BYLAWS FOR RELIEF WORK PASSED

TRAGEDY IN NORTH RESULT OF PLANE LANDING ON ICE

Big Majorities for Bylaws Put Before Taxpayers Yesterday For Grading and Sewer Work

The ratepayers of the city yesterday gave a decisive vote for the passing of the two bylaws to provide employment relief during the present winter. The opposition was very small, so small as to be practically negligible. While only 465 persons cast their votes, most of them voted in the affirmative. Returning Officer Jones was in charge and his deputies were Walter Vance and William Robb, while helping in the final count were Frank Macdonald and Malcolm McLeod. The vote follows:

FREDERICKS COMES BACK

Alleged Killer Is Now at Prince George—Preliminary Trial to Be Held at Vanderhoof

Carl Fredericks, who was arrested near Edmonton on a charge of having brutally murdered two German companions at Trembleur Lake north of Fort St. James during the past summer, arrived at Prince George on Wednesday night of this week. In about a week's time, it is expected that Fredericks' preliminary trial at Vanderhoof on a charge of murder will be commenced.

Child Killed When Run Over By Oil Truck

VICTORIA, Nov. 29.—Knocked down by an oil truck on Esquimalt road late yesterday afternoon Argus Sims, eight year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Sims, suffered a fracture of the skull and died shortly after.

McFarland Says He Is Taking Over Management of Pool For Reason of National Emergency

WINNIPEG, Nov. 29.—John L. McFarland of Calgary, one of Western Canada's most prominent wheat men, stated yesterday that he had accepted the general management of the Canadian Wheat Pool only from a sense of public responsibility in what he considers a national emergency. He declared that he would accept no salary in disposing of wheat now held by the Pool. He stated that, while it was a serious situation, it was not without elements of optimism. With grain selling below cost of production, consumption was being largely stimulated. Also the situation offered speculators the opportunity of entering the market on an investment basis.

CONSERVATIVES WIN ELECTION IN SCOTLAND TODAY

EAST RENFREW, Scotland, Nov. 29.—Conservatives retained East Renfrew seat in the by-election today, which returned the Marquis of Douglas and Clydesdale victor over Baillie Irwin, Independent, whose endorsement by the Scottish Laborites was regarded as widening the breach in Labor ranks. The Conservative majority was about 7,000.

MAYOR IS PLEASED

Expresses Appreciation to Ratepayers For Supporting Policy of Council

Mayor Orme this morning expressed great pleasure at the fact that the two relief bylaws had passed yesterday. He asked the News to express his appreciation of the substantial support received. The work was badly needed and would be the first step in caring for the unemployed during the winter. He said he felt the work was needed to be done and the action of the ratepayers yesterday enabled the city council to take advantage of the offer of the provincial government to provide \$16,250 out of provincial and federal funds for the relief work. The council had tried to provide suitable work and he was glad to know that the ratepayers appreciated their efforts and supported them.

Adventure After Adventure For Amy Johnson; Lost Way In Fog Not Long Ago; Landed at Sea

No one must imagine that because Amy Johnson has returned home from her wonderful trip to Australia that her adventures are ended. She is not like that. The other day she had another hairbreadth escape, particulars of which have arrived here in a letter from her father to his brother, T. H. Johnson of Prince Rupert. The letter said:

"Having been invited to attend some functions at Hull, Amy left at 2:45 on Sunday in her plane. She experienced heavy clouds and bad visibility, so immediately got above the clouds and was some 6,000 feet up. There she found perfect weather, blue sky and sunshine overhead and the clouds beneath. Then, thinking it was time that she was at Hull, she began to come through the clouds and was fully 20 minutes coming through them. When through, she found she was in darkness and also found she was over the North Sea with no idea in what part. She turned right west and then saw some lights. Coming down to them it was found that they were ships. This went on for an hour and still she could not see any land and it was very dark. She got 'windy' and felt she had to do something, so she took off her shoes and decided to come down on the sea alongside a ship and swim for it. She got her door opened and had almost decided on this course when she saw a lighthouse and, proceeding to it, located a beach and came down on it, landing on soft sand in a very small space.

"Amy found she had landed on Spurn Point. She got on the telephone and we went to bring her home. Today she moved her plane to the aerodrome.

"What a girl! Where does she get her nerve?" concludes the letter. "Tonight she is the guest of honor at the Aero Club ball. On Wednesday the fishing industry is making

her presentation and on Wednesday evening her old school are giving her a dinner. Then on Friday she goes to Scarborough for some gliding events. Really she could be engaged three times every day if she would accept the invitations. In London she is moving right in the tip top circles, so there you are."

POOL HAS POOR YEAR

Report Tells of Reduced Sales During Season Ending In August Last

WINNIPEG, Nov. 29.—The Canadian Wheat Pool export sales were cut almost in half during the year ending August 31 last. The annual report of the Pool's selling agency reports that in the 12-month period, characterized as the most difficult year in the history of the pool, export sales of wheat totalled 56,870,000 bushels compared with 180,000,000 the previous year.

Four Children Killed By Landing Plane and Several Are Injured

Flyer Did Not See Young Folk Who Were Playing Behind Barrels of Gasoline on Ice at Fort Chipewyan

EDMONTON, Nov. 29.—Four children were killed instantly and three seriously injured while another suffered minor injuries at Fort Chipewyan, Alta., 500 miles north of here late on Thursday when an airplane, piloted by Capt. W. N. Sherlock of the Commercial Airways, crashed into a pile of gasoline drums behind which the children were hiding at play. Sherlock and the passengers were unhurt.

Coal Strike In England Is Averted

LONDON, Nov. 29.—Emmanuel Shinwell, secretary for mines, announced today that the danger of a national strike in the coal industry had been averted. He said the owners and miners in practically all the important coal areas were proceeding with negotiations looking toward arbitration of their differences and that there would be no national upheaval Monday.

FRANCE TO BUY WHEAT

H. H. Stevens Says Canada Will Find Market There For Her Product

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—On his arrival here last night from London, where he attended the Imperial Conference, Minister of Trade and Commerce H. H. Stevens said France would be substantially in the market for Canadian wheat this winter. He expressed the belief that arrangements made in France for the sale of Canadian wheat would be lasting for several years.

STRIKE IN SCOTLAND IMMINENT

Nothing But Government Intervention Can Stop Coal Workers Going Out Tomorrow

LONDON, Nov. 29.—Complete stoppage of work in all Scottish coal fields beginning tomorrow afternoon was announced today, following the breakdown of negotiations between mine owners and workers. It will affect 92,000 men. Apparently the only thing which could possibly prevent a strike would be Government intervention. Meantime the owners and workers in the South Wales fields, were still negotiating in an effort to avert a general strike in that area.

SURVEYING BABINE ROAD

SMITHERS, Nov. 29.—J. A. Ruthford, B.C.L.S., has left to make a survey of the road between here and Babine Lake and expects to be away for about three weeks. Improvements in this road may form part of unemployment relief work plans in this riding.

Work Mostly Confined to Married Men

Following the passing of the two unemployment relief bylaws, the engineer is busy preparing for the commencement of the work which will get under way next week. It is found that owing to the fact that there are so many married men with families out of work, whom it is necessary to keep earning, the relief work will be confined very largely to them.

It is also suggested that private citizens having even a small amount of work to be done should get in touch with the employment office and have the men who are needing work employed on it.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 29.—Fred Marty of Los Angeles reported to the police today that \$14,000 in United States currency and a diamond ring valued at \$2,000 had been stolen from his room in a local hotel last night.

WEBB IS MAYOR OF WINNIPEG

WINNIPEG, Nov. 29.—Mayor Ralph Webb was re-elected mayor for the fifth term at yesterday's civic elections. He defeated Marcus Hyman, the Independent Labor Party candidate by a majority in the vicinity of 10,000.

KINGDOM OF CANADA

A move that would be a retrograde one would be the changing of this dominion to a kingdom. While it is already that in fact, there is no reason why we should tamper with the name.

Today there is a swing towards Empire and a swing away from closer relations with the United States. Some people interpret this to be a move toward all the snobbery and nonsense that goes with the older system, but they are mistaken. Canadian people do not want that sort of thing. They are well satisfied with being a dominion in a great commonwealth rather than a Kingdom in an Empire.

While this is only a play on words, there is something behind it all which is more than words. For a democracy the democratic names fit best, so let us stick to the old name "Dominion" and not copy the outgrown civilizations of Europe where they too are moving away from Kingdoms towards Commonwealths.

COST OF DOING BUSINESS

The cost of doing business comes high but the cost of not doing business comes much higher. That is where the newspapers come useful. They not only provide readers with the news of the day but they provide merchants with that publicity which helps them to do business.

SATISFACTORY RESULT

The result of the voting on the bylaws yesterday was very satisfactory. The members of the city council will feel much encouraged and the men who have been trying hard to keep the wolf from the door will have an opportunity to get something to eat.

Another good thing is that some very useful work will be done for the city.

RADIO IN CANADA

Considerable public opinion seems to be rallying to the support of the Aird report recommending the nationalization of radio, so much so that whatever the report of the parliamentary commission now studying the matter, it is likely that radio in Canada will receive much attention at the coming session, says the Winnipeg Free Press. Briefly, the Aird commission suggests taking over existing stations, compensating the owners, erecting seven 50,000-watt stations, and setting up a governing board giving full representation to the provinces and to the Federal Government. The cost is estimated at \$3,325,000, with an extra vote of one million dollars per annum for five years to meet operating expenses.

During the year since the Aird report was received applications have been sent forward from various sources, including one from the Canadian Pacific Railway, asking permission to build a series of stations across Canada. These licenses have not yet been granted and will not be passed upon finally in all likelihood until Parliament makes its decision.

Advocates of both private and public ownership are busy, drawing examples or warning, as the case may be, chiefly from Great Britain, where government ownership is in force, and the United States, where private enterprise prevails. In argument the British plan seems to have the advantage, although in fairness it should be pointed out that Great Britain being so much smaller, with a homogeneous population and practically isolated from other systems, is in a position very different from that which prevails here.

However, there are those in the United States who, fearing death from boredom superinduced by advertisement loaded programs, are looking at Great Britain with longing eyes.

HAD TRIP IN NORTH

Famous Priest, Author and Historian Had Interesting Summer

MONTREAL, Nov. 29 — After travelling 10,500 miles on a journey which took him through the Canadian Northwest and far into the ice bound Arctic, Rev. Father Duchaussois, celebrated author and historian, has returned to Montreal for a short respite before going to the jungles of Africa.

Father Duchaussois crossed Canada via the C. N. railways in June and started into the north from McMurray, accompanied by Mgr. Gabriel Breynat, Apostolic vicar of the Mackenzie. He covered 6,500 miles by land, water and air to visit a handful of Eskimos and Indians in twenty scattered missions. They reached Akvick in July and from there went to Herchell Island where a new mission was established. In the Hudson's Bay Company steamer "Baychimo," they travelled down Coronation Gulf, braving the hazards of ice and feeling their way along the shore without a compass because the iron deposits in the rocks made it undependable.

Returning to civilization, Father Duchaussois covered in less than ten hours what would have taken two and a-half months by old methods of travel.

BEGIN WORK ON NEW DOCK

B. C. Keeley Tells of Plans to Push Work Forward as Rapidly As Possible

VANCOUVER, Nov. 29—Work on the rebuilding of the new Canadian National pier, which was destroyed by fire last August will be commenced on Saturday morning. With the preliminary stages of the work completed, everything will be rushed along as fast as possible and I believe we will have the new pier ready for operation early in June," said B. C. Keeley, Pacific Coast manager, C. N. steamships, who returned home from Montreal today.

Mr. Keeley has been in the east on business in connection with the reconstruction of the new pier but could make no announcement until the plans had been finally passed by the eastern executive officials. The plans have now reached Vancouver. The Northern Construction Company are the general contractors for the work, but the Canadian National engineering staff will be in charge.

The new pier will be laid out along somewhat similar lines to the one which was burned during the summer. It will be 1,000 feet in length and 220 feet in width. A double track will be constructed through the centre of the pier for the freight cars to be loaded and unloaded to and from the ships.

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WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Salmon Pack Was Large—Breakwater Needed For New Floats—Hunting Parties Are Active

British Columbia's salmon pack for the 1930 season is nearly 100,000 cases higher than the previous record of 1926 according to final official figures which have just been issued by the fisheries department. The total is 2,163,712 cases of which District No. 2 contributed 278,899 cases; District No. 2, 1,497,003 cases, and District No. 3, 387,810 cases. The 1929 total was 1,389,476 cases; 1928, 2,035,629 cases; 1927, 1,360,634 cases; 1926, 2,065,451 cases.

A large bird hunting party numbering seven and led by Claude Kirkendal and Charlie Evelt left Wednesday night of this week at midnight aboard the Massett Cannery fish packer Jedway for a goose and duck hunting trip to Naden Harbor, Graham Island. The party, the first one from here this fall to visit Naden Harbor, expects to spend about a week on the Islands.

The British Columbia Fishermen's Co-operative Association, which entered the canning business for the first time this year, is reported to have had a successful season. In the association's plant at Vancouver a total of 120,000 cases of salmon were canned while a small plant at Alberni on the west coast of Vancouver Island put up 15,000 cases. In spite of the fact that nothing has been explained as to how and where this canned salmon is to be disposed of, it is hoped that, when the association's books for 1930 are closed, the men will find that they have fared as well as formerly in actual cash. The association is now talking of expansion for next year by adding another cannery somewhere on the north part of the coast, probably not far from Prince Rupert.

The New Floats

Following the recent westerly blow which stirred things up a bit but did no actual damage to the fleet, owing to the fact that prompt action was taken, the effectiveness of the new fishermen's floats just east of the dry dock has been the

subject of considerable discussion. It is pretty generally conceded that any site on the central waterfront, which is where the fishermen want to be, would not be free of hazard in a strong westerly gale so there is agreement on the new suggestion that a floating breakwater might remedy the situation. Accordingly, this suggestion is being transmitted to the public works with the hope that the government may see fit to do something about it. The floats themselves are most satisfactory and the fishermen are only desirous that they should be fitted out so they may be really used as the permanent and safe headquarters of the fleet.

Hatchery egg-takes at the principal British Columbia stations specializing in the propagation of sockeyes are generally reported to have been excellent this year. The Babine and Skeena Hatcheries are among the plants which did well.

The hunting around Morris Cove must be good else the party with Capt. Nels Peterson on the halibut boat Ternon would have been back by Thursday, they having been an even week out then. The party includes Jack Christiansen, Harry Menzie and Pete Jensen.

Nineteen proposed amendments to the fishery regulations include three which directly affect anglers. One is the removal of the daily limit from the catch of Dolly Varden trout which are conceded to be a pest. The second of the proposed new regulations, and one which is not meeting with a very hearty reception on the part of anglers, is that the limit of three steelhead when angling be applied to the whole province instead of exclusively to the Vedder River. The last and perhaps the most important amendment is the proposal to allow herring fishermen to sell the trout that are caught in their nets. This proposal meets with opposition on the grounds that it would encourage the catching and marketing of trout more particularly as they are on their way to spawn.

Initial work in an investigation under the auspices of the Biological Board designed to trace the migration of crabs in this district has been interrupted by the transfer of the investigator to another field. It is hoped, however, to continue the work next year. One of the chief objects is to definitely ascertain when crabs of the district spawn and to regulate the close season accordingly. There has been some dispute as to when exactly crabs do spawn.

Capt. A. M. Jangord, skipper of the American halibut boat Chancellor, came into Seattle recently with a story of having sighted a merman off Destruction Island. The creature, Capt. Jangord declared, rose almost vertically out of the sea to a height of several feet and blinked and stared at members of the crew of the Chancellor. It had a wrinkled face, much resembling that of an ape, and, from the color and general contour, it is believed to have probably been a stellar sea lion with a deformed face. Some years ago Capt. Leonard Pedersen of the halibut boat Betty Jane reported sighting a very similar creature in much the same vicinity.

Since being ordered to California two years back on account of ill health, Capt. Henrik J. Henrikson, former skipper of the halibut boats Teton, Mary M. Christopher and Cedric, has built himself a fine new halibut boat and next season expects to be back on the banks again, his health being now practically completely restored again. The boat, named Saga, is nearing completion at Oakland near San Francisco. It is being equipped with a 50 h.p. Fabco-Tuxham engine. Mrs. Henrikson has actively assisted her husband in the building of the new boat.

The 40-foot American halibut schooner Mayflower, well known

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here, was sold by the United States marshal at Seattle recently to Oscar Sirstad who will operate the vessel on the fishing grounds next year.

Capt. Louis Pfundt, veteran halibut boat skipper, who has been out of the game for some time, will resume halibut fishing next season with a new 40-foot boat which is being built for him at Shelton, Wash. The new boat is to be equipped with a 40 h.p. Frisco-Standard gas engine.

Back From Norway

Capt. William Hegge, well known here as owner and skipper of the American halibut schooner Republic, has returned to Seattle after a trip to his former home in Norway. The Republic was in charge of Capt. Jack Courage during Capt. Hegge's absence. She was the first of the Seattle boats to quit fishing this year for the winter, having laid up about the middle of September.

Although he said when he left a couple of weeks ago that he would be away all winter engaged in hand logging near Lowe Inlet, we notice Harry Scott, a well known old friend, back in town again this week. No doubt, Harry is in to do his Christmas shopping although here might, possibly, be other attractions under the white lights. In any case, he is back again and his shadow is no less.

A fish of a variety seldom taken in Alaska waters was a bottle-nose shark which was caught recently by the steam trawler New England. It weighed 155 pounds, measured six feet eight inches from tip to tail and was caught in Cook Inlet. The shark was frozen and has now been shipped east for exhibit as a curiosity. Although many other varieties are regularly captured by the fishermen, the bottle-nose shark is somewhat of a rarity in Alaska.

Capt. Joseph Paulsean, master of the United States Bureau of Fisheries patrol boat Scoter, died recently in the Bella Bella Hospital. He was taking his vessel from Ketchikan to Seattle when he was seized with a paralytic stroke. The Scoter put in at Bella Bella but Capt. Paulsean lived only a short time.
