

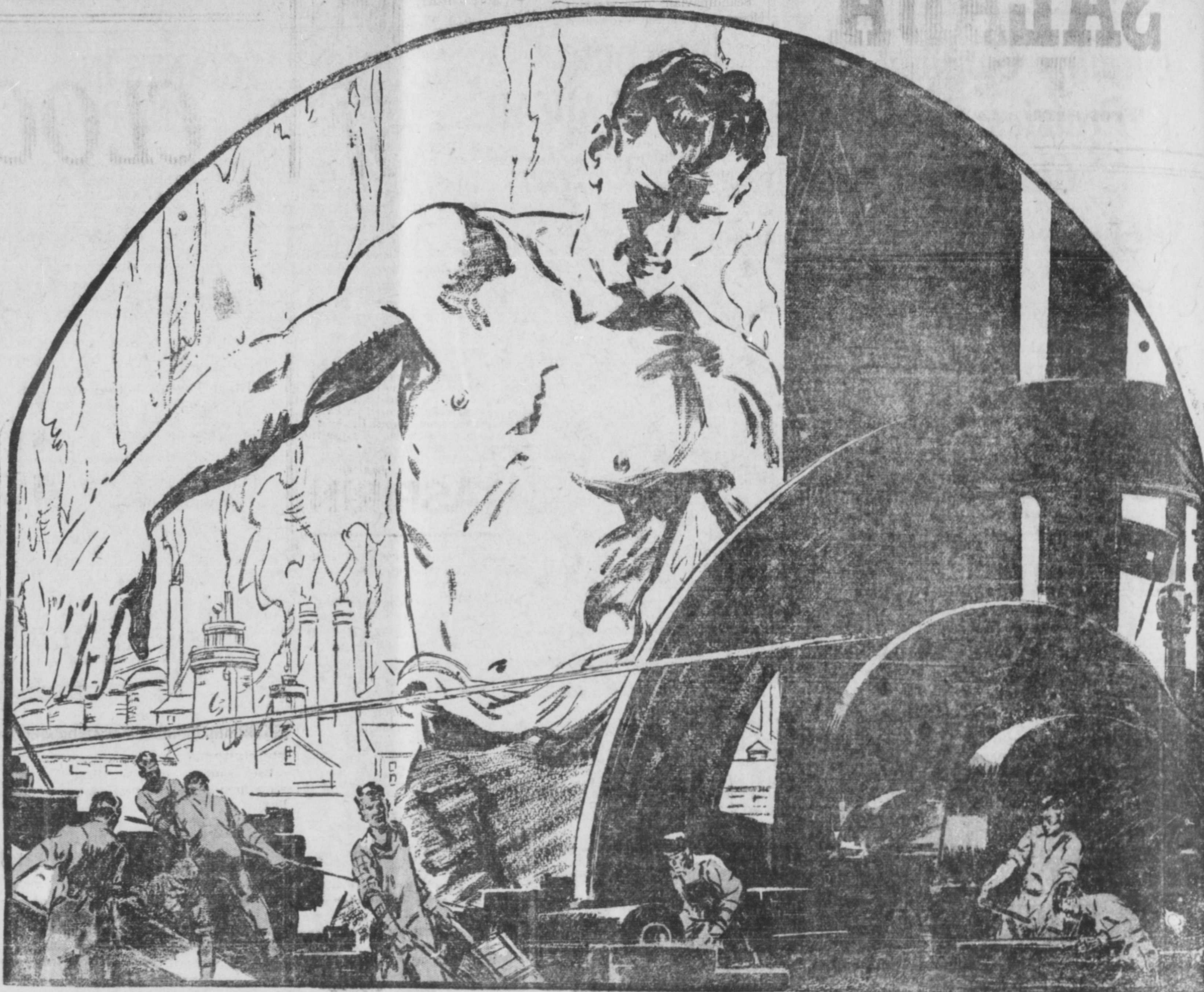


# LABOR LEADS THE WAY!
