Hon. S.F. Tolmie is Elected For Victoria, Majority 2,082

Barnard the Labor-Soldier Candidate Polls 5,023 Votes; In the East Three Farmers and One Liberal are Given Large Majorities.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VICTORIA, October 28.—Hon. Simon F. Tolmie, Minister of Agriculture, was returned here today by a majority of 2,082. He polled 7,105 votes while his opponent, Thomas Barnard of New Westminster, received 5,023 votes. The total vote was an unusually large one. There being over twelve thousand ballots marked out of a registration of 15,700.

Barnard went before the electorate as a labor-soldier candidate and got a large soldier vote. Tolmie was elected in 1917 as a Unionist and was this year chosen as Minister of Agriculture for the Dominion, bringing on this by-election. The contest has been a hot one. The large vote was polled in spite of a steady rain throughout the afternoon.

The following are the other election returns:

Assiniboia—Eighty polls out of 109 give O. R. Gould, grain grower, a majority of 4,000 over Hon. W. R. Motherwell, Liberal. Motherwell loses his deposit.

Clengarry-Stormont—Wilfred Kennedy, farmer, was elected with nine polls to hear from, by a majority of 1,332. It is expected this figure will be increased to 2,000.

Carlton-Victoria—James Caldwell, United Farmer, was elected over Col. Melville, Unionist, by 3,596, with only two small polls to be heard from. Caldwell's vote was 6,176, Melville's 2,580. Melville loses his deposit.

Quebec East—E. La Pointe, Liberal, won with a majority of 3,852 over F. K. Galibois, Labor. Galibois loses his deposit.

AMENDMENTS ARE DEFEATED

Straight Party Vote Carries the Grand Trunk Bill Through Committee.

OTTAWA, October 28.—Two amendments to clause 2 of the Grand Trunk bill were introduced while the House was in committee. The first by Hon. W. L. McKenzie King would provide "that this agreement shall be submitted and subject to ratification by the Parliament of Canada," was defeated by 49 to 26 on a straight party vote.

The other amendment by J. J. Denis of Joliette asked that five stocks of the Grand Trunk Railway instead of four be submitted to arbitration. This would mean arbitration of the value of the debenture as well as the common preference stocks. The amendment was defeated by 49 to 25.

SAYS CRANBROOK PEOPLE PREJUDICED

In Suit Against Returned Soldiers Labor Organizer Wishes to be Tried at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 28.—A. McKenzie, the union organizer, who is bringing suit against three returned soldiers, who are alleged to have run him out of Cranbrook on March 29, objected yesterday to a request by the defendants to have the case tried at Cranbrook. He claims that the jury would be drawn from the people who were prejudiced against him.

That is Suggestion of City Engineer—Material at Smith Island.

LUMBER PURCHASED FOR ROAD REPAIRS

Fifty thousand feet of lumber is to be bought from the Lakelse Lumber Co. at the price of \$24 per M. Such was the decision of the council last night when the special offer of this firm was brought to the attention of the city fathers. As the lumber is being sold in the city at as high a price as \$33 per M., it was considered good business to make the purchase. This lumber will complete the re-decking of the streets to make a good road from town to Seal Cove by the most advantageous grade.

Ald. Rochester inquired what was being done towards permanent road grading instead of plank-ing. He believed that it was the intention of the city some months ago to get away from the use of plank where possible.

City Engineer Clements replied that this was being done wherever possible. However, with the present material at hand he thought that it was almost vain to think of doing permanent grading. He had been investigating granite leads in the district and found that the granite on the island was only float and he had been unable to discover a body of it.

There are, however, some good granite bodies in the district. One is at Tyee station up the line and the other on Smith Island. In time the city should be able to get at one of these and get the hard material brought here for street grading purposes. In the meantime the present soft grading material which has been used is of little use for permanent work. The mayor was of the opinion that in the long run the use of granite would be cheaper and more satisfactory. The matter of bringing it to the city had been taken up with the G. T. P., but at the point from which it was to be brought there was no siding and the company refused to spot cars on the main line.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—(Noon). As soon as the Senate ratifies the German Peace Treaty the wartime prohibition will be ended, a presidential proclamation announced today from the White House.

Must Not Strike Says U.S. President

Whole Federal Machinery Ready to Deal with Conditions in Mining Field Unless Order Rescinded.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, October 28.—The Government stood pat today on President Wilson's ultimatum to soft coal miners that the strike ordered for November 1 must not take place. The whole Federal machinery already set up for the emergency was ready to deal with conditions in the mining field unless the executive board of the United Mine Workers of America, meeting in Indianapolis on Wednesday, votes to rescind the order.

In face of the statements of John L. Lewis, president of the Mine Workers' organization, that it was too late now to stop the walkout, there was a strong belief in official quarters that the strike would at least be postponed. This feeling was based largely on the feeling that the sentiment throughout the country was overwhelmingly for peace, regardless of how people might view the reported grievances of the miners.

LIGHT DOCKET AT ASSIZES

Mr. Justice Clements Comments on it in Charging the Grand Jury.

The fall assizes opened this morning before Mr. Justice Clement. In addressing the Grand Jury the presiding judge commented with pleasure on the very light docket and gave the jury its usual instructions stating that its time was its own and the members could make such inspections in the city as they deemed necessary.

The first case brought up was that of Rex vs. Michael J. Noone, the accused being charged with administering drugs with intent to commit an indictable offence. The Grand Jury retired and a true bill was brought in at 12 o'clock. The case was proceeded with this afternoon beginning at 2 o'clock. The chief witness is Angelo Pognotto, upon whom the drug was administered. L. W. Patmore is taking the case for the accused.

The case of Rex vs. Peter La France will not come till tomorrow afternoon, pending the arrival of witnesses from Stewart on the gas boat Nora.

President Vetoes Prohibition Bill; House Repasses it

WASHINGTON, October 28.—President Wilson unexpectedly vetoed the prohibition enforcement bill and within three hours the House of Representatives repassed it over his veto by a vote of 176 to 55.

The Senate also began laying plans to repass the bill there.

The President refused to sign the bill because it included enforcement of wartime prohibition.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT GIVES WAY TO PARLIAMENT ON SEVERAL POINTS IN VIEW OF THE RECENT ADVERSE VOTE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, October 28.—Last week's defeat in the House of Commons and the seriousness of the country's finances as revealed in the revised estimates submitted to Parliament showing that the estimated deficit for the year exceeds £447,000,000 instead of £250,000,000, as fixed in the budget, seems to have induced the Government to yield to certain reforms long demanded by the press. The foremost among these demands was for the return to cabinet responsibility and also a more regular attendance of the Prime Minister in the House of Commons. The former was adopted by a vote of 171 to 84.

Andrew Bonar Law, Government leader, introduced in the Commons a revised amendment to the Alien Bill presaging the settlement of the controversy which threatened the stability of the administration last week. The Commons adopted the amendment. The original amendments, except Frenchmen from the clause barring aliens from holding British pilot licenses. PRINCESS MARY IN WITH SILVER ORE FOR ANYOX SMELTER

The Princess Mary arrived from the north at 6 o'clock this morning with the capacity passenger list of the season. Owing to all the available accommodation on the steamer being taken up with the out-going Alaska passengers, she was unable to book any out of Prince Rupert. Among her passengers was Capt. Barrington, president of the Barrington Transportation Co. of New York, which operates boats from Wrangell to Telegraph Creek on the Stikine River. He is returning to New York for the winter. Another party also bound for New York was that headed by Capt. Bailie who has been big game hunting in the Stikine River valley with great success.

Besides her big passenger list, the Princess Mary also had a good deal of cargo and she spent the most of the four hours she was in port unloading silver ore from Skagway, which is to be transhipped to the Anyox smelter. She pulled out at 10 o'clock for Vancouver and Victoria.

WANT RIGHT TO TAX GOVERNMENT LANDS

Council Supports Action of Union of Canadian Municipalities in Demand.

A telegram from the secretary of the Union of Canadian Municipalities, of Montreal, was read at last night's council meeting. This union, it was pointed out, differed from the Union of B. C. Municipalities in that it was an association of all municipalities throughout the Dominion. The message drew attention to the fact that in the G. T. P. bill that is going through the House of Commons and Senate there is no specific provision for the payment of the railroad's property taxation in the municipalities. The Union

was demanding that this be embodied in the bill and asked for the support of the cities concerned.

Mayor McClymont had replied to the message supporting the demand on behalf of the city of Prince Rupert where the company has property to the assessed value of \$4,500,000. The action of the mayor was endorsed by the city council by a resolution moved by Ald. McMeekin, seconded by Ald. Perry and carried unanimously.

ORBITA RETURNS TO PEACE DUTIES AGAIN

Big Liner, Here During Was as Auxiliary Cruiser, Reopens Service from England to South America.

Coincident with the celebration of the eighteenth anniversary of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, the Company's liner, Orbita, sailed from Southampton on September 26 for South America, resuming this passenger and mail service which was cut off during the war.

Victorians will remember the Orbita as the auxiliary cruiser which called at Esquimalt while doing patrol work in the Pacific, and which came to Prince Rupert to dock. She is a palatial craft of over 16,000 tons, and on her first voyage on the South American route carried quite a number of distinguished passengers.

The Seal Cove Marine Ways, Limited, of Prince Rupert has just been incorporated with a capital of \$10,000. The objects of the company are for marine repairs and the construction of boats and a general business in connection with marine industries.

A letter from the Prince Rupert Hotel asking for permission to use the space under the sidewalk abutting their premises for the purpose of storing coal, baggage, etc., was referred to the Public Works Committee for report at last night's council meeting.

AWAITS TRIAL AT KETCHIKAN

Patsy Shanahan to Come up at The Assizes Now on in Alaskan Town.

Reports brought from Ketchikan state that there have been no new developments in the Ragar murder case. Patsy Shanahan, accused of the crime, is now in the jail and it is expected that he will come up for trial this week before the assizes that are now on there.

Shanahan is said to have been somewhat unbalanced for some time and it is stated that he has made threats against several of the officers of the law. In fact, four years ago he was recommended for the asylum, but nothing came of it.

On Thursday he went out with two loaded Colt automatics on a killing mission and calmly shot Deputy United States Attorney Steve Ragar in the main street. He then went to his room in the hotel where he was followed by the U. S. marshal and two constables. Fearing a desperate character, one of the police took a chair and mounted to the transom and covered him with his revolver and told him to come to the door where the other two took him. On being told he was under arrest he did not even ask why.

If his insanity is proven he will probably escape jail, but at any rate, the worst he can get is life imprisonment, as capital punishment has been abolished in Alaska.

PRINCE HAS CLEAR CARRYING VOICE

All Who Have Heard Him Remark His Speaking Abilities.

Everyone who has heard him has commented upon the Prince of Wales' remarkable voice. It is clear, with great carrying powers, the enunciation is distinct. Every word is well defined. Very few public men possess a voice of such splendid speaking qualities. Without apparent effort he can make himself heard four and five hundred yards away.

The keenest critics of voice qualities, the soldiers who have listened to commands and speeches through the medium of all sorts of voices, from the voices of sergeants to the voices of princes of the blood on days of high ceremony, praise with emphasis the speaking ability of the Prince of Wales.

And further, the Prince has a happy aptitude for choosing words of concise, direct and attractive meaning.

What phrase could be better than his "The Victory Loan is the bridge between war and peace."

The Prince of Wales has graciously consented to the use of his coat of arms on a flag which is to be the prize of honor; for districts winning their quota in the loan. A flag will also be given to organizations of fifty or more employees.

"I hope every city and district will win my flag," says the Prince.

BASKETBALL GAMES PLAYED LAST NIGHT

Beavers Beat the Cubs and the Colts Trottled all Around the Drydocks.

The boys are making preparations for entering the junior league which it is proposed to form in connection with the Basketball Association. Two games were played last night at the Exhibition Building. The Cubs and Beavers clashed for a short time and by a score of six to four the Beavers won.

In the second game the Colts trotted all around the Drydocks, winning by a score of 13 to 3. The Drydocks and the Colts are old rivals and it is expected that the former team will be strengthened before the next match and that some lively play will result.

QUICK ACTION

Frank Badgley, of the Canadian Field Artillery, who was decorated by King George with the military medal as the only survivor of a gallant party which charged a machine gun nest, met Miss June Elvidge, the movie actress, at the Victory Ball in New York and immediately asked her to marry him. She accepted him, and within 48 hours they were wedded and on their way to Canada.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$1 an acre; second-class to \$1.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$50 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 50 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from settlement to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

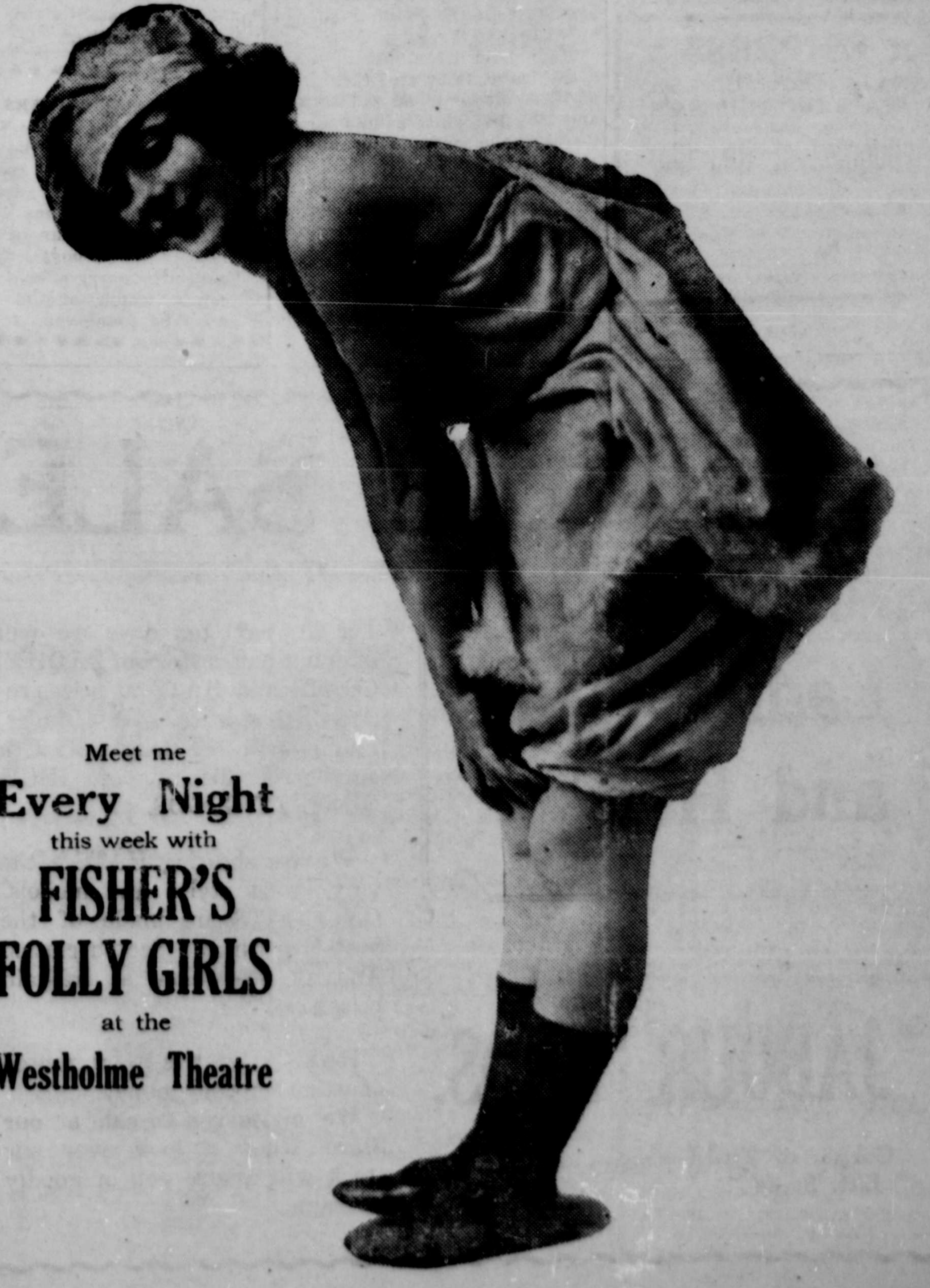
