## WATT CASE

Victoria Paper Has Leader Urging It to Be Tried Now

More than four months ago the Legislature of British Columbia ordered an inquiry into the case of Norman Watt because it was far from satisfied with the manner in which he had been treated by the Tolmie government. Mr. Shelly dismissed Mr. Watt from his position as government agent at Prince Rupert in a summary fashion. The first reason the minister of finance gave for his action was that Mr. Watt had been "playing politics." The second reason he gave was that Mr. Watt had retained government funds-coroner's fees which always had been considered a perquisite of the office of government agent at Prince Rupert and certain other districts in the province. The resolution of the House, therefore, originated more in a general desire to investigate Mr. Shelly than it did to investigate Mr. Watt.



### GREETINGS TOPREMIER

Ramsay MacDonald Writes to Mackenzie King By Air Mail Carried on R-100

OTTAWA, Aug. 2:-A letter from the Prime Minister of Great Britain to the Prime Minister of Canada crossed the ocean on the R-100. Under date of July 28, Premier Mac-Donald wrote to Premier King as

"My dear Prime Minister:

"I take the opportunity of the maiden voyage of the R-160 to Canada to send you and your colleagues my very best wishes and express the hope that the flight will be the forerunner of a regular airship mail service which will draw closer the bonds which link our two countries together.

"It is my confident belief that what has already been achieved in the air in the past decade is as nothing to the potentialities now opening before us."






## WINRACE

In the words of her skipper, Captain Ned Heard, 'Shamrock is beautiful, and she is all right.' And from all I hear it clearly appears that no challenger ever left these shores with a brighter chance of success. On finishing her trials Shamrock had sailed 22 races, of which she had won 15, Lulworth having beaten her six times, and Britannia once. She is now sailing on her voyage to America."




