
United States Launches New 10,000-Ton Cruiser

Guthrie, Stevens and Dupre Are Accompanying Premier Overseas-Efforts to Be Made to Market Canadian Grain

OTTAWA, Sept. 23:-Hon. Hugh Guthrie, minister of justice, Hon. H. H. Stevens, minister of trade and commerce, and Hon. Maurice Dupre, solicitor-general, are accompanying Premier R. B. Bennett to the Imperial Conference. Also making the trip are a number of technical advisers including representatives of the Wheat Pool, among them A. J. McPhail, president of the Canadian Cooperative Wheat Producers Limited. Mr. Bennett announced before leaving yesterday that every possible effort would be made by the government to secure a better price and a wider market for Canadian wheat.

Sir George Perley will be acting Premier during the absence of Premier Bennett. Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion will be acting minister of trade and commerce; Hon. W. A. Gordon, acting minister of justice, and Hon. E. B. Ryckman, acting minister of finance. The duties of the solicitorgeneral will be discharged departmentally.

For nearly two hours this morning Norman Watt was on the witness stand and during the whole of that time no new fact of any importance was brought out. He successfully resisted all attempts of counsel to shake him in his statement that he thoroughly believed he was entitled to the coroner's fees, that he had been so instructed when he took office and that it had never occurred to him that there was any-

thing wrong in doing so. At the conclusion of the taking of evidence and before hearing the argument of counsel, Mr. Justice Macdonald announced that at the conclusion he would adjourn the commission to meet again finally on October 2 at Victoria and that two days notice of any new matter to be brought forward then would be given on either side. This was objected to by A. M. Manson for Mr. Watt but the commissioner insisted, was quoted here today at 711/4c.

Six Survivors Arrive at Sydney, N.S., To Tell Story of Foundering

NORTH SYDNEY, N.S., Sept. 23:- Eight passengers and two members of the crew of the Newfoundland schooner Caranza, which left for Burin, Nfld., were lost Thursday night when the vessel sank after being split in two by lightning off the eastern coast of Cape Breton, it was learned when six survivors were picked up 75 miles west of St. Pierre, Miquelon, Sunday night and arrived here today on the schooner Vignette.

All those dead are from Newfoundland, including Captain Joshua Matthews.

Government Agent Was Entitled To Coroner's Fees, Document States

Former Local Official Takes Stand In Own Defence-Gives Clear and Frank Evidence—Was Cognizant of No Misdoing Whatever

Commissions by which Norman A. Watt was appointed coroner on September 30, 1924, and again on November 13 of the same year read that he was "to enjoy the office and execute the duties of coroner together with all rights, fees and privileges belonging to the office," it was brought out here yesterday afternoon at Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald's commission of inquiry into charges that Watt had received and taken wrongfully to his own use fees received from the city of Prince Rupert for services as coroner. Between the years 1924 and 1928 he admitted having held something like fifty inquests. Sometimes these inquests had been held in the morning, sometimes in the afternoon and sometimes in the evening but in the majority of cases they had been in the afternoon. The government auditor had never intimated to him that the coroner's fees should be accounted for to the government. Indeed, the matter had never been discussed with the auditors. Under the revenue oath, Mr. McNeill testified, the civil servant, on taking office, undertook "not to take or keep either directly or indirectly any fees or perquisites received through the execution of said office" other than his salary. This oath had been sworn to by Watt, witness said.

Mr McNeill then proceeded to identify certain circulars he had found in the government agent's office here. One of these had to do with the schedule of coroner's fees while another had to do with the question of witness fees for con-

IMPERIAL CONFERENCE

Today Premier Bennett is leaving for the Imperial Conference in London to represent Canada with a new policy and a new personnel. Premier Scullin will also be a new premier who has never before visited England.

The conference will deal with the outstanding question of inter-imperial trade and while it is likely to be intensely interesting and rather spectacular it seems doubtful whether much will be done of a permanent nature. Great Britain is almost a free trade country while all the Dominions are protectionist.

There seems to be a trend in Britain also toward protection and it is likely that the present conference will help to influence that country in the same direction. When all countries of the world have their tariff walls so high that it is with difficulty they are scaled, then all may turn their attention to pulling them down or to arranging for reciprocity within groups such as the countries of the British Empire.

Mr. Bennett, as has been said, will go with a new policy. turn in coroner's fees. 



mostly of a technical nature in which it was shown that he was paid for city inquests but not for those conducted or originating in the unorganized districts. There was an occasional case at places such as Stewart or Terrace but no charge was made in those cases as he had been specially instructed not to do

Mr. Watt said it was difficult to get information when he took over the office as the atmosphere in the department was decidedly frigid and not congenial.

The accounts were audited regularly by the department at which times he discussed financial matters with them but did not remember ever discussing coroner's fees. It had never once been mentioned. C. L Monroe was his successor in office and he had instructed him similarly in regard to the fees. Mr. Monroe was later called and confirmed this and said he had not kept the fees as a discussion regarding its legality arose.

Mr. Watt said he had remained about a month in charge of the office at much personal inconvenlence to himself.


