## AMERICAN FISHERMEN PROTEST PROPOSED FISH TREATY

### Final Halibut Sale of Season Here This Morning; All Boats Are Said to Be Accounted For

With all Canadian boats in and accounted for and few, if any, American boats still out, what will probably be the final auction of the season on the local Fish Exchange took place this morning when a total of 90,000 pounds—all American—was sold, not including 52,000 pounds which was taken on to Seattle on account of low prices. Prices were very weak and the top bid of the day was 8.9c and 4c. While no more are expected, it is possible, of course, that the odd American boat may yet struggle in. 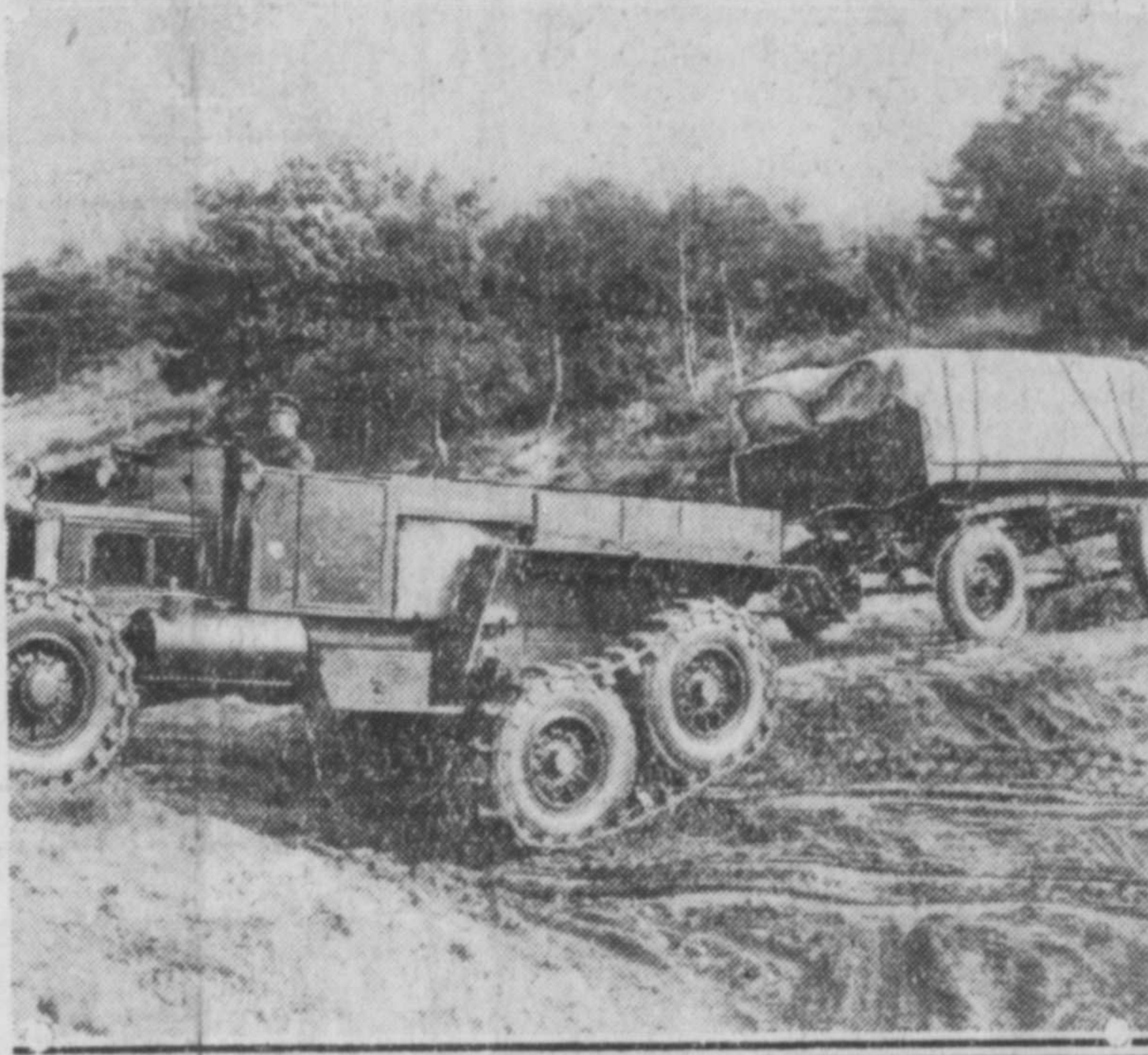
### ECKMANN LANDS SAFE IN SEATTLE

SEATTLE, Nov. 21.—Pilot Ansel Eckmann and two companions arrived here at noon today from Prince Rupert with the plane "Wrangell" which has had engine trouble.

### Fairchild Seaplanes Now Here Will Likely Leave For Atlin Soon To Conduct Operations There

Wet Weather Has Made It Difficult to Continue Northern Search Today—Two Planes Still Held at Smithers

Should Flight Lieutenant Phinney and Flying Officer Dunlap be delayed here much longer, it is understood that the Air Force might send two ski-equipped planes from Winnipeg to Atlin instead of dispatching the machines which are at present in Prince Rupert. Press dispatches confirm the report that the Air Force is planning to send machines to hunt for Captain Burke.

It was learned unofficially this afternoon that the two Royal Canadian Air Force seaplanes, which have been operating out of here for the past 10 days in the search for Pilot Robin Renahan, may be dispatched from here to Atlin, after two more full days of flying in local waters, to join the search for Capt. E. J. A. Burke. It was learned that the planes would continue the search either for Renahan or Burke until all hope has to be given up of either being found.

In the event of the two Fairchild seaplanes being ordered to Atlin, they would first return to their regular base at Jericho Beach, Vancouver, to have skis installed and other changes made to fit them for winter work. They would probably be flown from Vancouver to Atlin over the route via Prince George, Smithers, Hazelton and Telegraph Creek.

Flight Lieutenant Phinney and Flying Officer Dunlap are in charge of the planes here and would probably take them to Atlin.

Word received from Atlin today is to the effect that moderating weather and torrential rainfall yesterday added to the difficulties of the Burke search. Pilot E. L. Wasson of the Treadwell-Yukon Co., whose plane is on skis, is unable to continue the search meantime.

"Planes cannot land here on skis at present and, with rain, the small lakes are risky," said a report received from Atlin today.

This means that the two rescue planes of the Pacific International Airways, which have been tied up for over a week at Smithers where they have been equipped with skis, must continue to remain there for the present.

### Further Lengthening Of Close Season and Catch Limit Opposed

Henry O'Malley, United States Fisheries Commissioner, Says Situation Is Serious and Something Must Be Done Soon

SEATTLE, Nov. 21.—Halibut fishermen here yesterday protested against the proposed new halibut treaty between United States and Canada. They opposed in particular any attempt to lengthen the present closed season for fishing or to restrict the catch. Henry O'Malley, United States commissioner of fisheries, in presenting his case, declared that the halibut fishing situation was in bad shape and some steps to improve it should be taken immediately.

### RADIO IS REQUIRED

Experts Feel That Burke-Renahan Search Planes Should Be Thus Equipped For Safety

MOTHER SHIP COMING

Two United States Navy Planes Will Leave Seattle Within Next Few Days

VANCOUVER, Nov. 21.—Air pilots, engineers and navigators, meeting here last night to discuss the Renahan and Burke search operations, were of the opinion that steps should be taken to ensure that planes operating on the fringes of civilization should be compelled to carry proper radio equipment. This, it is felt, would be wise in the event of search planes themselves getting into difficulties.

SEATTLE, Nov. 21.—The two United States Navy planes, which have come north from San Diego to join the search for Robin Renahan and companions between Prince Rupert and Ketchikan, will be required to remain here for a few days at least before leaving for Ketchikan. Acting Commander Briggs of Puget Sound Navy Yard last night issued an order that the seagoing naval tug Swallow, which will act as a refuelling ship for the planes, must precede them north. The Swallow may leave here today.

**TIMES ARE NOT GOOD**

Queen Charlotte City Board of Trade Wonders at Statement of District Engineer

The following resolution has been passed by Board of Trade at Queen Charlotte City:

"Whereas the provincial district engineer, R. K. Gwyer gave certain statements to the Daily News, printed in Prince Rupert, over which the headlines read, 'No poverty on the Islands.' These statements being that the fishing industry here was a success, and that road work was still continuing (this not being generally true).

"Whereas the true facts of the case are, that in the Queen Charlotte City district fishing was a failure, and the government road work only of short duration averaging at most from seven weeks to three months.

"And whereas the statements of the engineer are as untrue in fact as they are unjust to those whose earnings have been and are still very meagre, owing to lack of fish, and the means of ordinary employment.

"Therefore, be it resolved, that the district engineer be asked to explain how he gave such statements to the press and his reasons for so doing."

**CONDITION ON ISLANDS**

Editor, Daily News—  
In your issue November 4, G. R. Gwyer, provincial district engineer, is quoted as saying that people on the Islands are pretty good this fall, that people on the Islands have been working all summer, and road work still continuing for a few weeks. Evidently, Mr. Gwyer is referring to the north end, and it may be true that part of the Islands, which I hope is true. With regard to the southern part it's not true, as to work on the roads or distress through unemployment.

Many of the men worked on the roads two months and one week only, others only seven weeks to date. Men with large families worked about three months. Since August no work was done south of Tl El until three weeks ago when three men and a team part time have been filling pitch holes for the benefit of car traffic.

Had Mr. Gwyer consulted the merchants and others in touch with conditions here he would not be so optimistic. The writer knows of many here who are living on small means and who at times go hungry as they have no means, and no credit. All are property owners.

If Mr. Gwyer could find a month's work for the needy he would be doing a charitable deed, whereas his optimism may cause severe suffering.

**ROTARY IS WITH YMCA**

By Resolution Service Club Backs Movement After Hearing Address

The Rotary Club at its meeting yesterday endorsed the Y. M. C. A. project after hearing an address by A. S. McAllister, Toronto, railway secretary, who gave a brief address on the work of the organization.

W. H. Tobey, chairman of the committee, also spoke briefly. Mr. McAllister explained that, according to the constitution of the Y. M. C. A., any self-respecting person might join. It was non-national, non-sectarian and non-denominational in character. He read the pledge which should be taken by any person wishing to join, a pledge that any Christian person could take.

The speaker said that during the 32 years in which he had been a member of the organization no religious difficulties had been encountered. The aim of the organization was to substitute worthy effort for those things which were less desirable. Another aim was to discover and train for leadership. It was a permanent organization. Many independent clubs had been started, operated for a brief time and failed. There was no doubt of the achievements back of the Y. M. C. A.

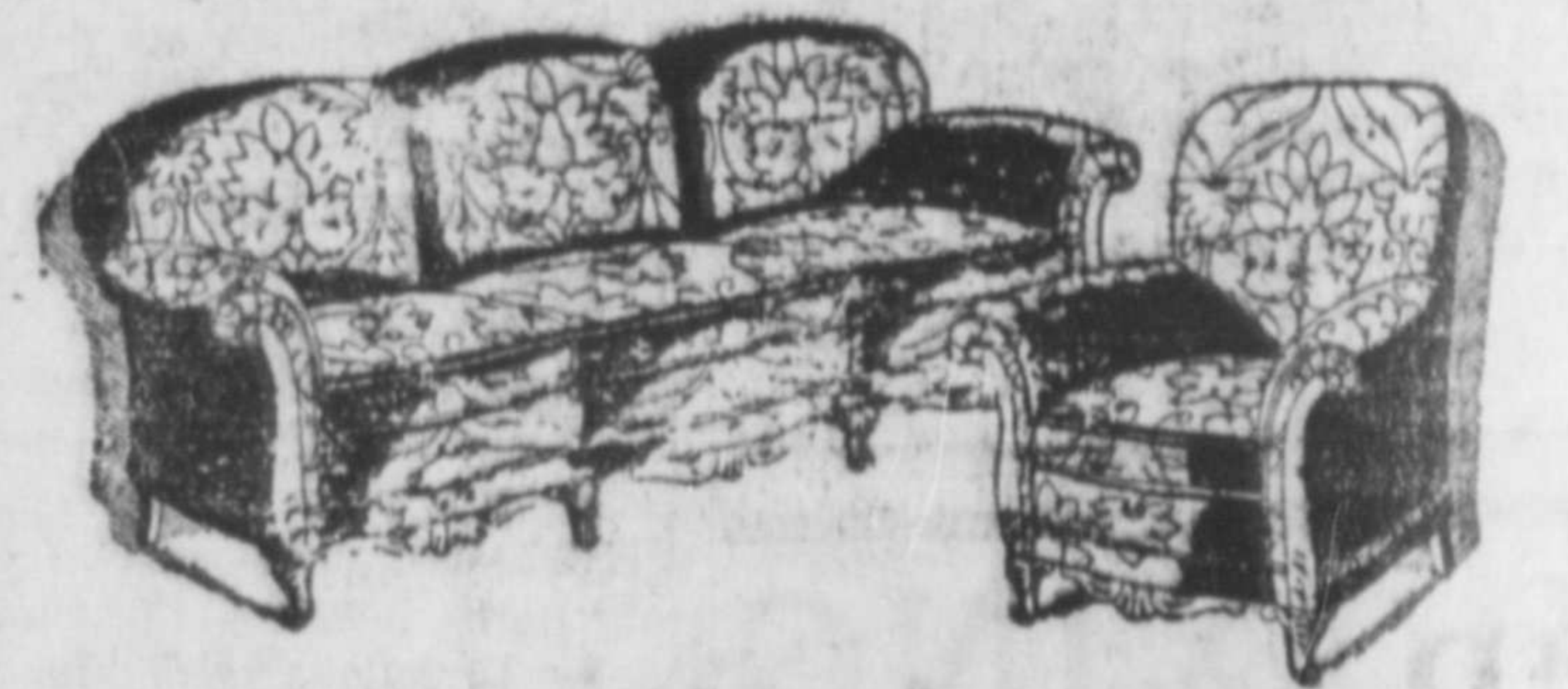
In reply to T. H. Johnston, Mr. McAllister said the Y. M. C. A. members had visiting privileges with other similar organizations in any part of the world.

## WEST WINS ALL PRIZES

Made Clean Sweep of Stock Judging Contests at Toronto

TORONTO, Nov. 21.—Western Canada attendants at the Royal Winter Fair were jubilant last night over the fact that the prairie provinces made a pretty clean sweep of the Canadian championship contests in juvenile livestock club contests conducted here annually by the Canadian National Railways, in co-operation with federal and provincial agricultural authorities.

Alberta won both Dominion-wide championships in the Swine Club and Cattle Club contests of the C.N.R. against teams from all the other provinces. The new Canadian Swine Club champions are Robert Wyllie and W. E. Schmidt from Vegreville, Alta., and the new Canadian Cattle Club kings are two boys from Camrose, Alta., Vernon and Borden McNeight, brothers.

In addition to these wins by Alberta, the three first places in the Swine Club contest were taken by Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba respectively with the scorings of 6666, 663 and 654, indicating how closely the contest was. The other teams were from New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and British Columbia, in order of marking.

This is the seventh year the west has won the Canadian juvenile Swine Club contest of the Canadian National Railway and it is the second time in eight years that Alberta has won the championship. The Cattle Club contests have been going on for only three years and this is the first year Alberta had a team entered. They walked off with the championship with very effective work done by the Camrose boys coached by Jack Howe, of the Alberta department of agriculture.

The Vegreville swine champions were coached by Fred Newcombe of the same department.

The contests were the closest in markings in years. The majority of teams in both swine and cattle club work showed remarkable form and excellent training, and pleased the judges greatly. Only one point separated the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick teams in the swine contest.

In the individual scoring Ivan Macdonald of Wiseton, Sask., was highest in the swine contest, and Warren Mackenzie of Nova Scotia was highest in the cattle club judging.

The swine club champions become possessors of the Robb Trophy, donated by W. H. Robb, vice-president of the C.N.R., and the Cattle Club champions get the W. J. Black Trophy presented by Dr. Black of the C.N.R. The champions were special guests at the banquet of the federal minister of agriculture.

## SKIDEGATE SHIPMENT

**Force Is Increased By Kitsault-Eagle Company On Skidegate Sunrise Group**

SKIDEGATE, Nov. 21.—With the completion and occupancy of the new winter camp at the Skidegate-Sunrise group of claims near here, the Kitsault-Eagle Silver Mines, Ltd., has increased its working force and now has a crew drifting on No. 1 vein on the 25-foot level and a day and night shift working on the same vein at the 50-foot level.

The vein shows a total width of eight feet on both levels and contains some very rich lenses of spectacular free gold ore. Some 50 feet of drifting will be done on the 25-foot level, on completion of which stoping of ore will begin there.
