Rev. A. Gordon MacPherson B.D. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, New Westminster, who arrived here this morning, will occupy the pulpit of First Presbyterian Church tomorrow and the Sunday following. Mr. MacPherson is one of the most capable of the younger generation of ministers and has 111 C been in charge of his present congregation for the last five years. St. Andrew's is the oldest Presbyterian Church in B. C., having been organized in 1862. Mr. MacPherson i a Preacher of Divinity from Knox College, Toronto.

St. Andrew's lost heavily both in numbers and in financial support following organic union, the congregation being almost split in two, so that they were compelled to seek aid from the head office towards " the minister's salary. This grant is now no longer necessary as the salary from the congregation in addition to the use of the manse, is now far above the minimum. The membership has increased from 150 to 325 and givings to missions and budget have more than doubled.

BOMB IN THEATRE

'TIS QUEER SITUATION

Stewart People Legally Must Give 24 Hours Notice Before Getting Water to Fight Fire

STEWART, Sept. 6:-A unique

situation has arisen between the Board of Commissioners of the Village of Stewart and the Stewart Public Utilities, the latter being the company supplying water to householders of the town. At the regular meeting of the commissioners last week a letter was read from the Utilities Co., which said in part: ... and that any hydrant broached or used in any manner whatsoever by any person, corporation, or government, whether used in the public interest or not, shall be charged for at the rate of \$100 per hour or part of an hour. Notwithstanding this unless specific arrangements have



For several years it was apparent that the veteran clergyman could not live long. The privations of his missionary work had brought about a physical condition which in the end proved fatal. He lived a great life and fought the dread reaper to the last like a good soldier of the Cross.

To the Canon the passing would not be a particularly sad thing. It was just a step forward. At one time young Parson Marsh was looked upon as the strongest man in the north. As he lost his physical strength he gained in spiritual power. It seemed then but a natural transition to






