Destroyer Saguenay Launched Today at Southampton Skeena to Follow

SOUTHAMPTON, July 11:-The Canadian destroyer Saguenay was launched from the Thornycroft Yards today. Madame Desbarats, wife of C. J. Desbarats, Canadian deputy minister of National Defence, performed the christening ceremony.

A sister vessel, the Skeena, will be launched in September. The vessels will each be of 1330 tons displacement with length of 310 feet and speed of 35 knots. They are specially designed for use in Canadian waters.

Brady's Blather

Canada's agricultural industry under the last ten years of Liberal rule has prospered as it never prospered before. This fact is admitted by the banks and by all the leading Canadian financiers and economists. The agricultural wealth of Canada in the year 1928 amounted to over \$800 per head of her population, an increase of \$60 per head over the year 1923. During the last seven years of Liberal rule a total of 9,000,000 additional acres of land were brought under cultivation in Canada. The Official Blue Book reports show us that the value of their products to Canadian farmers of all classes in 1923 was \$1,397,085,000 and in 1928 this had advanced to \$1,755,524,000 or an advance of \$358,-439,000.

In the face of these facts—the elementary knowledge of every public man in Canada-Mr. Brady in solemn tones tells the people of Prince Rupert that Canada's agricultural industry has been "annihilated and her fields lie d-e-s-o-l-a-t-e."

It is difficult to deal in kindly and restrained language with a man whose tongue is unbridled and whose every utterance on a public matter an extravagance.

His apologists say, "Oh, that's only Brady's blather"-but that answer is not good enough.

We have no objection to Mr. Brady's attempt to win votes by flattering men and women; by his telling them of the beauty of their daughters and the wonderful intellects of their sons. If he can cajole people by his blarney into voting for him, that is perfectly legitimate and we wish him good luck with the Brady method, but when it comes to instilling the poison of a deliberate untruth into the minds of some perhaps who are not so well informed upon public issues as they should

be, then the time has come to call a spade, a spade. The question of who shall be Skeena's next representative in Parliament is fraught with too far reaching results to those pioneers of the north who have waited all these years for the opportunity we now see in the Peace Outlet, for us to allow any public man to "get away" with deliberate deception. Mr. Brady knows just as well as we know that Canada's agricultural industry is not annihilated and that her fields are not desolate. He should know that Mackenzie King cannot be beaten by such methods.

No! Blather is not good enough. It is ridiculed at Ottawa, and it would be far better for Skeena to have as a representative a business man of few words but whose word is his bond.

THE RIGHT SPIRIT

"We like your wonderful hospitality and your wonderful esprit de corps. With such men as I have met in the city the place, it seems to me is bound to go ahead." Those were the words of one of the higher officers from the U. S. flotilla of destroyers that spent a couple of days in the city. This particular man said he had met a great many people here and they all seemed to be of one mind, that of showing them hospitality and of telling about the splendid prospects of Prince Rupert. He said he agreed with them that the city had a great future. Everyone must acknowledge that, but the keenness and eagerness of the pople was another thing and it was bound to have a good effect.

These are not the first visitors who have spoken in this way. This particular visitor was informed of the little political conflict going on in the city and throughout the country and of the keenness with which some of the citizens were taking part in it, and this too was commended by the visitors. "The man who will fight hard for his party will also fight hard for his city or his country," was the ready comment, and that too is probably true. As long as the contest is carried on in a sporting manner without bitterness it is a good spirit and develops citizenship just as much as does a good game of baseball between rival teams.

AUSTRALIA'S PLIGHT

Australia is levying higher duties against the world and the people of that country have to pay the bill. There is a mistaken notion that duties levied against a foreign country are paid by that country. Such is not the case. Most of these "protective duties" are paid by the working people of the country.

When Mr. Bennett urges protection for Canadian industries he is really advocating that the people who eat and drink and wear clothes and use cars shall pay higher taxes in order that those who make those articles in Canada may benefit. The foreigner does not pay the bill. The home people do that.

With most forms of taxes those who can afford it best are the ones who pay, but with customs tariffs the consumers pay and the consumers are chiefly the working people of the country, the men and women who eat and drink and wear clothes and also those who ride in cars, who use tools or who buy any of the ordinary necessities of civilized life.

The high tariff advocate would transfer the taxes of the country from the backs of the wealthy to those who find it difficult already to pay their way and live decently.




A 32-passenger Fokker in mid-flight over the Mojave desert in California, where peculiar meterological conditions provide an ever changing series of cloud formations.


St. Peter's Sunday School Had Happy Outing Yesterday


