Yesterday afternoon members of the Rotary Club were intensely interested in a paper given by R. H. 1.00 Fisheries Experimental Station, on .50 "The Part that Bacteria Play in the 2.80 dress was illustrated by a lot of fine .25 slides showing the oddities of par-.02 of working. There were micro-or-.15 ganisms which cause boils, blood poisoning, pneumonia, gonorrhea, meningitis, dyptheria, tuberculosis, leprosy, anthrax, typhoid, cholera, bubonic plague, lockjaw, gangrene, siphilis, yellow fever, malaria, dysentary, sleeping sickness and rabies. All got in their deadly work among the blood corpuscles. In his address Mr. Bedford said:

"Bacteria conjure up in the mind's eye of most of us a picture of an invisible army of assassins, whose advance upon the human race is followed by a trail of disease, disaster and death. This however, is only one half of the picture. They are just as much a blessing to mankind as they are a curse.
