



Many Prominent Careers Were Closed During Year Just Past

NEW YORK, Jan. 20 .- Death, respector of no class or creed, closed the careers during 1929 of an unusually large number of persons widely known for their leadership in their respective spheres or because of the high stations they oc-

Among them were many whose achievements won for them fame throughout the world. .

The most noted figures to pass from the world stage were Georges Clemenceau and Marshal Ferdinand Foch. It was Clemenceau, the statesman who, as prime minister welded together all France for the latest final strike in the world war and made Foch commander of the French army. From that post the marshal advanced to command of the allied armies to finally achieve

There was somewhat of a cointhe careers of two eminent journaorganizers and for 25 years general manager of the Associated Press, and Thomas (Tayy Pay) O'Connor, "father of the house of commons." Mr. Stone preceded his famous Irish contemporary in life by two months and in death by nine months.

Deaths among noted churchmen included Cardinal Gasquet, regarded as one of the most learned men in the world, and Cardinal Dubois, head of the Catholic Church in France. Another religious and social work leader who died was General William Bramwell Booth, head P. O. BOX 416 of the Salvation Army.
