WORST IS NOW FEARED FOR BURKE

WETS MAKE LARGE GAINS IN UNITED STATES ELECTIONS

Systematic Search by Airplanes Failed to Reveal Any Kind of Trace of Three Missing Flyers

Two Pilots Scour Territory Between Liard Post and Atlin; Machine May Have Been Buried In Snow; No Sign of It On MayLakes

ATLIN, Nov. 5.—The worst is now feared for Pilot E. J. A. Burke and two companions who have been missing since October 11 on a return flight from Liard River Post to Atlin. Pilot Dorbrandt and Pilot Wasson with Walter Sweet as lookout have taken in all the country that Burke would have covered in flying from Liard Post to Atlin.

CYNTHIA ASHORE

Union Boat Expected to be Refloated Today and To Continue Her Voyage

VANCOUVER, Nov. 5.—Running ashore in a dense fog at Mission Point near Sechel yesterday afternoon, the Union Steamship Co.'s steamer Lady Cynthia was not seriously damaged and will be able to resume her journey if refloated today.

Passengers were removed from the Lady Cynthia and taken to the company's hotel at Sechel where they are the guests of the Union Steamships Ltd.

CAN'T TAKE OVER ROAD

Prince George Advised That Government Policy Only Applies to Small Communities

PRINCE GEORGE, Nov. 5.—In answer to a request of the city council that the government designate the portions of streets to be considered as forming part of the Cariboo Highway and the Summit Lake highway and are, therefore, entitled to be taken over and maintained by the government, P. Phillip, chief engineer for the provincial department of public works, has written that his department has not the power to take over portions of the streets within limits of the city of Prince George for the purpose indicated.

Mr. Phillip intimated that the policy for taking over streets was restricted to small communities and that the population of Prince George took it out of the class of incorporated areas in which the policy could be applied.

NEW BOATS PROPOSED

Two Hydrographic Survey Vessels to Be Built, Minister of Marine Announces

VICTORIA, Nov. 5.—Construction at an early date of two new hydrographic vessels, one for use on the Pacific Coast and the other for the St. Lawrence River, is under consideration, Hon. Alfred Durand, minister of marine, stated upon arrival here on an official visit of inspection.

VANCOUVER WHEAT

VANCOUVER, Nov. 5.—Wheat was quoted at 67c on the local exchange today.

Although both planes have made a systematic search for the past two days in lovely flying weather, no signs of tracks or smoke have been observed.

Capt. Burke's plane is certainly not showing on any of the lakes which abound on the whole course from Liard to Atlin. If Burke had crashed, as it is now presumed he did, the plane would be very hard to find as it, doubtless, would be covered with snow. The plane is aluminum covered and would be hard to observe in any case.

Burke's two companions were Emil Kading, mechanic, and Bob Martin, prospector.

There is no word here of Pilot Robin Renahan who is missing on a flight from Vancouver to Skagway to join in the search for Burke.

Dorbrandt reported today, after a three and a half hour flight over Burke's course that there were plenty of trappers' cabins to be seen but around none that had been inspected from the air were any man tracks or smoke to be seen. There are plenty of moose and caribou in the country, Dorbrandt reported, and it was quite possible that the men might subsist if still alive.

AIR SERVICE FOR CANADA

C. N. R. and C. P. R. Will Co-operate in New Project, It is Said

WINNIPEG, Nov. 5.—Negotiations are nearing completion for the formation of a Dominion-wide air service in which the Canadian National and the Canadian Pacific Railways will participate, according to word received here.

James A. Richardson of Winnipeg will be the chief stockholder in the organization which will be known as the Aviation Corporation of Canada. This corporation will have under its control the Western Canada Airways, the Canada Transcontinental Airways, the Canadian Airways and other companies, providing a service from coast to coast.

W. F. Trant, post office inspector, arrived in the city on the Prince George this afternoon from Vancouver.

LABOR GOVERNMENT BEATS FIRST ATTACK

LONDON, Nov. 5.—The MacDonald Labor government late last night "beat" down the first important attack of the present parliamentary session, defeating a Conservative amendment by a majority of 31 votes. The motion was to amend the speech in reply to the Address from the Throne. The vote was 281 to 250.

MINISTER DEFEATED

Taschereau Suffers Reverse in Quebec Provincial By-Election

HUNTINGDON, Nov. 5.—Hon. Gordon Scott, newly appointed provincial treasurer for Quebec in the Taschereau government, was defeated in yesterday's by-election in Huntingdon County by Martin Fisher, Conservative, by a majority of 125.

In the by-election in Maskinonge County, L. J. Thisdel, Liberal, defeated Armand Lamy, Conservative, with a majority of four hundred.

In Two Mountains, Paul Sauve, Conservative, was elected over a Liberal opponent.

SEARCHING FOR FLYER

Pat Renahan and Two Companions Have Now Been Missing For More Than a Week

Ancel Eckmann, senior pilot of the Alaska-Washington Airways, was standing by at Seattle at the first of this week awaiting suitable weather before taking off for the north to make a search of Lowe Inlet, Ogden Channel and other waters north of Butedale for Robin Renahan, another of the company's pilots, who has been missing on the coast for over a week now. Renahan was flying north to Atlin to take part in the search for Capt. E. J. A. Burke. It is possible that Eckmann may already be in this district conducting his search for Renahan.

The last that was heard of Renahan was when he took off from Butedale at 5:20 last Tuesday evening for Prince Rupert, intending to reach here before dark that evening. He felt that he could do the 100 miles or so within three-quarters of an hour. Renahan and his two companions, Frank Hatcher, mechanic, and Sam Clerf, prospector, landed at Butedale at 5 o'clock on Tuesday evening. They had left Vancouver at 12:15 noon on Tuesday and were thus well on schedule when they reached Butedale.

The visibility was poor at the time Renahan left Butedale and there was a strong southeast wind blowing. Darkness set in at 6:15, so that Renahan had a narrow margin in his attempt to reach Prince Rupert before nightfall.

Under these circumstances fears for Renahan's safety have increased and the Seattle relief plane was to make all possible speed towards the northern waters where he may have experienced trouble.

The weather along the northern coast has been favorable during the past two days and it is thought that if Renahan were delayed by fog in some isolated bay he would have had one or two chances to get off.

It is feared that in making a landing at dusk on Tuesday Renahan's plane was damaged and he has been unable to proceed. Otherwise, it is said, he would have reached some cannery or village from which word could be flashed to Vancouver.

Robin Renahan, Missing Pilot, Believed to Have Come Down On Coast Just South of This Port

The mystery as to the whereabouts of Robin Renahan, Alaska-Washington Airways pilot, who has been missing since last Tuesday, narrowed down today to the fifty or so mile distance between Prince Rupert and Lowe Inlet. The provincial police received word this morning that at 6 p.m. last Tuesday, Eddie Clifton, Hartley Bay native, who was coming up the coast in his fishing boat, saw an airplane heading up Grenville Channel several miles below Lowe Inlet. The plane was barely fifty feet above the water and was travelling very fast. It was raining, almost dark and visibility was poor. This, as far as can be learned, was the last to be seen of Renahan who left Butedale at 5:20 last Tuesday evening bound for Prince Rupert en route to Atlin to join the search for Captain E. J. A. Burke, missing commercial aviator. It is believed that the plane became disabled between here and there. There is a possibility that he might have crashed in the dark. Arrangements were being made today to make an intensive search for Renahan. The provincial police boat and a fisheries protection cruiser are already searching. All coastal steamers have been advised to keep on the look-out.

Meanwhile, word has been received through the marine department that the tug Cape Scott sighted a plane travelling north at an elevation of about two hundred feet three miles south of Cone Island at 2 o'clock last Tuesday afternoon. The weather was calm and misty. There are several Cone Islands on the coast and it is uncertain just what one was meant in the message from the Cape Scott.

The lighthouse tender Estevan, ordered to make enquiries for Renahan at lighthouses, reports having visited Adenbrooke and Egg Island lights. There was no sign of Renahan at either point.

Democrats Elect More Members Both to House And Senate in Contest

Franklin Roosevelt Re-elected Governor of New York With Largest Plurality Ever Given By That State to an Executive

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Wets and dries divided up about equally Senate seats in yesterday's election where prohibition was an issue while anti-Prohibitionists cut into the preponderantly dry majority in the House of Representatives. Three states which held wet referenda, Illinois, Rhode Island and Massachusetts, went overwhelmingly for repeal of the Volstead Act. In Illinois the anti-Prohibitionists elected James Hamilton Lewis against the "personally dry" Ruth Hanna McCormick. Among the Prohibitionist supporters elected was Senator Borah of Idaho. Gifford Pinchot, Republican dry, won the governorship of Pennsylvania.

James Rolph jr., Republican, was elected governor of California. James Rolph jr., mayor of San Francisco, Republican, was elected governor of California. Upton Sinclair being one of the defeated candidates.

C. Ben Ross, Democrat, was elected governor of Idaho. Republicans and Democrats were battling for control of Congress today as returns from yesterday's election came in. About 35 out of 35 contests for the Senate, Republicans had elected 13, Democrats, 20 with two doubtful.

In the House, out of 435 seats contested, Republicans elected 176, Democrats, 187, with 72 doubtful. Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democrat, was re-elected governor of New York yesterday by the largest plurality the state ever gave its executive—some three-quarters of a million votes. He carried the entire state Democratic ticket with him.

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GREAT NEED OF LIBRARY BUILDING

The need of a new building and the excellent work being done at the present library were subjects of remark from Herbert Killam, superintendent under the public Libraries Act, who was in the city not long ago. A letter to the Board read at last night's meeting sets this forth as follows:

"During a trip through the northern part of the province I visited your library on September 2. You may be interested to hear the opinions of an outside librarian. "Miss Cruikshank impressed me very favorably. She seems intensely interested in her public as human beings, not only as persons borrowing reading matter from library shelves. She tries to find out their desires and needs and does her utmost to help them. Such technical matters as catalogue and circulation records are in first-class condition. The collection of books is a good one, and the selection of new titles shows careful consideration.

"Your Board has doubtless realized how inadequate your library building is for carrying on library work. It is crowded and any extension in the present building seems almost impossible. No doubt financial conditions forbid any appeal to the public at the present time for funds for the erection of a new building, but I sincerely hope that the time may not be far distant when your Board will have the satisfaction of directing the activities of a library which can be all that the public requires of it."

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DIVISION IS CUT UP

Former "D" Division of Police Split In Two—Inspectors Spiller and Macdonald in Charge

In order that the large area may be more conveniently and efficiently handled, "D" Division of the provincial police, which up to now has included the whole of Northern British Columbia, is being divided into two divisions, it is announced. The split will be practically north and south, down the centre of the former district and the dead line will probably cross the railway somewhere around Smithers, the boundary having not, as yet, been definitely set out. The eastern section will be the new division and will be known as "F" Division.

"F" Division headquarters will be at Prince George and the division will include the Peace River country, Fort George electoral district and portions of Omineca, Cariboo and Salmon Arm electoral districts. Inspector William Spiller, formerly stationed here and at present taking a leave of absence in the south, will soon assume command of "F" Division.

"D" Division, of which Inspector John Macdonald will be in charge, will include the rest of the present "D" Division and will take in all the coast north of Rivers Inlet and extending into the interior. Headquarters will be in Prince Rupert.

MALKINTO RUN AGAIN

VANCOUVER, Nov. 5.—Mayor W. H. Malkin announced today that he would again offer himself for mayor at the municipal election next month. L. D. Taylor has already announced his intention of running.

NEW BOOK BY A BOY

"A Boy of the Great North West," just published by the Graphic Publishers Ltd., of Ottawa is written by a lad, Robert Watson, whose father also is a writer of some note.

The book contains an account of a number of interesting events or descriptions of interesting things incident to a number of years of travel through the western country. The publishers speak of the book as "The rousing experiences of a young Canadian among cowboys, hunters, trappers, fur traders, fishermen and Indians."

Some of the experiences took place in the Prince Rupert district and for that reason are particularly interesting. The illustrations are from photograph and there is a bird's-eye picture of Prince Rupert and a number of totems including those at Kitwanga and Alert Bay.

Speaking of Prince Rupert, the author says: "Prince Rupert is about 22 years of age and it has made great progress in that time. The city seems to be cut out of the face of the mountain, just as Seattle was, and no matter where you go you face the beautiful sea."

While possibly in its boyish way the book is a little sketchy, it will prove very interesting, especially to boys who wish to know about the outdoor life as told by one who has lived it and appreciated it and who has the ability to convey his impressions in simple language to his readers.

Borrowings At Library

Total Number Taken Out During October Was 5,304 Volumes

The report of the librarian submitted to the public library board at its meeting last night showed that the total books circulated during the month was 5,304 or an average of 241 per day. This was made up of 3370 volumes of fiction, 155 duplicate pay, 552 of non-fiction and 1227 juvenile.

**PSYCHOLOGY
IS SUBJECT**

Addresses By Miss Halliwell and Mr. O'Neill At Teacher's Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Teachers' Association was held last evening in the Borden Street School with 23 teachers present. J. S. Wilson presided. Interesting papers were given on two aspects of psychology by Miss Halliwell and Mrs. O'Neill. Miss Halliwell took for her subject "The Problem of the Sub-normal Child." This is a problem common to teachers of all grades in elementary and even in high schools. The sub-normal child has a good memory for certain facts and the teacher in the elementary grades makes the associations necessary. The child cannot, however, make indirect associations. Where a child over nine years of age has a mental age three years less than his chronological age he is considered sub-normal. The presence of sub-normal children in a class makes it necessary to give special attention to them and also prevents the teaching being satisfactory to the normal children.

Miss Halliwell was able to give interesting accounts of her work in a special school situated in the slumland of London and told of the marvellous results obtained by one of the expert psychologists there. It was their object to train these potential criminals so as to prevent rather than to punish them for crimes. Out of over two hundred of the worst cases only two were returned to the institution for petty misdemeanors.

In concluding, Miss Halliwell expressed her opinion that when the new school will be built in Prince Rupert, which building is becoming a more pressing necessity every year, a special room should be set aside for the sub-normal children of the city.

Mr. O'Neill spoke of "Personality" as the sum total of all that goes to make up the person's character. He traced its development from the elementary sensations, external, organic and motor. Many reflexes were native to all and were present in the newly born baby. Personality was the result of environment forces working on inherited mechanism. He also pointed out how temperament depended largely on glandular emotion though the old-fashioned idea of assigning the causes of various temperamental displays to various organic bodies was quite different from the modern explanations. That man never outgrows instincts was a recognized truth no matter how highly he may develop mentally.

Grave Danger

There was grave danger of over-estimating the importance of intelligence in children and grown-ups. This was a false standard of life and various character tests were now available to grade the character of the individual. Mr. O'Neill took some time to explain the nature of several of these tests their object, how marked and graded.

On the conclusion of the papers and after some discussion a hearty vote of thanks was accorded the speakers of the evening on the motion of Fordyce Clarke seconded by Miss Rivett.

Refreshments were then served by a committee under Miss Mills. During this period the presentation of a pipe was made to Mr. O'Neill in recognition of his faithful and efficient services as secretary-treasurer during the past four years. In making the presentation Miss Mercer emphasized the value of Mr. O'Neill's work in the association and the appreciation that all members felt. Mr. O'Neill who was completely taken by surprise suitably acknowledged the gift though he thought that to deserve such a gift, he should have to serve ten years.

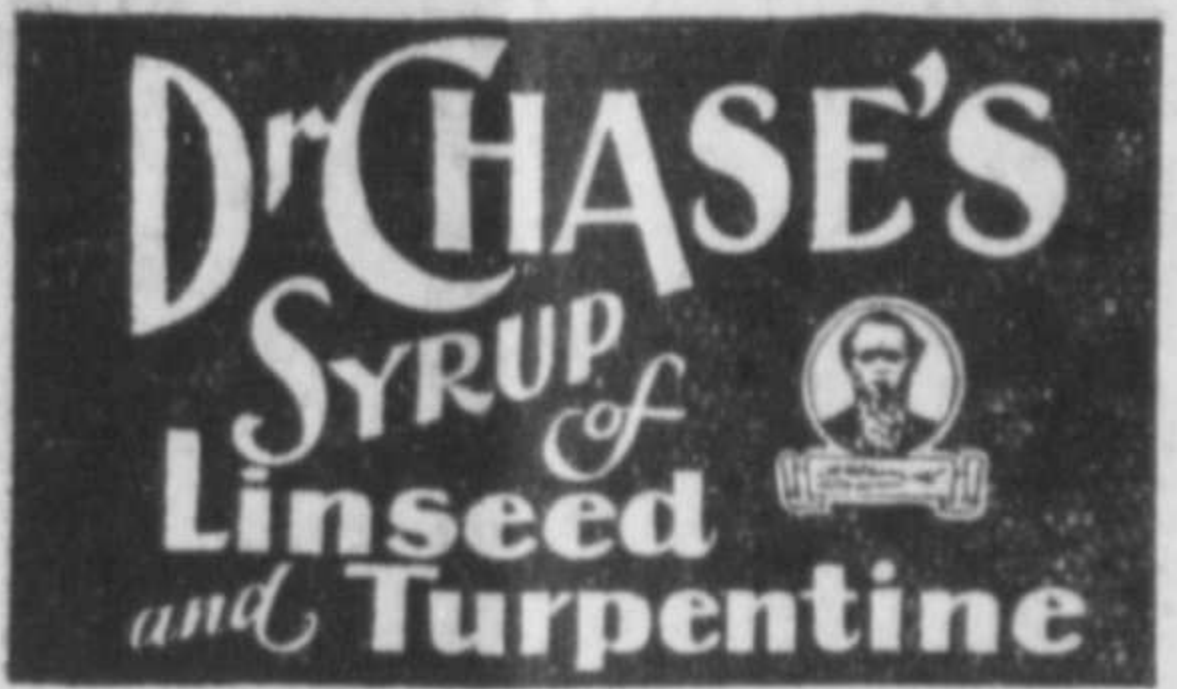

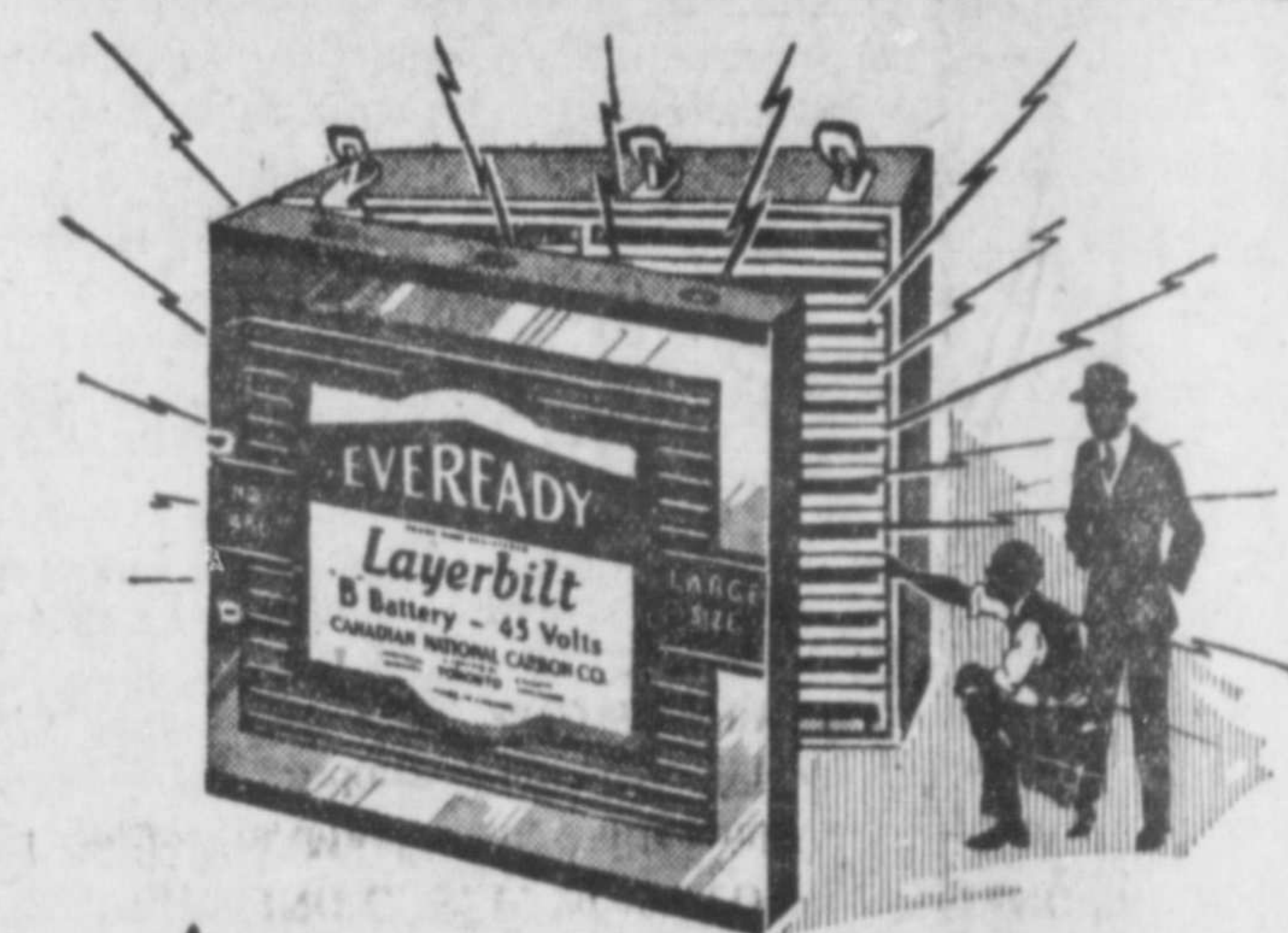
