# LONDON NAVAL TREATY IN EFFECT

## ANOTHER PLANE JOINS AERIAL SEARCH FOR PILOT BURKE

### Ratifications of Momentous Pact Are Deposited Today at Foreign Office of Gt. Britain in London

Premier Bennett of Canada As Well As Other Dominion Prime Ministers Witnessed Important Formalities in London at High Noon Today

LONDON, Oct. 27.—The final act of putting the London Naval Treaty into effect was performed at noon today when British, Japanese and United States ratifications of the momentous document were deposited at the British Foreign Office. Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald and Rt. Hon. Arthur Henderson were present for Great Britain. Ambassador Matsudaira for Japan and Ambassador Charles Dawes for the United States. The Premiers of the British Dominions including Premier Bennett of Canada were present with Premier MacDonald. Representatives of France and Italy, which nations did not enter the pact although they had representatives at the conference last winter, also viewed the ceremony.

### New Public Works Engineer In Peace River Valley Now

Major J. C. Johnstone has been transferred from Port Alberni, Vancouver Island, to Pouce Coupe, in the Peace River valley, as district engineer for the provincial department of public works. Mrs. Johnstone and daughter will spend the winter at Parksville and proceed to Pouce Coupe next spring.

### SEIZURES PROTESTED

United States Fishermen Raising Fund to Assist Appeal of Case.

SEATTLE, Oct. 27.—Salmon fishermen held a meeting here Saturday to protest the recent seizure and confiscation of the trollers Tillie M., Sunrise, Queen City and May by the Canadian government.

An attempt is being made to raise funds for a legal fight for the release of the boats, carrying an appeal to higher courts in Ottawa. The owner of the May asserted he was outside the three-mile limit when seized, while the owners of the other vessels asserted they entered Canadian waters to seek shelter in the lee of Graham Island.

The fishermen say they will appeal to the state department of Washington, D.C., for relief. The trollers were valued at from \$5000 to \$20,000 each.

### Local Theatre Is Offered For Lease

The Westholme Theatre here is being advertised for rent in Vancouver papers by H. G. Helgeson, local realty firm, a long lease being offered. As far as can be learned, however, there is no change as yet in the status of the building.

### KETCHIKAN REPORT IS DUBBED UNTRUE

The statement published in a Ketchikan paper on Saturday that two men had been arrested here as suspects in connection with the murder of G. P. Marshall, Ketchikan fish buyer, a few days ago, was dubbed untrue in all police circles here today. "It must be a mistake," said all provincial police officers when inquiry was made to confirm the report.

### Alleged Killer Passes Through Enroute Okalla

Sigurd Jussita, young Finlander, who was committed for trial at Smithers last week by Stipendiary Magistrate S. H. Hoskins on the charge of murdering Charles Yoch, Houston farmer, whose body was found last month in the basement of his shack with his head beaten in with a pick, was brought to the city from the interior on yesterday afternoon's train in custody of Inspector John MacDonald and Sergeant W. J. Service of the provincial police.

Jussita was attired in a khaki-colored mackinaw and rough clothing. He is of a very stolid appearance. The accused man was taken on to Okalla Prison last night by Constable Andrew Grant on the steamer Prince Rupert. His trial will take place at the spring session of the Supreme Court Assizes here next year.

### Trade Delegation From Dominion Is Visiting At Tokyo

TOKYO, Oct. 27.—The Canadian Chamber's of Commerce trade delegation to the Orient arrived at this, the seat of government of the Japanese Empire, today.

### PARLEY IS SLOWED UP

Premier of New Zealand Is Getting Nowhere Because of British Attitude

LONDON, Oct. 27.—The veil that shrouded the deliberations of the Imperial Conference was ripped asunder Sunday night by Premier Forbes of New Zealand who declared in an interview that the attitude of the British Labor government on tariffs left "little hope of real progress."

Premier Forbes said: "We simply seem to be drifting and not getting anywhere."

### Home of Northern Skipper Is Robbed

Clothing and Personal Effects Valued at \$400 Taken From Residence of Capt. Muir

The home of Captain John Muir, well known in Prince Rupert as skipper of the Union Steamship Co.'s freighter Chilliwack, at 3003 Seventh Avenue West, Vancouver, was entered by night last week and clothing and personal effects valued at \$400 were stolen.

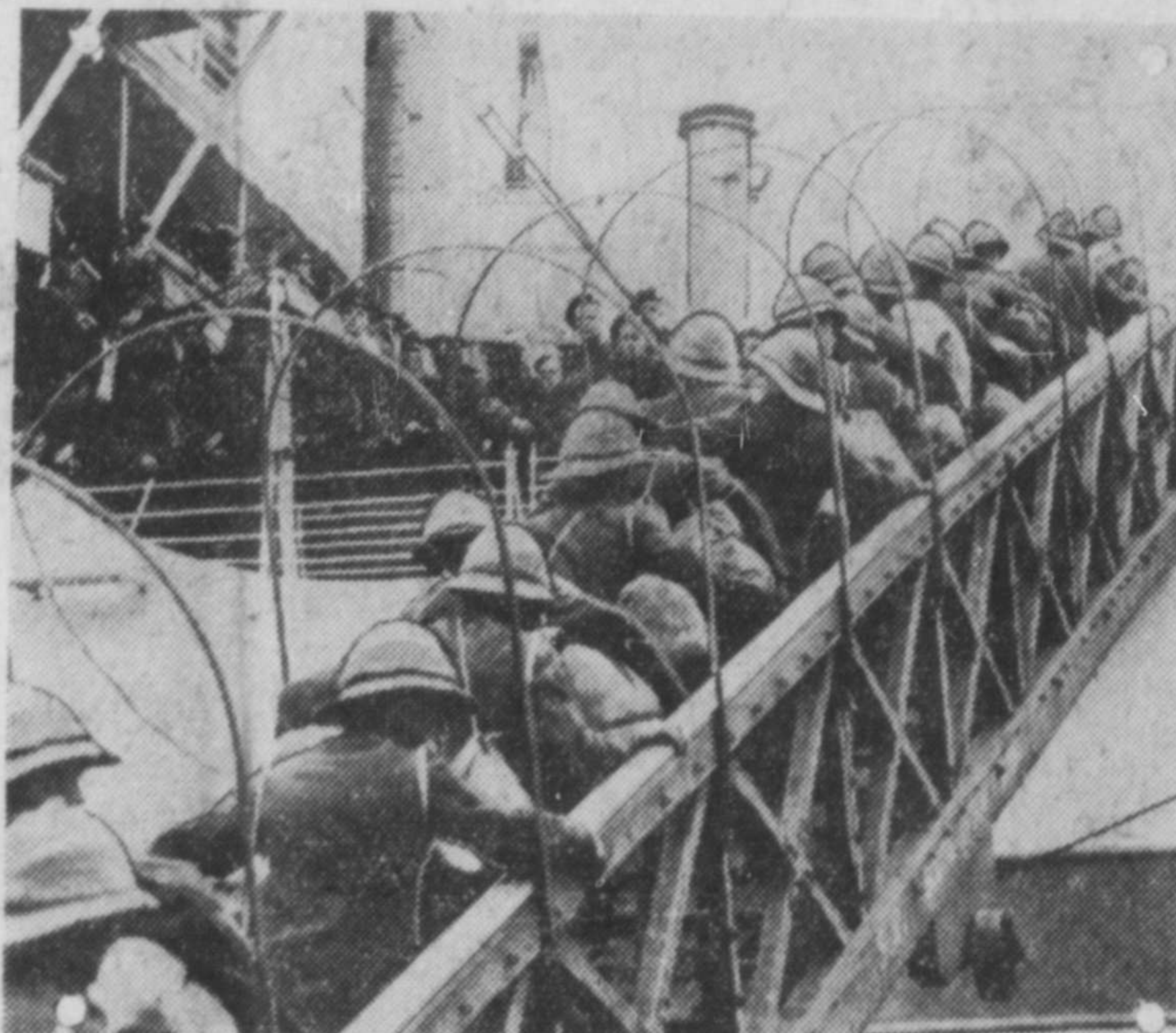


Jack Clayton, new manager here for the Home Oil Distributors Ltd. Mr. and Mrs. Clayton and their son have already taken up residence in the city.

### Can Anyone Blame the Great Port of Vancouver If It Is Very Sore With Such As This?

Much to the disgust of Vancouver, Prince Rupert but not Vancouver as a grain route is mentioned in Pitman's Commercial Atlas which is used as a text book in the schools of Winnipeg and which one of the members of the Winnipeg school board is seeking to have banned from the schools of that city.

The atlas, in its introduction, under the heading "Trade Routes of the Pacific," states that there are only two great routes. One is from San Francisco to Manila and it is anticipated that Prince Rupert will become an important centre. "No mention is made of Vancouver as a route to the Orient."

In discussing the Pacific Coast line on Page 92, the Atlas says: "Prince Rupert has a magnificent harbor and promises to be one of the great ports of the future now that the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway is completed with this town as its western terminus. No doubt, also, the opening of the Panama Canal will influence its future very considerably."

Again no mention is made of the port of Vancouver.

### HAS RECORD FOR WOMEN

Mrs. Miller Sets New Time For United States Flights In Both Directions

VALLEY STREAM, N.Y., Oct. 27.—Mrs. Keith Miller, Australian aviatrix, landed at the airport here Sunday afternoon from Columbus, Ohio, with the west-east and east-west trans-continental flight records for women. Her elapsed time from Los Angeles here was 21 hours and 47 minutes, four hours better than the previous record of Laura Ingalls.

Mrs. Miller recently made the east-west flight in 25 hours and 40 minutes which was also a record.

### VANCOUVER WHEAT

VANCOUVER, Oct. 27.—Wheat was quoted on the local Exchange today at 70 1/2c.

Union Oil Co.'s tanker Unacana, Capt. Powers, arrived in port at 5 o'clock this morning from Wrangell and, after discharging a parcel of fuel at the company's local station, sailed later in the morning for Vancouver.

### SETO DIB IS BURIED

Inquest Into Death of Chinaman Last Thursday Night Resumed This Afternoon

With a large representation of the local Chinese colony on hand to witness the rites and pay their last respects to the deceased, the funeral of Seto Dib, pioneer Chinaman of this city and district, who met his death last week as a result of being run down by an automobile, took place yesterday afternoon. There was a service in the chapel of the B. C. Undertakers, deceased's cousin, Seto Wo Boo, being in charge and burial took place in Fairview Cemetery. A large procession followed the body to the cemetery. Countrymen of deceased acted as pallbearers.

The inquest into the death of Seto Dib is continuing this afternoon in city police court before Coroner C. L. Monroe. Police officers were measuring off distances this morning on Second between Seventh and Eighth Streets where the fatality occurred last Thursday night.

### Alaska-Washington Co. Sending Pilot Renahan North From Vancouver

Second Rescue Ship Is Coming Here Tomorrow — Pilot Dorbrandt Unsuccessful So Far In Quest For Missing Trio

VANCOUVER, Oct. 27.—Pilot Renahan will not take off before tomorrow for the north to join the search for Capt. E. J. A. Burke, missing Atlin commercial aviator, it was announced this afternoon.

ATLIN, Oct. 27.—Pilot Frank Dorbrandt and his companion, Pilot Cope, arrived here yesterday afternoon from Telegraph Creek. On Saturday the aviators made an unsuccessful attempt to reach here but they were forced to return to Telegraph Creek when they ran into a blizzard over the summit, 130 miles north of Telegraph Creek. This morning the flyers planned to hop off for Liard Post in search for Capt. E. J. A. Burke of Vancouver and two others who have been missing since they started a flight 15 days ago. Late yesterday Dorbrandt flew to Teslin and Wolf Lakes. On his return, he reported all the small lakes frozen over.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 27.—Pilot Robin Renahan of Vancouver, in an Alaska-Washington Airways seaplane, will hop off from Vancouver, possibly late today, for Atlin to aid in the search for Capt. E. J. A. Burke and his two companions who are lost in the Liard River district of British Columbia. It is expected that Renahan can start this afternoon and reach Prince Rupert before dark, proceeding from there to Atlin tomorrow.

Renahan's plane is on floats which will be re-inforced to make it possible for him to land on frozen lakes if necessary. Renahan, who will be accompanied by J. McCurdy, mechanic, flew to Seattle early today and picked up a Lockheed-Vega seaplane capable of a top speed of one hundred and sixty miles per hour. He may try to reach Ketchikan or Juneau tonight but, if conditions do not permit, he will rest at Prince Rupert.

A telegram has been sent by R. Carter Guest, district inspector of civil aviation for British Columbia and the Yukon, urging the Treadwell Exploration Co. at Juneau to send one of their planes for the relief expedition.

It was learned from the Government Telegraphs here this afternoon that Pilot Frank Dorbrandt, who is engaged in searching for Burke, flew over the native village of Teslin this morning and dropped a message in a parachute to the native residents there. It was over Teslin that Burke is believed to have been seen last. Returning to Atlin, Dorbrandt made another flight this afternoon intending to follow the route Burke had taken towards Liard. It was snowing and foggy at 2:30 this afternoon, Dorbrandt having then been away from Atlin for two and a half hours.

Capt. Jennings, master of the Ketchikan salvage boat Akutan, was a passenger aboard the Princess Louise yesterday afternoon going through to Seattle on a business trip.

### HARRY PAYNE WHITNEY DIES AT AGE OF 58

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—Harry Payne Whitney, multimillionaire capitalist and sportsman who had heavy interests in Canada as well as in the United States, died on Sunday. He was fifty-eight years of age.

### RUNNING SURVEYS

Portland Canal Power Company Is Going Right Ahead

STEWART, Oct. 27.—In line with the ambitious program outlined for this year by the Portland Canal Power Co., engineers are now in the field running preliminary surveys for transmission lines from their proposed plant at Davis River to Hyder, Big Missouri and the head of Texas Creek. They expect to have these finished before the snow flies, and it is also the intention to survey up the Bear Valley and down the east shore of the Canal from Stewart.

### WILL HURT FISHERIES

Chief Inspector Fears Result of Power and Pulp Mill Project At Prince George

The pursuance of the proposed pulp mill power plans at Prince George will cut off one of the best salmon streams in British Columbia, Major J. A. Motherwell, chief inspector of fisheries, told the Vancouver Gyro Club in an address last week. Major Motherwell was speaking of the fact that big dams prevented salmon from making their way upstream to the spawning grounds.

BISHOP IS IMPRESSED BY BRITAIN

Local Churchman Is Enthused By Fact of British Empire and Inspired By Conference

Yesterday morning at the Anglican Cathedral, Bishop Rix, who has just returned from a lengthy visit in England, gave a very interesting address on the work of the Lambeth Conference and, introductory to this, spoke appreciatively of the people of Britain and the greatness of the British Empire as viewed from the centre of the Empire. The Bishop told of the impressions he received. Particularly was he impressed with the immensity of the Empire. Britain was, even in time of depression, intensely busy. Ships were coming and going to and from hundreds of ports, factories were working and most of the people seemed busy. There was to him no evidence of bad times although he knew from information he received, that many men were out of work.

The greatness of the educational institutions of England was mentioned, and the result of the work done there was evident.

Then there was the trade with the other Dominions and the great interest taken in them. Canada, naturally, ranked first among these. Turning to the church and its

work, the Bishop spoke of the strong influence for Christ the Church of England was throughout the world. There were delegates at the Lambeth Conference, 307 in all, from every corner of the world. The Bishops present were men of outstanding leadership, cultured men, from the Archbishops, down. While politicians came and went the church leaders carried on their work with little change, bent on the one great object.

Of the various subjects discussed at the conference, the Bishop spoke of one only yesterday, "The Christian Doctrine of God." This was particularly important at a time when Russia was carrying on a strong anti-God movement. There was also throughout the world the great body of men and women not concerned about God and also there was the scientific attitude toward God which had changed greatly of late. He told of having heard an address by Sir Oliver Lodge, the great scientist, who strongly believed in the existence of a God and stated that Christ was a great example sent to show humanity how to live. It was one of the most inspirational addresses he had ever heard.

The reception by the King and Queen was mentioned. The King gave an address, closing with the remarkable sentence, "God Rules." Here were 307 bishops of the church all holding different views on many subjects but uniting on the one outstanding fact: "God Rules."

The Bishop will continue his address on the conference next Sunday morning at the Cathedral.

Twenty Years Ago

In Prince Rupert

October 27, 1910

Telegraph communication between Vancouver and Prince Rupert was out of commission because a freight train on the Canadian Pacific Railway near Yale ran off the track and smashed down a row of telegraph poles.

Over one hundred citizens of Prince Rupert sat down at a banquet in the Premier Hotel last night in honor of George W. Morrow, popular pioneer citizen, who is leaving for Vancouver to reside. W. M. Law was chairman and George D. Tite toastmaster. Speakers included Alfred Cars, William Manson, G. R. T. Sawie, A. A. McIntyre, T. D. Pattullo, J. H. Hilditch, W. P. Lynch, A. R. Barrow, Dr. W. B. Clayton, J. F. Macdonald, A. J. Morris, Thomas Dunn, V. W. Smith, Duncan Ross, S. M. Newton and C. H. Sawie. In charge of banquet arrangements was J. E. Merryfield.

The construction of the new government telegraph line from Kitsumkalum to Stewart is proceeding as rapidly as possible, states J. T. Phelan, superintendent of Government Telegraphs, who is in the city. Seventy-five miles remains to be completed and Mr. Phelan expects the line will be completed and in operation by the end of the year.

PROSPECT PROPERTY

Tooth and Howse Complete Season's Work On Stewart Property

STEWART, Oct. 27.—W.—R. Tooth and L. C. Howse have recently completed a very satisfactory season's prospecting on their Palmy group of nine claims situated on Bear River ridge between the Dalhousie and M. C. Mining Co. properties, at an elevation of from 3500 to 6000 feet.

Confining their work to detailed surface prospecting, the owners claim to have located a silicified shear zone about 14 feet wide and traceable on the surface for something over 300 feet. This is at elevation, 4000 feet. The zone has a strike of N. 70 deg. W., and contains zinc blende, galena and pyrite in a quartz gangue, in what appears to be a grey tuff formation. With such encouraging results from what little preliminary work has been done, the owners feel justified in planning more extensive development next season.

Putting in a large open cut near the north end of the shear as far as it has been traced to date, the owners opened a width of 14 feet of mineralized material interlaced with stringers of solid sulphides, which gave assay returns as high as 45% lead, 8 oz. silver and \$2.00 in gold.

Messrs. Tooth and Howse were encouraged to prospect this ground as a result of reading the geological report on this section made by Dr. Geo. Hanson in Memoir 159. On page 25 of the memoir is found the following paragraph dealing with likely sections of the Bear and Marmot Rivers: "Bear River ridge between the Prince John and Dalhousie groups of claims probably contains undiscovered copper deposits."

TO COUNT WORKLESS

Stewart Board of Trade to Register Jobless—Mineral Act Amendments Asked

STEWART, Oct. 27.—For the purpose of compiling accurate statistics as to the number of unemployed at present in the Canadian side of the Portland Canal district, the board of trade decided at its last meeting to have the secretary open a list for registration purposes. All those not at work are asked to report their names to P. S. Jack, though it must be distinctly understood that the board of trade is in no way opening up an employment agency.

Another important matter before the board concerned the forthcoming changes in the Mineral Act which are to be brought up at the next session of the legislature. Several of the members have ideas they would like to see incorporated in the act, designed primarily from the standpoint of the prospector, and, for the purpose of putting these ideas into suitable form for submission to the government, the mining committee was asked to look them over and bring in a report.

G. R. Bancroft and Wellington Beaton, who are now in Vancouver and will no doubt be attending the sessions of the institute of mining and metallurgy on November 19-21 inclusive, will be asked to represent this district at the meeting.

The proposal from the Prince Rupert Daily News for advertising space in a special edition of that paper commemorating the formal opening of the Falls River power plant, met with favor and the board decided to take the newspaper's offer.

Don't be Penny Wise Pound Foolish!

Has it ever occurred to you that bargains, even honest-to-goodness bargains, are not always an unmixed blessing?

Of course many so called bargains are not real bargains at all. Like the rosy apple that is rotten at the core, they appear to be something that they are not. A bargain is only a real bargain when it is offered you at a price less than what the article is really worth.

Due to causes that predicate a loss to some Canadian producer, real bargains are sometimes available to you. And when they are, and you need the articles offered, you would be foolish not to take full advantage of them. For if you don't, someone else will! Meanwhile anyone buying them is doing the Canadian producer a good turn by helping him to dispose of merchandise that, for one reason or another, he is compelled to convert into immediate money.

But when the subject of the bargain is a foreign-made article, the whole situation takes on a different aspect.

Like as not the foreign producer, whom you would be helping out of a jam if you purchased his bargain, has a production cost that is far below the Canadian cost of producing the same article. And if you were to institute enquiries with a view to finding out why his production cost was so much lower, like as not you would find it was because he was paying his employees rates of wages that were away below the scale paid for similar work in this country.

In that event, it would be reasonably safe to assume that a much lower standard of living prevails among the workers in his country than prevails here. Possibly he requires his employees to work longer hours than is customary in Canada. Possibly the laws of his country are not as strict as they are here regarding the employment of child labour. Possibly he is not taxed, as Canadian manufacturers are taxed, to ensure compensation on a reasonable scale being paid his workmen who suffer injury in the course of their employment. Possibly he is not required to maintain his factory at anything like as high standards of ventilation, of sanitation, of heating, of lighting, of protection against fire and accident, as are in force in Canada.

In all these matters—hours of labour, rates of wages, standards of living, factory inspection, social legislation and industrial betterment work—Canada is much more advanced than most of the nations that make products similar to hers. The result is that Canadian wage earners are more fortunately circumstanced in almost every way, than are the wage earners in most other countries. Obviously they can only hope to retain those advantages as long as their employers, the manufacturers of Canada, are able to overcome in the domestic market the competition of foreign-made goods that are produced under longer working hours, lower wage scales, and lower standards of living. For should the time ever come when they can no longer compete, either their Canadian employees must agree to wage reductions and the loss of decent living conditions, or the manufacturers themselves must close up shop.

You can see therefore what serious trouble these bargains in foreign-made goods may cause you—what serious trouble any foreign-made goods may cause you whether they be bargains or not—if you allow yourself to be persuaded into buying them. Should you say there is nothing harmful in buying them once in a while, you will probably see nothing harmful in buying them every chance you get. And if you buy them every chance you get, you cannot blame others for doing the same thing. Once everybody in Canada starts doing it, you know what will happen!

So for the sake of a small immediate saving or merely to satisfy a passing whim, why run the risk of setting in train a movement that in a few years might easily prove your undoing! Wouldn't it be far better for you, and your family, and all your friends, to stand fast by the policy of buying "Produced-in-Canada," as the surest means of protecting Canadian rates of wages and Canadian standards of living?

The international billiard tournament now going on in England is a competition between the four greatest English billiard players of all time, Walter Lindum of Australia (scratch), Joe Davis, England, who receives 7000, T. Newman, England, who receives 7000, and Clark McConachy, New Zealand, who receives 7000. Two games are played simultaneously, one in London and one in the Provinces. The games are of two weeks duration, two sessions daily of one and three quarter hours each.

Brilliant as Lindum has proved to be, the magnitude of his task in this tournament can be judged when it is considered that each of his three opponents have breaks of around 2000 to their credit, and that this handicap calls for Lindum to score an average of over 160 points per hour more than each of his opponents for the whole fortnight. The tournament started September 29, and will finish December 20, the winner being the player winning most games.

"Daddy did not know I was in the race, but mother did. There wasn't a great deal of wind, but I loved managing the dinghy and I was so surprised when I came in first. At the last minute I took the place of a boy who was to sail in the race but was out of town."

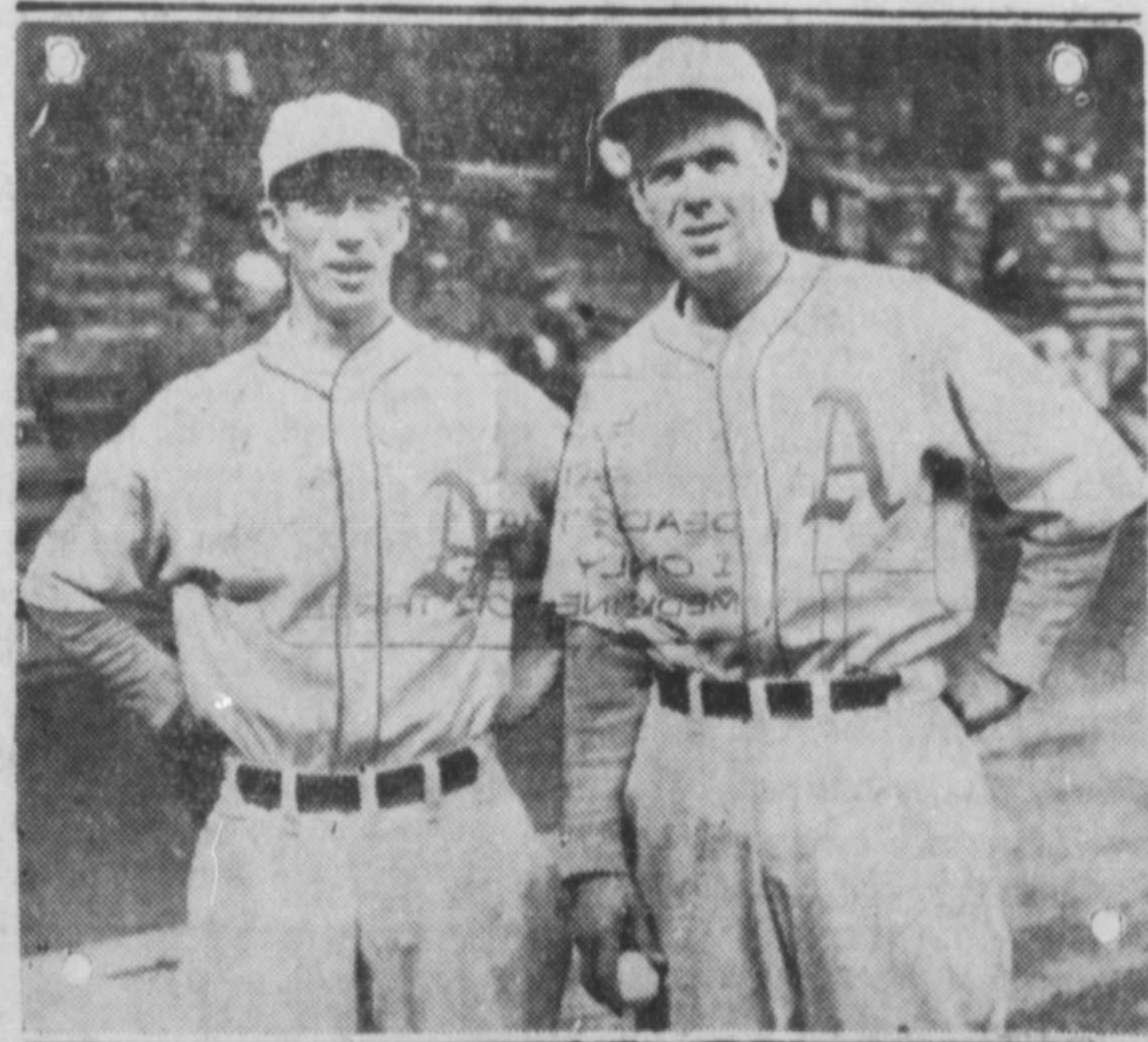
High School, having not lost a game as yet, has a substantial lead in the first half standing which will not be affected by the two remaining games.

### Wants To Sell His Waterfront

Mizak Aivazoff Asks City of Vancouver For \$34,000 For Property

Mizak Aivazoff, formerly of this city, is endeavoring to sell to the city of Vancouver for park purposes 330 feet of waterfront property just east of Bute Street which he purchased in 1925 as a site for coal bunkers which development was prohibited by subsequent city zoning regulations. Mr. Aivazoff is offering the property to the city of Vancouver for \$34,000 which, he says, represents the price he paid for it plus interest.

### Was Buried In Load of Lumber

STEWART, Oct. 27.—While proceeding to American Creek with a load of lumber weighing about one and one-half tons, a truck owned by A. B. Armstrong left the grade and turned over. Tim Williams, who was sitting on the load, was buried under the lumber but was found uninjured when it was removed. The truck itself was undamaged, was soon righted, and is again in service.

### Bring Home Superb Heads



The hunting season is in full swing in the Province of Quebec. In the middle of October a party of three Nimrods left the Gray Rocks Inn, St. Jovite, Que., and took a hydroplane trip into the north to investigate moose hunting prospects. They got a big surprise and one of the highlight moments of their careers as hunters of big game. One of the party bagged a moose with the magnificent spread of 66 1/2 inches; another of them shot a 60 1/2 inch head and the third also got a trophy which though smaller than either of the other two, would have ranked high in any average moose hunt. They report that the section is unusually well stocked with the big animals. The object of the party was to get quickly into the north to spy out the land and come back later for the real hunting with all its pleasurable hardships of portaging, camping out, canoeing one's way through unknown or almost unknown territory and ending up by pitting one's brains and experience against the instinct, sagacity and wariness of the moose. They have returned to tell us of a Mecca for hunters of moose in the North. ### AUTO CRASH AT STEWART

Stage and Roadster Collided and Latter Was Badly Damaged

STEWART, Oct. 27.—A light roadster owned by the Crawford Transfer Co., and driven by W. Eselmont, crashed last Saturday with one of the heavy passenger cars owned by the Salmon River Stage Lines as both cars were rounding one of the bad corners on the Stewart-Hyder road. There was a light fall of snow on the ground which made driving difficult, and though both cars were driving slowly yet the roadster was badly damaged. None of the passengers were hurt.

Arising out of the accident, Leo Auger, driver of the stage, was fined \$15 and costs for being without a chauffeur's licence, and F. Jeppi, proprietor of the stage line, was charged with allowing Auger to drive the car without a licence. The latter case was dismissed on the defendant's plea that Auger was

hired only for operation in Alaskan territory and came over the line without defendant's knowledge.

### PEACE GRAIN YIELD GOOD

Eight Elevators Being Built and Will Aid Much in Handling Crop

ROLLA, Oct. 27.—Threshing machines are humming merrily throughout the Peace River country.

The yield of grain is a good average this year, and in a number of cases wheat has run as high as 60 bushels per acre. While this is short of record yields, it is an indication of a good crop. Oats are reaching the 100-bushels-per-acre mark.

At harvest time wheat appeared to have the record beaten for quality, although oats were not quite up to the standard of some former years. With the continued bad weather wheat has fallen off in grade in most cases and oats have

been bleached in the stock. Eight elevators, now under construction in the block, will provide better facilities for handling the crop. They will effect a saving of miles truckhaul and transfer to the railroad.

Tom Hanson, sentenced here recently to three months' imprisonment without option of fine, is being taken to Okalla prison on the Prince Rupert last night by Constable Andrew Grant.

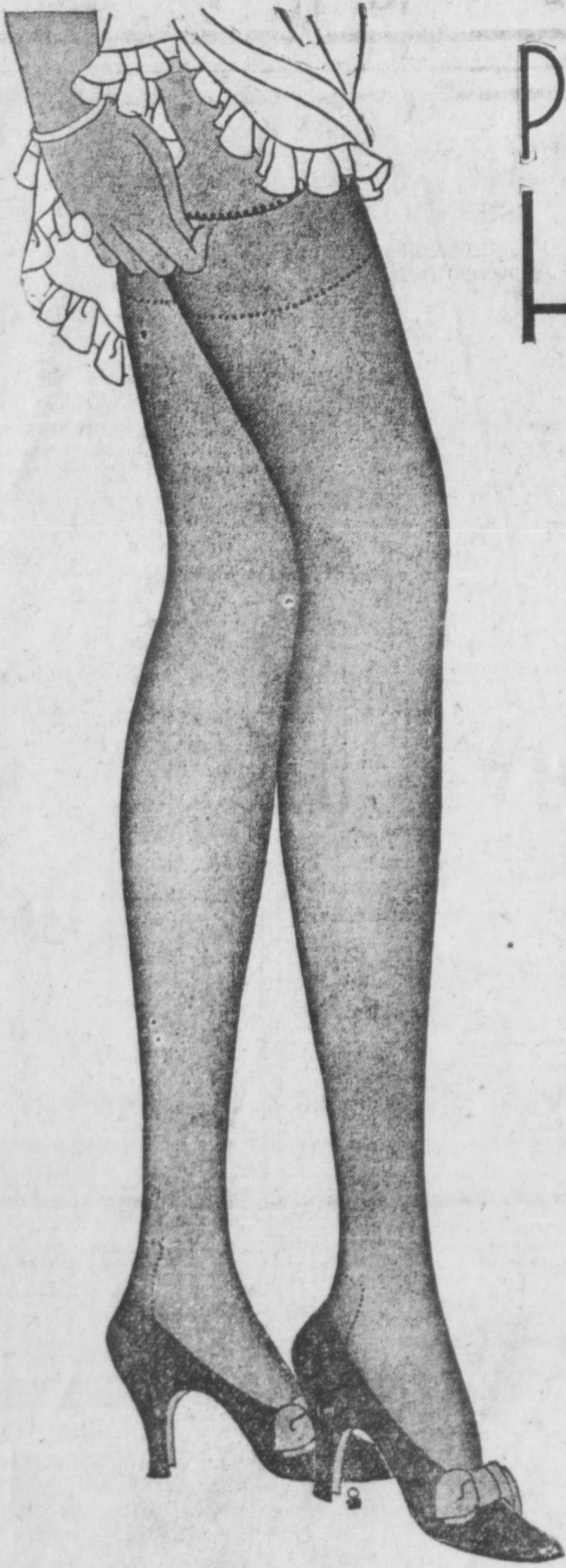
