## Industrial Court Proposed In a Bill Introduced Into British House of Commons

**Decisions to be Binding but Parties to Dispute do not Need to Submit their Cases to Court; No wage Reduction Before Next September.**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
 LONDON, November 3.—An industrial court and courts of inquiry to examine into special labor disputes, are among the special provisions of the bill the Ministry of Labor proposes to introduce into the House of Commons today. The decisions of the industrial courts will be binding, but parties to the dispute are not compelled to submit their case to the court. Courts of inquiry may be set up by the Labor Minister, with power to summon witnesses and documents. Apparently their principal function is to make a quick report on the facts, thus giving the public an opportunity of deciding upon the merits of the "Wages Act," by which war wages and bonuses are effective one year after its passage. This act expires on November 21. The new bill provides that there shall be no reduction in wages before September 30, 1920, the same date as set in the recent settlement of the railway strike.

## PARLIAMENT MAY RISE ON FRIDAY NEXT

Government Hopes to Conclude Work and Let Members away Before End of Week.

 OTTAWA, Nov. 3.—While there is no absolute certainty that Parliament will be able to conclude business this week, the Government is hopeful that the session will not last over another week-end. Morning sessions commence tomorrow, and the House will rush through the business in hope of prorogation being reached not later than next Friday afternoon or evening. If possible on Friday evening. The Grand Trunk bill has to be passed through its remaining stages. Then be passed on by the Senate. The Prohibition Bill also goes to the Senate and there always a danger that it may be delayed before the old men have finished with it. The report of the re-establishment committee also cause a good deal of discussion in Parliament and one of these subjects may be taken up by the members into next week.

## TEN YEARS AND THIRTY LASHES FOR LA FRANCE

Evidence Sordid and Pitiful and Trial Conducted in Camera.

At 5:47 p. m. on Saturday the jury sitting in the Rex vs. La France case, where the accused was charged with carnal knowledge, brought in a verdict of guilty and Mr. Justice Clement meted out a punishment commensurate with the grossness of his crime. The sentence was ten years' imprisonment in the Provincial Penitentiary with thirty lashes, ten one month after going in and ten each year till the full number have been inflicted. The accused was shown no sympathy by either judge or jurors and, as he is an old man, it is the general opinion that he will never live to see freedom again. The evidence was most sordid and pitiful and the whole trial was conducted in camera. Among the chief witnesses were Ila M. Young the victim, 44 years of age, her mother and father, as well as La France, who maintained till the last that he was not guilty. However the evidence was so strong for the prosecution that there never was a chance for him to be found anything else but guilty. The jury after hearing the evidence which took two days, retired at 5:10 and returned at the time stated with their verdict. The judge then passed sentence. On being asked if he had anything to say, La France stolidly stood up and said "I am not guilty."  
 Court officials say that they never saw such an unemotional and passive prisoner in the box.

## BLEW HERSELF UP WITH MELANITE

 CHATEAU THIERRY, FRANCE, Nov. 2.—Adrien Thuremel, an employee of an explosive depot was charged with theft from the Government and his sweetheart committed suicide today with the help of five pounds of melanite and a detonator. The explosion destroyed property within a radius of 100 yards.

## TWENTY BODIES ARE RECOVERED FROM MINE

 AMSTERDAM, Nov. 3.—With the recovery of twenty bodies from the burning Y. C. Coal Company's mine, it is believed that all the miners who were entombed for more than three days have been accounted for.

## TEAMSTERS GET AN ADVANCE IN WAGES

Fifty Cents Granted by Employers It Was Announced at Meeting Yesterday.

At the meeting of the Teamsters and Chauffeurs Union yesterday, President Cameron in the chair, it was announced that the employers had voluntarily conceded the advance of fifty cents a day increase in the wages of their employees and that the only question now to be considered was that of extra pay for overtime. This will be taken up by a committee. The matter of late deliveries was discussed and while the union was strongly of opinion that the late deliveries should be eliminated the drivers were affiliated with the Retail Clerks Association and were outside their jurisdiction.

## BLACK SEA PIRATES STOLE MUCH CASH

 CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 2.—Pirates concealed in the hold of a ship Maria overpowered the crew and passengers and got away with \$25,000,000 in the Black Sea.

## POLICE COURT

In the police court this morning, Ada Douglas, charged with having stolen a \$900 diamond ring from Jack Miller, was dismissed. There was not sufficient evidence to warrant a committal. Sam King, a Chinaman, charged with having drugs in his possession, was fined \$200 or the option of three months' imprisonment. The second tallest man in British Columbia was before Magistrate McMorris, Harry Moore, over 6 ft. 6 in., paid ten dollars for being drunk.

## Soldiers Pledged to Defeat Government

**Mass Meeting of Veterans at Toronto Declare Recommendations of Committee Idle Subterfuge of already Discredited Government.**

 TORONTO, November 3.—At a meeting of the United Veterans League in Massey Hall, a resolution was passed condemning the report of the soldiers' re-establishment committee, declaring it "discloses a most flagrant and pitiless disregard of the rights and necessities of the returned soldiers upon the question of gratuities. The recommendations made in the report are idle subterfuges of an already discredited government to evade the obligations and responsibilities to returned soldiers. This meeting pledges itself to encompass the defeat of the Government and every member of Parliament who speaks or votes in favor of the adoption of the report."

## HALF OF TOTAL VICTORY LOAN IS SUBSCRIBED

First Week Brings \$152,009,650 Out of Total of \$300,000,000 Asked.

 TORONTO, Nov. 3.—The second week of the Victory Loan campaign opens with a grand total for the Dominion of \$152,009,650 subscribed, according to an official announcement. Present available totals by provinces are, British Columbia, \$4,425,950; Alberta, \$3,152,800; Saskatchewan, \$2,180,700; Manitoba, \$9,510,750; Quebec, \$37,757,400; New Brunswick, \$1,800,350; Nova Scotia, \$3,676,000; Prince Edward Island, \$194,200 and Ontario, \$89,446,800.

## Full Marine Agency For this Port Soon

**Likely Change will be made at beginning of Year; Two Boats to be Built, One for This Port.**

Word is expected within the near future from Ottawa giving notice that the sub-agency of the Marine Department at Prince Rupert is to be raised to the status of a full agency as at Victoria, says the Victoria Colonist. While the matter has been discussed for years, recently things have been coming to a head, and it is understood that arrangements are practically complete. It is also understood that certain members of the local agency staff will be transferred to Prince Rupert. Ottawa is expected to announce the change any day now.

Colonel Peck, V. C., when asked recently at Victoria concerning the raising of the Rupert station to an agency, stated that he understood the change would be made. It seems likely that it will be made at the beginning of the new year.

The establishing of a full agency at Prince Rupert will mean that it will operate independently of the agency in this city. At the present time all business with Ottawa is done through Victoria. With Rupert dealing direct there should be a saving of time. The proposal is for the Victoria agency to look after all British Columbia waters up to a point just north of Vancouver Island, Prince Rupert having charge of the remainder of the coast line. The largest number of navigation aids would have to be looked after by the local agency under this arrangement.

In about two weeks it is expected that tenders will be called for the construction of two 75-foot boats to be used by the Marine Department. One will be stationed at Prince Rupert. The long stretch of coastline makes this desirable in order that quick service may be maintained in connection with the maintenance of the navigation aids.

## INCREASE IN PUPILS AT THE PUBLIC SCHOOL

Sixteen More Pupils Actually Attending During October Than in September.

The total actual attendance during the month of October at the public schools of the city, exclusive of the High School and the Catholic schools, is 589, an increase over the month of September of 16 pupils. The increase is a normal one and the probability is that the new year will see a much greater increase. This is taken to indicate that in the very near future a new school room must be opened, but just where the room is to be found nobody can suggest.

The average daily attendance of pupils during the month was 509... and the percentage of attendance is 86.5.

## JELICOE LEFT

HONOLULU, Nov. 2.—Admiral Jellicoe left for Suva aboard the warship New Zealand.

The Hawaiian troupe who were playing at the Westholme Theatre during the last week, left for Vancouver on the Prince Rupert last night. ## NEWFOUNDLAND ELECTION TODAY

Fishermen's Protective Unions Enters Lists as Political Unit.

 ST. JOHNS, Nov. 3.—Newfoundland will hold her first general election in six years today, the ordinary four year term having been extended from 1917 because of the war.

Political changes since 1913 have provided new party lines, with the Fishermen's Protective Union comprising the labor element in the character of the opposition, appearing as a distinct political unit for the first time.

## BURGLAR GOT INTO VETERANS' CANTEN

Also Attempt Was Made to Enter Warehouse of F. G. Dawson, Ltd.

There were some burglaries reported around town last night. Nothing valuable was taken, but it is evident that some amateur had intent along these lines. The work was of a clumsy and unskilled type and did not show persistent efforts.

The first report comes from the returned soldiers' rooms. An attempt had been made to jimmy the back window open, but on this evidently failing, the would-be burglar broke the window and unfastened the window lock. He entered the rooms and tampered with a strong box containing some papers but was unable to open it. The only thing missing from the room was a little candy.

An attempt was also made to break into F. G. Dawson's wholesale store and traces were found of where the person had attempted to whistle away the door. However he failed to gain entrance and everything was in good order this morning.

## LABOR DISSATISFIED WITH CONFERENCE

Would Throw Out Votes of All Countries Not Having Labor Delegates.

### Should Economize In Fuel During Strike.

The coal miners of the United States have gone out on strike and it will be the wise thing for the people of Prince Rupert to economize in coal. There is plenty in sight for some time to come, but it is never sure that the supply will continue. We may sometimes think the coal is expensive but it is worse to do without than to pay the price. If the miners remain on strike many months, it will certainly be more difficult to secure a fuel supply than it is today and possibly the prices may go higher yet.

### May Burn Wood In Place of Coal.

We may have to burn wood pretty soon. If there is a coal scarcity there is wood all around us and none of us need be cold. It would do many of us good to cut wood for an hour after sitting in an office or doing other sedentary work instead of sitting around. The main difficulty is that the wood is damp and there is little opportunity to dry it this time of year.

### Must Live Up to Our Reputations.

W. S. Henderson, telegraph editor of the Victoria Daily Times, says that at present Prince Rupert looks very good to the people of his city. He says that down on Vancouver Island they are expecting great things from us.

Prince Rupert must live up to her reputation which she is earning, she must show that she really is a live town. She cannot afford to allow her streets to remain as they are, for instance. There must be a change and that at once. To ride along a level road and run the Ford on Low is undignified and tends to make us feel that we are of no importance in the world. There is no need for such a condition.

The citizens as a whole are demanding that money be spent on the streets. The profits on the public utilities might well be spent in making them passable until such time as a bylaw is put through to have them properly paved.

### Agrarian Government In Ontario.

Ontario is to be administered by a group of farmers, aided and abetted by labor representatives. That is a fine combination. There is no danger to the country from the farmer. He is radical in some respects but in others he is very conservative. The labor element will do him good, and on the other hand he will steady up the laborites. The only difficulty in Ontario is that the majority of supporters for the new government is very small. Possibly, however, the farmers will get some support from the Liberals.

Too large a majority does not make for good government, neither does too small a majority. When the majority is very small there is a tendency to grant concessions to certain interests in order to secure or keep their support.

## Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 500 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 50 acres may be purchased on conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 30, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 31, 1920.

**SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.**

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

**GRAZING.**

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travelers, up to ten head.

The money from the Victory Loan is to be used to finish defraying the expenses of demobilization, to keep up the military hospitals, to re-establish soldiers in civil life and to establish credits with overseas countries so that they may purchase Canada's surplus food stuffs and manufactured goods. The Victory Loan is the connecting link between the war and the peace that is to remain, it is hoped, forever.

**GEORGE BELL ON  
ONTARIO ELECTION**

Member for Victoria Who was Recently Wore Took Part in Campaign.

George Bell, M. P. P., who was recently in Prince Rupert and who is known to many here, returned recently to Victoria after having taken part in the big prohibition campaign in Ontario. He spent three weeks on the stump, speaking at meetings in different parts of the province. In an interview given immediately on his return he said:

"The heavy vote polled in favor of prohibition is due to the fact that the people of Ontario are influenced by the proximity to the United States. They realized that the United States has gone dry for good, and they cannot afford to be the dumping ground of the undesirable from the republic. They realize further that immediately ahead of us is severe competition, that we cannot hope to compete with the millstone of liquor around the neck of the people. This means that our people are ten per cent. less efficient on account of even moderate drinking to say nothing of the high cost of liquor, which previous to prohibition was thirty-six million dollars per annum.

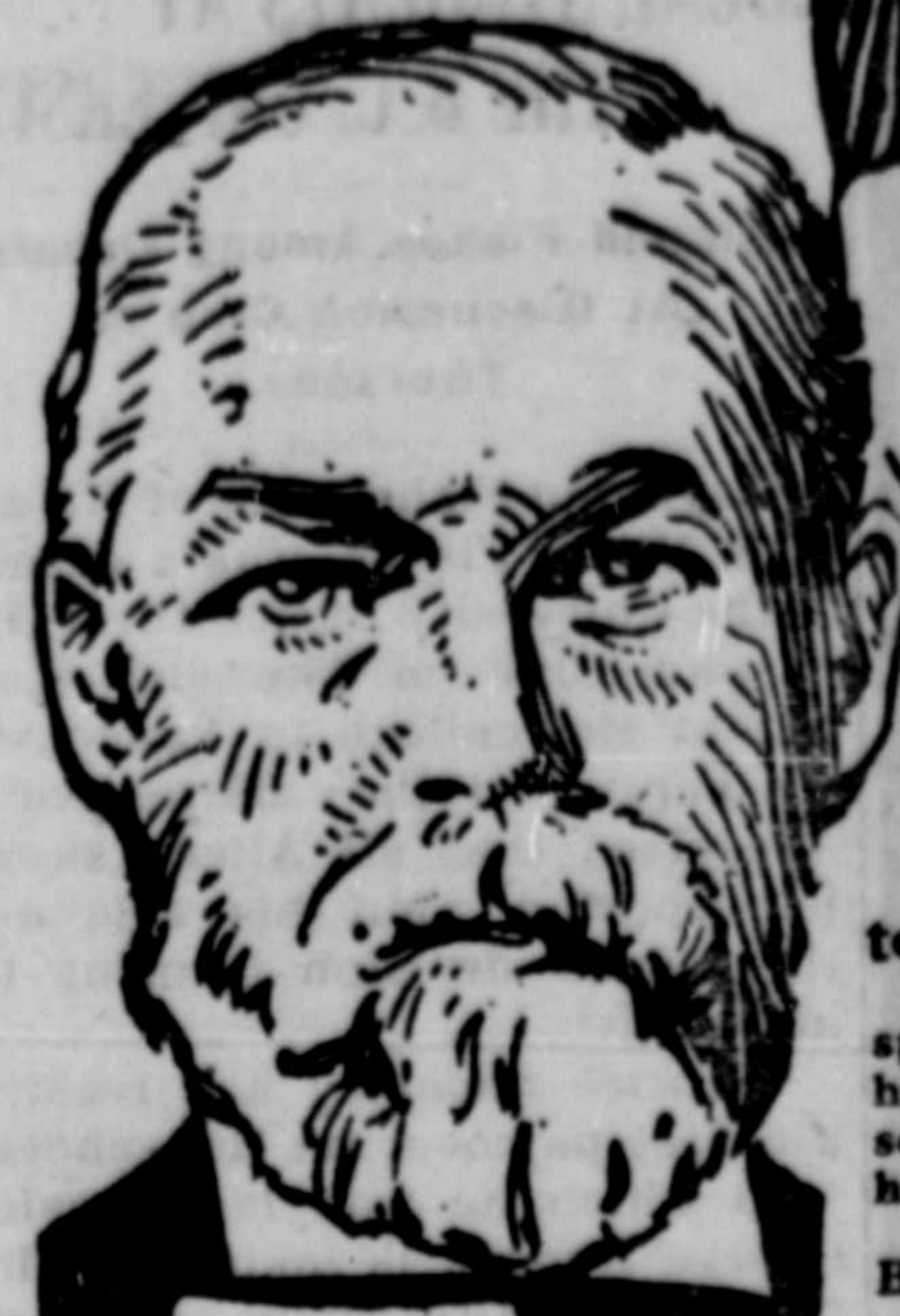

## TWO CARLOADS OF HALIBUT GO TO FAR EAST

Halibut Arrives From Yakutat Banks in Large Quantities; Cod for Local Firm.

A considerable number of boats were in from the Yakutat banks yesterday morning for the fish sale. It was not quite as large a sale as Friday's but the fish is coming in better now than it has been for some time past. This fact reflects itself on the size of the special fish trains going east as well as on the price prevailing. On Saturday a special fish train pulled out direct for eastern cities with ten cars of frozen fish. This morning another special of seven cars were dispatched. Both these trains will arrive in New York for Monday morning's market. The price is now down to 15½¢ for first class fish, which is due to the very satisfactory supply coming in.

The Andrew Kelly arrived in yesterday morning with 70,000 pounds of Halibut and 15,000 lbs. of sable fish for the Cold Storage plant, as well as the Sitka with 70,000 lbs. of sable. The Skandia was in yesterday with 70,000 lbs. of sable but her men were not satisfied with the price bid so she left for Seattle. The following are the figures for the sale held yesterday:
