ICE HAS GONE OUT IN YUKON RIVER

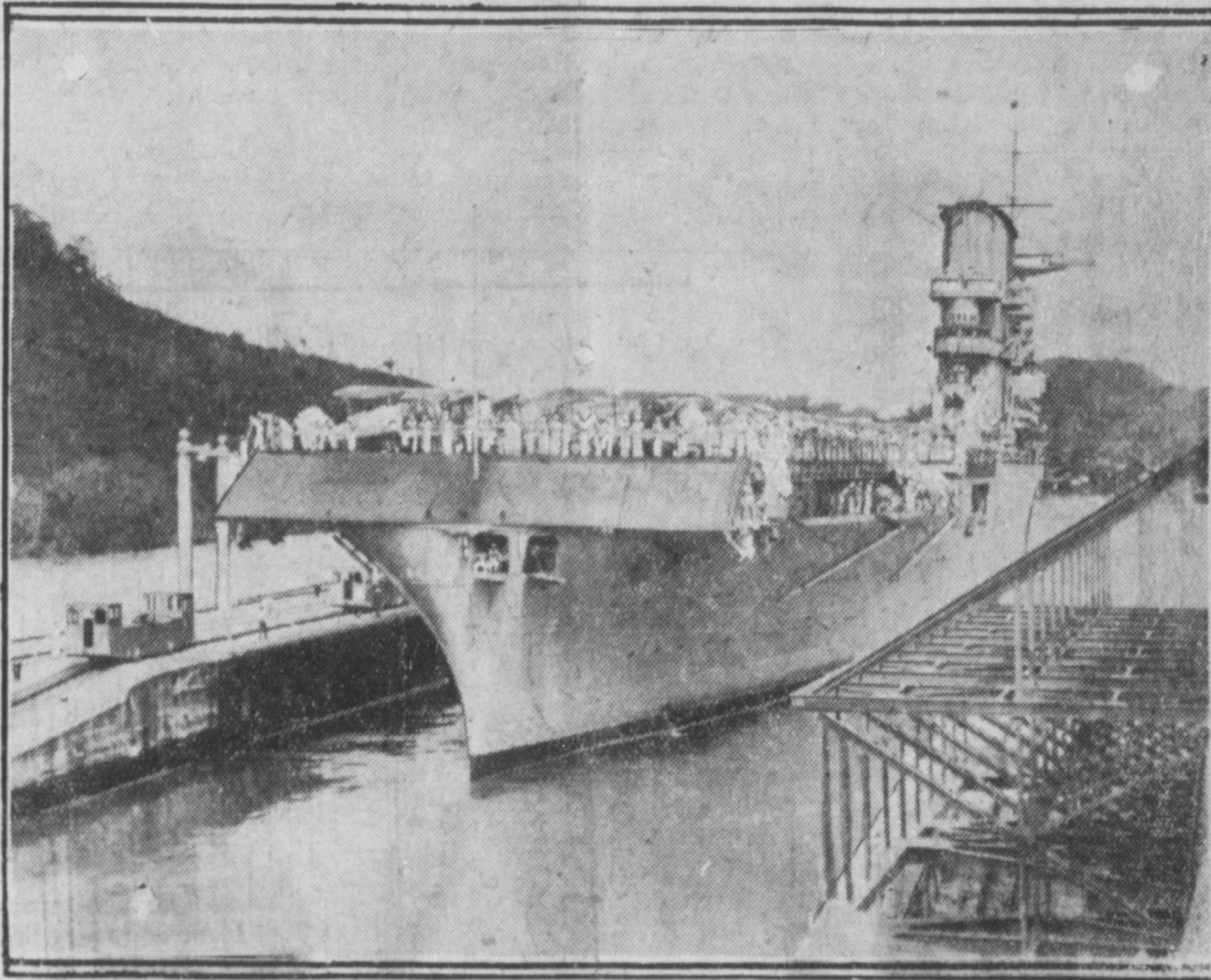
Saturday Evening Saw Break at Dawson With Water Stage Very Low

Francis Burton of Whitehorse and W. R. Sherwin of Fairbanks Divide \$5,000 Sweepstake Prize Money

DAWSON, May 12.—Ice on the Yukon River front moved out at 6:43 Saturday night, heralding the advent of summer and the opening of navigation. The ice moved out quietly and on the lowest water stage ever recorded here. The first prize in the annual sweepstake as to the date and time the ice moved out was won by Francis J. Burton of Whitehorse and W. R. Sherwin of Fairbanks, Alaska, both with a guess of 6:42 p.m. May 10. They divide \$5,670 between them.

Should be Known Soon Whether Commons May Finish in Two Weeks

Many Appointments Are Pending and These Are Expected to Be Made Between Prorogation and Dissolution

OTTAWA, May 12.—The House of Commons resumed the debate on the budget today and indications are that it will not be completed when the House rises for the day as there are a number of members wishing to speak. Developments of the next few days should fairly well indicate whether prorogation within two weeks will be possible. There are a number of appointments to the Senate and to the bench pending as well as the naming of a new minister to Washington. While the government may announce some of these the most of them will be made during the interval between the time that the House prorogues and the time that Parliament dissolves, according to some who are close to the cabinet.

DESPATCH ASSIZES BIG SHIP OPENED

War Vessel Coming This Summer Has Distinguished Commander and Crew of 450

H.M.S. Despatch, which is to visit Prince Rupert this summer, is a vessel of 4,765 tons with a length of 472 feet, a breadth of 46 feet and a depth of 16 feet. She has a complement of 450 men. The ship has 40,000 horsepower Yarrow engines which gives her a speed of 29 knots. The armament is impressive, including six six-inch 50 calibre guns, three four-inch guns, four three-pounders, two two-pom-pom guns, two M.G. guns, eight Lewis guns and 12 21-inch torpedo tubes in four triple deck mountings.

The Despatch will have aboard the commander-in-chief of the West Indies squadron, Vice-Admiral Vernon H. S. Haggard, C.B., M.C., who has seen distinguished service with the British navy in all parts of the world. He had command of many famous ships during the Great War, and was mentioned in dispatches.

KARACHI, India, May 12.—One day ahead of Bert Hinkler's 15-day record for the flight from England to Australia, Amy Johnson, British girl flyer, arrived here Saturday night from Bandar Abbas, Persia, continuing her flight across India yesterday and towards the Straits Settlements today.

ALLAHABAD, INDIA, May 12.—Amy Johnson, twenty-three year old British aviatrix, arrived here last evening from Karachi in her Moth plane.

CALCUTTA, INDIA, May 12.—Amy Johnson reached here tonight from Allahabad. She alighted smilingly and said it seemed impossible that she had left London only on May 5. It is reported that she is travelling so light that she has to borrow a pair of shorts at every stage of the flight. The 940 mile flight from Karachi to Allahabad over the Indian Desert was considered one of the most dangerous stages of Miss Johnson's flight.

DISORDERS IN INDIA

Salt Depot at Shiroda Raided; Gandhi's Successor Placed Under Arrest

BOMBAY, May 12.—Abbas Tyahji who succeeded Mahatma Gandhi as leader of the Indian civil disobedience movement, was arrested this morning at Navsari with all his immediate followers as they were preparing for a raid on the government salt deposits at Dharsana.

BOMBAY, May 12.—The first great raid on the salt depot operated by Gandhi followers occurred today at Shiroda when one hundred arrests were made. The entire second battalion of Royal Ulster Rifles and a battalion of headquarters troops rushed from Sholapur to Poona where further serious outbreaks were feared.

DECEPTION IS CHARGED

Hon. R. B. Bennett Opens Conservative Federal Election Campaign at Guelph

GUELPH, May 12.—Charging the Liberal government at Ottawa with deception and betrayal, Hon. R. B. Bennett K.C., Dominion Conservative leader, addressed an audience here Saturday night. It was the prelude to the opening of the opposition's election campaign. Earlier proceedings had witnessed the unanimous selection of Hon. Hugh Guthrie by South Wellington Conservatives as their candidate for the election.

STANDARD CANNERY IS BURNED

The Standard cannery, owned by the B. C. Packers, was burned down last night about 11 o'clock. It had not been operated for a number of years but was used as a fishing station.

LABOR TROUBLE IS NOW SETTLED

At a conference yesterday between Capt. C. N. Mitchell V.C., general superintendent of the Power Corporation of Canada, and representatives of organized labor a satisfactory adjustment was reached regarding recent labor trouble at the Falls River construction work, it was announced today by Ald. S. D. Macdonald, president of the Trades & Labor Council.

SCHEDULE OF TRAINS

C. N. R. Service Is Speeded Up This Year

WINNIPEG, May 12.—A new fast train service between Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver, will be inaugurated by the Canadian National Railways when the Confederation goes into service westbound from Winnipeg to Vancouver on May 18. The first eastbound from Vancouver will leave that city on May 20. Westbound between Winnipeg and Vancouver the Confederation, which will operate via Regina, Saskatoon and Edmonton, will be two hours and a half faster than the schedule on which it operates last year and there will be a further saving of one hour in the time between Toronto and Winnipeg, or a total saving of three and one-half hours in the complete journey. Eastbound from Vancouver, there will be a saving of two hours and forty-five minutes between Vancouver and Winnipeg and a saving of forty minutes between Winnipeg and Toronto.

In leaving Toronto, the west-bound Confederation makes a connection with the new fast International Limited from Montreal. This latter train leaves Montreal at 3 p.m. daily and makes the trip to Toronto in six hours and is the fastest train in the world over the same distance. By using it and the Confederation, a saving of 13 hours can be made in the time between Montreal and Vancouver as compared with any existing service over the Canadian National Railways between these two ports. CURIOUS POLITICAL SITUATION

A curious political situation has arisen in Vancouver. William Dick, member of the legislature and elected on the Conservative ticket, has made a public attack on Premier Tolmie and his government. He objects particularly to the spending which has been going on and the consequent increase in taxes.

It is hardly to be supposed that one rebel in the Conservative camp will affect the strength of the government sufficient to hasten their end. They are too firmly entrenched for that. The public castigation is likely to make them more careful and possibly even to change their policy somewhat. That is about all. There is also a possibility of Dick being read out of the party.

NOT TURNED LIBERAL

It must not be presumed that Mr. Dick is turned Liberal. There is nothing in the latest despatch to indicate that. It is just the case of a man of independent mind saying what he thinks of his friends and comrades. He is a millionaire or pretty nearly so and in getting his money has been in the habit of ordering people around and having his own way in financial matters. Now he probably wants to order Premier Tolmie around, and naturally that cannot be done. He is simply one of a group, each of whom has a say in the administration with the premier as the chief voice.

MINING SITUATION

The slump in the price of copper is turning the attention of mining men once more to the production of gold, which is always a stable commodity. Gold is not being produced in keeping with the development of trade. Australia produced less than ten million dollars worth last year and India is barely maintaining her regular production. South Africa is making no progress and United States is not producing enough for her own trade requirements. To what extent British Columbia will benefit by this condition remains to be seen. There are all sorts of possibilities.

INTERESTING INQUIRY

We have an inquiry from Winnipeg from a man who asks in regard to mixed farming in this locality and if there is nothing in that line, what else has Prince Rupert to offer one with, say, a thousand dollars.
If anyone has a suggestion to make we should like to hear it and if anyone wishes to get in touch with this man we shall be pleased to give him the address so that he may write to him personally. There ought to be something in Prince Rupert that a thousand dollars would turn.

WARMTH IS NEEDED

Crops on Prairies Are Coming Along Nicely, Official Report Says

WINNIPEG, May 12.—Cool, wet weather with rainfall varying from light showers to heavy downpour has been prevalent over most of the grain growing districts of Western Canada during the past week, according to the weekly report of the agricultural branch of the Canadian National Railways. Practically all points advise early sown wheat from two to four inches above the ground and plants are sturdy, dark green in color and the temporary roots are being replaced by an intensive permanent root system. No points report much growth for this period and warm weather at an early date not only speed grain germination but would assist the growth of wild oats and weed seeds, thus ensuring the destruction of the first growth of noxious weeds previous to the seeding of barley and oats as many districts are endeavoring to refrain from starting coarse grain seeding until weeds have had a chance to sprout.
All Manitoba has had good general rains and wheat already above ground varies from 50% to 75% of the total acreage sown in some districts. Coarse grain seeding in some districts is nearing completion while in others this operation is only beginning. Frost was recorded at numerous points on May 5 but

no damage followed and, while the rains have delayed work about one week, the land is in excellent condition and no points report soil drifting.

In Saskatchewan the general heavy rain of May 4 preceded local showers at numerous points nearly every day last week. Snow from one to three inches fell along the Kur-oki-Wadena-Clair sub-division and also along the Tisdale line. The Yorkton-Touchwood sub-divisions report land is too wet to work and seeding operations have been delayed about one week.

The southerly districts of Saskatchewan report frosts but no damage from same, fall rye is making rapid growth and stooking well. The only territories in Saskatchewan not reporting rain are the Cutknife-Craik subdivisions, but these districts have sufficient moisture to insure good germination.

In Alberta wheat seeding is practically completed and coarse grains already in the ground vary from 50% to points at which this operation is just commencing. Early sown grain is showing up well and, while a few points report high winds, no soil drifting has been evident and Alberta, as with the other two provinces, desires warm weather to assist growth.

Weather in the Peace River country has been cloudy and cool with a few light rains and wheat seeding varies from 50% to fully completed. The soil has plenty of moisture and conditions are favorable. Pastures are lush and all classes of livestock are in good thriving condition.

Receipts on western stockyards are very light but price of cattle and hogs remains strong and all suitable offerings find ready buyers.

SEALS AND SEA LIONS

A short time ago one of our local merchants sent a box of seal noses to the fisheries department at Prince Rupert to collect for bounty, which is \$2.50 each.

The department found 13 sea lion noses among them, for which they refuse to pay bounty. This small action of the department seems utterly brainless, which once again proves how very incompetent our fisheries officials are when every practical fisherman knows how destructive the sea lion is to the salmon and halibut. Only this last winter at a mass meeting of fishermen held at Skidegate Mission they asked the government to pay \$15 each bounty for these waters. It's the same old story with our so-called fisheries department, penny-wise and pound-foolish.

ISLANDS SERVICE

SKIDEGATE, May 12:—The new district steamer service given by the Canadian National Coast Steamships with ss. Prince William from Prince Rupert to the Queen Charlotte Islands shows another marked advance in transportation facilities to the islands.

The first steamer to run to the Queen Charlotte Islands was provided many years ago by the Hudson Bay Co. This vessel used to come over on a yearly schedule.

Later in turn came the Canadian Pacific Navigation Co.'s Danube, commanded by Capt. Myers; the C. P. N. Princess Louise, Capt. Foote; the Coquitlam, Capt. Absalom Freeman, and the steamer Nell, Capt. Madden. The last mentioned vessel made its headquarters at Georgetown, near Port Simpson.

In 1897 there was a marked improvement in service when Skidegate used to get a boat every month. Even at that, letters were often sent down from Massett to Skidegate by packer at the rate of 25c for each letter. The packer would have to walk the beach all the way from Massett to Skidegate.

In the boom days of 1911, the British Columbia Coast Steamship Service of the Canadian Pacific Railway instituted a fortnightly service. The late Capt. Locke, who commanded the old Amur and later the Princess Beatrice on this run, did a great deal to help the people of the Queen Charlotte Islands. A notable event in the marine history of the islands was the visit to Skidegate Inlet in 1910 of the big C. P. R. coastal liner Princess Charlotte with an excursion party of investors.

Since 1911, the Grand Trunk Pacific Coast Steamship Service and then Canadian National Coast Steamships have had the steamboat business to the Queen Charlotte Islands pretty much to themselves and, for nearly 20 years, the sturdy old liner Prince John has been a regular caller here. For the first 10 years of that period, the Prince Albert was used on the route and, in more recent years, the Prince Charles. The latest addition is the steamer Prince William on a weekly schedule out of Prince Rupert.

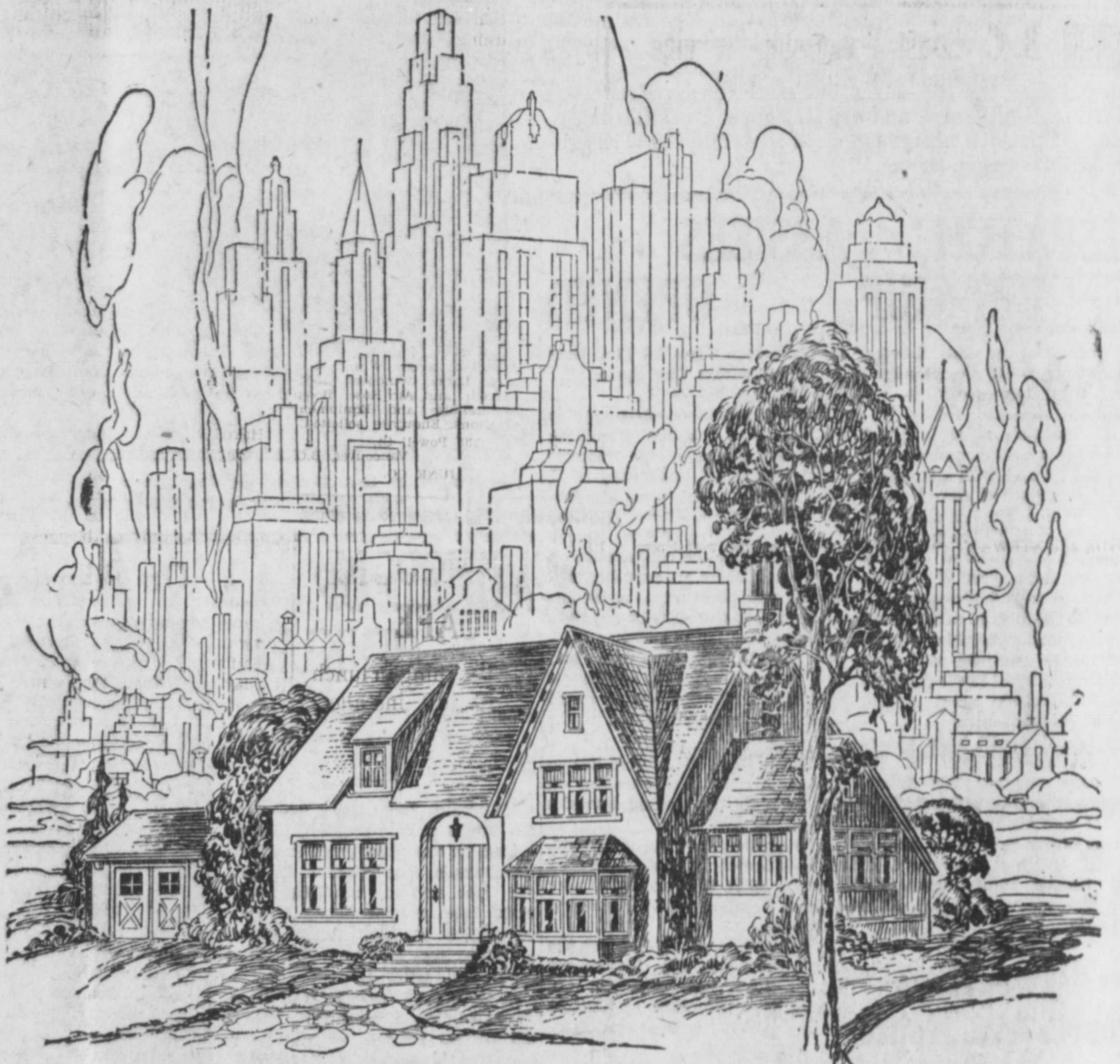
Up to date there has been no sign of spring salmon on the West Coast or in Skidegate Inlet although quite a lot of herring are showing in Skidegate Inlet.

WORK ON WOODBINE

Operations on Well Known Stewart Property to Start About June 1

Work on the Woodbine property adjoining the Premier holdings in the Portland Canal area, will be under way about June 1, according to Hugh McGuire, who is directing the affairs of the company.

At the meetings of the company to be held May 20 it is expected that changes will be made in the new directorate, which will include the appointment of prominent Winnipeg and Vancouver men to the board. Considerable interest in the meeting has been shown by shareholders in various parts of Canada, as well as in Great Britain, and it is believed that this meeting will be the signal for the season's campaign at the Woodbine.

Mr. McGuire states that the ore bodies revealed by the recent diamond drilling campaign will be opened up and the drift, seven feet in width, from the portal of the main tunnel will be continued. Work will be conducted under expert supervision and every attention paid to the development of the property which is now reported by mining experts to be similar to Premier at the same stage of development. Large bodies of gold ore have been shown, as well as values in silver, lead and zinc.

HINTS FOR GARDENERS

SEED

In gardening a fresh and reliable supply of seed each year is even more important than with ordinary field crops because in the case of vegetables and flowers a very much larger variety of plants are grown. Before one is tempted to depend absolutely on seed saved from ones own garden last year it should be remembered that much of this seed is probably a mixture of several shades, varieties and different qualities of plants. The bees, which mix the pollen, are no respecters of colors and when they get through with sweet peas, for instance, they have probably mixed things up so much that weakly colored flowers are sure to result from the seed used. Then, again, the seed in this case is often saved from the later flowers and naturally will produce later flowering plants. The bed, too, has been spoiled by allowing the production of seed pods which as soon as they start to form stop all bloom.

With vegetables, early and late maturing plants, as well as weak and strong ones, are so mixed up that the seed produced is liable to be disappointing. On commercial seed farms not only are the flowers and vegetables grown in large solid blocks so that there is less chance of mixing, but in the case of high class flowers particularly blooms are screened to keep out the bees and the pollen is mixed by hand so that true varieties or certain desired crosses are obtained.

With vegetables, also, there is no attempt made to produce a crop of food for the table, but seed only, and that seed is selected from the earliest and most vigorous sorts so that early and vigorous crops are the results of using that seed.

FLOWER PLANTING

One should order the flower seeds early and particularly those rare and popular varieties which are sold out quickly. It is well to check over the list before handing it to the person who is going down town to make the purchase. First of all, get those seeds that must be started indoors. Select your standard varieties first, that is those flowers which have given satisfaction in the past. But also add a few new ones and novelties for the sake of gaining experience and adding interest. Remember too that varieties are constantly being improved and that flowers and vegetables which were standard a few years ago may have been discarded for something very much better today. Your order should be balanced so that your garden will give the maximum satisfaction. One must have flowers for cutting, bedding, edging, background and fragrance. There must be early, medium and late bloomers so that there will be flowers all season. One must have a variety of color. In planting some attention must be paid to the latter point so that there will be no clashing of shades. A hastily planted garden where the vegetable rows are crooked or
