

Woodsworth, Winnipeg Laborite, went further in the House of Commons last night than urging the appointment of a Canadian as Governor General and agreed to name a Canadian for the post. Woodsworth accepted a suggestion of J. F. Pouliot, Liberal, that the chief justice of Canada automatically become Governor General of the Dominion. Carrying the suggestion even further, he advocated the making of chief justices of the various provinces the lieutenant-governors of those provinces.

Down at Sydney, in Australia, they are getting ready to welcome Miss Amy Johnson, said an editorial in the Vancouver Province last Wednesday. It seems they are going to be glad to see her, and we hear of forty-seven speeches and fourteen receptions to be given. She deserves the welcome, and perhaps something better than the speeches. She is 25, pretty, blueeyed, fair-haired. She is also a remarkable young woman. She is flying alone from London to Sydney, twelve thousand miles, and she has achieved the greater part of the journey. Late Dr. R. T. Davidson Guided English Church Through Difficult Days

The Most Rev. Dr. Randall Thomas Davidson, Archbishop of Canterbury from 1904 to 1928, whose death occurred on Sunday in London, guided the Church of England through one of the most difficult periods of its history.

As Primate of All England, the enerable archbishop, affectionately called the "Grand Old Gentleman" of the Church of England, had been the balance wheel between two forces of the church, one moving toward modernism, the other clinging to the wealth and ritual and ceremony of the past.

Although there had been rumors of his retirement for nearly four years, announcement of the resignation of Dr. Davidson, made by the Prime Minister in July, 1928, reated somewhat of a sensation. It was the first time any Archbishop of Canterbury had resigned, all his predecessors from medieval times having died in harness or been

After having made a masterly address in favor of the revised Prayer Book in the House of Lords, he witnessed with great satisfaction its acceptance by that body, only to have it rejected the next day by the lower house of Parliament.

On that occasion he was a spectator in the Peers' Gallery and after the vote had been taken he, in tears, left the house, leaning on the arm of the Archbishop of York. That was in December, 1927. His spirits somewhat buoyed by the possibility of success through further revision to meet the previous objections, the archbishop worked along that line and in June, 1928, the House of Commons again rejected it. The second rejection is said to have greatly affected the aged prelate.





HINTS FOR GARDENERS

ANNUAL FLOWERS

Some hardy annuals can be sown outdoors where they are to bloom writes Miss Isabella Preston, in the introduction to the Dominion Deartment of Agriculture bulletin on Annual Flowers. The soil should be in good condition, well dug, and raked, and made quite fine before sowing, which should be done when the soil is rather dry. The depth of planting depends on the size of the seed. Small ones are sown on the surface, and pressed into the soil with a flat piece of wood. For larger ones, remove an inch or two of soil and sow thinly then cover with the fine surplus soil and press down evenly. In a border, the seed should be sown in an uneven circle with stakes marking the place. When the seedlings are a few inches high, thin them out to a distance apart according to the mature height of the plant. Do the thinning out when the ground is moist. Those annuals broadcast or sown in the clumps are Alyssum, Candytuft, Calendula, Cornflower, Eschscho-Itzia, Sunflower, Matthiola Bicornis, Mignonette, Nasturtium, Poppy Portulaca, and Virginia Stock. Those annuals which are best sown in rows and transplanted to their permanent position in the border as seedlings include Asters, Coreonsis, Lavatera splendens, Malope, Mirabilis, Nemesia, Pansy Petunia, Phlox Drummondi, Rudbeckia and Scabiosa. With the last list, it is advisable to start the seed early in a hot bed or a cold
