Grants and Gratuities to All Returned Soldiers are Refused

Sum of \$35,000,000 Recommended to be Set Aside for Providing Relief and Other Necessary Expenditures in Connection with Re-establishment

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, October 29.—The Parliamentary Committee on soldiers' civil re-establishment rejects the proposal for a general distribution of grants or gratuities on the ground that the country is financially unable to pay. The general scheme for re-establishment submitted by the G. W. V. A. and also the \$2,000 gratuity scheme are rejected.

The G. W. V. A. proposal was to concern men who might be able to establish their needs before the national board.

The Parliamentary Committee concedes the necessity of further re-establishment and in certain particulars recommends improvements and extension of the work now carried on together with some new lines of work to be undertaken involving an estimated expenditure of \$35,000,000. Following are the details of the expenditures recommended:

Gratuities to Canadians who enlisted in the Royal Air Force and other Imperial units, \$9,000,000.

Rebate of transportation expenses paid by dependents who returned to Canada prior to November 11, 1918, \$1,000,000.

Provision for extra items of expenditure such as clothing allowance to S. C. R. patients, pay and allowances to trainees taken on the strength of the S. C. R. and subsequently not approved; care of subnormal cases, necessitous cases, pensions, under arrangement with the Patriotic Fund; loans to disabled men for tools, equipment, training and education; cashing of checks at war for Canadians who joined the Imperial units; unemployed relief during winter, established at about \$25,000,000.

CHANCELLOR OF EXCHEQUER HAS FIGURED AHEAD

While Present Financial Conditions are Bad, Austin Chamberlain Shows How in Future They May Make Good.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, Oct. 29.—Chancellor of the Exchequer, Austen Chamberlain, laid before Parliament a white paper in which he gives proposals for making up a national balance sheet in normal years: Estimated revenue, £806,000,000. In this are included £290,000,000 derived from customs and excise duties, £460,000,000 received from inland revenue, £13,000,000 from post office and £13,000,000 from other sources. Estimates of expenditures under post bellum conditions are composed of £373,000,000 for fighting forces, £246,600,000 for civil services and £53,400,000 for revenue services.

The Chancellor declared expenditures for the financial year 1919-1920 will reach £1,642,295,000 or £194,195,000 more than estimated in the budget laid before the House, while the revenue will attain £1,168,650,000, which is £321,450,000 less than estimated. Thus the deficit on this year's budget will amount to £473,645,000.

DEFENCE OF THE PACIFIC COAST

General Mewburn Says That Matter Will Be Discussed at Ottawa Conference With Jellicoe.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VANCOUVER, Oct. 29.—General S. C. Mewburn, speaking here on the Defence of Canada, said that although Parliament authorized a permanent force of 10,000 men it was not likely that they would be raised more than 6,300. He said that a conference at Ottawa during the visit of Sir John Jellicoe would deal with the defence of the Pacific coast. He could make no prediction of the policy to be adopted.

OPPOSITION TO G. T. DEAL AND PROHIBITION

Conservative Caucus Develops Idea that There Should Be Delay in Both Matters

OTTAWA, Oct. 29 (noon).—The caucus of Conservatives this morning developed opposition to the Grand Trunk legislation and also to the proposed prohibition legislation. There was strong feeling that there should be delay in action on both matters.

MANY JOIN THE TRADES COUNCIL

Purchase of Motor Ambulance is Urged and Conscription of Wealth Suggested

At the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council held in the City Hall last evening it was reported that many new members were being enrolled into the International locals. There were applications from Anyox, Ocean Falls, Surf Inlet, Swanson Bay, Stewart, Queen Charlotte Islands, Smithers, and Prince George and this was taken to indicate that the worker wants to feel solid.

The Great War Veterans and the Army and Navy Veterans are each to be asked to send delegates to the Trades and Labor Council and the secretary was instructed to write them to that effect.

A letter from the Trades Congress of Canada asking the local council to support the Victory loan was turned down, the Council being of opinion that there should be conscription of wealth, the worker having already done his share.

The Council urged that the City purchase a motor ambulance particularly for the purpose of giving the workers who were injured proper treatment. It was suggested that it might be kept in the City Hall at very little extra expense.

The carpenters advised the Council of their demand of \$1 a day increase.

JACK DEMPSEY IS TO FIGHT BECKETT

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—Jack Dempsey has accepted an offer for a bout with Joe Beckett, the well-known English boxer.

The weekly practice of the Prince Rupert Symphony Orchestra will be held in the usual place on Thursday at 8 p.m. in stead of tonight as arranged.—Secretary.

Major McMullin returned on the Prince George this morning after attending a conference of military men in Victoria with a view to establishing an active militia in District No. 11.

At a meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last night attention was drawn to the fact that retail clerks holding union cards were working in shops not carrying out union rules. The executive was empowered to look into the matter with a view to adjustment.

GUILTY OF SAYING SCANDALOUS WASTE MONEY IN RUSSIA

LONDON, Oct. 29.—Lieut.-Col. J. Sherbrook Kelly, V.C., pleaded guilty before a court martial to writing letters to a London newspaper in which he asserted among other things that there had been a scandalous waste of lives and a vast use of money in the operations of the British in Russia.

Sentence will be promulgated later.

SENATE PASSES THE PROHIBITION ACT OVER PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—The Senate passed the Prohibition Act over the President's veto and made immediately effective the machinery for preventing the sale of beverages containing more than one and one half per cent alcohol.

MC PHEE LEADER IN PRIZE COMPETITION

Confidence Renewed In British Cabinet

Large majority for Government in vote on Bill Renewing Defence of Realm Act in House of Commons.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, October 29.—The Government received a vote of confidence in the House of Commons. A bill renewing the powers of the Defence of the Realm Act was under discussion. Sir Frederick Banbury, having obtained the speaker's endorsement of a technical objection to the bill, moved the adjournment of the debate to secure its withdrawal and the substitution of a new bill.

Andrew Bonar Law refused to withdraw the bill and made the question one of confidence. The Banbury motion was then rejected by a vote of 283 to 77.

This vote has special significance in view of the fact that the Government's amendment to the Alien Bill was defeated by a majority of 80 votes last week.

Opposition Scores Important Point

Protect Nation against any change being made in Agreement with Grand Trunk Railway after Passing of Bill Now before House.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, October 29.—The Grand Trunk bill again occupied the attention of Parliament to the exclusion of all other business. The discussion was resumed in committee on Clause 3 which makes provision that the agreement to be entered into between the Government and the Grand Trunk Railway Co. shall provide for a definition of the company's properties and interests and such other terms and conditions as the Government and company may agree upon.

The opposition made their chief fight on the point that the agreement should be submitted to Parliament for ratification. Liberal speakers asserted it was unwise to give the Grand Trunk shareholders the opportunity to ratify the agreement and to deny shareholders the opportunity to this right to Parliament.

Hon. Arthur Meighen in reply said the Government course was in accordance with the best precedent, because Parliament was now in reality discussing the terms of the agreement.

It was finally agreed, on the motion of Hon. J. D. Reid, to amend clause 3 by providing that no change should be made in the agreement inconsistent with the provisions of this Act.

REGINA, Oct. 29.—The Government of Saskatchewan will foreclose and take over the lines of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, unless Saskatchewan is refunded every dollar paid in interest on the bonded indebtedness secured under the provincial guarantees, is the statement of Premier Martin.

PRESBYTERIANS GIVE BANQUET TO SOLDIERS

Dr. Grant Says Nation in Birthpangs of a New Era.

MANY ADDRESSES AT INTERESTING GATHERING

"This is a time of evolution. We are in the birthpangs of a new era. Let us be calm and each do his duty as we know the men did on the field of France and Flanders. Men are criticising the church. They are not right in doing so for they should stand by her. Every institution is being attacked. Old ideas are fighting with the new and the church requires the same backing up as other institutions. This is the proudest day of my life when I can welcome back the men of this congregation, something like two hundred of them, who went overseas."

This paragraph quoted from the speech of Dr. Grant at the banquet to the returned soldiers of the Presbyterian Church congregation and their wives last night was the keynote of the gathering. Coming from the man who preaches to a large congregation every Sunday it was an indication of the feeling of the church. The other addresses, numerous and interesting, centred around this one.

Country and Empire.

Colonel McMordie and Mayor McClymont spoke to the toast "Our Country and Empire." The former spoke of the lofty ideals and the breadth of character of the Canadian, of the greatness of the Empire, saying it was his proudest boast to be able to say, "I am a Canadian citizen and a British subject."

Mayor McClymont illustrated his opinion of the future greatness.

MICHAEL NOONE A FREE MAN

Jury at Assizes Found Him "Not Guilty" of Administering Drugs or Theft.

After being out for about fifteen minutes the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty in the case of Rex vs. Michael J. Noone last night. He was found innocent of both charges, for administering drugs and theft. He was immediately released. He was arrested on September 20 last and has been in the city jail ever since.

The witness, Angelo Pognotto, upon whom the drug was alleged to have been administered, was examined. He admitted that the missing jewelry mysteriously turned up about two weeks ago.

Dr. Cade testified that the smell of the drug that was alleged to have been used was extremely like that of chloral hydrate, a narcotic drug. He would not, however, swear positively to its being such judged merely by smell.

Constable Bailey, Christina Johnson, housekeeper of the hotel where the crime was supposed to have been committed; Edward Borget, manager; Chas. Conner, clerk, and Constable McGlinchey, who made the arrest, all took the stand. The only positive and tangible piece of evidence was given by the last mentioned who testified that when he went to search the room occupied by the accused Noone took a small vial from his pocket and crushed it under his foot on the oilcloth. This exhibit was produced in court but it was not proven conclusively that it contained chloral.

L. W. Patmore made a strong plea for the accused, based on the lack of evidence. The only thing that they could convict on would be a smell and there was no conclusive proof to show that the vial in question contained chloral or cocaine for the man's own use.

British Finances

Not Beyond Control.

Austen Chamberlain, British Chancellor of the Exchequer, has taken the trouble to show the people how, as soon as the present unsettled conditions are over, the nation may yet pay its way in spite of the immense burden of the war debt. He goes into some detail and if conditions do not change materially he may be right. People of that country, and of every other that has been implicated in the war, have been wondering if the Governments would be able to meet their interest payments and carry on after the soldiers have been returned to civil life. He estimated the revenue of the country at £800,000,000 or about four billion dollars and the expenditures will be about the same amount.

Interesting Fight Over Prohibition.

There seems to be a fight on between the President of the United States and Congress over the matter of prohibition. There is a war time measure in force at present in that country which would elapse as soon as the treaty of peace was signed. Congress passed a bill continuing the measure, but the President has vetoed it and issued a proclamation saying it will cease with the ratifying of the Peace Treaty by the Senate. The House of Representatives repassed it and today it is before the Senate and probably may have been passed by the time this is published. The outcome will be watched with interest.

Salutary Lesson for British Cabinet.

We have often heard of the autocracy of the British cabinet, but never before have we heard of the cabinet being disciplined as it was a few days ago. The newspapers and politicians had been protesting of late but without effect. Then a section of the members of the House of Commons rebelled and the Government was defeated on a snap vote, in spite of the efforts of the Government whips to bring them in line.

It was a question for a time whether the Government would resign or reform. They reformed. In all probability they were assured by the rebels that all they wanted was decent treatment, and a return to parliamentary practice as it was understood before the war. This they have secured. Lloyd George who had to a large extent given up attending the sessions of the House of Commons has promised to return and give the affairs of the nation his personal attention.

Vandalism With Indian Names.

The Geographical Board of Canada is said to have changed the name of the Wishniskit mountain to "The Seven Sisters." This surely is a mistake. There could not be anything more common place than this new name. Almost every mountain range has its "sisters." Wishniskit means "high mountain." It is quite appropriate and can never be confused with any other mountain in any other part of the world.

The general principle of retaining the Indian names is one that should be followed. Very soon the Indian language will be a thing of the past and these names will be all we shall have to remember it by. The Indian names are unique and we should cling to them tenaciously. A somewhat similar case occurred near Victoria where on the recommendation of the chief astronomer the name Saanish Mountain was lost and the place given the commonplace cognomen of "Observatory Hill." This should be followed by a change in the personnel of the Geographical Board.

ness of the country by telling of an interesting speech he had heard delivered by Major Martin, provincial industrial commissioner, in which that gentleman had emphasized the advantages of living in a place where they produced the necessities of life. In this province there were opportunities for the building of ready-made houses, the production of wood alcohol, the development of the tanning industry by the use of the bark of our own trees, and by the further development of the pulp and paper industries. More smelting and steel works were also necessary to develop our ores. To get these new industries in operation would mean much to the country.

Fallen Heroes.

The toast to "Our Fallen Heroes" was drunk in silence. Mr. Harvey and Miss Stephens playing the Dead March.

In proposing "Our Returned Men" Fred Stork spoke of the thankfulness and heartfelt joy that they were all home again. Everyone in the congregation felt a peculiar interest when the mothers had their boys back at church for the first time. He spoke of the part this city had played in the great war.

Rev. Mr. Rowell who had been a stretcher bearer at the front, mentioned that anyone would be glad to have taken any part whatever in the great accomplishment. Everyone had rallied to the call, and the contemptible little army had earned the eternal gratitude of the world by crushing autocracy.

Howard Pringle told of some of the difficulties he experienced in getting into the air force, and described their work at the front.

The Allies.

In proposing "The Allies," F. F. Schellenberg said there may be differences of opinion as to who won the war but there was no difference of opinion as to who lost it. By each doing his part the result had been achieved. He hoped that the good feeling which existed between the allied countries would continue and that all our rivalries would be friendly rivalries.

American Consul Wakefield spoke of how the sons of Britain had flocked to the standard. Their deeds were enrolled on the tablets of fame. They were proud of the smaller nations that had stood out on the side of right and justice. They felt a deep sense of gratitude to those who made a barrier against the advances of the enemy. If the returned soldiers did their duty half as well since returning as they did over there, no trouble need be feared.

Formal Welcome.

Dr. Grant extended the formal welcome to the men and their wives and especially those wives who had come here as war brides. They were all glad to see them so handsomely hitched up. They had left as citizens untired in the arts of war, and they returned as citizens to help work out the destinies of this great land. He felt sure they would all do their duty. It was not wise to be always crying "wolf, wolf." They should keep nerved up and not fall under stress, and show calmness and courage.

Simon Duff told of the work of the army chaplains and spoke appreciatively of the work of Dr. Gordon, who is better known as Ralph Connor.

J. H. Kelly sketched humorously the various welcomes they had received, ending with the final French welcome when the liberated French people had been so effusive.

Capt. McGregor, V. C., spoke of the usefulness of "The Padre" in the army. Dr. Grant, he thought, would have made a splendid Padre.

In speaking for the Church, Rev. Mr. White of Kimberley, who had been an army chaplain in South Africa, mentioned that the church had often not been popular with a certain section of the community. They must not mind that. He spoke of the inter-church movement and was glad to see that here there was a union of effort for the uplift of the community.

The Ladies.

Scotty Dennis was witty as usual in proposing a toast to the ladies. He told of the work of the nurses and how it was ap-

ASK GOVERNMENT FOR ALL TAXES

The report of the mayor regarding the Convention of B. C. Municipalities was again brought before the council on Monday night. On motion of Ald. Rochester, seconded by Ald. Kirkpatrick, the report was filed.

The mayor, on being questioned, stated that the matter of the administration of justice and collection of local taxation is to be brought before the legislature by special committee at its forthcoming session. It is to be asked that the administration of justice be taken over entirely by the provincial government. Also it is going to be requested that all taxes collected within a municipality go to that municipality's revenues.

QUESTION AND ANSWER AT CITY COUNCIL

Alderman Perry Wants to Know in Regard to Several Matters.

Ald. Perry asked several questions at Monday night's council meeting from economical and moral standpoints. They were as follows:—

What method is adopted by the city in keeping track of and storing city tools?

Answer by mayor—The city purchasing agent takes stock periodically. The stock, which has been low for some time, is stored in the basement of the fire hall and in the city stables. Recently new locks have been put on the city stables.

Ald. Perry recommended that the matter be looked into and that a satisfactory system for the keeping of these tools be adopted. Is the work of Mr. Black in connection with the drawing of plans nearly finished?

Answer by mayor—The work is nearly finished and they are in excellent shape.

Ald. Perry recommended that Mr. Black's services be dispensed with as soon as the work is completed to avoid unnecessary expenditure.

Why is it proposed that Ed. Bannier be further prosecuted for selling liquor after he had already received a fine under the Indian Act?

Answer by the mayor—The fact that Bannier was a German had nothing to do with the matter. It was the feeling that a jail sentence would have been more to the point. Recently some others had gone to Okalla for the same offence. It was apparent that Bannier had been making a business of selling liquor and it was the general feeling that the fifty-fifty sharing of fines with the constable under the Indian Act was not a good system. It was the method and not nationality that had caused dissatisfaction.

Mr. Perry said that he was at the trial. He thought that it was clearly a case under the Indian Act. He did not like the system of sharing fines either but it was the Indian constable's duty to prosecute under the Indian Act. The mayor said that the city police were all ready to prosecute under the B. C. Prohibition Act, but that the Indian constable had insisted that it was his case.

Mr. Perry said that a punishment could be made just as severe under the Indian Act as under the B. C. Prohibition Act.

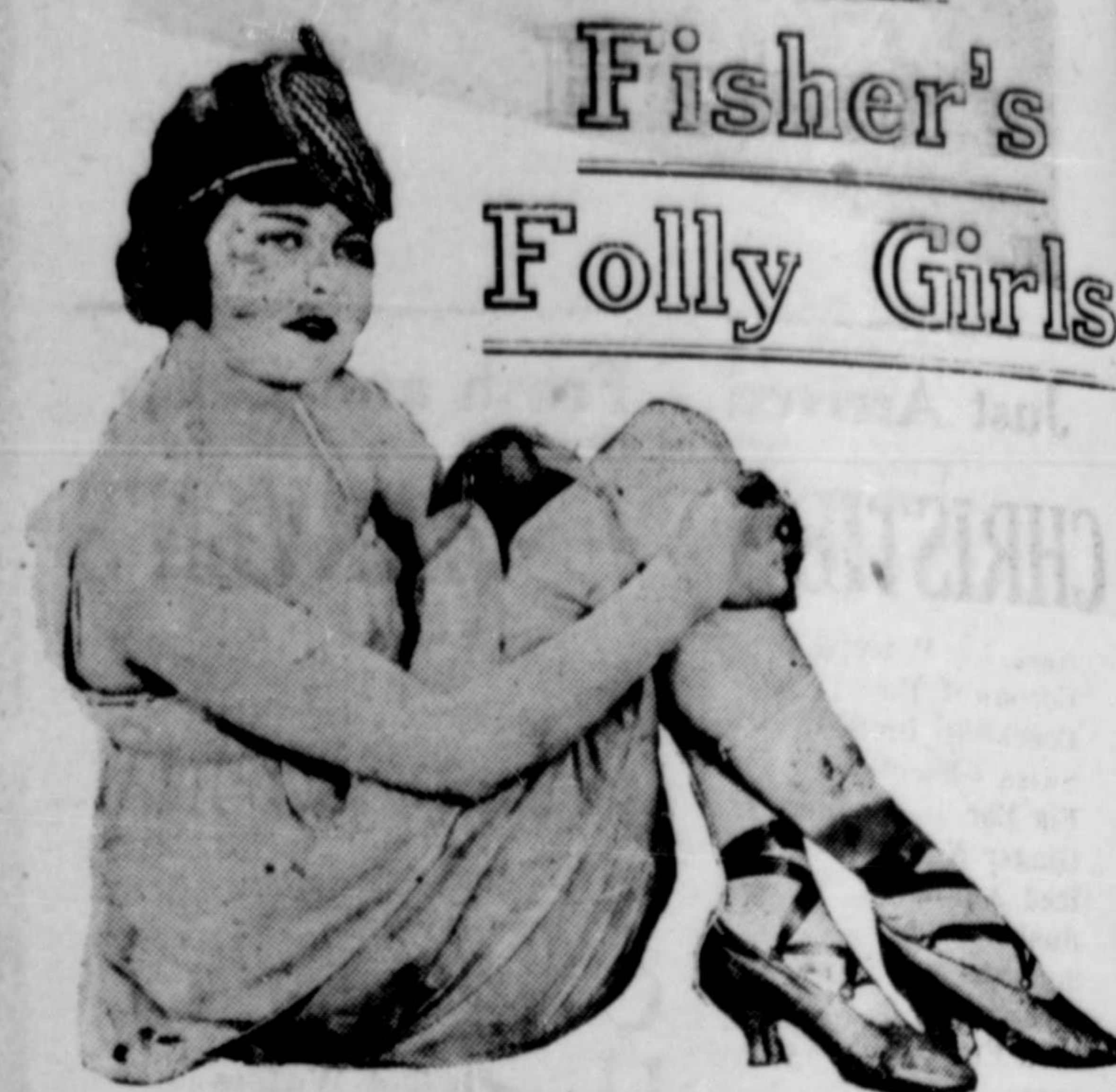

PECK NOT KEEN ON MINISTERS

Says Tolmie Only One He Would Go Out of His Way to Support.

Speaking at Victoria Col. Peck is reported in the Daily Times as follows:—

"I am not here to apologize for the sins of the Union Government. We live in times when everybody abuses all governments and charges all the sins of all civilization against any government at all.

"I want to say this about the Union Government—give the devil his due.

"I think the Union Government has done the best it could and until you show me you have got a better Government and that the parties that opposed it in the crisis of our war when we were fighting in France and Flanders in the desperation of conflict can improve on it—until you show me a better Government I will support it. There is no other minister of the Union Government that I would have gone out of my way to support."

Laughter and cheers from part of the audience greeted this expression.

"I don't mean what you do," he went on.

"What I did mean was that I support him on the common ground of friendship for a man of British Columbia who has the proper ideals. That is the reason I came here to support Dr. Tolmie.

True to Returned Soldier.

"I don't think there was ever representative of this town who did better for the city than Dr. Tolmie did. If I wanted to I could tell you a great story of what he did—of how he fought day and night. He fought like a true Victorian. No man has ever done more for the city of Victoria than Dr. Tolmie.

"The returned soldier has had no better friend in the Parliament of Canada than he has had in Dr. Tolmie. And I say that knowing there are returned men in Parliament. I can truthfully say that there has never been a man in Parliament more genuine, more true in all questions affecting the returned soldiers than Dr. Tolmie. I had many questions in common there with Dr. Tolmie affecting the returned soldier. If there was ever any member in that Parliament of Canada that was more faithful, true and genuine in his friendship for the interest of the returned soldier than your member, Dr. Tolmie, I don't know of any.

Stand on Bonus.

"I appeal to you on these grounds because I think the return of Dr. Tolmie is of paramount importance to Victoria today. I want to say to every person here tonight that if they are to cast a vote to bring about a general election in this country they have got to take the responsibility.

"Regarding the bonus to returned soldiers, I took the same ground as Mr. Barnard did. I took this ground that as far as it is possible within the financial capacity of the country this bonus should be paid to returned soldiers. But just one matter I want to mention. I think some of the men made a great mistake at the G. W. V. A. convention at Calgary in placing the gratuity at \$2,000 in the first place.

Widows and Maimed First.

"The returned soldier here in his full strength is not the first charge on the citizens of this country. The first charge is this—and I said it two or three times on the floor of Parliament—that the first pensions should be paid to the widows and to those of our grand fellows who are maimed and afflicted. Next should be considered our men who came back from this war, who haven't had sufficient education to resume civilian life as they should and the men who left trades to go overseas.

"As regards the gratuity, I want to stand here and quite sincerely say that I am quite in earnest that the returned soldiers should get everything this country can pay, but I don't believe that it should be anything beyond the capacity of the finances of this country to pay."
