Planning to Colonize Queen Charlotte Islands with Hardy Fisherfolk from Old Country

Moreton Frewen, Economist and Financier, Enthusiastic over Prince Rupert and its Future and Especially over the Development of the Fisheries.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 A plan to colonize the Queen Charlotte Islands with fishermen and soldiers from the Old Country is one of the interesting schemes that Moreton Frewen, economist and financial expert, has in view. The plans are not worked out but Mr. Frewen has the ear of the public and a great deal of influence with the authorities both at Ottawa and at Victoria, as well as in England. He is now making investigations with a view to forwarding the scheme. He arrived here last night and will be in the city some days.

"It is a few months too early to expect much capital from England, but I am here looking into conditions and making plans," Mr. Frewen said to a Daily News representative this morning. "I have been in Prince Rupert, however, and am going to have a great deal to say. From everything I hear you are now in a healthy, improving condition and I look for a steady growth with development."

Mr. Frewen is interested in a great deal of land across the harbor which has already been laid out for a townsite. It includes the property of which the salt lakes are a part. Naturally he is interested in the city and its future, and he is also an enthusiast on the subject of food production and fisheries in Prince Rupert one of the food stores of the Empire. He says that Prince Rupert is being talked of everywhere.

Writing from Sir John Lawes, Moreton Frewen mentioned a statement in which that eminent man said that one acre of water off the harbor would produce more food than one hundred acres of pastureland in one of the fertile fish counties. The same was true here. Enough interest was taken in the fisheries nor was the wonderful wealth conserved. He expected to see a great development of these in the near future and Prince Rupert would benefit therefrom.

Mr. Frewen went on to quote the serious authorities on the use of fish which showed that at present there was seven pounds of meat used to one of fish. This portion should be changed. There would be much less tuberculosis and the general health of the nation would be better if less meat and more fish were used. Mr. Frewen has done much to draw public attention to Prince Rupert. He has written many magazine articles. One on Canada's Fertile Northland recently appeared in "The Nineteenth Century and After."

Mr. Frewen said that he had been much interested in the railroads. He had been to Vancouver and talked with the minister and as a result he felt sure that Prince Rupert had everything to gain and nothing to lose from the Government taking over the railroads. The Government realized its responsibilities to this place and the value of the port to the country and the result would be beneficial to the country. He felt that the Government was determined to go ahead with the plan and Prince Rupert would benefit.

E. Bissell, tax commissioner of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railroad, arrived in the city last evening. He is accompanied on his trip by Mrs. Bissell.

EX-EMPEROR IS CONCERNED IN INTRIGUES

Political Correspondent of Daily Mail Says He is in Constant Communication With Royalists.

 LONDON, Oct. 24.—The former Emperor and the former Crown Prince are concerned in intrigues of the German Royalists, the political correspondent of the Daily Mail asserts. The ex-emperor is far from leading a life of detachment from German affairs. He recently has seen a number of mysterious visitors from Germany and is receiving many telegrams. He is constantly in communication with some place in Germany by telephone, a private line having been attached to his residence across the frontier. These communications are with German Royalists.

SUGAR SUPPLY IS ARRIVING

Several Shiploads on Way to Vancouver, the First Being Due on Monday.

VANCOUVER, October 24.—The sugar shortage in British Columbia will be materially relieved within the next two months, is the statement made today by D. S. Rogers of the B. C. Sugar Refinery, who said that starting next month a larger quantity would be available. Two vessels from Fiji are on the way, the first carrying 70 tons due next Monday, and the second with 2,300 tons coming a week later. Then will follow several cargoes of Peruvian sugar. As to the future, sufficient raw material is in sight to assure to western Canada an ample supply for the first half of next year.

NEW ENGLAND BRINGS FISH

Number of Boats in Port Sell Catches at Fish Exchange This Morning.

The big trawler New England is unloading 75,000 lbs. of halibut at the Atlin Fisheries' plant today. This is her first call here this season. This morning's fish sale was larger than for some time, but the price was down to 49¢ for first class fish, after having sold for 20¢ at the last two sales.

Her hold was flooded and the damaged cargo removed after which the vessel proceeded for Prince Rupert.

British Government May Have to Resign

Defeated on Amendment to Alien Labor Law and House Adjourned until Monday to Consider Position.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 LONDON, October 24.—The country is suddenly faced with the possibility of the resignation of the Government, owing to unexpected developments in the House of Commons by a majority of members. Only about half the members were present and voted with the result that the Government was defeated by 185 to 113.

It is the general belief in political circles that the Government will not resign but it is not unlikely that Home Secretary Short who is in charge of the Alien Bill, may tender his resignation.

The Alien Bill, the earlier stages of which were disposed of during the summer session, was in its report stage. The committee had previously inserted an amendment withholding pilotage certificates from all aliens and today the Government sought by an amendment to modify this resolution in favor mainly of French pilots for whom special provision had been made in the existing pilotage act.

The amendment was defeated although in charge of Government whips. Andrew Bonar Law at once moved the adjournment of the House until Monday to enable the Government to consider what course it would adopt. He admitted that the defeat of the amendment with Government whips was a serious matter, requiring considerable consideration, but he declined to admit that it necessarily implied the resignation of the ministry.

KETCHIKAN MURDER WAS COLD-BLOODED

District Attorney Shot down on Street Last Evening by Patsy Shannahan

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 KETCHIKAN, October 24.—One of the foulest and most cold-blooded murders ever perpetrated in the North occurred here last evening at 5:30 when District Attorney Steve Ragar was shot in the head on one of the main streets in the presence of many people passing on the street. The shooting, it is said by eye-witnesses, was done by a logger, "Patsy" Shannahan, who has been acting strangely of late and had threatened Ragar after he had ordered him off the wharf. Immediately after the death, which was instantaneous, search parties were sent in all directions to locate Shannahan and he was placed under arrest coming out of his room in the hotel. Mr. Ragar was a married man with a family and had been district attorney in Ketchikan for a number of years. He was just returning home from his office, carrying a package of documents which he was taking home for his family. He was a respected citizen of Ketchikan and the ire of the people has been aroused by the terrible atrocity.

Thirty Majority for Government over Grand Trunk Ry.

W. L. Mackenzie King makes first speech in house following re-election to Parliament; Bill read second time last night

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 OTTAWA, October 24.—Shortly after midnight the Liberal amendment to the motion for the second reading of the Grand Trunk bill calling for the postponement of consideration of the railway measure until next session was defeated by a vote of 91 to 61. The second reading was then declared carried on the same division. Three Government supporters voted with the opposition, Major Gen. McLean, J. E. Johnston and Major Andrews. The House then went into committee on the bill, but progress was soon reported and the House rose at 12.20.

The bill is being considered in committee again today and it is expected to give it a third reading not later than Monday, when it will go to the Senate, where a debate of some duration is expected.

In the first speech of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, the new Liberal Leader, since his re-election to Parliament it was announced that D. D. McKenzie would continue to be House leader for the remainder of the session. Mr. King declared that the Government's proposal in the matter of the railway was not public ownership at all. Guaranteed and debenture stocks were left in the hands of the present possessors, to whom the Government guaranteed four per cent interest annually for thirty years.

H. H. Stevens of Vancouver interjected the statement that ownership of the road was vested in the voting stock and not in that which the Grand Trunk stockholders will keep. Mr. King, however, reiterated that so long as the stock remained in the hands of the present shareholders, the Government would not own the road. These stockholders will reap the benefit of the Government guarantee, which would increase the value of the stocks to par.

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TWO WEEKS OF VAUDEVILLE

Arrangements Made for a Large Musical Comedy Company to Give Series of Shows Here.

For two weeks, commencing tomorrow night, there will be a feast of musical comedy at the Westholme Theatre. Paul Aivazoff who arrived back from Seattle yesterday says that the Fisher's Folly Girls are a strictly high-class company of seventeen. There are six principals, a beauty chorus of eight and three comedians. They come here directly from the Orpheum circuit and played to crowded houses in Seattle.

The Folly Girls have a varied repertoire and will keep the local people well entertained for the next two weeks.

POLICE COURT CASES ADJOURNED ONE DAY

In this morning's police court Al. McKay was fined ten dollars for being drunk.

Ada Douglas was charged with the theft of a \$900 diamond ring from Jack Miller. Her case was adjourned till Monday morning and she is out on bail.

The charge against E. J. Butler of supplying under the Indian Act was dismissed and he is now charged under the B. C. Prohibition Act of having liquor in his possession other than in a private place. The case was adjourned until tomorrow morning.

CLAIMANT FOR DERBY HONORS

Lieut. Alex. Pearson, Jr., says He Made Actual Lowest Time in Flying Across Country.

WASHINGTON, October 24.—A claimant to first honors in the transcontinental airplane derby appeared today when the Air Service announced that Lieut. Alexander Pearson, Jr., established the lowest actual flying time between San Francisco and New York and return yet reported.

Pearson's time was 48 hours and 16 minutes for the round trip, practically ten hours less than Capt. Lowell Smith or J. O. Donaldson, and better than Lieut. Maynard's record, even after subtracting the eighteen hours Maynard spent in replacing his motor.

COL. PECK ASKED TO ADDRESS SOLDIERS

According to a telegram received from Walter Drinnan, the secretary of the Great War Veterans' Association of British Columbia, the report to be brought in by commission on Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment at Ottawa will be unsatisfactory to the G. W. V. A. One of the most important matters is that there will be no bonus for keeping men through the winter and assisting them in getting established again. The representatives of the organization in Ottawa confirm that the report will be unsatisfactory. As a result of this the G. W. V. A. in each constituency is asking the member for the district to address them on the matter of civil re-establishment and a wire has been sent to Col. Peck, V. C., member for this district, to address the local organization.

Prince Rupert as Centre for Sport.

Prince Rupert is not often spoken of as a centre for sport. It is true, however, that it is one of the best possible points from which to reach the hunting grounds. Deer are brought in here every week end during the season and ducks and geese are secured in large numbers. An occasional wolf is bagged, and the sportsmen have not to go very far to secure bear.

There are sportsmen in the city who know the favorable spots and who can go out and bring in a deer in half an hour from the time of landing. It is splendid sport and one that tends to ruggedness of constitution and health.

Police Commission And "The Force."

The police commissioners from time to time give the chief of police instructions to enforce the law in certain directions. At one time it is against a certain type of gambling and again it is against disorderly houses or against people who sell drinks contrary to the Prohibition Act, or against vendors of fruits after prohibited hours. These instructions seem to intimate that there may be cases where the police should not enforce the law. Only recently, however, the city solicitor made it quite clear that it was the duty of the police to enforce the law at all times and that neither the commissioners nor anyone else had any option in the matter. If the law is wrong it should be repealed, but while it is on the statute book the duty of the police is to enforce it. That is what they are for, and when they are sworn in they declare their intention so to do. They have no right to obey instructions to refrain from enforcing the law, although it must be admitted that it is often done in other cities than Prince Rupert.

Ontario Situation Very Complicated.

The situation in Ontario becomes more interesting every day. The attitude of the different parties toward each other is still in doubt. The United Farmers cannot expect support from any of the other parties unless it makes concessions, in the way of giving them representation in the cabinet.

It is just possible that the 43 farmers, with 11 labor men and two independents may carry on, but that would give them only one majority in the House and that one would be needed for speaker. It would be almost impossible for them to do business with only the casting vote of the speaker to carry measures. There must be a working arrangement with one or other of the parties in the House.

GOOD WORK IN GETTING PEOPLE ON THE LAND

Chairman of the Land Settlement Board Who Was Here Last Evening Tells of Their Activities.

That 150,000 acres had now been included in the settlement areas of the provincial government in central British Columbia, wherein the price of land is set by the Land Settlement Board and a special tax levied if the owners refuse to sell. This was a statement made by M. H. Nelems, chairman of the Land Settlement Board, who in company with Col. R. Davies, another member of the Board, passed through the city last evening bound south. They have been visiting the areas in the valleys east of here and are both enthusiastic over the success of the work.

Establishing Homes.

Mr. Nelems in discussing the work of the Board with a Daily News representative said that while a large amount of land had been purchased from the owners by the Board and resold to settlers, the chief benefit of the ring their engagements on the on owners of property. In most cases as soon as the Land Settlement area was established the owners dropped the price of land to half what they were originally asking and this land was being sold to actual settlers, who were coming into the country with their families and establishing homes.

This year a lot of land prospecting had been done. People had come from the prairies to look over the ground and as soon as they could sell out their prairie farms they would come to British Columbia.

Many Areas.

Land settlement areas had been established at various points along the line as follows:
Nechaco Valley, 42,000 acres.
Bulkley, 15,000 acres.
Prince George, 18,000 acres.
Marten Lake, 15,000 acres.
Smithers, 15,000 acres.
Francois Lake, 20,000 acres.

While there had been no development areas set aside in which farms were prepared beforehand for those wishing to move in without enduring all the hardships of pioneering such as had been done at Merville and other points, such work was contemplated in the spring and it was quite probable that a gang of men would be employed clearing land and building houses for that purpose as soon as the snow disappears.

Mr. Nelems and Col. Davies were accompanied through the district by Mr. Munro of Terrace, who is also a member of the Board.

 And then these exasperating people, the makers of obvious remarks, began their flimsy work. "Hullo, Major, your boat full of water?" seemed to be the favorite starter.

Now the major is one of the most genial of men usually, but in the session he was subjected to yesterday, he very nearly lost his customary aplomb. He was saved from utter loss of dignity by a fishing boat skipper who was lending a hand with the operations. Sport Briefs

Plans are now being discussed for the extending of the Coast Hockey Association to include Edmonton and Calgary and probably another prairie city. Frank Patrick, president of the Association is considering the erection of an ice arena at Calgary. The admission of the Alberta cities to the Pacific Coast Association will largely depend on how they make out this winter and if any class is shown.

The stage life is undermining Jack Dempsey's health and he is very anxious to get back into the ring. It is possible that he might have a match with Carpentier, Deekett, or Fulton. Even Jess Willard talks of coming back. Ever since the big Toledo fight Jess has been working on the farm in Kansas and is reported to have lost weight and is now as hard as nails. He never did consider Dempsey a formidable rival and is still confident that he can regain the title.

President Cominsky, of the Chicago White Sox, says that his pitching staff was a great disappointment in the world's series. It will not be the same when the 1920 season comes around, he says. He realizes that his team was lucky to get away with the American League pennant and he is going to depend on Wilkinson and Dick Kerr a lot for next year.

Miss Canada Gives Account of Her Stewardship

And explains her War Financing to her Citizens

Miss Canada: In humility, because of the sacrifices which have been made for me, but in pride because of the Spirit of Fortitude of your Sons, I come to enlist your most sympathetic support, as expressed by your financial aid, to enable me to meet the many obligations that still remain towards the men who fought. I also wish you to provide me with sufficient National Working Capital to consolidate the position in the world's markets, that you, by your industry, have so honourably won.

Citizens: Perhaps you might like to take this opportunity of telling us how you expended the \$610,000,000 we loaned to you last year?

Miss Canada: I would. You will recall that I asked you for funds to carry on the war, and to enable me to advance credits to Great Britain and our Allies, who, by their purchases here, have prospered our farms and factories. Do you want details?

Citizens: Yes. The more facts and figures you give us, the more fully will you answer the natural queries of those to whom you are now appealing for a further loan.

Miss Canada: Very well, then. I suggest you ask me questions. That is the best way to bring out the facts.

Citizens: How much of the Victory Loan 1918 did you use for war expenditures?

Miss Canada: Three-fifths of it—\$380,900,000 in fact. Before giving this expenditure in detail I wish to explain that your demobilization expenses as against those of mobilization have been concentrated within a few months. The expense of transporting our Army overseas was spread over more than four years. Consequently the cost of it did not bulk so large in any one year's budget. But to bring home in a few months hundreds of thousands of men spread from England, France and Flanders, Italy, Egypt, Palestine to far-off Siberia, was a gigantic and expensive task. It taxed all my resources.

Citizens: Realizing the conditions you faced, because of the shortage of shipping, and remembering that other parts of the Empire were eager for the speedy return of their men, we think you did very well. Give us now the details of your war expenditures.

Miss Canada: \$312,900,000 was spent for the payment of soldiers since the Armistice—the cost of feeding them, part cost of bringing them home, separation allowances to their dependents, the maintenance of hospitals, their medical and nursing staffs, in Britain as well as Canada, the organization and conduct of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment (which includes the Vocational Training Schools) and the financing and operation of the Soldier's Land Settlement Act.

In addition to this, I have already authorized and am paying gratuities to soldiers on their discharge.

Citizens: What is the amount of the gratuity?

Miss Canada: I used \$59,000,000 of the Victory Loan 1918 for this purpose, and expect to use \$61,000,000 of Victory Loan 1919.

Citizens: Did you make any other disbursements under the heading of war expenditures?

Miss Canada: Yes, \$9,000,000 was spent at Halifax, to be used in reconstruction after the disaster.

Citizens: We quite appreciate the fact that these were all necessary war expenditures. Perhaps you will tell us now what you did in the way of advancing credits to Great Britain and our Allies?

Miss Canada: With pleasure. I advanced Great Britain \$173,500,000 to help purchase your grain; and I loaned her another \$30,000,000 to buy other foodstuffs.

Citizens: Did Great Britain buy any fish from us?

Miss Canada: Yes, \$9,000,000 worth. I loaned her the money to pay you for it.

Citizens: Were there any other loans to Great Britain?

Miss Canada: Yes, Great Britain bought \$2,900,000 worth of ships built here. I loaned her the money to pay for them. Then I loaned her \$5,500,000 to meet other obligations in connection with munition purchases.

Citizens: What security have you for all this?

Miss Canada: Great Britain's pledge to repay—backed by the resources that made her Banker, Manufacturer and Bulwark to her Allies during the war.

Citizens: That's good enough. Did you do anything for our Allies?

Miss Canada: I loaned them \$8,200,000 to buy your foodstuffs, raw material and manufactured products.

Citizens: That accounts for last year's Loan. Will you tell us now why you need another Loan, and how you purpose using it?

Miss Canada: I need another loan to finish paying the expenses of demobilization, since the proceeds of the 1918 Loan were exhausted, and to meet the obligations I still owe to your Soldier Sons. I also need money for National Working Capital.

Citizens: What are the obligations to soldiers?

Miss Canada: The cost of bringing them home. The payment of all those still undemobilized, including sick and wounded, who are still in hospital, and who of course remain on the Army Payroll until discharged. The upkeep of hospitals, and their medical and nursing staffs.

Citizens: How much will these items entail?

Miss Canada: \$200,000,000.

Citizens: Does that include the gratuities?

Miss Canada: No. I shall need \$61,000,000 of the New Loan to finish paying these.

Citizens: Will that include the money to finance the Dept. of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, including the Vocational Training Schools, and the working out of the Soldiers' Land Settlement Act?

Miss Canada: No. I estimate \$57,000,000 for this. I have already approved loans to the amount of \$26,000,000 to soldiers already settled on the land under this Act.

Citizens: How many soldiers are taking advantage of it?

Miss Canada: Up to August 15th, 29,495 soldiers had applied for land under the terms of the Act. 22,281 applications had been approved. 9,043 men were already placed on farms, and millions of acres will be under cultivation, that might otherwise be idle.

Citizens: What do you consider the great national advantage of having soldiers become farmers, apart from increased production of food?

Miss Canada: The love of outdoor life and the resourcefulness of our soldier citizens are just the qualities to make them successful farmers, and upholders of the best Canadian tradition.

Citizens: Have you any other war obligations?

Miss Canada: Not that I foresee. I have covered the major ones.

Citizens: You purpose extending further credits to Great Britain and our Allies, do you not?

Miss Canada: Yes, to the extent that your loan will permit me to.

Citizens: Why sell to Great Britain and our Allies if they can't pay cash?

Miss Canada: Their orders are absolutely essential to the continuance of your agriculture and industrial prosperity. The magnitude of their orders, and the amount of employment thus created will depend upon the success of the Victory Loan 1919.

Citizens: Will you explain simply this idea of credit, and why it is so necessary that we should give it?

Miss Canada: Farmers and manufacturers (and that includes the workers on these orders) must be paid cash for their products.

Therefore I must borrow money from you to give credit, temporarily, to Great Britain and our Allies.

Actually, no money will pass out of Canada.

If you do not grant this credit, other countries will; and they will get the trade, and have the employment that should be yours, to distribute amongst their workers.

And remember, you absolutely need these orders to maintain employment. If you don't finance them, employment will not be as plentiful, business will feel the depression and conditions everywhere will be adversely affected.

Citizens: Will you use the proceeds of the Loan for any other purpose?

Miss Canada: Yes. I must carry out the National Shipbuilding and Reconstruction programme. I am also committed to advance loans to Provincial Housing Commissions.

Citizens: What are individual—personal advantages to be gained in buying Victory Bonds?

Miss Canada: The fact that Victory Bonds are among the world's premier investments—in security—in good interest yield—and in ready saleability.

Citizens: What do you mean by Security?

Miss Canada: I mean that the whole resources of Canada—all the assets of all the people—plus all the wealth yet to be discovered is behind my pledge to repay you your principal when due and to meet each interest payment.

Citizens: What do you mean by "good interest yield?"
