

Manager of Edmonton Commercial Grads Gives Helpful Hints

(By Percy Page)

I have been asked to offer a few criticism of the play-both boys' and girls'-as I saw it Wednesday

To my mind, the two outstanding faults of the games, from a local point of view, were the eagerness of the players to shoot when he chances of success were almost regligible, and, second, the ease with which players were mancoured out of position. Inasmuch as the girls had very few opportunities to shoot the first criticism has to do mainly with the boys'

Statistics gathered over a long period of years show that only one shot in four ever goes in, and since these successful shots include many from close in, it follows that a long shot has only a very remote chance-I would say about one in seven-of being successful. Despite these actual figures the boys were shooting from away out on the floor, with the almost invariable result that the ball was imediately seized by the "c'nemy." No military leader would ever win [a game that way. Games that are] won by spectacular long shots read well in story books, but they don't work out in practice.

Championships in any line of sport are won by being better than average. Applied to basketball, it means that players must learn to beat the average of "one in four" that I have already spoken of. To illustrate let me refer to the first 16 points scored by the Grads. Up until the time the P. R. girls called for their first rest, the Grads had scored eight baskets, and those eight baskets came as a result of exactly eight shots. It is true that as the game progressed the Grads became a bit careless and missed the basket more than they should, but, for the most part, their shots were "dead on" and almost always; resulted in scores.

The Grads' System

This was accomplished by working the ball close in, so that the chances of success, instead of being about "one in four," were much better than an even bet. It was here that the system which has made the Grads famous was seen at its best. We try continually to manecuvre our opponents out of position until finally one of our players is almost directly under the basket and ready for an easy score. Frequently the ball may be passed about among our players ten, twenty or even more times-a rapid, accurate, short-passing style which will almost always draw an opposing player out of position. 



What more could one ask? We looked over the little rustic Anglican Church from which the floor has been torn, evidently to be used for other pur-

The ride up the valley on the railway is full of historic interest. The trail over which the gold seekers trudged is plainly visible and stops were made at various points to view scenes of historic interest or to enjoy the rugged scenery. Near the summit is a monument to the horses that lost their lives in Dead Horse Gulch. It is indeed a trip not to be missed.

But the flowers of Skagway! To many these were the great attraction. Dahlias as large as dinner plates were the rule in all the gardens of this charming village. They seem to have no pests in Skagway and more than that they evidently love flowers, else they would not care for them as they do. Go to Skagway to see the flowers. if for nothing else.

But this must be the end of the article because space is limited and I have not even mentioned Soapy Smith. We called at Wrangell southbound spending a pleasant two hours visiting the famous community house of the late Chief Shake and talking to the villagers. We called again at Juneau and Ketchikan. We did what most tourists do, walked the decks, met new people, talked and danced in the evening. Rev. James Gillett, Indian Agent for the Queen Charlotte Islands, who was last year adopted into the Haida nation as Chief Big Eagle, bespoke the sentiments which were felt generally for the late Mr. Simpson when he addressed a memorial service, attended by two hundred whites and Indians, which was held last Saturday afternoon at the Langara cannery, the service being conducted by Rev. C. O. Darby. Mr. Gillett spoke in part as fol-

"On an occasion such as this there are many subjects on which one could speak. We have not met here to hear a sermon but to show our respect for one who has left us, and also to express our sympathy to Mrs. Simpson and Sam, who are bereft of a husband and father.

"In showing our respect to Mr. Simpson, naturally we think of him when alive and what he accomplished. You know that the works that men do live after them. Man's life is short, when compared with the things he does, for oftimes they live and remain long after he is gone. You can see what I mean by thinking of Shakespeare. He died hundreds of years ago, yet his plays still live. I venture to say that, although Mr. Simpson has gone, his works will remain, and that this cannery which was established by his efforts, will continue to be spoken of as Simpson's cannery, for a long time to come. It has meant much for both New and Old Massett, and I know that the Indian people are deeply grieved at Mr. Simpson's passing. You had in Mr. Simpson a man who was interested i nyour welfare, and his aim was whole year round, so that you would be continually employed. He worked and planned with this in view. While we are met here to show our respect for Mr. Simpson, I feel sure that we shall often, in the days to come, have him in our minds, as we continually come in contact with the things with which he was asso-
