Sir William Hearst Hands in Resignation as Premier

New Head of Ontario Government will be called on by Lieut. Governor at once and Cabinet Announced soon; Labor to be Represented.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
TORONTO, October 31.—Sir William Hearst placed his resignation in the hands of the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario today as well as those of all the members of his cabinet. The Governor will at once call on E. C. Drury to form a government and the personnel of the new cabinet should be announced early in the week. It will contain the name of at least one labor member of the new legislature, the others being farmers. It is possible, too, that the Liberals may be represented, although it is not thought likely. Just what attitude the Liberals will take in regard to the administration is a matter of speculation. They stand for much the same policy as the farmers.

TERMINALS AT THIS PORT TO BE IMPROVED

Vice-President and General Manager W. P. Hinton Discusses the Important Matter.

"We could not possibly go through another season without increased terminal facilities at this port," said W. P. Hinton, vice-president and general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway to the Daily News yesterday. "We are perfecting the plans for the dock which is to be built here and just as soon as they are ready the contract will be let." Mr. Hinton said that engineering difficulties had to be overcome. It was necessary to take soundings carefully and have the plans such that the dock would be a permanent structure. He did not anticipate any delay, however. This would be the forerunner of other improvements at this port. Preparations were being made for the new station here but the yards had to be developed and some old buildings torn down before the work could begin. The new station would be built at the platform where the train now stops. Mr. Hinton said he did not anticipate any great delay in this matter. The increase in business here made it absolutely necessary to make immediate improvements.

NEW FORESTER IS APPOINTED

E. C. Manning, an Experienced Man From Victoria, Takes Position Vacated by R. E. Allen.

E. C. Manning, of Victoria, has been appointed district forester in place of R. E. Allen, who recently notified the Government that he was about to retire in order to go into business. Mr. Manning has had a good deal of experience in the forestry business. He was in the Dominion Government and C. P. R. service before joining the provincial department. He will have charge of the Prince Rupert district, which extends from Rivers Inlet in the south to Alaska in the north and east as far as Endako. The chief work of the district forester is to look after timber sales and the collection of royalties and stumpage. As there is a great deal of activity in the lumber industry just now, the forester is kept very busy. The new forester was in the city yesterday and he has returned to Victoria to fetch his wife and family here. Mr. Allen will remain in charge until he returns. VICTORY LOAN GOING STRONG

Large Sum Subscribed, Mostly From Province of Ontario.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
TORONTO, Oct. 30.—Subscriptions to the Victory Loan amount to \$81,344,100 as follows: Ontario, \$52,009,300; Quebec, \$25,367,100; New Brunswick, \$534,530; Nova Scotia, \$522,600; Prince Edward Island, \$25,400; Manitoba, \$920,150; Saskatchewan, \$1,041,800; Alberta, \$391,300; British Columbia, \$561,350. The figures represent three days' returns from Ontario, two days from Quebec, and one day's figures from the remaining provinces.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 30.—Revised figures show that in the first two days Victory Loan campaign Vancouver subscribed \$548,600. The municipal corporation of Vancouver may subscribe \$2,500,000. Vancouver branch of the G. W. V. A. will invest \$10,000.

BULKLEY VALLEY BEEF COMING HERE

Arrangements Made by P. Burns & Co. for Regular Shipments to City.

There are about five hundred head of fat stock to be killed in the Bulkley Valley and shipped to this city for the use of the local people, according to information just received here. The first car load of dressed beef is due to arrive here tomorrow and other shipments will follow in due course. P. Burns & Co. have made arrangements for regular shipments with the double purpose of aiding the Bulkley farmers and of giving Prince Rupert people the local beef.

BOLSHEVIK' MENACE LINES OF GATCHINA

General Yudenitch Compelled to Evacuate Position.

LONDON, Oct. 31.—A wireless despatch received here from Moscow reports that General Yudenitch has been compelled to evacuate Gatchina, owing to the fact that the Bolsheviks are menacing the lines of communication.

LADY RHONDDA TO SIT IN HOUSE OF LORDS

Lady Rhondda who recently visited Prince Rupert is one of the ladies who will get a seat in the British House of Lords under the Sex Qualification Bill. She is one of the ladies too who will take advantage of the privilege. LARGE BOATS IN WITH FISH

Prices Have Taken a Drop, the Highest Today Being Sixteen and a Half Cents.

Several large boats were at the fish wharves this morning. They all had very good catches, but the price has dropped and first class fish was selling at 16½ cents as high figure this morning. Seconds were selling for 8½ cents. A number of the boats which were out in Hecate Straits coming in reported experiencing the gale of last night and to quote them the "boats were on their heels." But they all philosophically state that that's part of the game and that they plough through them all. Following are the catches and prices for today:

EXPLOSION ON JAPANESE SHIP

Fourteen Men Were Killed and Thirty Injured in Tokio Bay.

TOKIO, Oct. 31.—The manoeuvres of the Japanese fleet in which the whole empire participated, were marred by an explosion yesterday on the battleship Hyuga in Tokio Bay. Fourteen men were killed and thirty injured.

HOWLING WINDSTORM DID LITTLE DAMAGE

Building in Course of Erection Went Down Before Gale.

Yesterday afternoon's howling windstorm reminded old-timers of the city of the days back in 1910, '11 and '12, when there were many buildings bowled over. Yesterday's gale was certainly what the old mariner would call a "roaring snorter." The harbor presented a picturesque scene. Mrs. Hilditch had the misfortune to have one of her plate glass windows blown in and a small garage near the junction of Third and Second Avenues was keeled over. A house under construction in Section 2 went down and still another was damaged by the electric wires breaking and arcing on the newly built structure. The arcing of the wires on the building produced quite a fireworks display and a rush call was sent for the city trouble man to put the wires in safe shape.

ARE NOT EXTRAVAGANT SAYS HOUSE OF LORDS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, Oct. 30.—By a vote of 52 to 13 the House of Lords rejected a motion expressing the opinion that the Government had been guilty of extravagance. Lord Beaverbrook declaring that inflation was the real cause of the financial troubles.

NO DANGER OF COAL SHORTAGE

Good Supply on Hand and Telkwa Can Increase Output Very Largely.

In view of the United States coal strike which is expected to commence tonight, inquiry has been made in regard to the local situation. It is found that Albert & McCaffery has a cargo of 70 tons just in and 400 tons more on the road, as well as promise of delivery of other cargoes to follow.

The Prince Rupert Coal Co. is expecting delivery of a quantity of Vancouver Island coal within a few days and as they have a contract for regular delivery they do not expect to be cut off.

The Terminal Coal Co. report that car load lots of the Telkwa coal are just beginning to arrive and if there is a shortage the Telkwa mine can supply the demands of the whole city. The mine is so far developed that a number of men can be employed and there is snow on the road connecting the mine with the station so that the five teams employed there are able to achieve results.

It is difficult to get eastern coal and it is possible that the supply may be cut off if the coal is needed in the eastern states, but there is no danger of a local shortage.

MCGEER SPEAKS AT THEATRES

Addresses Audience on Merits of Victory Loan—C.P.R. Takes Twenty Millions.

At the local theatres last night G. G. McGeer, member for Richmond in the provincial legislature, spoke for a few minutes on the Victory Loan. He told of the necessity to raise more money to carry over and keep the wheels of industry moving until such time as conditions had become normal once more. He also emphasized the fact that Prince Rupert could not expect to receive more contracts for shipbuilding unless she was prepared to support the loan and invest money with the Government that places the orders. The committees have all been arranged for the canvass, which commences Monday.

It is announced that the C. P. R. is subscribing for \$20,000,000 in bonds which is an increase of \$3,000,000 over the amount the company took last year. Employees of the company will subscribe individually in addition to this. The general opinion around town seems to be that Prince Rupert should take bonds up to at least \$200,000.

STRIKE TIES UP STEAMSHIPS

Six Hundred and twenty-five Vessels in all are Idle at New York.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—As an effect of the longshoremen's strike 625 vessels, of which 540 are steamers, are tied up at piers in Manhattan, Brooklyn, Staten Island, or are at anchor in the harbor. The daily cost of the tieup is estimated at more than \$1,500,000 aside from the expense of maintenance.

BUILDING PERMITS

Peter Black has taken out a building permit for repairs and alterations to his hotel. These repairs will amount to \$1,500 and will be made by Delgarno & Watts. A. Holmberg is to put up a one-storey frame dwelling on Atlin Avenue in Section 2. It is to cost \$2,100 and will also be built by Delgarno & Watts.

Another Drug Fiend Is Sent to Okalla

Magistrate McMordie gives Kam Sing Six Months at Prison Farm so that he might do some honest work; Other Cases.

A six months sentence was imposed by Magistrate McMordie on a violator of the Drug Laws. This time an old offender, Kam Sing, got the axe and didn't seem to be any more pleased than the chicken could have been either. L. W. Patmore appeared for him but the only plea he could make for him was that he was a hopeless drug fiend and that leniency might be shown. Magistrate McMordie thought that six months on the farm with medical attention and a little honest work would perhaps be good medicine for Kam Sing. He will, therefore, accompany his countryman, Young Auk, who drew six months yesterday for the same offence, having drugs in his possession.

Another one of the yellow race, by name Sam, appeared charged with having drugs in possession and was remanded till tomorrow. He had morphine and cocaine, it is alleged.

Mrs. Alice Walters, who had been remanded on the charge of having liquor in her possession other than on private premises, was dismissed with some good advice from the magistrate, who wasn't altogether satisfied with her conduct.

The case of Ada Douglas, who was charged with having stolen a \$900 ring from Jack Miller, was adjourned until Monday.

Wm. Brown and O. Donald, charged under the Indian Act with supplying extract to Indians were remanded. They now have a lawyer representing them.

TEAMSTERS TO MEET AND REVISE SCALE

Matter Reported at O. B. U. Meeting Last Night, Along With Other Business.

At the meeting of the Central Labor Council of the O. B. U. the action of the carpenters in presenting a demand for an increase in wages was formally endorsed.

The organization of a Fisheries Industrial Unit was reported to be well under way. The secretary-treasurer was granted \$20 per month for his spare time, to count from the formation of the Council.

The committee appointed to interview the local employing machinists in regard to the threat of the internationalists to "take steps" if the O. B. U. men in their employ were not fired was received. It was to the effect that the reception of the committee was uniformly favorable, and the employers without exception announced their intention to ignore the threat.

The statement made on the floor of the Trades and Labor Council at a previous meeting that O. B. U. machinists were working below scale was denied. The G. T. P. shops are working on schedule, and the contract shops are paying more than the international scale called for. Teamsters will hold a meeting on Sunday next to draft a new scale of wages and overtime.

The question of subscribing to the B. C. Federationist for every member paying dues to the Council was discussed, and finally laid over for a special meeting to be held on Thursday next.

The secretary-treasurer reported the receipts for the month to date as being over \$300, the largest since the formation of the Council, with an uninterrupted increase in the membership.

The executive committee was instructed to get the recruiting unit into organized shape as soon as possible, and until it had its delegates elected, Messrs. McLeman, Newman, Miller and Burrough were appointed to act as its representatives on the Council.

PRESIDENT OF WAR VETERANS TALKS POLITICS

States the Union Government for Treatment of Soldiers, and Other Bids.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
TORONTO, Oct. 31.—Colonel Hunter, president of the Parkdale branch of the G. W. V. A., in reference to a report of the parliamentary committee on soldiers' re-establishment, said that the proposition, if correctly stated, will faithfully represent the anxiety of Ottawa to alienate another group of the public, the returned soldiers who are bearing patiently with their infirmities. Having irritated labor, alienated more than half of the financial interests, and aroused the farmer to political manslaughter, the only thing necessary to make the job complete was to drive returned men into forming a political party of their own.

CANADA FILES FORMAL PROTEST

Claims She Should be Represented on Governing Body of Labor Office.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—Canada has filed a formal protest against the proposed composition of the governing body of the international labor office to be established under the League of Nations. The point at issue involves the right of Canada, by reason of her industrial importance, to name one of the members of the governing body rather than to take her chance of election as one of the nations of lesser importance from an industrial point of view.

TAKES NEW POSITION AT PRINCE GEORGE

Money We Subscribe Comes Back to Us.

Shortly before the Victory Loan campaign was started many of the eastern municipalities sold out their 1918 bonds at a premium and got ready to buy the new ones. As municipalities do not pay income tax it was no advantage holding bonds with that feature in them. This year's bonds were equally good.

It is possible that other municipalities in the west may do the same.

Prince Rupert should do everything possible for the loan as the city gets back many times the amount subscribed. Much of it is to be spent in shipbuilding in this city. We cannot expect the Government to order ships here unless we are prepared to do our part in putting up for the national expenses.

Are Deserting Sinking Ship.

The criticism of the Grand Trunk Pacific deal and of the prohibition measure by the Conservative caucus at Ottawa seems to indicate that since the total rout of the Unionist forces in the Ontario election the Conservatives are running for cover and are already taking independent action apart from the Unionist organization.

Electing Hon. Simon Tolmie in Victoria in the way in which they did was like damning with faint praise. Tolmie is the strongest candidate the Unionists could get. He is popular everywhere. His character and standing in the community are above reproach. He had no political sins to atone for. He appeals to both Conservatives and Liberals for he has never belonged to either party, so far as anyone knows, before the Union was formed, and yet in spite of this a candidate imported from New Westminster, a man who could not be elected in his home town, and polled over five thousand votes. It was really an overwhelming victory for the opposition.

The other by-elections did not turn out very well. Not a supporter was elected for the Government out of the four seats. Naturally there were signs of dissatisfaction among the chief backers of the Union Government. Unionism having failed they must turn to something that would make a stronger appeal to the people. Conservatism could not be worse and it might be better. They would turn to the old Conservatism and see how the people like it. Hence "a strong feeling" against the Government policy at the Conservative caucus.

Colonel McMordie at Board of Trade.

The speech of Lieut.-Col. McMordie at the Board of Trade luncheon Wednesday was one that caused a great deal of favorable comment from those who heard it. It shows that the Colonel had made a study of the social unrest and was prepared to advocate dealing with it in a somewhat radical manner. It set everyone thinking. While hardly anyone would agree with the suggestions in their entirety, the address showed an attempt to deal with a big question in a courageous manner. Too radical for some, the proposals are also too conservative for others. This was bound to be. The great thing about the address was that it provided food for thought. After the experience of Wednesday the Prince Rupert Board of Trade will be glad to hear from Col. McMordie at any time.

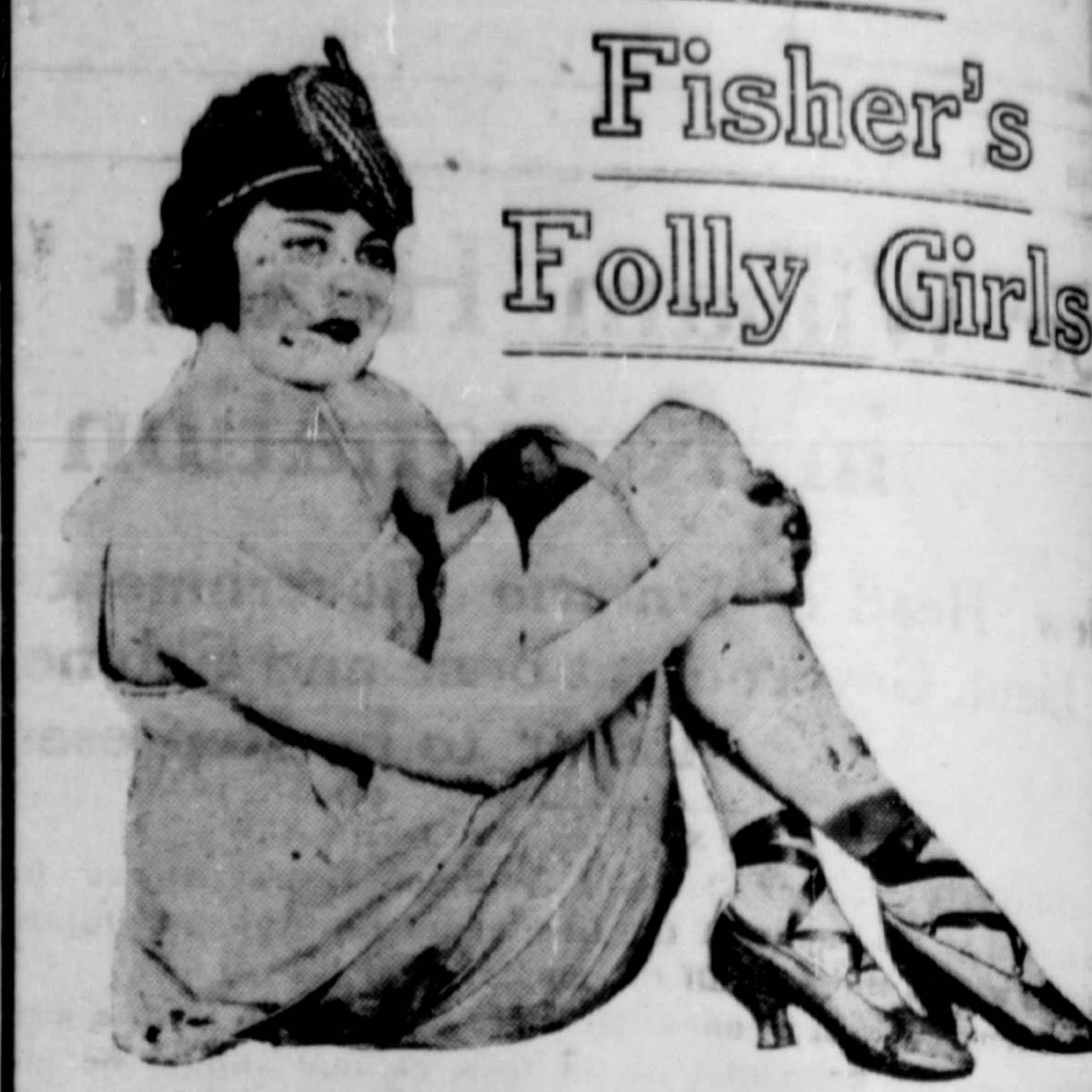

I quite agree with you in that old Indian place names should be preserved as far as possible. The Indian language of this coast will very long become a thing of the past and it is only right that their names for places should be continued.

The same thing applies to our own locality where, in many cases the original names given in pioneer days have been changed. These names are historic landmarks of an interesting past.

MANY ORDERS MADE BY COURT

Assize Court Dispositions and Chambers Applications Before Mr. Justice Clements.

The action of T. Omori vs. John Shirley, M. M. Stephens and T. Morita, arising out of the ownership and sale of a gas boat was dismissed on Wednesday afternoon at the Assizes. It practically amounted to a non-suit case.

In re estate of Eric Peterson, deceased, order made for administration of estate, Stephen H. Skins, of Smithers, official administrator. M. Gonzales, of Williams & Manson, appeared for the petitioner.

In re estate of Mary J. Orme, deceased, order made for probate of estate, M. Gonzales, of Williams & Manson, appearing for applicant, Cyril H. Orme.

Dorothy Forde vs. Wm. Walton, action over mortgage, judgment to be made in foreclosure action. A. M. Manson appeared for the applicant. W. E. Fisher appeared for the defendant asking for postponement of trial. Both applications were adjourned until Saturday, November 1.

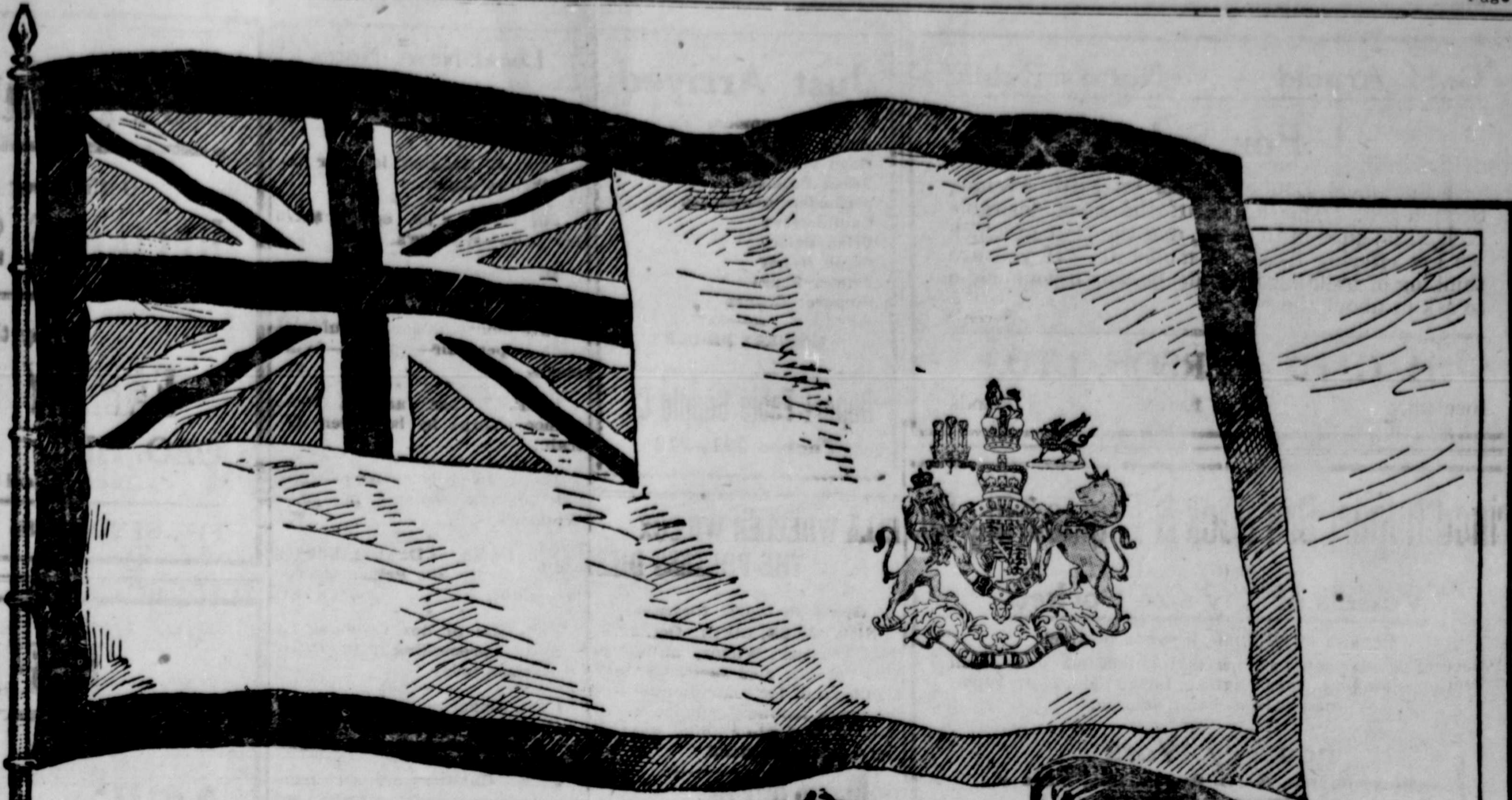

"I Hope Every City and District Will Win My Flag"

When Edward, Prince of Wales—eager, bright eyed, smiling and sincere—arrived in Canada in August, and when he voiced his great admiration of the wonderful achievements of Canadians, on the fields of battle and at home, once again we were thrilled with joyous pride.

He asked concerning Canada's reconstruction programme, and when he was told of the Victory Loan 1919, he graciously consented to the use of his Coat of Arms on a flag, which is to be the prize of honour for districts achieving their quota in the loan.

In dedicating "The Prince's Flag" at Ottawa on Labor Day, His Royal Highness said in part:—

"It is a great joy to me to be associated with the loan, which is the bridge between war and peace, and which is finishing off the job."

"I hope every city and district will win my flag."

Striking, and beautiful in design, this flag will form not only an unique memento of Victory Year, but a lasting and outstanding souvenir of the visit of His Royal Highness—a visit which will remain as one of the most memorable events in Canada's history.



The reproduction above shows the design of the flag. The body is white, the edge red; in the upper left hand corner is the Union Jack; and in the lower right hand corner the Prince of Wales' Coat of Arms.

The flag is made in two sizes, 4 feet 6 inches by 9 feet for small cities, towns and villages, and 7 feet by 13 feet 6 inches for cities of over 10,000 population.

Canada has been divided into canvassing districts by the Victory Loan Organization. Each city forms one district. Other districts have been determined according to population.

Each of these canvassing districts has been allotted a certain amount in Victory Bonds to sell. To win the Prince's Flag, therefore, a district has to sell its allotment. That is the one and simple condition.

Anticipating that many districts will buy far beyond their allotment, the organization decided that for each



twenty-five per cent. excess of the quota one Prince of Wales' Crest be awarded. Thus the workers in a district doubling its quota will be the proud winners of four small crests for their Honour Flag. These crests will be sewn to the flag. The Prince's Crest—the three ostrich plumes—is shown at the top of the coat of arms.

To every organization with fifty or more employees, where seventy-five per cent. of the enrolment invests a total of ten per cent. of the annual payroll in Victory Bonds, a supplementary Prince of Wales Flag in smaller form—48 inches by 34 inches—will be awarded.

The allotment for each district has been carefully considered, and is based on a conservative estimate of the purchasing power of the district.

Your district can sell its allotment and thus win the Prince's Flag, provided each person does his or her share.

You will gladly do your part and encourage your neighbour to do his.

Remember YOUR purchase may be the one that decides whether or not your district is to be the proud possessor of the Prince's Flag.
