Many Matters of Interest Are Taken Up at Annual Convention of Fishermen's Association in City

The annual convention of the Northern B. C. Salmon Fishermen's Association was attended by the delegates and a representative gathering of the members of the organization. The association reports a substantial increase in paid up members during the past season.

The reiteration of its request for a breakwater and light at Seven-mile Point (Whale Point) outside Massett, increased harbor facilities at Seven-mile Point would stimulate the fishing on the Massett grounds by the Prince Rupert trolling fleet and thereby materially increase the possible revenue to Prince Rupert from this fishing ground which at present is fished mostly by the big American trollers especially early in the season.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 7.—Declared by an eye witness in a report to the police to have plunged from the wharf, Peter Logie, aged 50, former longshore foreman, was drowned last night. The body was recovered.

NEW CLUES ARE FOUND

Bright Fire on Stephens Island Reported But Not on Date Renahan Was Coming

SEEN AT LEWIS ISLAND

Two new clues were revealed today in connection with the search for Robin Renahan, missing Seattle pilot, and his two companions. One of the new items of information was that a plane circled twice over Lawson Harbor, Porcher Island, on the evening of October 28 and then headed across towards Kennedy Island.

The other clue, not a very positive one as yet, was given by Eddie Ryan of Metlakatla who said that he saw from Metlakatla a bright fire on the very peak of Stephens Island, Ryan says, however, that this was a week ago last Saturday. He is to check up the date.

VANCOUVER WHEAT

VANCOUVER, Nov. 7.—Wheat was quoted at 69 1/2c on the local exchange today.

City Gets Only \$16,250 From Governments For Relief Work Which Will Not Help Very Much

At a special meeting of the city council last night it was decided to enter into an agreement with the provincial government to undertake relief work in the city at a cost of not less than \$32,500, of which half the cost will be paid by the city and the other half by the federal and provincial governments. This sum of \$16,250 is all the city can get from the governments for its relief work and it will not go very far although it will be better than nothing. It means that only the bona fide residents of the city will be able to get relief.

The city asked the governments for \$45,000 as its share, the city agreeing to put up an equal amount, provided the ratepayers agree to vote that amount. As some opposition has arisen among ratepayers to such a large amount being raised

DIED HERE LAST NIGHT

Samuel Mikkeli Passes Away at Hospital in Which Were His Wife and Young Child

Under circumstances of a sad nature, Samuel Mikkeli, aged about 40, passed away last night in the Prince Rupert General Hospital, his widow being a patient in the same institution with a week-old son. Cause of Mr. Mikkeli's death was tuberculosis.

The late Samuel Mikkeli was a Jugo-Slav by birth but had lived in this district for nearly twenty years. For 15 years or more he was employed at the Granby smelter at Anyox. Last April he came to Prince Rupert and in June was seized with the illness which resulted fatally.

In addition to the widow and infant child, there is another son about four years old. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers but interment will not be made until after the arrival of a brother of deceased, Frank Milleki, from Anyox next Tuesday.

LABOR HAS LOST SEAT

Shipley Riding Elects First Conservative Member In Its History

SHIPLEY, Nov. 7.—Labor lost a seat in Parliament and the Conservatives gained one as a result of yesterday's by-election here in which J. H. Lockwood, Conservative, was elected by a majority of 1690 over W. A. Robinson, Laborite. The Liberal candidate was third.

It is the first time that Shipley has ever gone Conservative.

Theft Case Being Tried In County Court By Judge

Crown evidence was completed before Judge F. McB. Young in County Court this morning in the cases of Louis Wesley and John Morrison, who are charged with theft from the person of Andrew Gavin in a local hotel and the case adjourned until this afternoon when defence evidence will be taken.

Mr. Kitson of the office of W. E. Fisher is prosecuting while A. M. Manson K.C. is appearing for the two accused men.

Missing Seaplane Was Very Close Here Just Before Disappearing

Engine of Lost Ship Missing Badly As It Passed Salmon River—Rescue Plane Is Out On Quest Again Today

Word that a seaplane, presumably that of Robin Renahan, had been seen by natives passing up Grenville Channel at Salmon River, about seven miles below Watson Rock and some twenty-five miles south of here, shortly after six o'clock last Tuesday evening, and a fruitless all-day search north and south of Prince Rupert by Pilot Eckmann were the latest developments.

Yesterday afternoon in the quest for the Alaska-Washington Airways pilot and two companions who have been missing for ten days on a flight from Vancouver to Atlin. The aerial search is continuing today and small boats are also assisting in the quest. As time passes and no definite word is received, the belief grows that Renahan and his party met with disaster not far from this city while making the hop from Sutedale to Prince Rupert in the murky dusk on the evening of October 28.

The report of the plane having passed Salmon River in Grenville Channel that evening was brought to the city yesterday afternoon by the provincial police boat P. M. L. 8 on its return to port after spending several days down the coast in search for traces of the missing plane. The Indians who observed the plane were engaged in curing fish at the mouth of Salmon River. They were particularly attracted by the fact that the machine was travelling at a very low altitude and its engine was missing badly.

There are many inlets and bays between here and Salmon River where the Renahan plane might have come down were a forced landing necessary. On the other hand, there are mountain sides and stretches of open water where it might easily have come to grief in the dark. Were the men or any one of them not disabled, however, it is difficult to understand how, so close to the main steamboat channel, they have not been able in ten days to give distress signals. Their only hope now for being safe lies apparently in the possibility of their being marooned on some lonely island. Should this be the case, the aerial

search should be instrumental in locating them. After having spent six and a half disappointing hours in the air, Pilot Eckmann and his two companions—Frank Wadman, air engineer, and Larry Parks, Alaska manager for the Alaska-Washington Airways, returned to port shortly after 5 o'clock last evening. They scoured the coastline thoroughly for more than one hundred miles up and down, examining closely islands, hills and mountains and flew up several inlets but were unsuccessful in finding any trace whatever of the missing party.

Pattullo Comments On Vancouver By-Election; Suggests Big Stick Tactics On Part of Government

VICTORIA, Nov. 7.—In a statement yesterday, T. D. Pattullo, provincial Liberal leader, said: "The vote cast in the North Vancouver by-election was less than fifty per cent of the total number eligible for registration. I think it will be generally conceded, however, that the preponderating factor in this by-election was the argument that North Vancouver should not place itself in opposition to both the Dominion and provincial governments. It is all very well for my friend, Dr. Tolmie, to say that nothing of a bludgeoning character will be exercised by his administration. The fact of the matter is that the doctor headed the procession.

Then again, the action of the Harbor Board, whether in itself a proper or improper one, in dismissing some thirty odd employees at the time when it did dismiss them, was an evidence of what might further be expected should North Vancouver vote adversely to the government candidate.

The vote of Wednesday does not improve the character of the government we have been getting and we shall continue unremittingly to expose it."

THEORIES OF EXPLOSION

Discussion Still Heard Regarding Blast Which Alarmed Town On Sunday Night

Theories are still heard as to the explosion which alarmed many residents of the city at midnight last Sunday. Some are inclined to support the belief that the blast really was caused by a giant rocket or some sort of fireworks. Others think that it may have been a meteor falling.

low. Here they thought their search had been rewarded with gratifying success. They descended and investigated but their spirits fell when they found it was not the missing flying party after all. From Porcher Island with darkness impending, the search plane returned to Prince Rupert to spend the night.

Pilot Eckmann stated, on his return last evening, that he would go out again today for another search just as soon as it was clear enough to leave. He would continue the search, he said, until the last hope of finding Renahan's party or learning their fate became exhausted. Fog hampered the search considerably yesterday and better conditions in that regard were hoped for today.

Many theories are held as to what might have happened to Renahan or where he might have gone after being sighted last in Grenville Channel. With his engine missing and darkness having fallen, it is considered more likely that he had headed for Prince Rupert than for Ketchikan. That his engine gave out and he was forced to land seems likely and landing at a strange point after dark has, it is feared, proven disastrous. The search now in progress should soon reveal what happened since the radius of the missing plane's possible whereabouts has now been cut down so considerably.

**Also Saw Plane**

Thomas Smith, who is trapping down the coast, reports having seen a plane, presumably Renahan's, pass him northbound on the evening of October 28 below Salmon River but considerably above Lowe Inlet near which point Eddie Clifton, Hartley Bay native, saw a plane pass a few minutes earlier the same evening.

Renahan was flying from Vancouver to Atlin to join the search there for Capt. E. J. A. Burke. His companions were Frank Hatcher, mechanic, and Sam Clerf, prospector and guide.

Pilot Eckmann hopped off at 10 o'clock this morning on his second search flight. There was a drizzling rain and visibility was poor. He hoped, however, that conditions would clear soon.

Pilot Eckmann and his party returned to port shortly before 1 o'clock this afternoon, reporting no success in their morning quest. They were away nearly three hours and scoured Grenville Channel as thoroughly as meteorological conditions would permit. The ceiling, however, was low on account of clouds and the elevation that was desired could not be obtained. Bays and hills were, however, combed without trace of the missing Renahan party.

Hothouse cucumbers are now in season and will be offered here soon.

The lard market is firm although advances have not yet been made in retail prices. Sugar and butter are also advancing although there are no changes as yet in local retail prices.

The flour market is weak and prices are dropping. Large reductions in grain lines are also to be noted.

The egg price is very high now and will be that way for some time. It is expected.

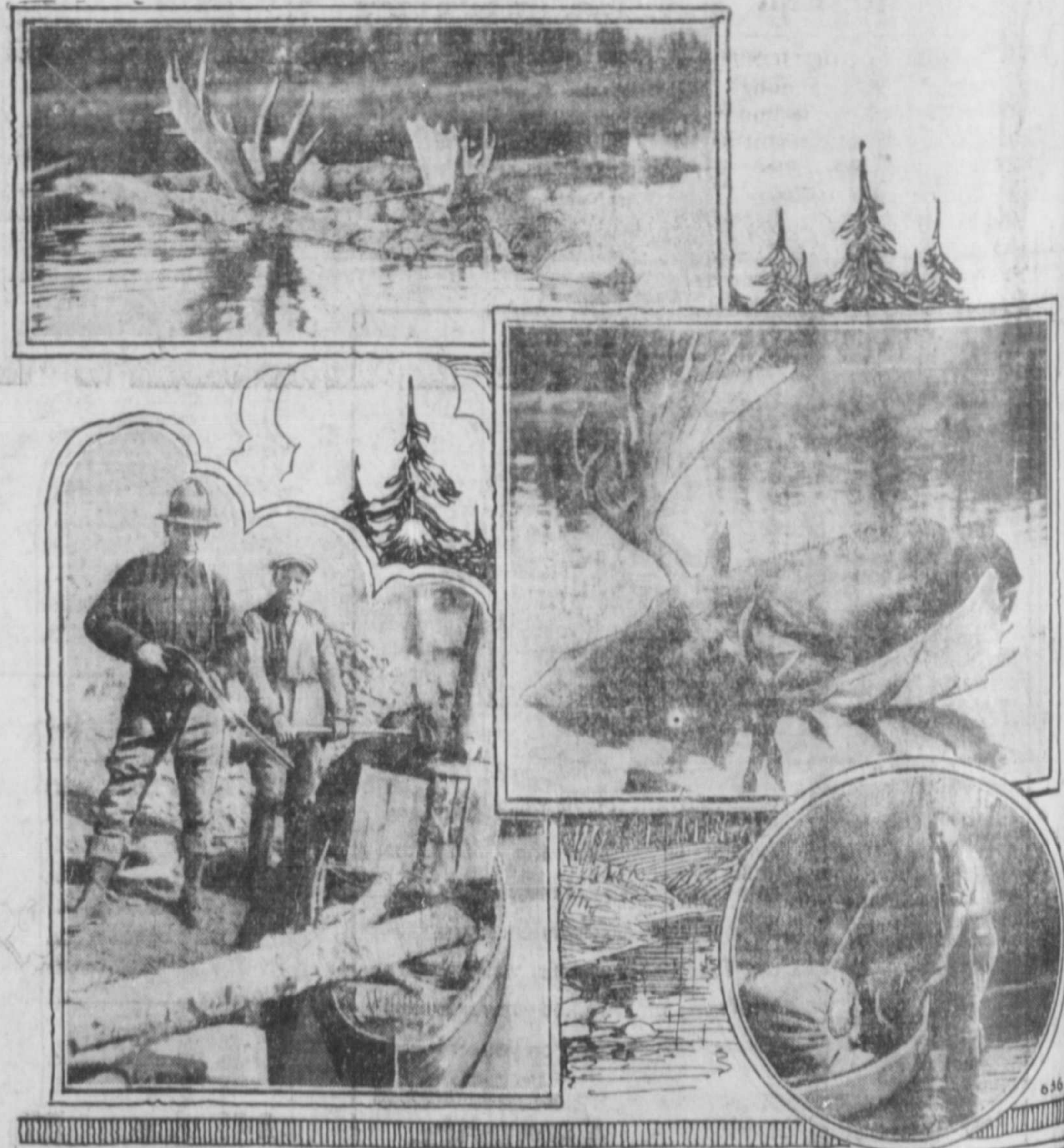

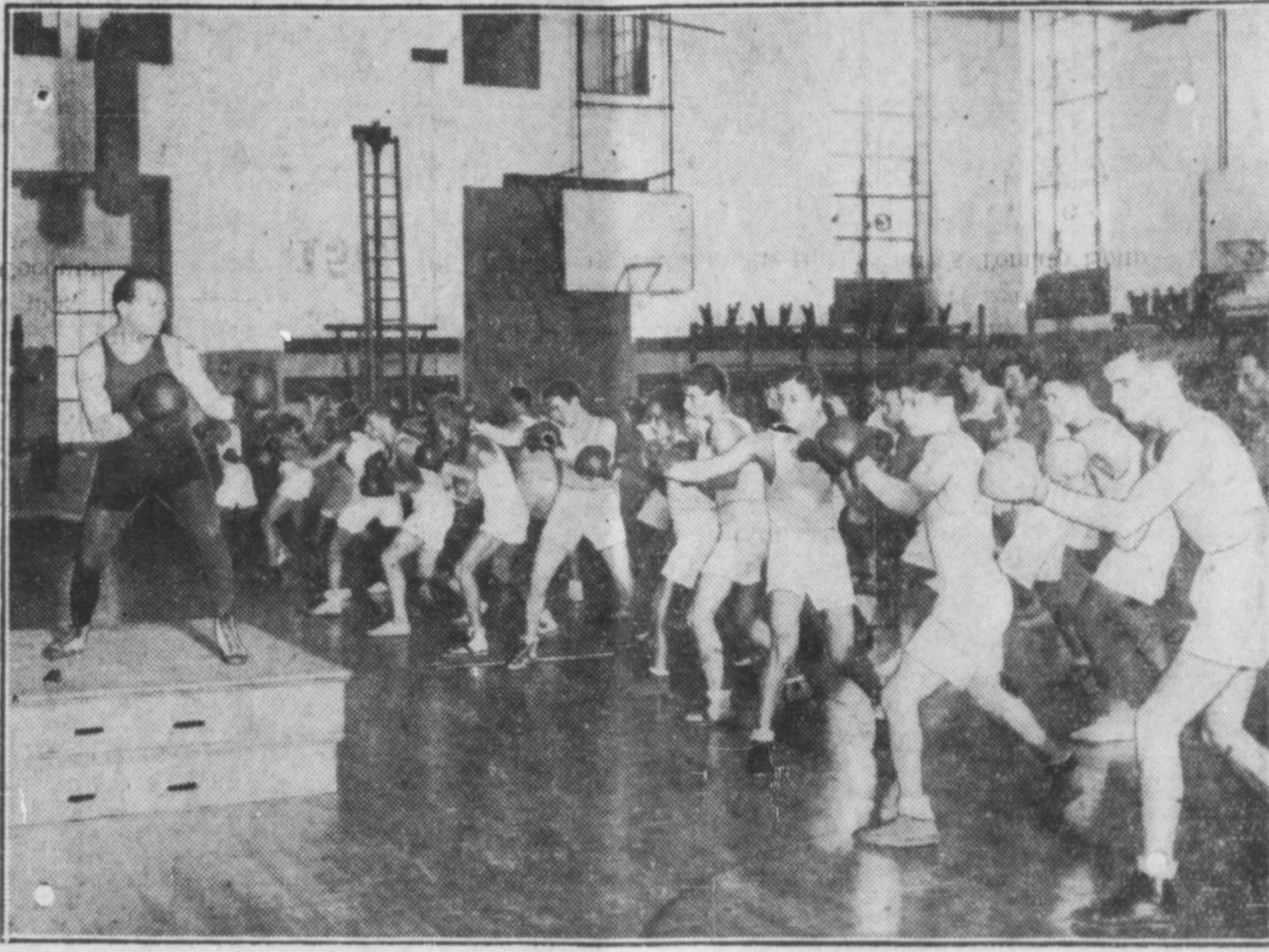
