British Government is Given a Shock but May Not Resign

Adverse Vote looked on as Assertion of the Independence of Parliament; Conservatives, Free Liberals and Labor Members Voted Together Against Government.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, October 25.—Political experts and editorial utterances in papers generally, express the view that no one expects the Government to resign as a result of the adverse vote in the House of Commons and that the circumstances of the defeat of the Pilotage Amendment in no wise need entail such a step.

The incident is regarded on all sides as one which has given the administration a severe shock, a repetition of which it could hardly survive.

The vote is described as an assertion of the independence of the House of Commons and a revolt against alleged direction

of ministers. It was a determination to reassert the supremacy which the House of Commons surrendered to the cabinet during the war.

More than one hundred supporters of the coalition, among whom Sir Edward Carson was conspicuous, voted against the Government. These represented the intense anti-alien feeling prevailing among Conservative coalitionists and their vote was a protest against any attempt on the part of the Government in the present stage of the bill to annul the amendments which those hostile to aliens secured in the committee stage.

Surprise is expressed that labor members and so-called free liberals joined in the vote against the Government, thereby identifying themselves with the anti-alien faction, contrary to the avowed principles of their leaders.

It is believed that on Monday the Government will ask the House to reconsider the vote and in view of certain circumstances regarded as possible, that the House comply.

London, Oct. 25.—(Noon). The Lloyd George cabinet has decided to remodel rather than abandon the Alien Bill upon which the Government was defeated.

STATE CONTROL OF RAILWAYS

Sir Eric Geddes said to be Preparing a Scheme to Submit to Parliament.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, October 25.—Sir Eric Geddes, Minister of Transport, is reported by the Central News Agency as preparing a scheme for state control of railways and canals for submission to Parliament.

The refusal of the Government to undertake the nationalization of the British railways was met by a storm of protest by the labor people of Great Britain. The proposal to place the transportation under government control is intended to meet the labor interests half way.

"AT HOME" FOLLOWED CLUB REHEARSAL OF "THE MAGISTRATE"

A full rehearsal of the Dramatic Club was held at the Savoy Hotel last evening. There are sixteen members of the cast to take part in the English play "The Magistrate" which will be presented to the public about the end of next month.

Following the rehearsal, a formal "at home" was given for the members and friends. There were about twenty couples present and Mrs. Bowness, the vice-president of the club, acted very kindly as hostess, much to the delight of all the guests.

The first part of the function took the form of a recital. Mr. Pudney was there, quite recovered from his recent severe cold and delighted the audience in his unsurpassed style with recitations and songs. Miss Edmonds sang several delightful solos and Miss McCann was heard to great advantage in dialectic imitations of Geo. Formby, the famous English comedian.

After bounteous and enjoyable refreshments were served the guests began to dance and the happy party did not break up till about one o'clock. The music was supplied impromptu by the musicians present.

PORK PRICES ARE ORDERED TO BE LOWER

OTTAWA, Oct. 25.—Private advice is to the effect that the Food Board order requiring a reduction in pork prices will go into effect on November 1 without modification, despite protests from packers.

ROUMANIA'S DEMANDS REFUSED BY THE ALLIES

Paris, October 24.—The Roumanian demands for the restoration of the frontiers fixed for her western borders have been refused by the Peace Conference.

EQUIPMENT FOR DRY KILNS HAS ARRIVED HERE

Other Machinery is on the Road and Should be Here Before Long.

The dry kiln equipment for the new planing and shingle mill at the drydock arrived this week and the work of erection will commence immediately. The planing and other material is on the road and will be here soon.

Particulars in regard to this mill have been published in the Daily News before. Unfortunately there have been delays in securing machinery. Prompt shipments of any kinds of machinery seem out of the question these days and the efforts of Major Cowper Young to secure equipment, while successful, did not meet with immediate response.

Some work has already been done on the site of the mill in preparation for the equipment and it should not be very long now before the buzz of the recul saws and the hum of the planes is heard in that part of the city.

EXPENDITURES OF GREAT BRITAIN ARE MUCH OVER INCOME

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, Oct. 25.—Hon. Austin Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, said in the House of Commons that for the half year ending Sept. 30 the average daily expenditure was £4,225,000 and the income was £2,508,000. He had hopes that matters would improve in the second six months.

The obligations of the Allies to Great Britain are £1,622,000,000 and those of the dominions and colonies, £186,000,000.

PIERRE LENOIR WAS SHOT YESTERDAY

PARIS, Oct. 24.—Pierre Lenoir, who was implicated in the Bolo Pasha and Joseph Caillaux treason, was executed yesterday morning. Because of partial paralysis he was permitted to sit while the rifle squad fired.

FAIL TO AVERT COAL STRIKE

Half Million Miners Will Quit Work November 1 Unless a Settlement is Effected.

MOST CANADIAN MINES ARE NOT AFFECTED

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—The last effort to avert the big coal strike set for November 1 has failed utterly. Half a million miners will quit work on the eve of winter with the national bins running extremely low.

OTTAWA, Oct. 25.—Information received by the Minister of Labor indicates that the strike order by the United Mine Workers Association over the bituminous mines of the United States will not affect the districts of that organization in Canada, embracing southeastern British Columbia and Southern Alberta and Nova Scotia.

BILLIARD RECORD IN NATIONAL GAME

Cochrane Makes Run of 265 Against George Slosson of Boston.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—In the national 18.2 balkline billiard championship tournament, Welker, Cochrane of Detroit won two games, in the first of which he defeated George Slosson of Boston, in the tenth inning with a new world record run of 265. This beats all balkline records where a championship title is involved. In last night's game Cochrane defeated Young Jake Schaeffer by 400 to 257 and by a score of 400 to 356 Joki Yamada defeated Geo. B. Sutton in 20 innings.

International Union Heads Are to Confer

Meeting to be held at Washington and Possible United Action Will Be Taken by Labor of States and Canada.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—What may prove one of the greatest industrial battles in history is forecasted by the announcement of Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor,

that a conference of the heads of 112 international unions affiliated with the American Federation of Labor would be held in Washington in the near future to discuss the present and impending disputes.

The co-operation of the four big railroad brotherhoods and the farmers of the country as well as

labor organizations of Canada will probably be sought in furthering whatever program the union chiefs decide upon.

The National Industrial Conference adjourned last night but not before the public group had passed a recommendation to President Wilson that he create a commission to carry on the work which it was unable to accomplish. The report of the public representatives declining to assume the task for which the original gathering was called was transmitted to the White House in a thousand word letter.

COME AND WELCOME.

Senate May Defeat Railway Legislation

Suggestion that Government may Appeal to People on Railway, Prohibition and Senate Reform Characterized as Bluff.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, October 25.—It is stated that the Grand Trunk legislation may be defeated in the Senate unless the four vacancies now existing are filled.

It is further stated that if the bill fails to pass the upper chamber the Government will go to the people on the issue of Senate reform, public ownership, and temperance.

Last session the Senate killed the Government's prohibition bill providing for an extension for one year after the proclamation of peace of the existing war time restriction. The Government

has since brought in other legislation along the lines of liquor prohibition and it is whispered that even this may have a hard time passing the Upper Chamber.

The chief trouble with the rumor of dissolution and election and one which bans it as almost impossible is that there is no Franchise Act and little possibility of one being passed during the present session. Special persons refer to the report as "bluff" to influence the Upper House, which has been bluffed so long by various parties that it has become cynical of threats.

Work of Parliament. Parliament is not likely to prorogue next week. It is understood that the opposition is proposing to discuss the details of the Grand Trunk Bill in committee for some time and that the discussion in the Senate will last several days. The prohibition bills will have to be dealt with by the House and there may be legislation arising out of the special soldiers' committee which has not yet reported to the House.

During the greater part of yesterday the House was in committee on the Grand Trunk bill, and during the course of discussion the Minister of Railways said that the physical asset of the Grand Trunk railway would be liable to municipal taxation as before.

BOLSHEVIKI CONSIDERING EVACUATION

Suggestion That They Will Leave for Turkestan After Abandonment of Moscow.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, Oct. 24.—The Bolsheviks are considering the evacuation of Soviet Russia, according to reports reaching General Denikine, a wireless despatch received today from his headquarters says. The plan is for the removal of the cabinet to Tashkent after the abandonment of Moscow and the withdrawal of troops on all fronts to Turkestan.

NATIONAL HOCKEY PLAYERS WILL BE ON VANCOUVER TEAM

VANCOUVER, Oct. 25.—A trio of National Hockey Association players will make their debut in Pacific coast hockey this season as members of the Vancouver club, president Frank Patrick announced today. They are in receipt of signed contracts of Alf Skinner and Jack and Bill Adams, who were last year with the Toronto club.

SHIPBUILDING SPEED UP SOON

Two or Three Machines for Structural Shop Have Not Yet Arrived.

The shipbuilding plant here is now almost ready to commence real construction work. Two or three of the machines have not yet arrived and the lack of these has delayed the work somewhat. Preparatory work has been going on all the time, however, and the second keel will be ready for laying about November 10.

Already the commissary and dormitory department at the shipyards is filling up and a number of shipmen and ship constructors are expected to arrive very soon.

DID NOT USE MUCH "COKE" SAID PRISONER

Frank Bennett Will Appear Again On Monday Charged With Having Drugs.

A familiar denizen of the public streets of late by name Frank Bennett, was before Magistrate McMordie this morning. For some time he has been seen around the town usually piteously telling of the cruel way in which the world was using him, that he couldn't get any work, and that after all he thought life wasn't worth living, with the plea for currency attached.

Yesterday afternoon Constable Adams on his rounds noticed him and took him to the station where a hypodermic was found on him.

This morning the charge of having drugs in his possession was made against him. He said that he had been in jail before and that it had not reformed him and also that he didn't use very much "coke." He pleaded for release and promised that he would depart from these parts on tonight's boat and inflict himself upon the citizens of Anyox, but Magistrate McMordie persuaded him to remain a guest at the Vicker's Hotel until at least Monday when he will be again called upon to answer to the charge. He left the court room for the nether regions with a sad look in his eye as if his entertainment was not acceptable.

STEEL MILLS AT PITTSBURG ALL OPERATING

Output is From 15 to 20 per cent Normal, Says J. L. Mullen, Who Has Returned From There.

Pittsburg is the fighting centre of the big steel strike and J. L. Mullen, president of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., who just arrived from there, says that the steel output in that district has been within fifteen to twenty per cent normal. None of the mills in that district have closed. The mill of the Cambia Steel Co. at Johnstown has closed however and also some of the mills at Youngstown.

Expressing his opinion regarding the progress of the fight, Mr. Mullen said that Judge Gary made a great mistake in not meeting Samuel Gompers and his committee. Autocratic action of that kind would not succeed in these days. By doing so he lost the sympathy of the American people.

The United States Steel Corporation was not bigger than the people as represented by the Government.

Aside from the unrest Mr. Mullen said business in the States was good. The mills and factories were all loaded with orders and there was every sign of prosperity.

Discussing the railway question, Mr. Mullen said he expected the Government would turn the railways back to the former owners in a good healthy condition. They had come to recognize that the Government could not operate them as cheaply as a private concern.

Mr. Mullen's firm, the Jno. L. Mullen Construction Co., at Pittsburg, manufactures construction steel and is very busy at present as the building trades are all busy.



NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—With an unbroken string of four victories, Willie Hoppe retained the lead in the national 18.2 balkline billiard championship tournament here by defeating Ora Morningstar of San Diego 400 to 250, finishing the match in eight innings. The highest runs were 164 and 137.

Sport Briefs

Herring, the former manager of Bombardier Wells, says that Joe Beckett, the English heavy-weight, will knock Dempsey cold if they can come together.

It is proposed that several of the cities having teams in both the National and American baseball leagues share the same baseball parks next season. REGISTER NOW OR NO VOTE

Non-Property Owners Must See
City Clerk and Put Name
On List.

Those who do not register may not vote. That is the law of the land. Anyone wishing to vote at the municipal elections and who are not registered property owners should call on the city clerk and pay the road tax or make a declaration that he or she has paid other taxes. This has to be done each year. The list closes on the last day of the month and after that it will be too late.

The prime requisite is that all intending voters be British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years, that they have been resident of the city since January 1 of the current year and that they contribute in some way to the revenues of the city either as taxpayers, ratepayers, or license holders. Either men or women may vote who have the necessary qualifications.

License Holders.

License holders are not called upon to pay the road tax. Any license holder paying at least \$5 a year can get on the voters' list providing that he or she is otherwise qualified, without the payment of the road tax. The declaration must be made before midnight of October 31.

Householders, not otherwise paying taxes, must pay their road tax to entitle them to vote and make their declaration by October 31. Property holders or ratepayers under an agreement for sale must make their declarations any time up to 5 o'clock of November 30.

Ratepayers who own property under a title and are also assessed in the city books are automatically placed on the voters' list. The same requirements hold good for them as for license holders and tax-payers and if there is any doubt as to their requirements being fulfilled they are subject to challenge at the election.

Exemptions.

The exemptions from the road tax are as follows:—

(1). Certified efficient members of any corps in British Columbia in the active militia force of Canada.

(2). Persons under 21 and over 60.

(3). Assessed owners of property within the municipality.

(4). Assessed owners of property under the last agreement of sale or the last assignee of said agreement who have paid current year's taxes and who take and subscribe before the city clerk a statutory declaration to this effect.

Under these exemptions the first two clauses do not provide for voting unless taxes are paid. No person can vote who is under 21.

Returned men are not called on to pay the road tax, but they cannot vote unless they do so or pay taxes in some other way.

BIG CATCHES OF WHALES

Owing to Good Weather Operations are Continuing Later Than Usual.

VICTORIA, Oct. 24.—Whaling operations off the British Columbia coast will continue for a short time as the weather, conditions are excellent and many mammals are being harpooned. Last week the three whalers operating out of the Kynuquot station took nine large whales. The skippers report conditions unparalleled for this season of the year and they have been instructed to continue operations until a break in the weather occurred.

Early in the month it was expected that the season would have closed about this time and the whalers would have returned to their winter quarters at Point Ellice. The Seattle whalers which operated off the Alaska coast have been back on the Sound two weeks. The local vessels, however, have found the weather and quantity of mammals far ahead of the early part of the season.

When the whalers went to sea early in June they found the weather extremely bad and the whales scarce. These conditions existed till the end of July, when the weather improved and the whales started to come inshore.

Big catches have been made at the Queen Charlotte stations at Rose Harbor and Naden Harbor, but it is expected that the Kynuquot station will again lead in

the catch.

The end of the month may see the first of the little steamers returning to port to pay off their crews and tie up for the winter.
