BIG MILLING COMPANY SUFFERS HEAVY FINANCIAL LOSSES

Five Unions of Prince Rupert Sympathetic to Workers Taking Action

Trades and Labor Council Receives Replies From Constituent Bodies to Its Query as to Entering Political Field

Members of five out of seven of the constituent unions of the Prince Rupert Trades & Labor Council have voted in favor of the formation of a Labor Party in local politics, it was reported at last night's regular meeting of the council. In some cases the decision was unanimous and in all the five there were substantial majorities in favor of the proposal. The Car Workers'g

Union has expressed itself as being opposed to a local Labor Party while the Typrographical Union has not as yet taken the matter up.

Maple Leaf Milling Co. Loses More Than Three Million Dollars In Sixteen Months

Directors Explain

Unauthorized Speculations and Advances Are Blamed For Condition of Affairs

MONTREAL, Oct. 18:-An operating loss of more than three million dollars in sixteen months ending July 31 last is shown in the annual report of the Maple Leaf Milling Co. Ltd. This figure, according to statement, is before providing for certain reserves but includes "losses from unauthorized speculalations." The previous surplus carried forward at nearly \$5;500,000 was practically wiped out, leaving

a balance of about \$10,000. The directors stressed unfavorable milling conditions and mentioned that the unfavorable showing was "due in large measure to speculations made by the management without authority of the directors." 

Halibut Landings Two Million Pounds Less Than Last Year-Livingstone II Ties Up-White Hope Spends Night on Rock

With less than a month of the season left, halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the 1930 season up to October 17 totalled 21,634,000 pounds or more than three million pounds less than the 24,736,250 pounds which had been recorded up to a similar date last year. The Canadian total up to date this season was 6,023,200 pounds as compared wth 6,974,250 pounds last year while the aggregate of American fares was 15,610,800 pounds as against 17,-762,000 pounds at the corresponding date last year. There is no chance now for landings this -----

year to catch up to those of last prize to any one else who has brains year. The landings were never able enough to evolve something real to recover from the loss of two snappy and novel. weeks in getting started this season through the agreement of the fishermen not to commence operations utnil March 1 instead of February 15, the statutory date for the opening of the season.

Landings for the week of October 11-17 inclusive totalled 665,000 pounds of which 120,000 pounds was from Canadian boats and 546,00 pounds from American. During the week prices were fairly steady with a tendency to weakness. The highest bid of the week for American fish was 18.2c and 5c which the Betty was paid for 7,000 pounds while the low price was 10c and 5c which the Attu and Eagle received or catches of 27,000 and 48,000 pounds respectively. The top bid for Canadian fish was 16.6c and 5c received by the Clipper II and Selma for catches of 3,000 and 5,000 pounds respectively and the low, 10.4c and 6c which the Viking I was paid for 2,500 pounds.
