# QUARTER MILLION FOR HOTEL HERE

## Canadian National Railways Estimates in House Include an Item For Local Tourist Hostelry

Will Provide For Start Being Made on Construction This Year—Further Votes to Be Made For Completion of Building

OTTAWA, May 15.—Among the estimates of expenditures of the Canadian National Railways submitted by the railway committee to the House of Commons yesterday was an item of \$250,000 for the construction of a tourist hotel at Prince Rupert.

This item, it is understood, will permit of construction of the hotel being started this year. Further funds will be voted later for its completion. It is understood that the hotel completed will cost at least \$500,000.

Estimates of the Canadian National Railways adopted by the parliamentary committee on railways and shipping adopted yesterday totalled \$51,000,000.

## BALDWIN FAVORS FREE TRADE

Member of Famous Musical Family

## Former Premier Favors Lower Tariffs But Not World Dumping Ground

Conservative Chief Addresses Second of "Home and Empire" Campaign Meetings in Sheffield.

READING, Eng., May 15.—Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Conservative leader and former premier of Great Britain, is all for lower tariffs throughout the world. "I am all for lower tariffs," he said when addressing the second of his "Home and Empire" campaign meetings here last night, "but," he lifted a warning finger, "we will never get lower tariffs or universal free trade while we preserve this country as a dumping ground for the products of the whole world."

## REPORT ON PENSIONS

Facilitation of Applications and Open Tribunal Recommended By Committee

OTTAWA, May 15.—Provision of machinery whereby every applicant for a pension will be afforded full opportunity to be heard and the establishment of tribunals to hear representations in open court are the main recommendations of a special parliamentary committee on returned soldiers' problems which made its reports to the House of Commons last night.

## SUSPEND OFFICER

Rev. George Ireland of Relief Department Admits He Was Paid Commission By Cafe Proprietor

VANCOUVER, May 15.—Rev. George D. Ireland, city relief officer, was suspended from office last night by the select committee of the city council investigating civic relief disbursements after he had admitted on the witness stand that a statement by G. S. Wrinkle, proprietor of the Log Cabin Cafe, that he had been compelled to pay five per cent on relief meal tickets in order to get the business was true.

Wrinkle gave evidence at the civic probe yesterday afternoon to the effect that for the past four years he had personally paid Ireland a commission of five per cent on all meal tickets issued to his cafe. He said that, prior to four years ago, he had been unable to get any business from the city relief department. Then he entered into the agreement with Ireland whereby he paid the five per cent.

According to figures presented by Wrinkle his business during the past four years was approximately \$40,000.

Clifton Maxwell, suspended clerk in the relief department, confessed at the probe to redeeming the relief office meal tickets to the amount of \$100 weekly for his personal use.

## DRAIN WAS DISCUSSED

School Board Thinks City Responsible and Medical Health Officer Disagrees

Surface water and drain conditions on the King Edward High School grounds came in for more discussion at last night's meeting of the school board.

A letter from Dr. J. P. Cade, medical health officer, stated that the trouble was due to the fact that the present drain was not large enough to carry off the surface water. It was his opinion that the grading of Seventh Avenue had not caused the trouble in which case it was up to the school board and not to the city to provide a drain of sufficient size to carry off the water.

Trustee Waugh contended that it was up to the city since it was an overflow from a city drain.

Trustee McAfee suggested that the opinion of the city solicitor be secured. A menace to health existed that he was surprised the authorities permitted to continue.

Trustee Thompson pointed out that the city engineer had the equipment with which to do the work more cheaply than could the school board. Since the taxpayers had to pay for the work anyway, he did not see why the city could not do it.

The matter will be taken up further with the city engineer to whom it will be pointed out that a menace to health exists which the city is in a position to rectify more cheaply than is the board.

## DELAY TILL NEXT YEAR

OTTAWA, May 15.—It is not the intention of the government to proceed with the financial reconstruction of the Canadian National Railways this year, Hon. T. A. Crerar, minister of railways, told the parliamentary committee examining estimates of the C. N. R. yesterday.

## PILLAGE BY REDS

Two Hundred Persons Killed and Much Damage Done in Chinese Siege

HANKOW, May 15.—Two hundred persons are reported killed and six hundred thousand dollars worth of property looted by Reds attacking Simakow, 40 miles from Hankow.

It is also reported that the town of Hanchwan, across the river from Simakow, is surrounded by three hundred thousand attackers equipped with machine guns.

Mother of Mrs. Joseph Greer Dies Suddenly in Toronto

Mrs. Joseph Greer received the shocking news last night by wire of the death yesterday afternoon at her home in Toronto after a brief illness of her mother, Mrs. Letitia Barr, who was very well known in Prince Rupert, and who left here only about a month ago after having spent a year and a half here.

After leaving here, the late Mrs. Barr spent a few days in Winnipeg visiting with a son and, after arriving in Toronto, contracted a cold about a week ago which resulted in her demise.

The late Mrs. Barr was a native of Ontario and was 83 years of age. Predeceased by her husband some 20 years ago, she leaves to mourn her loss three daughters and five sons. The funeral will take place in Toronto.

Merely routine business was taken up last night at meeting of the local Moose Lodge. D. C. Schubert, dictator, presided.

School board expenses for the month of April totalling \$10,307.01 were passed for payment at last night's meeting. The total was made up of \$3,189 in accounts and \$7,117.50 in salaries.

Rev. Olof Fosso, of Ketchikan, was a passenger aboard the Princess Louise yesterday afternoon going south enroute to Minneapolis, where he will attend a Lutheran Church convention.

Caroline Cravetto has been granted absolute decree of divorce by Mr. Justice D. A. MacDonald in Supreme Court at Vancouver from Peter Cravetto, shipwright and carpenter of Prince Rupert, whom she married at Seattle on July 1, 1912.

Constable C. W. Birrell, late of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police at Vanderhoof and now identified with the Provincial force, arrived in the city on the ss. Prince George yesterday from Vancouver and in a week or so will leave for Massett where he will be stationed.

F. Feero has arrived here from Skagway to take the place of M. L. Stepp, transferred to Ketchikan, as United States customs officer at this port. Mr. Feero, while a native of the United States, has lived almost all his life in Skagway. He will be joined later by Mrs. Feero.

Appreciative remarks were made at last night's school board meeting of the work of Reg Clark, janitor of Borden Street School, in repairing windows and painting desks of that school during Easter holidays and of W. H. Derry, Booth School janitor, in repairing blinds at that school.

The school board decided last night to write a letter to A. J. Prudhomme thanking him for an inspection he had made and advice he had offered in connection with the repairing of the foundations of King Edward High School. Twenty years ago Mr. Prudhomme built King Edward High School.

It was reported at last night's meeting of the school board that a Vancouver firm had supplied "Highroads of History" books No. 5, instead of 5A, which had been ordered. However, there was also a shortage of the No. 5 books which could be used by the schools instead of shipping them back. The board decided to let the matter stand over until further word was heard from the vending company.

Trustee W. R. McAfee reported at last night's school board meeting that the High School had had the opportunity recently of obtaining a fine collection of pressed flowers from the interior but it had not been taken advantage of since there were so few pupils taking botany in High School and there was no place to store the collection anyway. Neither had the museum board been able to handle the exhibit so it had been sent back to Smithers.

## Axel Norberg of Oona River Dead

Had Been Ill For Several Months; Leaves Widow and Four Children

After an illness of several months, Axel Norberg of Oona River died this morning about 11 o'clock in the Prince Rupert General Hospital. He was a Scandinavian, 61 years of age and followed the occupation of a fisherman. He is survived by a widow and four children.

## OPPOSED TO EXCHANGES

Prince Rupert Too Small to Trade Teachers, Is Opinion of Board

The local school board, at its meeting last night, expressed disfavor for the proposal of exchanging teachers such as is done in larger cities such as Vancouver. The matter was brought up by Miss S. A. Mills, principal of Borden Street School, who stated that some of her teachers had asked that she bring it before the board for an expression of opinion.  
The scheme worked out better, Mr. Barrie said, in the large cities where, should an exchange teacher not fit in one place, she might be switched around to a place for which she was more suited. The systems in the Old Country and in Australia were much different to that of Canada.

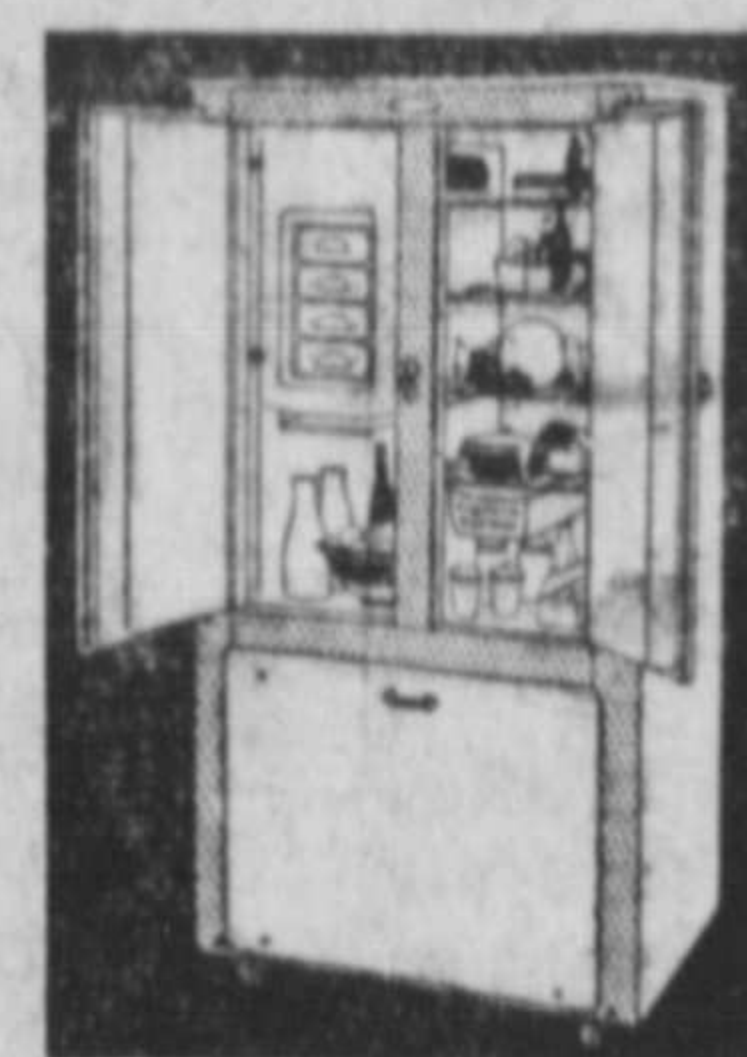
Mr. Waugh was not in favor of the idea. It meant that if an exchange teacher were not satisfac-

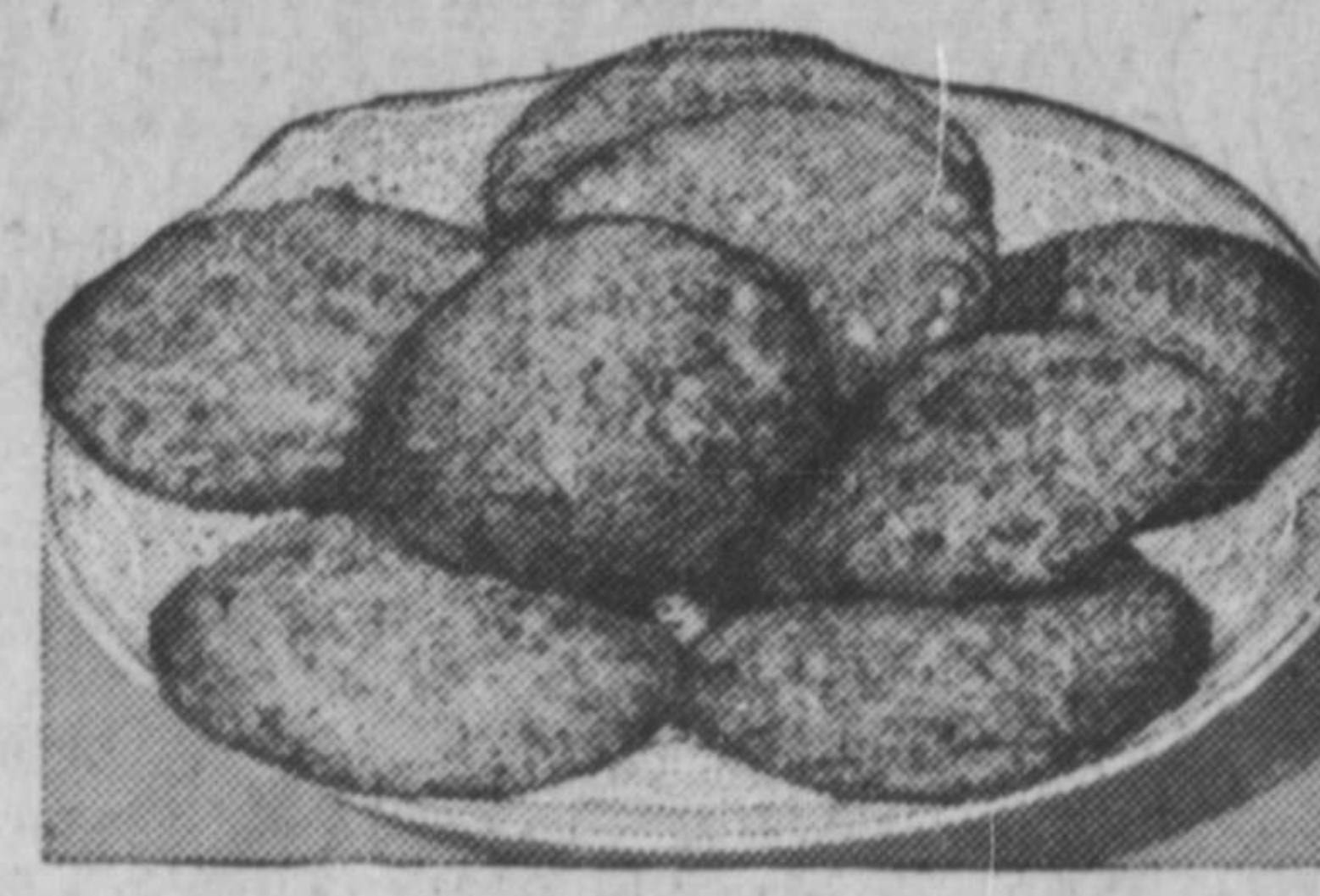

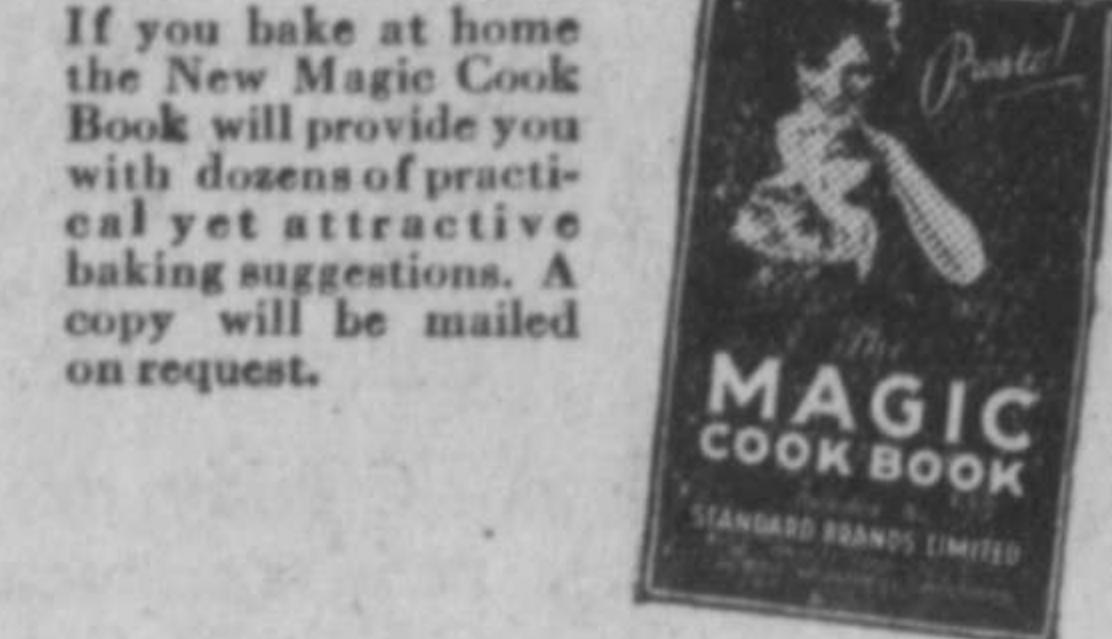

New Readers Necessary Following Revised Requirements of Department of Education

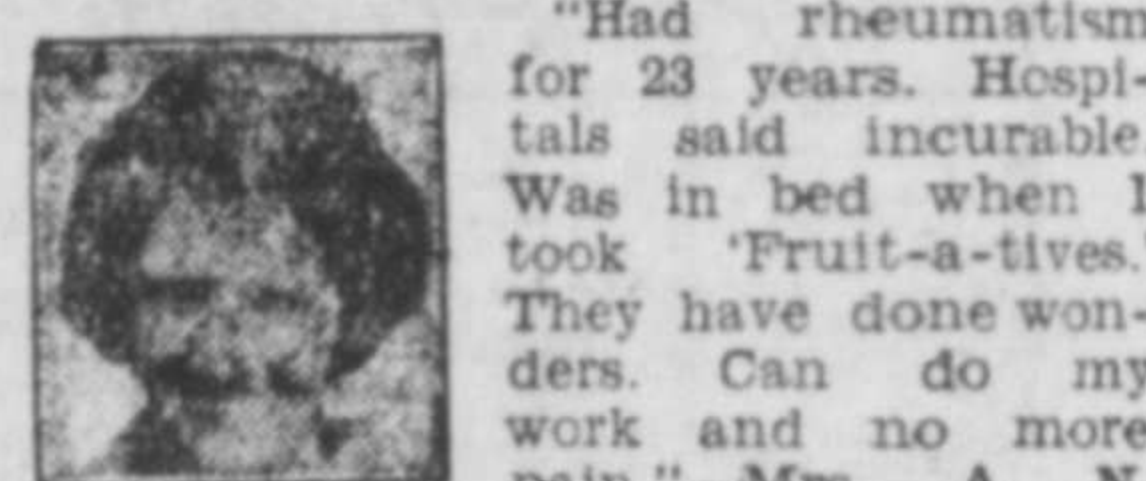

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**CHOCOLATE FUDGE CAKE**

4 squares unsweetened chocolate.  
3 tablespoons sugar.  
3 tablespoons boiling water.  
1-2 cup butter.  
1-4 cups of sugar.  
2 eggs yokes well beaten.  
1-2 cup Borden's St. Charles Milk.  
1-4 cups flour.  
2 teaspoons baking powder.  
1 teaspoon vanilla.  
3 egg whites, stiffly beaten.

Shave or break the chocolate in small pieces, add three tablespoons sugar and the boiling water, and melt over hot water. Cream the butter, add sugar gradually, beating well after each addition. Add the egg yolks, continue beating. Stir in the chocolate. Add flour mixed and sifted with baking powder, alternately with milk. Beat vigorously, flavor and fold in the egg whites. Bake in two layers in moderate oven. Fill and cover the top with the following:

**THE FILLING**

4 squares unsweetened chocolate.  
1 cup brown sugar.  
1 cup granulated sugar.  
1-4 cup Borden's St. Charles Milk.  
1 tablespoon butter.  
1 teaspoon vanilla.  
1 cup nuts, chopped or broken in pieces.

Shave or break the chocolate in small pieces and cook with sugar and milk until it forms a soft ball when tested in cold water. Remove from stove, add butter, but do not stir it in. Cool slightly, beat until creamy. Add vanilla and nuts, spread between layers, and cover top of cake.
