

### Treaty of Versailles to Be Torn Asunder By Successful German Fascists, Leader Says

LEIPSIC, Germany, Sept. 25:-Adolph Hitler, Fascist generalissimo, whose party made great gains in the recent general election in Germany, today declared that just as soon as German Fascists, by legal means, have captured political power in Germany, they will tear asunder the Treaty of Versailles, if necessary by means looked upon by the world as illegal. His sensational announcement of purpose was made at the trial of three Reichswehr officers to which he had been summoned as a witness.
