Supreme Court Rejects Canadian Pacific Case Against ss. Hampholm

Vancouver Vessel Found to Have Been Solely Responsible For English Bay Collision in 1928

OTTAWA, April 10:-The appeal of ss. Princess Adelaide vs. Olsen was dismissed with costs by the Supreme Court of Canada today. The decision relieves the steamer Hampholm of responsibility and finds that the Princess Adelaide was solely to blame in respect to a collision in the fog off English Bay, Vancouver, in December, 1928. Chief Justice Morr son Finds J. J. Hepner Was Wrongfully Convicted

VANCOUVER, April 10:- Immediate release from Okalla jail of Jacob John Hepner, sentenced by Stipendiary Magistrate R. W. Mc-Gowan of Burns Lake to six months imprisonment on a charge of keeping liquor for sale, has been ordered by Chief Justice Aulay Morrison. The order was made under a writ of habeas corpus obtained on an appeal against the conviction.

Right of the magistrate to try the case after he had taken statements from two of the crown witnesses was one of the grounds upon which the conviction was challenged and also because the magistrate had remanded accused for longer than eight days.

SUPPORT HOME INDUSTRIES

The Daily News has been accused of supporting the monied interests because it believes in the policy of supporting home industries as against foreign, of supporting home merchants as against mail order houses of keeping the wheels of industry running instead of sending those we now have to the boneyard along with the hundreds that have gone before. The north is too full of the skeletons of unwise investments or unsupported industries.

Let us try to forget this petty policy of pulling down and try to build up. There are over a dozen meal and oil plants using the herring in Alaska, yet we are told this north B. C. coast will not support one. Possibly a dozen is too many, but shall we let the Alaskans have everything and not support one on this Canadian coast? We have very definite information that the herring run this year was a very large one and that the taking of 5,000 tons from it could hardly be noticed.

Usually our sympathies are with the fishermen but like other people they get off wrong sometimes. They are a splendid lot of people and we admire them very much but we think they are wrong in this and we have the courage of our opinion. It is as reasonable to say we must not make meal from herring as to say we must not make pulp from timber, just because timber is used more rapidly there than in any other kind of mill.


INTERNATIONAL VIEWPOINT

Canada's international interests and relationships have very greatly increased in recent years, says the Winnipeg Free Press. A few decades ago this country lived very largely to itself, but now the eyes of Canadians are upon the broad horizon that encircles their country. Canada is now not only an equal member of the British Commonwealth, but also a member of the League of Nations, and her trade has expanded until it now brings her in touch with practically every nation in the world. It is very necessary for the Canadian people to become interested and informed on our international affairs, and they are doing that to a very considerable degree. It is a new and distinctly important experience in our national life that has come largely within the last ten or fifteen years.

The editor of one of Canada's leading newspapers, who was in the city yesterday was much interested in the fact that Power Corporation was putting in a plant here and remarked that there would be no money for them in the first unit. 
School Teacher Writes to "Prince Rupert, Alaska" For a Job


