FIVE ARE DEAD IN PRAIRIE BLIZZARD

LLOYD GEORGE WOULD CUT BRITAIN'S ARMAMENT BILL

Saskatchewan Tempest Takes Mortal Toll as Traffic Is Paralyzed

Men Had Been Picked Up By Coach From Snowbound Car—Five More Are Suffering From Shock

REGINA, Oct. 17.—Five men are dead and five passengers are suffering from shock as a result of exposure in last night's storm. The five dead, who have not been identified, were trapped in a coach driven by George Bell of Regina who had picked them up when their own cars became snowbound. The coach was found this morning near a farmhouse. Bell was delirious. It is not known definitely whether the dead succumbed from exposure or through inhaling gasses generated by the car in which the motor had been left running for warmth.

Tulsequah Will Be Important Camp When Metal Values Come Back, Alice Arm Man Declares

When the metal markets recuperate, Tulsequah is going to be one of the big camps of the country, Neil Forbes, well known Alice Arm mining man, who spent the past summer in the Taku, declares. Mr. Forbes is quite enthusiastic about the future of the new camp. The United Eastern property is a good example of the richness of the field. On the basis of normal metal values, at least \$2,000,000 in copper, silver and zinc has been blocked out on this property. The United Eastern Co. was not active at Tulsequah during the past summer, owing to the general depression, but it is understood it will resume work next spring. Already the company has carried out two years' extensive development.

ORDER FOR LIFE BOATS

Local Dry Dock Is Given Job By Canadian National Steamships

The local dry dock has received an order from the Canadian National Steamships for the construction of 12 life boats for the steamers Prince Rupert and Prince George. The life boats are to be 28 feet long with standard equipment. They will be of wooden construction throughout.

Half of the boats are to be delivered in six weeks and the remainder in 12 weeks. They will be constructed at the woodworking plant of the yard.

TRIAL ON THURSDAY

Sigurd Jussita to Be Given Preliminary Hearing at Smithers on Charge of Murder

Sigurd Jussita, alias John Emilson, who was found this week in a secluded hotel near Lake Kathlyn, having in his possession articles belonging to the late Charles Yoch, Houston farmer, was murdered early last month, will come up before Stipendiary Magistrate S. H. Hoskins in Smithers for preliminary trial on a charge of murder next Thursday, it is stated at divisional offices of the provincial police.

Jussita's arrest followed a long and thorough investigation by the police.

BLIND MAN IS CHARGED

Police Officer Tells of Squats in Premises of Carl Anderson

Carl Anderson, a blind man, who lives in the basement of a small building at the corner of Second Avenue and Seventh Street, appeared before Magistrate McClymont in city police court this morning on a charge of permitting drunkenness on his premises. After hearing the evidence, His Worship reserved his decision until tomorrow morning.

Corp. George Barber, who was the principal witness, told of numerous complaints which had been received in regard to the goings on at the residence of Anderson. These complaints had resulted in a visit by himself (Barber) and Constable Gilker to the place. They found five very drunk people there, some of them reclining on a bed. The drunken people, the officer testified, included the accused, Tom Hanson, an interdict, who had recently been sentenced to three months' imprisonment for his sixth drunkenness offence, and a woman. This was the condition of affairs between 10 and 12 Monday night.

Under cross-examination, Constable Barber testified that there was noise, swearing, cursing and drunkenness. The way the people in the place acted they must have been drunk. The cursing was not fit for the public to hear. "The language used there was simply a disgrace to this town," the witness commented. The language was so loud that it could be heard not only on the sidewalk above but clear across the street.

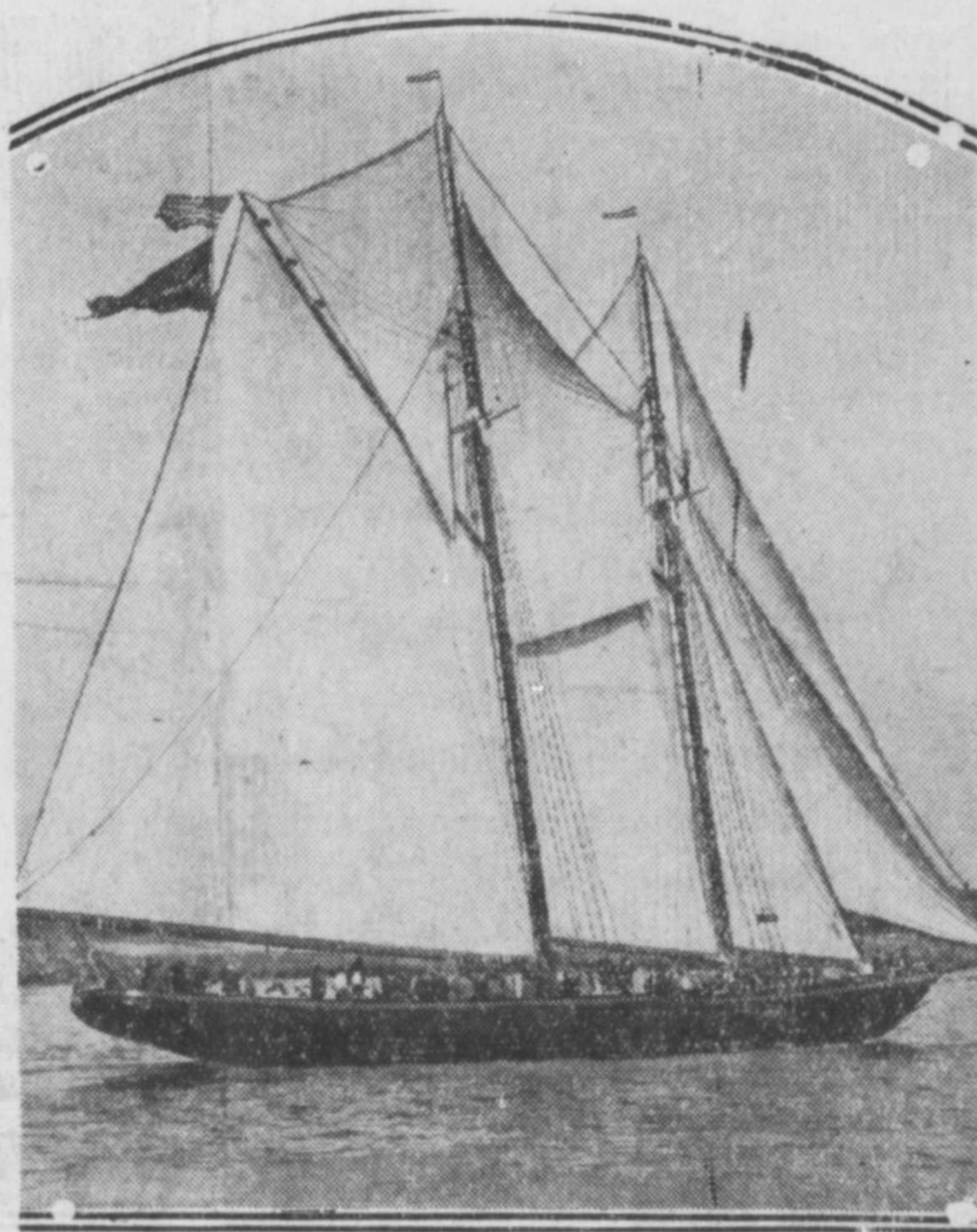
When he entered the place, Corporal Barber continued, accused had said: "In the name of God, let me alone, I'm blind." "That was all hypocrisy," Barber declared. The officer stated that he had tried to quieten the situation down but accused had grabbed hold of him in such a manner, with the assistance of Tom Hanson, that had it not been for the aid of Constable Gilker and another man in the place who happened to be sober, he (Barber) would have had to use force to free himself.

Things had become so bad at Anderson's place, Corp. Barber asserted, that it had got to a point where something had to be done. Constable Gilker gave evidence corroborative of Barber's and there was one witness for the defence. Anderson was accompanied to court by two young sons who live with him. L. W. Patmore was defence counsel.

Plane Brings Doctor Here

The monoplane seaplane Sea Pigeon of the Pioneer Airways of Alaska arrived here about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, having on board Dr. W. E. Peterson of Ketchikan who had been called to Seattle on account of the death of his father. The Sea Pigeon had to fly 125 miles north of Ketchikan to get Dr. Peterson and then brought him in here. Had the weather been favorable, the plane would have gone right on to Seattle with Dr. Peterson but the wind and impending snow made it advisable to put in here and let the passenger go south from Prince Rupert last night on the steamer Prince George.

IS UP TO PREMIER

If Government Promises to Complete P.G.E. North Vancouver Liberals Won't Nominate

NORTH VANCOUVER, Oct. 17.—A Liberal convention last night called to nominate a candidate for the provincial by-election forwarded a resolution to Premier Tolmie asking for immediate construction and completion of the Pacific Great Eastern from North Vancouver to Prince George.

In the event of a favorable reply being received within a week, the Liberals decided not to run a candidate. Failing an official pronouncement, a candidate will be chosen on October 24.

BRITISH LABOR GOVERNMENT

There is a tendency among a number of people in Prince Rupert to belittle the work of the MacDonald Government in Britain and to use it as an argument against any labor movements in this country.

While we do not favor class legislation or class representation in a general way, there is much to be said in favor of the present government although, looking from this distance, they seem likely to do down to defeat at an election that may possibly be held soon. It is likely now that the British Conservatives have thrown in their lot with the protectionists the Liberals of that country may ally themselves more definitely with labor and keep them in power to prevent the possible success of the Tories.

The outstanding feature of the success of the Labor Government has been in its foreign policy. It has stood firm in regard to post war settlements, done much to pacify Egypt, and above everything has successfully negotiated a tripartite treaty with the United States and Japan with a view to naval reductions.

In domestic affairs, the MacDonald Government has legislated in the interests of widows, extended the benefits of unemployment insurance, dealt with such matters as housing, drainage, public works, workmen's compensation and other matters and is claiming particular credit for its Coal Mines Act which shortened the hours of miners, set up machinery for national wage negotiation and laid the foundation for a thorough reorganization of the industry. It insures improvement in the condition of the miners and gives promise for better things in the industry generally. The government has also taken important steps in efforts to find foreign markets, especially for those commodities which will provide more employment at home.

The chief charge against the government is that unemployment has doubled since it came into power.

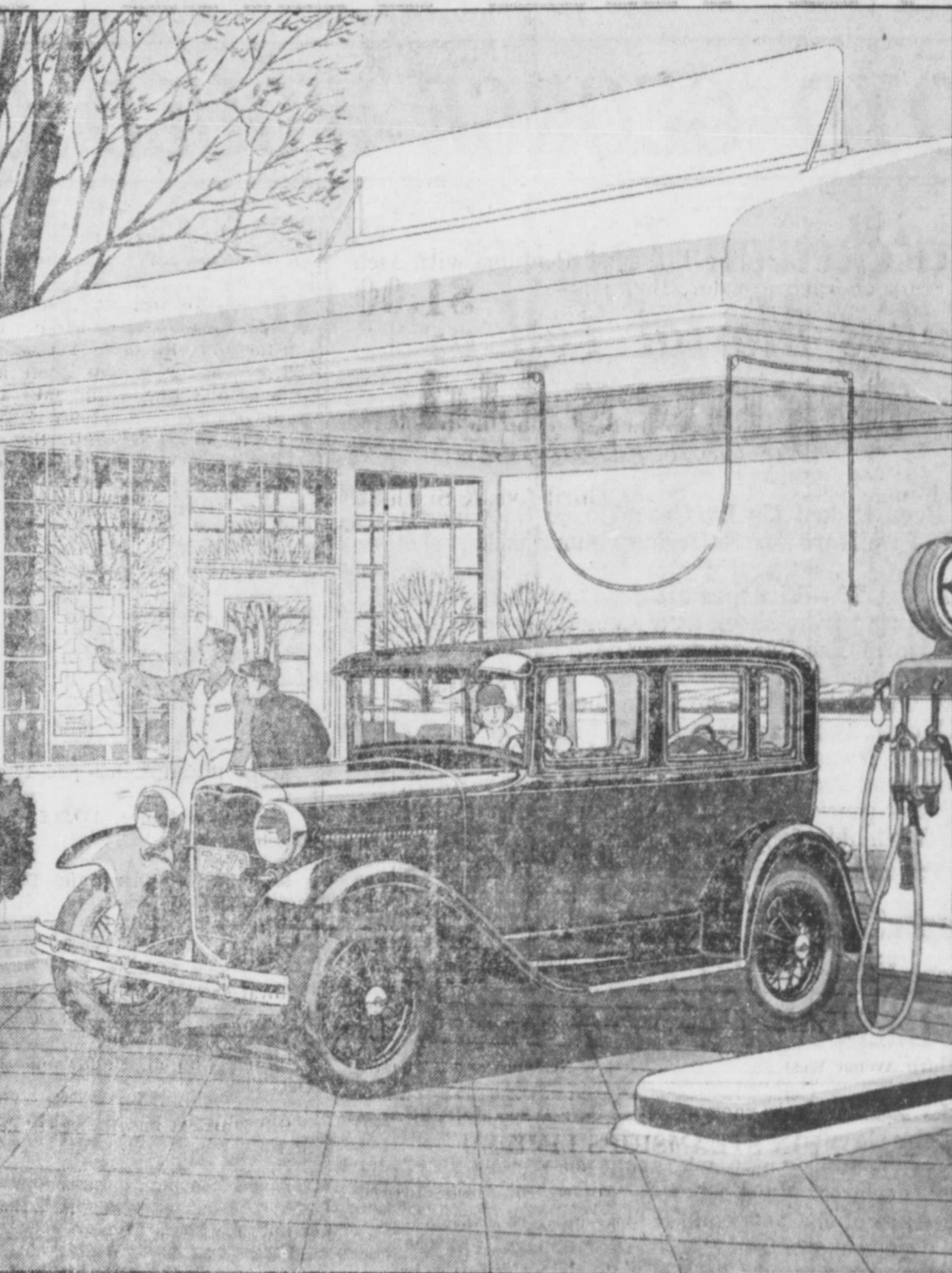

Are you one of those whose lot in life consists in looking after the home?

If so, unless you happen to be among the fortunate ones who have means of their own, you are dependant upon some one—husband, father, brother, sister, son, daughter—to provide you every week with the money you must have to pay the grocer, the butcher, the baker, the milkman, the druggist, the dry goods merchant, and all the other dealers for the things you have to order from day to day.

It would be a terrible thing, wouldn't it, if next week your house allowance were suddenly to be shut off! Yet that is what might happen if your breadwinner were unexpectedly to lose his business, or his job!

Are you doing everything you could do—everything you should do—to spare yourself a misfortune of that kind?

Your breadwinner may be a professional man, or he may be in business as a merchant, or as a farmer. If so, he wants customers, more and more of them—the kind who pay their bills regularly in cash. Isn't there something you might be doing to help those customers, so that they in turn could do more business with him?

Some of them are probably growing or making things of the kind you have to order from day to day. So long as such things find a buyer, their jobs are secure. And naturally you don't want that to happen!

Obviously there will be more of such people, the more you and your friends see to it that for your daily needs you buy things that have been produced right here in Canada. Because when you forget and buy an article that has been made in some other country, you are depriving some one of a job in this country.

Other women, everywhere in Canada, are being urged to protect the job of your breadwinner by always giving a Canadian made article preference over one that has been imported. Won't you do the same for their breadwinners, and incidentally make your own income that much more secure?

Fallacy of Communists In This Country Set Forth By Writer In Organ of Canadian Labor Group

(Continued from page one)

It would seem to be a primitive conception of history from which springs the idea that the military tactics of the paladins, who led a few hundred tribesmen, bound together by ties of common blood, and who if they did not win were usually slaughtered, are the appropriate tactics for modern struggles between great masses of men, often divided by race, language and creed. Human intelligence being what it is, and modern conditions what they are, the labor general's problem of preserving the unity of his forces, of getting them to undertake common action, is a vast more complicated problem of leadership than that of the tribal chief who led his blood relatives to war. No union vests the power of life and death in its headman, a power possessed by Indian war chiefs and the war leaders of ancient Greece while they were on the war path, though in council they might have to listen to insults.

Social Evolution

There is no magic in organization "per se" any more than in the "manifestoes" which the Communists issue so frequently, as if they were messages from heaven endowed with the power of suddenly converting the workers to a full understanding of the need of social revolution. That is to say, organization and education are both necessary processes of social evolution, and since neither of these processes can be completed in a day—any more than a youth can accomplish the biological evolution of becoming an adult in a day—they call for the exercise of tact and patience, qualities in which the hierarchy of the Communist Party of Canada is notably deficient.

Whether in its theoretical expression as a scientific exposition of social development, or in its practical expression as a political party, socialism is a natural product which must pass through the phases of infancy and youth in order to attain a mature development. This is a necessary law of the evolution of anything in the natural or social world. But in other countries as well as Canada the enthusiasts of new movements have lost sight of that law. In the development of scientific, or fact-founded, socialism notably, enthusiasts in the early stages have affected a childish exclusiveness, a superior virtue, as though they possessed a special vision and a monopoly of wisdom giving them the right to treat as heretics all who do not see eye to eye with them. This lofty conceit in the case of the Communists is joined with a nebulous romanticism and fanatical fervor which gives to the idea of the social revolution the narrow and incomplete character of an end in itself, and begets the illusion that the social organism can be radically changed in a day or so by a general strike, or a political upheaval of a fraction of the people.

Fed By Russia

This hope of a transformation of capitalism into socialism by a sudden and violent stroke has been fed by the swift rise of the Dictatorship of the Proletariat in Russia. But it is necessary to recognize that the seizure of political power by the Communist Party in Russia was, owing to the peculiar conditions in that country, an adventure very different from the exercise of political power by organized workers in countries like Canada, possessing political democracy and a large, well-organized and intelligent bourgeois class.

In Russia capitalism was only a small island in an ancient feudal regime. An autocratic czar and landlords for the most part controlled the political power. Russia had not experienced a religious, reformation or bourgeois political revolution. The mass of the people were illiterate and steeped in superstition.

When the corrupt czarist regime collapsed, Kerensky, representing the bourgeois class, attempted to appropriate the political power. But neither capitalists proper, nor small business men and traders, had any real training in political method; quite unlike the capitalists and middle classes of, say, England, who since the business revolution under Cromwell have been exercising political power and who, if sometimes divided by divergent interests, have learned to unite their forces in op-

position to efforts of the working masses to ameliorate their lot.

Kerensky Was Weak

The Kerensky government was weak and incompetent because the Russian bourgeoisie lacked unity and political experience; because the middle class as such was an insignificant proportion of the total population. The small but well-organized and well-disciplined Communist party overthrew Kerensky and seized the political power. The special circumstances favored the Communists. On the one hand, their slogan "The Land for the Peasants" had an appeal that it could not have in Canada where the farmers already own their lands—nominally at any rate. On the other hand, the soldiers who with inadequate arms and food had opposed the well-equipped and well-fed legions of Germany, were ready to turn their anger against both feudal nobility and the bourgeoisie, be-

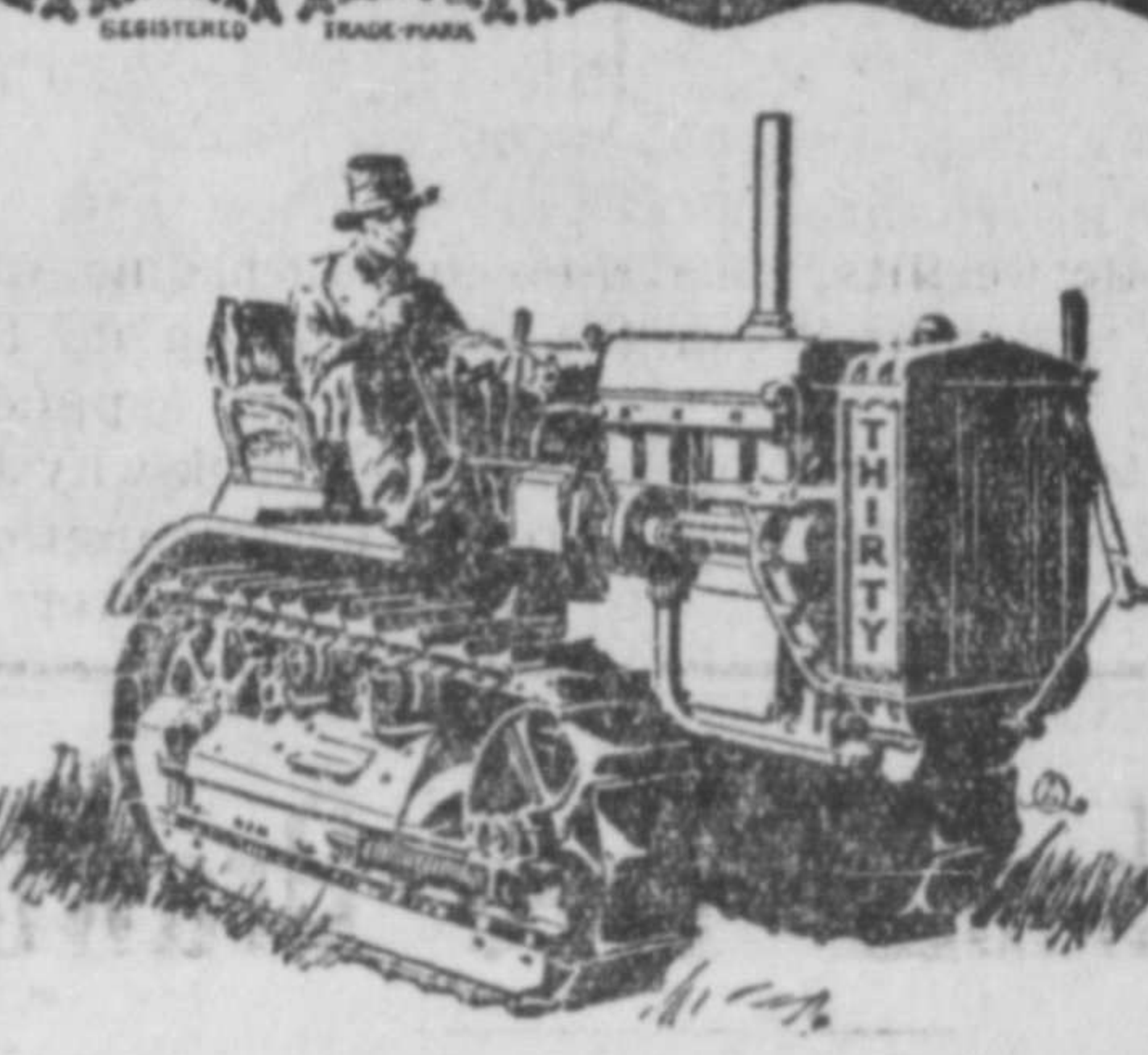

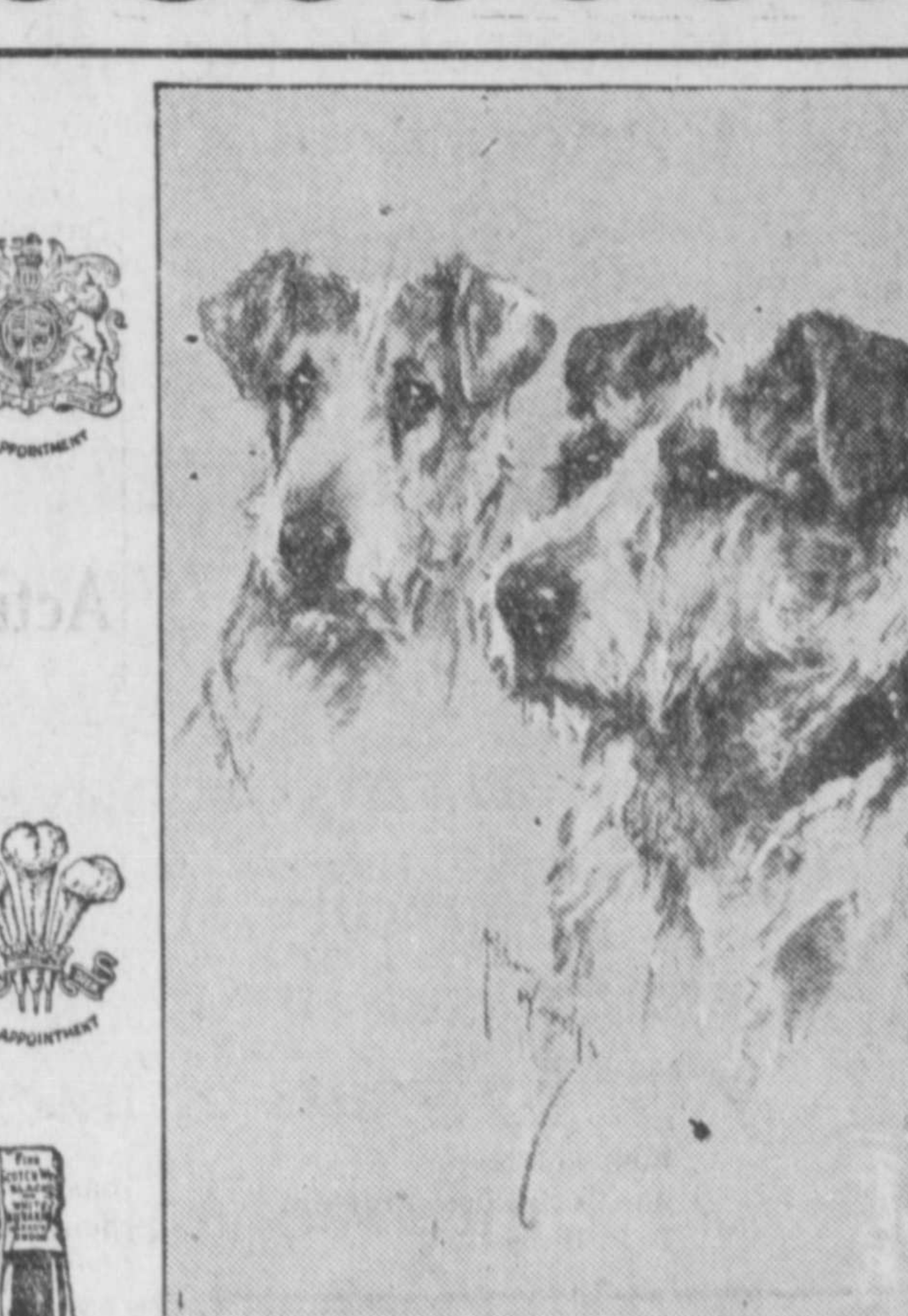

CLUB HEARS ABOUT INDIA

E. N. Walker Gives Address at Weekly Luncheon of Local Organization

An interesting address on India was given yesterday afternoon before the Rotary Club by E. N. Walker of the Capitol Theatre staff who spent a good deal of time in India installing for the Northern Electric Company. He showed that much of the unrest was due to the activities of the educated classes and that the chief difficulty in connection with it was the difference of religion and caste. There was a different standard of justice and morals from what people in this country were accustomed.

Speaking of the religions, Mr. Walker stated that the majority were Hindus of whom there were approximately 210,000,000 out of something over 300,000,000. Next came Mohammedans who were generally better educated and more alive. The Hindus were divided into castes of which the outcastes numbered 60,000,000. The ruling class was the Brahmin priest class, most of whom were professional men.

Mr. Walker spoke of the non-cooperation movement and its reliance on Gandhi as leader. The troubles in Northwest India were chiefly the result of the efforts of the British to prevent the Mohammedan tribes from raiding the Hindus of the valleys below and living off them. It was not to be considered seriously.

At the close Mr. Walker was thanked by President Johnston for his able address.
