The heating throughout the vessel is carried out by steam, separate systems being fitted for passengers, crew and cooking purposes. A telephone system, replacing bells, is another feature of the new boat's

equipment. The propelling machinery, constructed by the builders, Cammell, Laird & Co., consists of two sets of single-reduction geared turbines of the latest Parson's type supplied with steam by six Yarrow-type water tube boilers. The steam pressure is 350 pounds and the steam may be heated to 650 degrees Fehrenheit. Two cylindrical boilers are provided for supplying saturated steam at 200 pounds per square inch to the auxiliary machinery. The machinery was constructed under the survey of the Board of Trade and British Corporation.

Fine Appearance The appearance of the ship is distinctive, and is due in part to the high services speed. The cruiser stern adopted gives easier propulsion, and the three funnels are fitted to suit the particular arrangement of the boilers. All are working

The watertight subdivision has been arranged in accordance with the latest Board of Trade regulations, there being eight watertight bulkheads extending to the main deck as well as additional subdivi- Lakelse Lake Shore sion in the form of oil bunker bulkfitted with electric alarms.

The construction of the Prince Henry and her two sister ships-Prince David and Prince Robertmarks another step in the development of a particularly interesting type, the miniature liner which has been developed for the Western Canadian coast during the last quarter of a century. It was originally an adaptation of the American sound type of steamer, but many British features were immediately introduced into the design and have undoubtedly effected a considerable improvement.

There are, of course, many rather smaller steamers of these services, but the first class ship has been almost standardised with two masts and three funnels, a rig which makes the ship imposing as well as graceful, which is a great asset with a passenger service such as they maintain.
