KAMLOOPS MEETING GREAT SUCCESS

Startling Charges Laid Against Tolmie Government at Convention of Liberals in Saturday Session

Disregard of Pledges, Extravagance and Patronage Among Allegations—Work of Opposition For Past Two Years Approved

Premier King's Statement On Peace River Approved

Officers Elected at Big Grit Meeting in Kamloops, and Victoria Chosen For Next Gathering

KAMLOOPS, June 2:—Severe condemnation of the conduct of the present provincial administration was presented to the Liberal provincial convention here Saturday in a resolution submitted by G. S. Pearson, M. L. A. for Nanaimo. Outstanding among the charges were:

Disregard of the pledges made previous to taking office. Reckless and wanton extravagance. Increases in existing taxation and imposition of new taxes and fees.

Ruthless partizanship and grave injustices to outstanding citizens.

Partizan control of the Government Liquor Control Act. Secrecy in conduct of public businesses.

Breaking of faith with municipalities and motorists. Suppression and alteration of public documents.

Refusal to give proper information.

Appointment of innumerable partizan commissions to justify further extreme partizanship and to cover the government's own incompetency.

Attempted interference with the rights of fishermen. Sale of lands below their publicly recognized value.

Giving public franchises to party friends and refusal to properly safeguard the public interests.

Prostitution of public services for the benefit of those in control of the administration and their friends.

Opposition Is Approved

A resolution moved by Dr. K. C. McDonald of Vernon, formerly M. L. A. for North Okanagan and provincial secretary, strongly approved the work of the Liberal opposition during the past two years.

A resolution submitted by Dr. J. J. Gillis, M. L. A. for Yale, and carried proposed that taxes and other imposts should be reduced to a minimum consistent with the maintenance of adequate stable government, that industries should be encouraged to expand trade, that measures with this end in view should be enacted progressively in accordance with existing conditions and that, "for this purpose, the Liberal party of British Columbia, as represented at the convention, dedicates its every effort."

In a resolution submitted by J. W. de B. Farris K.C. of Vancouver, expression of confidence was renewed by the delegates in the King federal government which Mr. Farris declared to be pre-eminently in the interests of the Canadian people.

Commendation of the Dominion government for the generous manner in which it had returned to the province the railway belt and Peace River Block was expressed by A. M. Manson K.C., M. L. A. for Omineca.

Regarding Peace River

The convention strongly supported the announcement by Premier King that it ought to be possible for the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Canadian National Railways to settle the route for the Peace River outlet within six months and to begin construction within a year. H. G. Perry, former M. L. A. for Fort George, spoke strongly in support of this step.

A wire from Hon. Dr. J. H. King, British Columbia's representative in the federal cabinet, congratulating the convention on its selection of T. D. Pattullo for leader was read.

Dr. King mentioned the bright prospects of the federal election and declared that it was desirable that British Columbia should take advantage of the opportunity to see that the province had a strong Liberal representation in the next federal parliament.

FISH PRICE CONFERENCE

Canned Salmon Section of C. M. A. Not Willing to Meet Skeena Fishermen Individually

Regarding a price conference which was supposed to have been held at Port Essington on Saturday, last, Charles Lord, secretary-treasurer of the Northern B. C. Salmon Fishermen's Association, stated this morning that the canned salmon section of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association had declined to meet the fishermen of the Skeena River as a separate body in price negotiations.

The canners were willing, however, to meet representatives of the fishermen before the main price committee for the coast in Vancouver.

DOCTOR IS EXPELLED

Principal of Pentiction "Tar and Feather" Case Is Again In Limelight

VANCOUVER, June 2:—A decision of the council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia ordering the name of Dr. V. C. Latimer of Pentiction released from the registry will be appealed to the Supreme Court, it was announced on Saturday by G. L. Fraser, counsel for Latimer.

Dr. Latimer was the supposed victim in a "tar and feather" case last November in Pentiction as a result of which assault charges have been laid against Charles Oliver, son of the late Premier John Oliver.

Charges of unprofessional conduct were later laid against Dr. Latimer and heard in camera by the council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons. The announcement of the appeal was the first intimation of the decision of the College.

IS DEAD IN INTERIOR

Robert McCaffery, Brother of M. P. McCaffery of This City, Passes Suddenly at Prince George

Word was received in the city Saturday afternoon of the sudden death at Prince George of Robert McCaffery, well known the contractor of that district and brother of M. P. McCaffery of this city. Mr. McCaffery, who was attending the Liberal convention at Kamloops, was intercepted by wire and left immediately for Prince George. Mrs. M. P. McCaffery left on today's train for Prince George where the funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon.

The late Mr. McCaffery was 65 years of age and unmarried. Born in Quebec and a resident of Maine in his younger days, he had lived at Prince George for years in connection with his timbering interests in the central interior. Three weeks ago he was visited at Prince George by his brother of this city and was apparently in good health at that time.

Besides Mr. McCaffery here, deceased is survived by another brother in Portland, Ore., and sisters at Portland and in the east.

Two American packers are buying at Seven-Mile and Langara and are paying 16c per pound. Canadian buyers are offering only 12c.

Swede Logger Loses His Life

Torvald Knutson Died Instantly Last Week When Struck By Tree at Selwyn Inlet

Details have reached provincial police headquarters here of a fatality at the T. A. Kelley Logging Co.'s camp at Selwyn Inlet, Queen Charlotte Islands, on May 25 when Torvald Knutson, one of the members of the logging crew, was struck on the head by a small tree in falling operations, dying instantly. An inquest was held at Queen Charlotte City and it was shown that death had been entirely accidental. Burial took place at Queen Charlotte City.

Knutson was a Swede and had been out from the Old Country only four years. He is survived by a brother who is also employed at Selwyn Inlet.

Fraser River Fishers Refuse To Take Sixty Cent Bid For Sockeye

Another Conference to Be Held Tonight With Canners Before Final Action in Matter Is Taken

NEW WESTMINSTER, June 2:—The possibility of a salmon fishermen's strike on the Fraser River loomed up today as a result of members of the British Columbia Fishermen's Protective Association deciding on Saturday to refuse the offer of 60c a fish for sockeye and 22 1-2 for coho salmon. Association representatives will have a further conference tonight with the canners. The 60 cent offer applies only to the Fraser River, 50 cents being the price suggested for northern canneries.

FISH PRICES FOR SEASON

The British Columbia Salmon Canners' Association is offering gilt net prices for the Naas and Skeena Rivers as well as other northern waters this year of 50c each for sockeye, 7½c per pound for red springs, 22½c each for cohoes and steelheads, 4c each for pinks and 5c each for chums.

For seine fish the prices offered are 50c for sockeye in the Naas, Skeena, Rivers Inlet and Smith's Inlet areas; at Lowe Inlet, Butedale, Klentu, Walker Lake, Namu, Bella Coola, Kimsquit and South Queen Charlottes, 42½c, and in Massett Inlet, 35c.

The price offered for sockeyes is about 7½c a fish lower than last season.

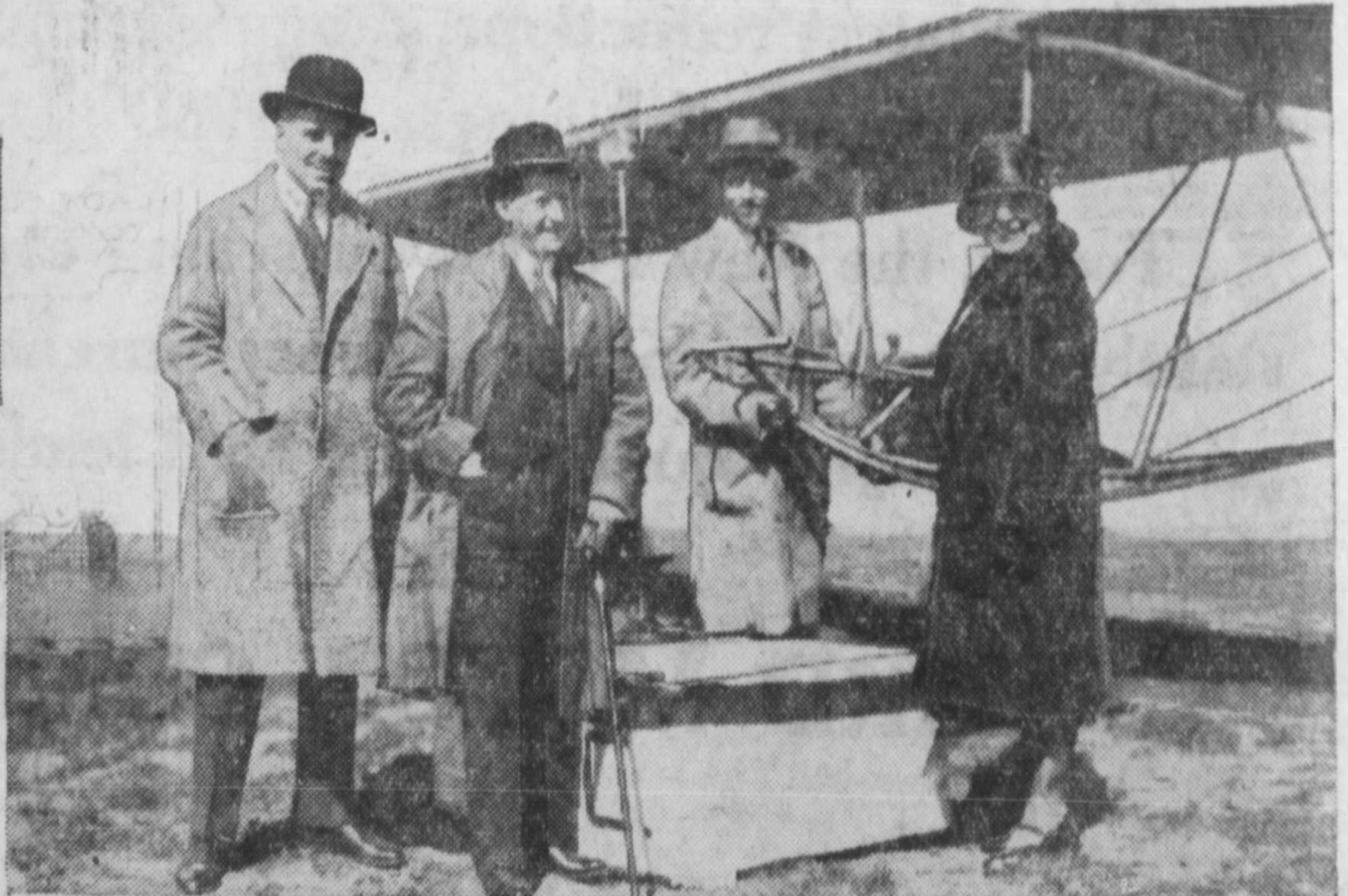

COLD HURTS GRAIN CROP

Warmer Weather Badly Needed, Peace River Brightest Spot

WINNIPEG, June 2—Cool weather predominated during the greater part of the past week and, with frosts at night, growth has been very slow. High winds during the day in addition to drying out the surface soil have also caused considerable damage through cutting grain at the surface of the ground. This is especially true in districts where land is rolling as the grain on knolls was cleared off. With warm weather and more moisture crops so affected could yet make splendid recovery and damage would not be heavy, according to the weekly report of the department of agriculture of Canadian National Railways. Seeding has not progressed very rapidly on account of high winds and it will take another week to completely finish this operation, although quite a few districts now report all grains have reached the seed bed and early sown oats are between two and three inches above the ground.

Generally speaking, conditions at all points throughout the west are less favorable than when the last report was written on account of frosts, wind, dry weather and some insect pests, but with a few good rains in early June, accompanied by warm weather, this setback would only be temporary.

Of the three western provinces, Manitoba reports most seasonable weather. Nights were cool but high winds were not so general as in the two more westerly provinces. Soil drifting is reported between Portage La Prairie and Brandon and a good general rain in that territory would be acceptable as a means of preventing further soil movement.

In Saskatchewan cut worms are active in the Regina territory and Madison, in the north, also reports about 200 acres have been affected by this pest. The only thing which will prevent the cleaning off of many fields by these insects within the next few weeks would be copious rains. Surface soil in southern Saskatchewan is rapidly drying out and soil drifting is reported from many points, necessitating reserving of some oats, wheat and flax in the Dodsland, Bengough, Tessier and Riverhurst subdivisions. Crops in districts not affected by the high winds are still in good condition, but general rain fall throughout all grain growing districts would not be amiss.

In Alberta

Alberta reports the weather continues cool and windy with two or three heavy frosts. These frosts, together with high winds, have, in many districts, cut growing crops to the ground, but it is not anticipated crop damage will be permanent but that growth will be merely retarded from a week to ten days. Many farmers consider the frost is beneficial as it will strengthen root growth and increase stooling when crops now retarded again appear above the surface of the ground. There is sufficient moisture for present needs and warm weather with intermittent rains will be beneficial.

Central Alberta has also been visited by strong winds but a heavy snow fall, was the means, in many districts of increasing the surface moisture to such an extent that drifting which otherwise would have occurred, was prevented.

Good growing weather has experienced in the Peace River country as heavy downpours, varying from a few points to over two and one-half inches, are recorded. Practically all crops are now seeded and conditions are very favorable. This territory is the brightest spot in this week's report.

Scanty receipts on western stock yards are still a feature but desirable cattle are changing hands on a little stronger basis. Few stockers and feeders are coming and the price of these is holding steady. Shipments of hops have also been light and with less arrivals the market has strengthened.

Rev. J. L. McLean of Toronto, who has been supplying in the pulpit of First Presbyterian Church here for the past month, will sail on the Princess Louise Wednesday afternoon for Vancouver. Rev. Dr. R. M. Stevenson, who has accepted a call to the pulpit of the local church, and Mrs. Stevenson will arrive in the city from Vancouver this week.
