PRAIRIE SECESSION IS ADVOCATED POWER CORPORATION MAY GO TO PEACE RIVER COUNTRY

Breakaway From Dominion Urged Actively by Agrarian's Meeting In Province of Saskatchewan

Farmers Request Head Office to Formulate Charter of Liberty For Presentation to Government—Would Have Free Trade With Britain

WILKIE, Sask., Dec. 19:—A farmers' meeting here yesterday asked the head office of a thirty thousand strong Saskatchewan agrarian unit to formulate a "charter of liberty" listing agricultural demands. Under the plan, Manitoba and Alberta will be asked to join Saskatchewan in a co-operative union. Direct exchange with the Mother Country would exist on a free trade and barter basis. Port Churchill on Hudson Bay would be the port of entry!

MOTORSHIP IS ON WAY

Dorothea Coming North From Seattle to Institute Intensive Search For Renahan

The Seattle motorship Dorothea, well known in Prince Rupert as a former lumber carrier from here, is now on her way north from Seattle to institute an intensive search between here and Ketchikan for Pilot Robin Renahan, Mechanic Frank Hatcher and Sam Clerf, guide, who have been missing since October 28 when they disappeared somewhere near here while proceeding north to join the Burke search. The Dorothea has been substituted for the Margrita which it was originally intended to send north from Seattle. It has been suggested in Vancouver by persons who purport to know the country that another search should be made in the Lowe Inlet area for Renahan by a fleet of small boats.

GUARANTEE BY GOV'T

Banks to Be Protected on 1930 Wheat Pool Advances

ESTEVAN, Sask., Dec. 19:—Intimation that the Dominion government had come to the aid of banks in guaranteeing them against loss on 1930 wheat crop advances to the Wheat Pool was contained in an address by Premier Anderson at Midvale.

Premier Anderson expressed the opinion that announcement would be made in the near future by Premier Bennett in this connection.

SEARCH IS CONTINUING

Police Boat Leaves This Morning to Look For Laporte and Rudland

The provincial police power cruiser P. M. L. 3, in charge of Constable Olsen, left this morning to continue the search for Pete Laporte Jr. and Henry Rudland, who were blown out to sea from Lucy Island in a dory a week ago this afternoon. The police boat will thoroughly comb Stephens and Dundas Islands and on up the coast.

EXPERIENCE HARMLESS

Van Der Byl and Cressy Suffered Little If Any As Result of Their Long Hike

A local man, who happened to be at Vanderhoof at the first of this week when R. I. Van Der Byl and T. T. Cressy arrived there after having been marooned for about a month at Thutade Lake after Pilot W. A. Joerss lifted their plane off the lake when it threatened to freeze in, says that the two men were in good shape on coming out. They had a rigorous experience mashing in the distance of 275 miles from Thutade Lake to Fort St. James but they suffered little in the way of real hardship. They did the distance in 13 days and lost weight somewhat because of the exercise. Both, however, were feeling in the pink of condition.

Van Der Byl and Cressy did not actually come out from Thutade Lake by themselves but hired a native guide to accompany them from Thutade to Takla Landing, a good deal more than half the distance. They, however, missed a party of native guides who had been sent from Takla Landing to bring them in.

Van Der Byl is a former resident of Prince Rupert, having before the war been in the taxi and garage business here.

HOUSE IS ADJOURNED

British Parliamentarians to Get a Month's Respite From Very Arduous Labors

LONDON, Dec. 19:—Jaded by weeks of critical debate during which the government has faced one crisis after another, Parliament adjourned this afternoon until January 20.

With the promise of still more strenuous days ahead, the members of Parliament were thankful of this opportunity to get a little rest before the storm breaks again.

FURORE IN THE STATES

Judgment of Judge Clark Declaring Prohibition Unconstitutional Is Featured

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19:—The judgment of Federal Judge William Clark of New Jersey declaring that the prohibition law in this country was unconstitutional and that the Eighteenth Amendment would be ineffective in the State of New Jersey and possibly throughout the states caused a furore. Big headlines in all newspaper throughout the country recorded the fact and commented on it.

Later and more conservative comment makes it clear that the amendment is not in any present danger. Three federal judges refuse to concur in the judgment of Judge Clark. The law will be enforced as usual in New Jersey state and President Hoover is taking quick action to insure that no change takes place at least at present.

A formal appeal has been entered to the Supreme Court of the United States.

M'KINNON IS FREED

Magistrate McClymont Finds Insufficient Evidence to Warrant Trial on Manslaughter Charge

Giving his decision in city police court this morning, Magistrate Thomas McClymont found that there was not sufficient evidence to warrant his sending Alex McKinnon up for trial on a charge of manslaughter and, therefore, he dismissed the charge. McKinnon was the driver of a city truck which went off the street at the corner of Tenth Avenue and Bacon Street nearly two weeks ago. William Hanson dying as a result of injuries sustained in the crash.

Charles Campbell, Edmonton and Regina Newspaperman, Awarded \$50,000 In Privy Council Appeal

LONDON, Dec. 19:— Charles E. Campbell, Edmonton and Regina newspaper publisher, today won his appeal to the Privy Council against decisions of the Ontario courts in a dispute with the Nationalist Trust Co., acting as executors of the estate of the late E. A. Wallberg over commission the appellant claimed for the sale of the output of a paper mill. Mr. Campbell based his claim on the fact that he had introduced to Wallberg a prospective purchaser.

Their Lordships of the Privy Council declare that the remuneration should not be based on the actual labor of Campbell but rather on the value to Wallberg of what Campbell's intervention produced. Therefore, Their Lordships allowed Campbell's appeal and declared in their opinion that a proper remuneration would be \$50,000.

It was also directed that the respondents, the trust company, should pay the costs of Campbell's appeal to the Privy Council.

The action hinged on the introduction by Campbell of Lester Clarke, president of a newspaper and magazine corporation, to Wallberg, president of the Lake St. John Power & Paper Co.

FLOWING LAVA KILLS NINETY JAVANESE

BATAVIA, Java, Dec. 19:—Ninety natives died yesterday in the sudden and violent eruption of a volcano at Merapi, in Central Java, which had been active for two weeks. The victims were engulfed by a stream of lava two hundred yards wide and seventy feet high which advanced so rapidly that they were unable to escape after they saw it.

Pawson Visits Chief Town of Valley and Institutes Dealings

Commercial Agent of Big Hydro-Electric Concern Looks Over Peace River Municipal Plant With View to Purchase

PEACE RIVER, Dec. 19:—Following several communications by telegraph and letter between his company and the town council, H. E. Pawson, representing the Power Corporation of Canada, of Montreal, was a visitor to Peace River this week to look over the local electric light and power plant with a view to purchase by his company. Following his arrival he spent the time from then until he left looking over the plant and distribution system, going into details as to power output, rates, etc. He also took opportunity to look over the possibility of water power development.

ANSWER EVASIVE

Pattullo Not Satisfied With Tolmie's Explanation Regarding Fort George By-Election

VICTORIA, Dec. 19:—"Premier Tolmie's explanation as to the calling of the Fort George by-election is no explanation," said T. D. Pattullo, provincial Liberal leader, yesterday. "I did not state that the election was called 'because' I was away, but I explained that it was called 'while' I was away. As for weather possibilities, if it should turn to forty below zero, not only will there be grave difficulty of campaigning but the vote will be exceptionally light.

"There was no occasion, however, for calling the election over the holiday season. It might just as well have been called for the end of January and certainly a court of revision should have been held before the election was held. Fifty per cent of the voters of the Peace River area are disfranchised. Our prime minister offers no explanation in this regard."

MONEY FOR PUBLICITY

T. H. Johnson Says More Being Asked to Aid Marketing Fish

"It is the aim of the Canadian Fisheries Association to secure the expenditure by the government of the sum of \$100,000 for publicity purposes to aid in marketing fish. Already it is announced that \$25,000 has been secured to help the salmon men but the association will not be satisfied with that. They will continue their activities until the other \$75,000 has been secured." This was a statement made by T. H. Johnson, last year's president of the association, in an address to the Prince Rupert Rotary Club yesterday. He said the association was not concerned particularly with any one branch of the industry but was interested in all. It was satisfactory that a beginning had been made.

Widespread Strike Still On In Spain

Government Firmly Entrenched But Danger of Civil Strife Not Ended

MADRID, Dec. 19:—While the revolt in this country has been suppressed temporarily at least and the government is securely entrenched, danger from civil strife is not over as long as the half million men at present on strike are out.

IN THE LETTER BOX

MORE RADIO INTERFERENCE

Editor, Daily News:—

With particular reference to one part of a recent letter appearing in these columns, relating to disturbing noises in radio sets, it is an undisputed fact that a considerable amount originates right at electrical appliances in the household or office itself. From there it is "broadcast" to all radios in the vicinity.

Those who own a radio need little precautioning except perhaps a reminder that would not be amiss. It is mostly to those who are not radio users that this is addressed.

Let me say here, that if there were, for instance, in Prince Rupert, an electric sewing machine or vacuum cleaner in continuous operation each evening, radio reception would be a decided rarity, if not an absolute impossibility. Those people who have not experienced the vicious and chronic roar from one or both of the machines just mentioned, really have no conception of the terrific disturbance that can be emanated to their neighbor's ears. My experience has taught me that in the majority of cases, where an intermittent noise is present in a radio, it nearly always turns out to be a household or commercial electric appliance that is at fault.

Chief among the offenders are the sewing machine and vacuum cleaner, as mentioned; violet ray machines, some types of electric furnaces, flashing signs, meat and coffee grinders, heating pads with automatic control, battery chargers of the vibrating type, barber's clip-

pers, drink mixers, etc. In fact anything electrical that is in any way faulty or even loosely connected will cause disturbance in a radio. Users themselves know how merely switching on a light, or a loose globe in the socket, will affect the radio. The worst part is that the noise travels outside the house itself, and will perhaps continue a considerable distance. The radio owner will then be well advised to be certain that the interference is not within his, or his neighbor's home, before going farther afield.

Furthermore, "blanketers" can be provided at a very reasonable cost, which will greatly minimize, if not entirely eliminate, these above mentioned noises. I will be only too glad to advise what I think will be a cure, if such cases are reported to me.

While the foregoing is not suggested as by any means a total cure for all existing radio troubles, it certainly is responsible for a few of them at the least. It behooves us all, then to exercise our extreme judgment when using anything of an electrical nature, and to determine whether or not we are making life pleasant or miserable for others. We would not think of getting out in our neighbor's back yard or shed and beating old tin cans or imitating an Indian War dance. Then let us not actually invade their homes and interfere with one of their greatest sources of real enjoyment—their radio.
