ALL TALKING HANSON

"They're all talking Hanson," was the reply to a query this morning by a citizen who meets a large number of working-men.

It's curious how victory seems to be in the air. Two weeks ago the supporters of the Liberal candidate were evidently depressed. They did not know what was going to happen. Since that a great change has come about. Today, "they're all talking Hanson." Monday they will be voting Hanson.

It's not necessary to wait for the voting to know that the victory is already won. As the Interior News says, "Hanson is elected."

HIGH STANDARD IN CANADA

At the Conservative meeting last night T. S. Baxter told how the standard of living was higher in Canada than in any country of the world except one. People in Canada earned high wages, twice as high as in Great Britain and higher than in any other country in the world with one solitary exception.

It was a great compliment that Mr. Baxter paid to Canada and to the Mackenzie King Government which has been in power for the past nine years. If the country has been so prosperous that the standard of living has been well maintained, it could hardly be argued that the government responsible for that condition should be discarded and a new experimental policy introduced.

Those who earn wages and who might be expecting big things from a change of government might well ponder over the figures quoted by Mr. Baxter. The Liberals, in spite of all assertions to the contrary, have maintained the standard of living high. Why then grumble? The imaginary pictures painted by the Tory orators are creatures of the brain. The pictures painted by the Mackenzie King Government are pictures of happy homes and a prosperous people. The present little lapse is only a slight reflex of a world condition in which Canada is suffering less than any other country.

SALESMAN DROWNED

VANCOUVER, July 24.—O. W. Evans, salesman for a local wholesale hardware firm, was drowned early this morning when his automobile skidded off Ballantyne Pier into 45 feet of water. Evans had driven a friend to the pier and was returning when the accident occurred.

INFANT BURIED

The funeral took place this morning of Estella Doane, three months old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence H. Doane. After a service in the chapel of the B. C. Undertakers at which Rev. Dr. R. M. Stevenson officiated with A. J. Lancaster presiding at the organ, interment was made in Fairview Cemetery.

Lowe Inlet Japanese Woman Cuts Throats of Children and Tries to Take Own Life

Mrs. Kobayashi is the name of the Japanese woman who is reported to have cut the throats of her two children at Lowe Inlet and inflicted injuries upon herself. She is being brought to the city on the cruiser tonight for hospital treatment. Her two children are reported to be dead.

On receiving a report late last night that a Japanese woman at Lowe Inlet cannery, down the coast from here, had murdered her two children but cutting their throats and then attempted to take her own life, injuring herself severely, provincial police officers, coroner, undertaker and physician left the city last night for that point. Information so far received by the police, of the tragedy, is only of a very meagre and indefinite nature. The police party left here for Lowe Inlet on the cruiser P. M. L. 8 and are expected to return to the city tonight with the bodies of the children and the Jap woman, if she is still alive.

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PREMIER KING CHARGES TORY CORRUPTION

Concentrated Attack Upon Ferguson Made at Chesley, Ontario

Prime Ministers of New Brunswick and Saskatchewan Associated In Attack—Issues Warning Against Tammanyism In Canada

CHESLEY, Ont., July 24.—Charging corruption in connection with provincial road building, Premier King here last night directed a concentrated attack against Premier Ferguson of Ontario. With Mr. Ferguson, the Prime Minister associated the Conservative governments of New Brunswick and Saskatchewan. His charge in brief was that the provincial governments in these three provinces had held up expenditures from appropriations provided for road building until a short time before the present election in order to buy up votes.

FALL ENDS IN DEATH

Larry Mullins, Injured on Premier Tram Line, Passed Away Early This Morning

Lawrence Mullins, who fell from the top of a tower on the Premier tram line at Stewart last Saturday afternoon and lay helpless and terribly injured on the rocks below for several hours before his plight was discovered, died early this morning in the Prince Rupert General Hospital from the effect of his injuries. The unfortunate man was brought from Stewart on Tuesday afternoon and had lapsed between consciousness and unconsciousness from that time until he died. His injuries were such that recovery could hardly be hoped for and death came as a fortunate relief to terrible suffering.

The late Mr. Mullins was an Irishman and was born in 1885. For the past five or six years he had been a lineman on the Premier tram and was well known and popular in Stewart. He was unmarried but a brother resides in Seattle. Deceased was a Roman Catholic in religious belief and his funeral will take place under the auspices of that church. The remains are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

The Premier referred to "Tammany methods—the curse of the United States." He gave warning that there was some danger of the establishment of something similar to Tammany in Canada in the aspirations of some Conservative leaders to achieve a monopoly of control through a great machine. He mentioned Toronto as a point at which this control was being exercised.

High Tariff Wall Urged By Tory Speaker at Moose Hall Last Night Even Against Imports From Britain

Picturing the wonderful condition that might be Canada's were the tariff wall built and sufficiently high to keep out imported goods from this country, T. S. Baxter of Vancouver, last night talked for an hour and a half to a large audience in the Moose Hall about the wonderful things that would happen if Hon. R. B. Bennett were returned to power supported by J. C. Brady of Skeena. Also he painted a picture of desolation in Canada at the present time but admitted quite enthusiastically that the present standard of living in this country under the King administration was the second highest in the world.

He argued that this standard could be kept up only by means of a high tariff.

James H. Thompson presided and the audience was responsive except to one or two references to the war record of Premier Mackenzie-King when there were evident signs of protest in the rear of the hall.

Mr. Baxter spoke of the good work done by Mr. Brady, not only in the House of Commons but as an after dinner speaker in the East. He prophesied that the people would return him again. He spoke of the ability of the candidate.

Launching into his subject, Mr. Baxter then explained that the difference between the Liberal and Tory parties was that the Liberals believed in tariff for revenue only (Continued on Page 2)

FISH PACKER IS MISSING

Fears Expressed For Safety of Aina Which Left Dundas Island This Morning

Fears are entertained for the safety of the well known local fish packer Aina which left Dundas Island early this morning for Inverness cannery with a heavy load of fish and one man on board. The Aina is said to have been overloaded and took to sea in a stiff breeze.

Another boat which left Dundas Island for Inverness not long after, expecting to see the Aina at Inverness, saw no trace of her and alarm was then felt that tragedy may have befallen the missing craft.

More Than Three Thousand May Be Dead As Result of Horrible Earthquake Disaster In Italy

NAPLES, July 24.—Government officials this afternoon expressed fear that an earthquake death list given out at noon as numbering 1778 might be far exceeded. Unofficial reports said that more than 3,000 bodies had been taken from ruins throughout the devastated area.

Some reports said that the dead in Melfi were increasing every hour. Cemeteries in that town were completely filled and two bodies that could not be disposed of there were taken to Foggia for burial.

To add to the horror, Naples was swept this morning by a hurricane which drove huge waves ashore, adding to the fears of the stricken population.

Grits Will Have Ten More Seats Than Last Session 'Tis Asserted

Keystone Province Is Weary of Conservative's Monopolistic Attempts and Will Show This By Votes of Its People Next Monday

OTTAWA, July 24.—Assaying the prospects of the government in Ontario, the National Liberal Bureau today estimated a gain of 10 seats in that province, with a possibility of more. Ontario's government representation in the last House of Commons numbered 25 of whom two were Labor-Liberals and one Liberal-Progressive. Reports reaching the national bureau from observers throughout the province indicate that the next parliament will witness a considerable proportion of the remaining 57 seats adhering to the government.

The national bureau summarizes its estimates as follows:

North Huron, snatched from the Progressives in the 1927 by-election by a majority of 188, is considered by the Opposition to be one marked for definite restoration to the Liberal ranks.

The traditional Liberal South Essex, in the hands of the Conservatives since 1925, will assume its "status quo" while John Sarold will again be sent to the House of Commons from Brant Coulee next session. The Opposition had a majority of 152 in 1926 but there is every indication that this slender count will be overturned.

North York, which has sent many distinguished statesmen to parliament and which in only five of eighteen elections has departed from its tradition of political faith will be represented in the next House of Commons by Col. W. P. Mulock, the Liberal standard bearer.

Many prominent Conservatives in South Renfrew frankly acknowledge defeat of their man and are resigned to the return of the former member of trade and commerce, the Hon. T. A. Low. Mr.

FLOODS IN YORKSHIRE

Hundreds Homeless and Destitute After Esk River Overflows

WHITBY, England, July 24.—Hundreds of people are homeless and destitute today as a result of a flood which devastated the valley of the Esk River. The waters, which rushed over the area following a terrific cloudburst, had almost subsided today but rain was falling for the fourth successive day, making relief work difficult.

Small bungalows, scores of rowboats, and lengths of stake fencing were piled high upon hedges while great trees were uprooted.

High Tariff Wall Urged By Tory Speaker at Moose Hall Last Night

whereas the Tories, believed, in making the tariff so high that imports would be excluded. Goods coming in, he claimed, did Canadians out of jobs. It was selling jobs for revenue, like Esau selling his birthright for a mess of pottage.
 Sometimes drives were made for Canadian goods. Merchants were asked to feature them in the windows and offer them to their customers. The policy of the Tories was to keep foreign goods out so that there would be nothing but Canadian goods in the stores.
 The United States, the speaker said, had adopted a high protective tariff and had prospered. There were between 120,000,000 and 125,000,000 people in the United States today, the numbers swelled by the boys from Canada who had gone over to better themselves.

Canada needed a high protective tariff, Mr. Baxter argued, because the standard of living in Canada was the highest in the world with the exception of one country, and it could be kept high only by a high tariff. Cheap labor would drive dear labor out of employment.

Defining wealth, the visitor said that it consisted in digging out of the hills something without value and creating value. He instanced iron and showed the successive stages through which it passed before it became steel rails.

The speaker then told of the labor problem in Vancouver where \$335,000 had already been paid out by the city for relief and as much more would be needed before the end of the year. Now they were spending a thousand dollars a day that way. In spite of this, the Government had refused to give any aid.
 The speaker then read from Hansard, the account of the five cent speech, mentioning that it was Hansard, not Hanson, from which he was quoting. He had never read anything Hanson had said. (Laughter.)

Against Britain

The new high tariff laws of Australia were quoted in favor of a high tariff for Canada. The tariff there was prohibitive on some goods. He told of the injury done to Canadian industry by English competition. Wages in Canada were over 100 per cent. higher than in Britain and four times as high as in Italy. Canada could not compete with those countries. There must be a barrier erected to prevent goods coming in.

Mr. Baxter then took various industries such as the woollen industry, sheep raising, knitting, iron and steel, and leather and showed how the country might benefit from a high tariff. He sneered at Premier Mackenzie King's War record and said that, when the guns boomed in 1914, Mr. King was across the border singing "Sweet Land of Liberty" while Mr. Bennett was "keeping the home fires burning."

The alleged exodus of young men to the United States was dilated upon at some length and the speaker stated that it was still going on and scarcely any were returning. He had visited the United States recently and found less unemployment there than in Vancouver. He denied that if Mr. Bennett were elected he would cancel all trade treaties. There would simply be a revision. Some would be amended and some denounced. The treaties had not increased exports but instead had reduced them.

The final subject dealt with was the alleged attempt of Mr. Merryfield to disfranchise the fishermen, in connection with which action legal proceedings had been taken in the courts. The returning officer, he claimed, had acted directly contrary to the Dominion Elections Act. He read the wire Mr. Merryfield had sent which was a long one and had to do with the city polling as well as that of the fishermen. The article against which an injunction had been obtained he considered libelous and untrue.

Low has an adverse ballot of only 221 to turn over, a task which the Opposition admits to be well within his capacity.

W. H. Moore, recently resigned chairman of the tariff advisory board and the object of a number of attacks in the House of Commons by Mr. Bennett, will be in a position on July 28 to confront the Opposition leader and challenge some of the assaults upon him. Mr. Moore's election is assured in Ontario County where the Government's policies have found wide approval.

Northumberland's precarious Conservative majority of 386 will be reversed by Mr. Fraser who has conducted a vigorous campaign. There is every indication that in this riding the misrepresentation and derision of the Opposition with respect to Liberal policies, particularly in connection with agriculture and dairying, are reacting adversely on the Conservative candidate.

Two Ottawa Seats

Two seats in the Ottawa valley—Lanark and Carleton—will adhere to the Government. Internal feuds among two Conservatives themselves have wearied a vast number of electors who are revolting against being regarded as pawns in a game of politics. They are largely seeking tranquility in the Liberal fold and Lanark's vote on Monday will register strongly for B. H. Sopher; with that of Carleton going for M. N. Cummings.

Hon. E. C. Drury will bring North Simcoe in to the Liberal column, and wipe out the Opposition count of 193 in that rural riding. Mr. Drury's presence in the House of Commons will be welcomed. Ontario's position at the moment is interesting in that there is a manifest crumbling of the Conservative monopoly in that province. Resentment at the virtual dictatorship which the Conservatives are seeking to establish is patent on every side.

In the other constituencies of Ontario hard fought battles are being waged with the Opposition throwing horse, foot and artillery in the breach in order to preserve their hold, much after the fashion of the Chinese warriors of old who carried noise-producing instruments into battle in order to frighten the enemy with the racket. The Conservatives of Ontario are frantically shouting predictions of Oposition landslides and such like absurdities. The effect of such ludicrous prognostications is merely to draw more attention than would normally be the case to the precariousness of their own positions.

Bennett's Task

"With the maritimes reinforcing the Liberals' ranks to the extent of nineteen sure seats, Quebec to the extent of sixty-one and Ontario thirty-six, Mr. Bennett has only 139 constituencies to play with. Of these there are 65 west of the Ontario boundary. He would have to get every one of them in order to furnish himself with a working majority and it simply cannot be done. If he gets one-third of them he will have done vastly better than any Conservative leader since 1917. But the Liberals do not consider even that many. That is their answer to the Opposition "predictions."

Admiral Speaker At Rotary Club

Vice-Admiral Vernon S. Haggard C.B., C.M.G., commander-in-chief of the American West Indies Naval Station who is here aboard the flagship of the squadron, H. M. S. Despatch, was the speaker today at the regular weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club. Admiral Haggard took as his subject "The London Naval Treaty" and he delivered an informative and memorable address.

Major S. D. Johnston, president of the club, was in the chair and guests included several officers from the visiting British warship in addition to a full representation of club members.

Canned Salmon Pack All Along Coast Shows Large Increase; Sockeye Take Specially Good

VANCOUVER, July 24.—Increases in the fishing harvest in every district of the coast are shown by the latest canned salmon bulletin of the Department of Fisheries. In the Naas River district, the sockeye pack is 5,000 cases ahead of the same time last year. The pink catch is more than 8,000 cases ahead and the total of all classes is 27,362 cases so far this season as against 12,147 cases last season. On the Skeena River, the total pack to date is 60,524 cases which is the largest for any season up to a similar date since 1926. Gains are shown in sockeye, spring and steelhead packs with losses in pinks and cohoes. On Rivers Inlet there is a gain in every grade, the total being 28,447 cases as against 10,092 last year at the same date.

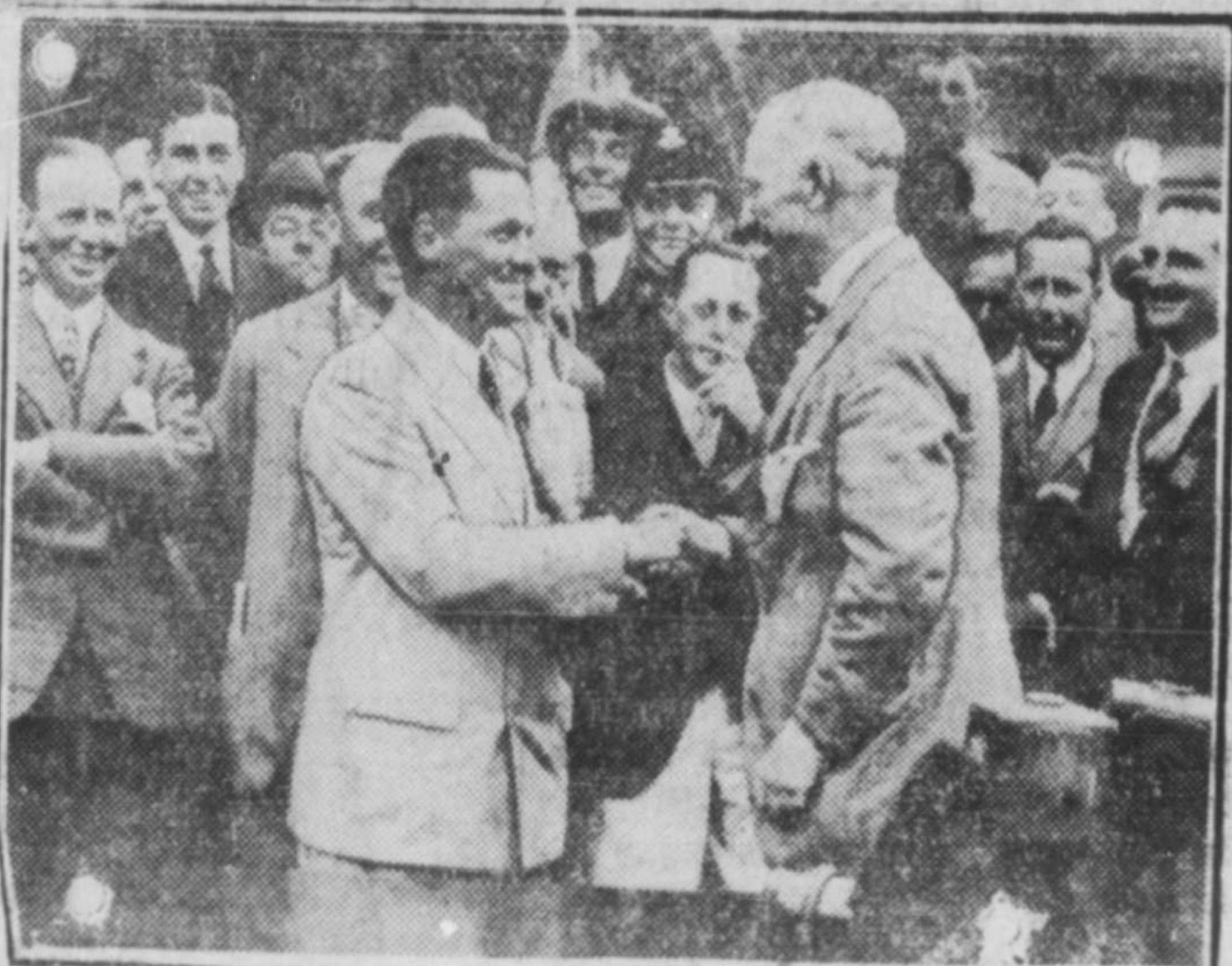
CELEBRATION AT PREMIER

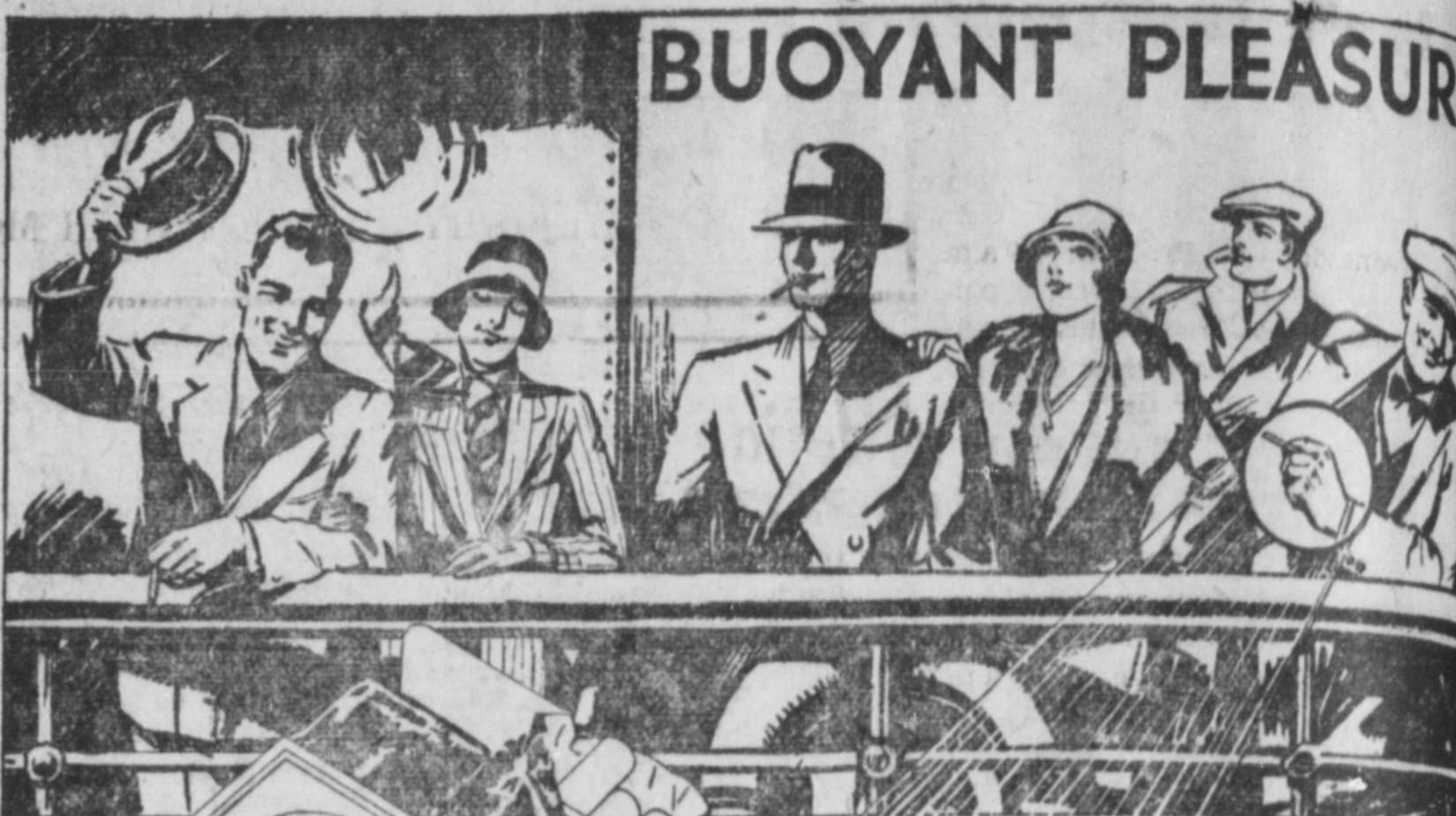

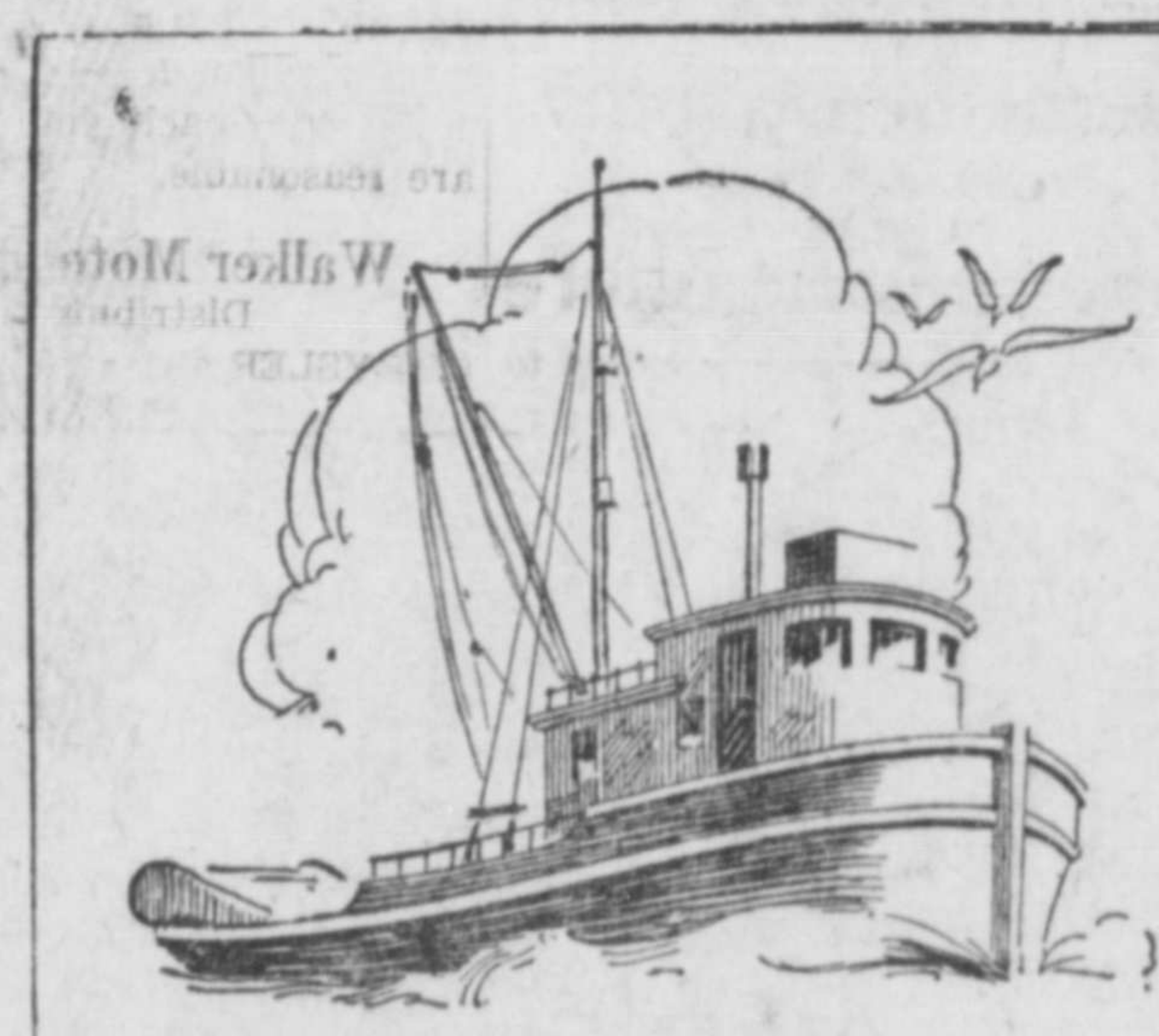

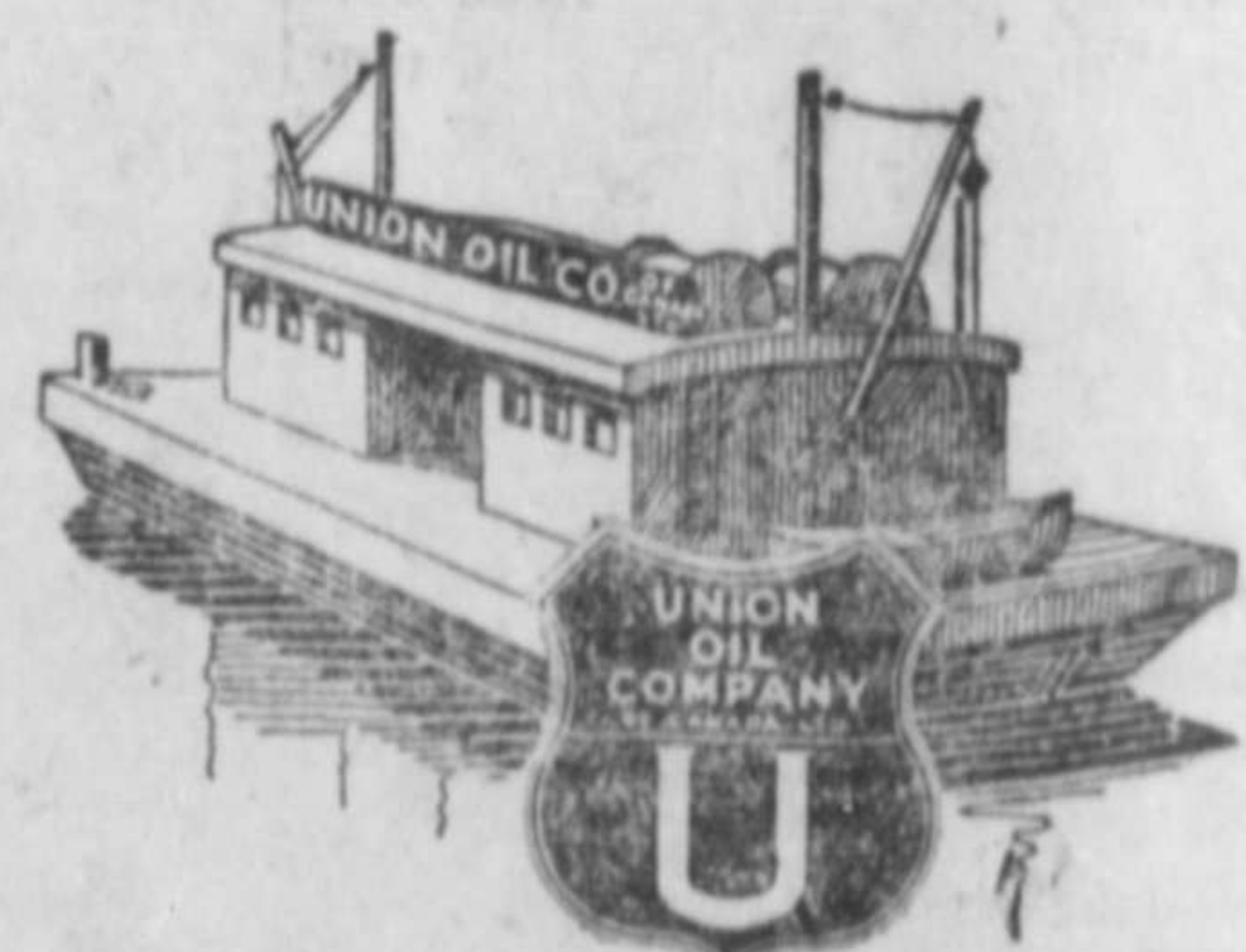

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MADE FINE IMPRESSION

Hanson's Meeting at Stewart Was By Far Most Successful in Campaign

STEWART, July 23.—By far the best attended meeting held so far in the present political campaign was that addressed here Sunday evening by the Liberal candidate, Olof Hanson, who was assisted by Milton Gonzales of Prince Rupert and Wm. There was no heckling, but to the several questions asked, Mr. Hanson gave convincing replies which left no doubt as to his stand on the foremost issues of the day. His answers were received by interrogator and the rest of the audience with much hand-clapping and acclaim.

Wm. Asselstine, popular Premier mill superintendent and well-known entertainer, was at his best in opening the meeting for Mr. Hanson. The speaker is renowned for his witty sallies and interspersed them freely throughout a long and interesting explanation of why he was supporting Mr. Hanson and why he considered the policies of Mackenzie King were pre-eminently better for Canada at this particular time than were those of the Conservative party.

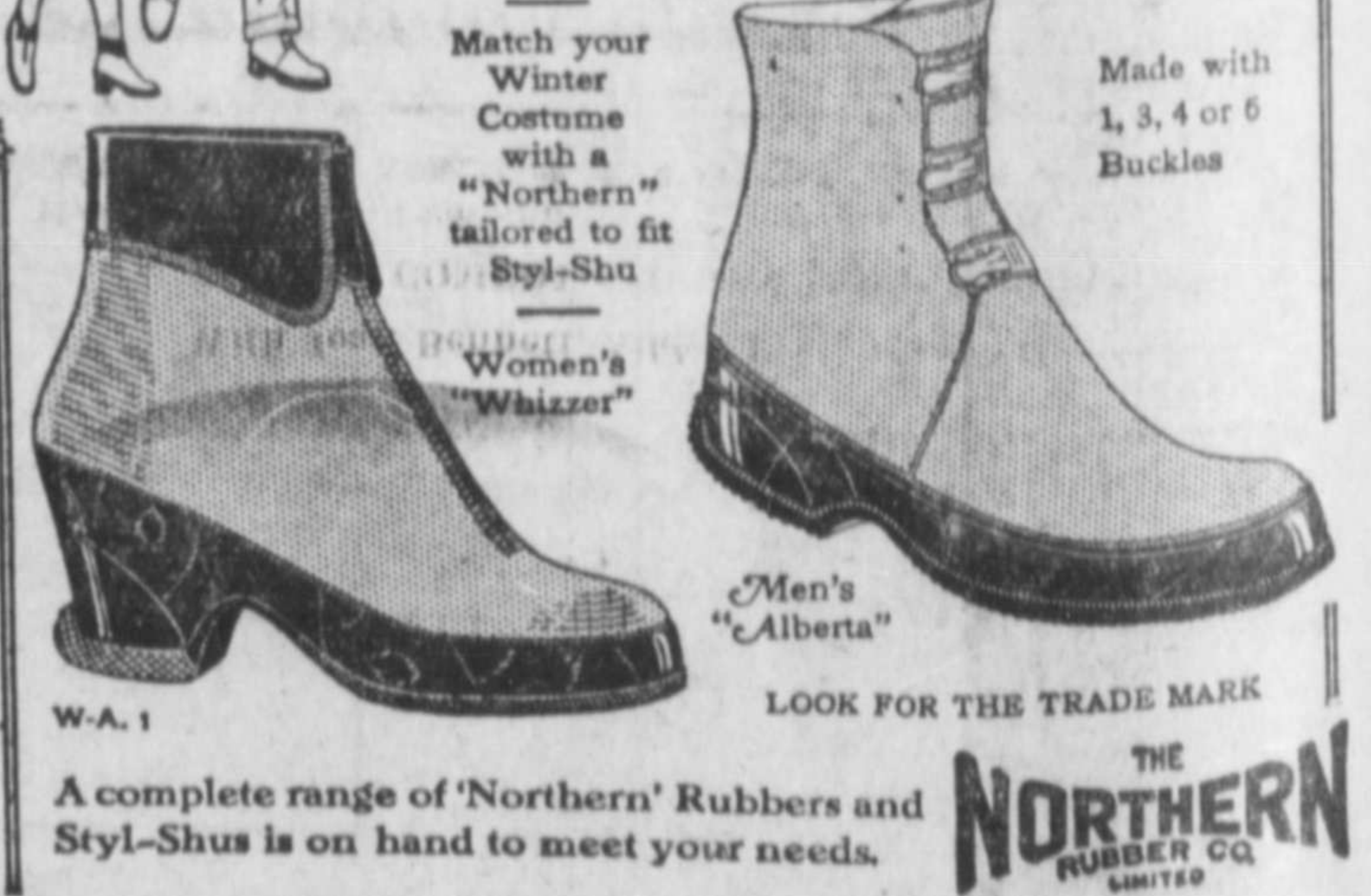
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
