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

A returned soldier who was away fighting and who had not returned before the beginning of the year is not allowed to register as a voter in the city unless he is a property holder. It is the law of the province and one that should have been amended, but apparently no one thought of the matter. It seems curious that a man who is out of the province in the interests of the whole community should have to be disfranchised for doing his

### Women Voted in

Large Numbers. Women voted in large numbers at the Victoria election when Hon. S. F. Tolmie, minister of agriculture, was returned. Forty per cent of the registered electorate were women, but it is said that over forty per cent of those who voted were women. There was nothing unseemly about the way in which they turned out and exercised the franchise. There was nothing immodest. It was not reported that any children were neglected or that dinners were left uncooked. All the fears of the anti-suffragists were shown to be false. So it is with most reforms. We see all sorts of evils through the colored glasses of our distorted imagination.

### Renewed Interest in Matters Municipal.

It is a good sign that people are once more taking a keen interest in municipal matter. The registration is larger this year than it has been for man years past and it looks as if there might be a real contest in sig it. There are all sorts of whispers going around, but no one seen s quite sure what will happen. The probability is, however, that at least four candidates will be in the field before very long.

It always makes for good government, either civic, provincial or federal, when the people become interested enough to register and vote. It is of the very essence of democracy that the people rule and not the politicians.

### Not Giving But Simply Lending.

On Monday canvassers will start combing the city for subscribers to the Victory Loan. People are asked to lend their money at a high rate of interest considering the security. Bonds are safer than the banks and they pay a higher rate of interest. They can be used just like bank notes in purchasing goods and while they are lying idle they bring in a revenue. What more could be required.

# IUNTING SEA

Victoria Man Kills 700 in Waters of Queen Charlotte Sound.

TELLS OF METHOD ADOPTED BY FISHERMEN

James Cessford of Victoria has been hunting sea lions in his fishing boat and took 700 of them around Queen Charlotte Sound. In telling the Victoria Colonist about it he says:

"The method of hunting the lions is very interesting. You have to get them when they come out of the water upon the rocks, and nit them from an advantage point higher up. The reason for his is that they never look up for; danger. They always took straight out to sea, even if a shot were fired from above. We therefore always lodged on a rock higher up to do our shooting.

The Jugular Vein. "One has to be a very good shot to be a successful hunter of sea lions. There is only one place where the shot will do its work. If the hunter hits the animal in any other part of its body, the only result will be that your prize will jump or roll into the water and immediately sink. As they never get far from the water's edge, it takes very little effort to get back into the water in case of danger. The one vital spot is behind the ears, and as the lions have very small ears, usually not more than an inch in size, it requires a very accurate aim to plunk your shot through the jugu-

Strange Rocks.

The lions have a habit of pulling out to the most dangerous rocks to be found. This seems to be an instinctive effort towards self-preservation. "But after you have fired your i first shot don't the rest of the lions jump into the water for safety?

"No. That is the strange part |of it. They seem to have no thought of danger from any other source than from the sea. When a shot is fired from bigher up the rock, the lions look straight ahead on the water for danger, and crouch further on to the rock for safety. All you have to do is sit there and pick them off if you fare a good enough shot. But if you do not hit the jugular vein they roll into the water and sink like a piece of lead. If you hit them in the right place they drop right where they are hit, and emit long streams of blood from their


