Washington is Hopeful of Settlement in Coal Strike

Break in Union Ranks at West Virginia and Colorado; Opinion Expressed That Men Should Have Been Consulted Before Strike Called.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
WASHINGTON, November 4.—Official Washington is firm in the belief that the end of the coal strike is near. There is nothing definite or tangible in the way of actual developments to justify the hope, but everywhere the feeling prevails that influences are being brought to bear to have the strikers, numbering 400,000, return to work.
 Confidential reports to the Department of Justice from the coal fields are said to show many defections from the ranks of the strikers. Scattered reports from the coal fields of 28 states showed the first breaks in the ranks of organized labor in West Virginia and Colorado.
 Advices to the Washington headquarters of the operators said non-union mines were working to capacity and turning out considerably more coal than on Saturday. Some of the operators' reports said that the union men had gone to work in non-union mines and that there was a growing sentiment that the men themselves should have had the right to vote on the strike before it was called.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—(Noon). The Government officials are very hopeful that the injunction issued out of the Federal court at Indianapolis which will shut off strike funds from the strikers will operate in bringing the present coal strike to a speedy conclusion before its effects are too far-reaching and damaging.

D. PATTULLO PRESSING FOR GROUNDHOG LINE

Gone to Ottawa to Take up Matter With Dominion Government.
 (Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
VICTORIA, Nov. 4.—Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, left for Ottawa to press on the Dominion Government the desirability of constructing a branch of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway into the Groundhog coal area near the headquarters of the Naas River. The proposed line would run north from Hazelton.
 Mr. Pattullo will also try to settle the Indian lands question in a view to securing for cultivation many tracts of the best now held by the Indians in the north in a wild state.

LABOR MEN ASK CITY FOR AN AMBULANCE

Matter Already Had Been Considered by Hospital Association.
 A letter was read from the Trades and Labor Council at last night's City Council meeting regarding a city ambulance. The council's decision was wholly inadequate. The doctors refused to attend patients with broken limbs in it. Also infectious cases were not allowed in public taxis. The Trades and Labor Council expressed its willingness to cooperate in any way with the city in procuring a suitable vehicle might be obtained.
 It was reported by Ald. McRae that the Hospital Association had been looking into the matter and had written for estimates and reports but as yet had received no reply.

In this connection Ald. Casey mentioned that he thought that in the near future the health department would make a report in which he would recommend, besides a new ambulance and other things, a new isolation hospital. The present one was neither large enough for an emergency nor was it in the right location. The mayor mentioned that although the Carpenters' Union Hall had been put up for use as an isolation hospital for the scarlet fever patients, the outbreak was now in control and the hall would not be needed.

EXCHANGE WITH ASIA CHANGES

Silver Now at High Price and Purchasing Power Correspondingly Great.

The mysteries of exchange were explained to the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon by Moreton Frewen in connection with an address on Prince Rupert. There had been a revolution in the value of silver in Asia. In four years the value of the metal had gone up from 23 pence to 60 pence and the change was causing a revolution in trade. The coolie coming to this country formerly paid 800 taels for the \$500 head tax. Now he could liquidate this debt with 300 taels.
 The Chinaman came here to save his wages and send it home to China. After he had earned \$500 he sent it home and got 800 taels for it. Now he got only 300 taels and thought he was being swindled by the bankers.
 In matters of trade the change in value was an aid to us. If an order was sent from China for 8,000 taels worth he was sent lumber valued at \$14,000. This difference in value tended to encourage exports from this coast. It was difficult to overstate its importance to this port. If it continued it should make the export trade immense. Ships would tend to go out full and return empty, whereas they had formerly gone out light and returned full. A ship built here for a quarter of a million dollars could be sold in China for a third of what the price would formerly have been.

FOUR JAPANESE ARE MURDERED

Woman and Three Sons Found Dead in Bed With Their Throats Cut.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 4.—The wife and three sons aged seven and five years and eight months respectively, of Buta Sakata, a Japanese, were found dead in their beds with their throats cut. Buta Sakata is in jail charged with the murder and it is alleged by the police that he has confessed.

Grand Trunk Third Reading Wednesday

Bill will then go to the Senate; Large Supplementary Estimates Tabled by Government to Provide for Soldiers.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, November 4.—The House of Commons did not give the third reading to the grand Trunk Bill last night and it cannot now reach the Senate before Wednesday.
 It developed that on Friday a tentative agreement had been made that the vote would not be taken until Tuesday in order to allow all members going home for the week-end to be back.
 Failure of the Grand Trunk Bill to receive its third reading last night makes it certain that prorogation cannot be reached until next week. The tabling of the estimates is another obstacle in the way of early prorogation.
 Supplementary estimates for the current fiscal year have been tabled to the amount of \$62,346,000. Of this, forty millions are to carry out the recommendations of the report of the committee on soldiers' civil re-establishment is the biggest vote submitted to the House, while twenty millions is provided for advances to settle soldiers upon land and the cost of administering the Soldiers' Settlement Act.
 Hon. Martin Burrell, Secretary of State, tabled the report of the Royal Commission which inquired into the Guelph Novitiate charge. The report exonerates Hon. C. J. Doherty, Minister of Justice, and Major General Mewburn, Minister of Militia, and declares that "upon the evidence before us we think that the conduct of this raid was open to all the adverse criticism found in the memorandum of the Adjutant General." The charges made by Sir Sam Hughes are also declared to be unfounded.
 None of the by-election writs have yet been received at the capital and it will not be possible for the new members to take their seats before Wednesday.
 The attention of the Government was drawn to the acute sugar shortage in the West. Sir George Foster replied that at present there was an embargo against the export of sugar. He understood that raw sugar was now coming into Vancouver and the refineries would doubtless be in a position before long to relieve the shortage.

COMMITTED TO HIGHER COURT

Chinaman Accused of Obtaining Money Under False Pretenses From Grocers.

In the police court this morning Mah Kee was given a preliminary hearing on the charge of having obtained money by false pretenses. It is alleged that he falsely endorsed a check made out by Kim Mah. There is no account in the bank for Kim Mah and none of the parties are known by the bank officials.
 Mah Kee took the check to the store of a Japanese, T. Nakana, who, in partnership with Wati, runs the N. and W. Grocery on Fulton St. He made some small purchases and offered the check in payment. It was accepted, but on taking it to the bank, Wati, one of the partners, was unable to get it cashed, there being no account.
 The matter was then reported to the police who took it up and Mah Kee was arrested. The evidence was heard by Magistrate McMorde and he was committed for trial. He will probably come before the county court judge tomorrow.

LARGER GRANT FOR HOSPITAL

Report of Finance Committee Recommended Increase to 70c per capita.

A report from the Finance Committee in regard to the Hospital Grant was read at last night's council meeting. In this report the Finance Committee recommended that a grant of 70c per patient per day be paid instead of the \$5,000 per annum which was the present grant. It would mean a grant of \$7,700 yearly and would be a great assistance to the hospital finances. The grant to the hospital was really a means of caring for indigents that were public charges anyway.
 It was resolved unanimously that the present council go on record as being in favor of the 70c per day grant. It was pointed out that in the city of Vancouver the General Hospital received a grant of 60c.

Rupert Should be Great Grain Port

That is Opinion of Moreton Frewen Expressed at Board of Trade Meeting Yesterday Afternoon.

"Prince Rupert should become a great, if not the greatest, grain port in the world," said Moreton Frewen in an address to the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon. "By all means you should try to get wheat shipped from here. It has been shipped successfully from Vancouver and this is the natural port for the business. I see an immense future to the place in the next five years, that will be ample compensation for the disappointments of the last five years."
 Mr. Frewen told of a visit he made to the coast in 1883, when Victoria was a little "Sleepy Hollow" with pheasants walking in the streets, Seattle had a population of 6,000, smaller than Prince Rupert of today, and there was not a tree cut where Vancouver now stands. He came to Vancouver again in 1906 with Charles Rivers Wilson and Charles Hays, and Mr. Hays told him of the future of Prince Rupert. "People sometimes wonder if he was wrong in his judgment," said the speaker.
 "Carry Out Pledges."
 Mr. Frewen then outlined the arguments. What are the prospects? he inquired. Mr. Hays was a good railway man and he said that the Yellowhead Pass was the key to the Northwest freight situation. Owing to the nearness to the Orient and the higher speeds that might be made on the good gradient, Hong Kong was brought four days nearer London by this route than by any other. Unfortunately like other roads the G. T. P. had found itself in financial difficulties and was unable to fulfill the promises that had been made. Now instead of an insolvent corporation, the port had behind it a sound, solid government and that government was in honor bound to carry out the pledges made to the purchasers at the time the townsite lots were sold.
 The speaker recounted J. J. Hill's opinion of the railway and port and then told of the intention of Hargiman, the greatest railwayman of the age, to come to Prince Rupert. He sent Dr. Farquharson to go over the road and if possible to secure running rights or to acquire a controlling interest in it. Had he lived he would have made an attempt to link his railways up with the G. T. P. From this they would see that if they had erred in their judgment of this place, they were in good company. "The American trade with the Orient must flow through this port."
 Mr. Frewen spoke of the vast resources and of the future growth of the town. He referred to the value of the fisheries and of the great value of the silver mines of the district which were just being opened up.
 Mentioning the almost untapped resources of the ocean, the speaker said that in England each person consumed less than an ounce of fish a day and ten ounces of meat. This should be changed so that every man should use four ounces of meat only and up to seven or eight ounces of fish. Sir James Creighton Browne in his fight against tuberculosis had advocated the use of more fish. He was going to ask the Government to put a cold storage plant into every village. Labor applied to the ocean brought much more wealth than the same applied to the land.
 Mr. Frewen said that the position of this town was unassailable. He mentioned the experiences of the C. P. R. The port here needed an ocean-going wharf and, given that, undoubtedly ships would gather here like vultures.

Subscribes Over Seven Million Dollars—Good Showing Throughout the Dominion.

TORONTO, Nov. 4.—Up till last evening the total subscriptions to the 1919 Victory Loan amounted to \$164,584,650, as against \$175,379,700 for the same period last year. Yesterday was a bad day but it is hoped that with a number of new communities just getting to work that the average will pick up in a day or so.
VANCOUVER, Nov. 4.—The Prince of Wales Honor Flag has been presented to the city of Vancouver by Sir Henry Drayton. Vancouver has made a wonderful showing in exceeding her quota already. Her quota for the present loan campaign was \$7,000,000 and \$7,710,000 is already subscribed.

Great Danger From Cheap Competition.

One of the serious and pressing questions of the day is whether the countries like Japan and China, where wages are low, will be able to capture the manufacturing business of the world and especially of those countries where wages have soared inordinately. Authorities are not agreed on the subject. Germany on account of her efficiency has in the past been able to dominate the manufacturing of the world.

Opinions are widely at variance as to Germany's ability, immediately, or in the near future, to engage largely in export trade. The Canadian Acting Trade Commissioner in London, England, states that firms engaged there in the trade in boot and shoe lasts reported that Germany is ready to recommence export trade in that line and that, aided by the present abnormal rate of exchange lots of lasts have been offered at prices as low as, if not lower than, costs of production in the United Kingdom.

Germany and Toy Trade.

The British Toy Manufacturers' Association also recently sent a deputation to the president of the British Board of Trade, asking for protection against the low rate of German exchange, which offers an important encouragement to German export business. The president of the Board of Trade in his reply said that Germany had only small stocks of goods accumulated for export; there was no great manufacturing activity at the present time; costs of production were enormous, and Germany could not compete even with British manufacturers for a long time.

The British Government has reserved power to stop all or any imports into the United Kingdom from a country from which such imports are made possible and overwhelming by the state of the exchange.

Speaking optimistically on the prospects of British trade, Sir Auckland Geddes has declared that Germany cannot hope to rank among the great manufacturing nations of the world for months, and perhaps for years to come. He also contended that owing to the high cost of living and increasing costs of production, Japan will not be able to compete successfully with Great Britain in those superior articles of manufacture which have given British products such an international reputation.

Japan Captured Trade of India.

It is a striking fact, however, that the value of Japanese imports into India have tremendously increased until today they represent practically one-fifth of India's import trade. The official figures for 1918-19 show Japanese imports into that country of \$111,666,665, as compared to \$61,666,665 in 1917-18, and \$44,166,665 in 1916-17.

Now that there are rather serious labor disturbances both in Great Britain and the United States a good many manufacturers are looking to China and Japan as likely fields for endeavor. Now come from the Orient and, the business is developing at a rapid rate. Every raise in wages here gives Japan an advantage so that she can flood this market in spite of the duty.

Just what the outcome will be no one seems to know. Unless the labor leaders of Europe and on this continent can raise the Japanese working people to the desirability of charging the same price for their labor that is being charged on this continent, it seems inevitable that much of the business must eventually cross the Pacific.

CITY WILL BE GIVEN CHOICE SCHOOL SITE

Plebiscite to be Taken When By-law is Re-submitted to the People.

Owing to the technical difficulty in connection with the advertising of the school bylaw mentioned in this paper a short time ago the people will have another opportunity of expressing an opinion on the matter. The bylaw will be resubmitted and in addition there will be a plebiscite on the matter of sites. The people will be asked to express their preference for either the Hays Cove Circle or the Acropolis Hill site.

Some people voted against the bylaw on a previous occasion simply because they said they were opposed to the site. There will be no such excuse in future.

CITY COUNCIL AND SEWERS

New System Advocated by Mayor and Engineer Asked for Report.

The sewer question came in for a good deal of discussion at last night's council meeting. The matter arose from the reading of a letter from David H. Hays, in which he stated that the matter was really serious and that the city had been criminally negligent in not having it repaired. The condition of the Second Avenue sewer had been known for a long time and it was a risk to the health of people in the neighborhood. Some of Mr. Hays' tenants had threatened to leave his building if something was not done and he had decided to hold the city liable for any loss he might sustain through this condition.

The city engineer, who was present, was asked to report on the matter. He said that the board of works knew of the condition some time ago and it had been discussed with a view to remedying it. There was a lot of water in the manhole at Mr. Hays' corner but there was no movement so it was judged that the sewer must be blocked somewhere. With a view to finding this block a tunnel had been driven through the retaining wall below the manhole and the city workmen were at present tracing the sewer pipes and hoped to locate the trouble and have it remedied in the course of a day or so. In the meantime the department was doing its best.

Found Boulders.

On inquiry being made if anything had been found so far which might have blocked the sewer, Mr. Clements replied that already 12 boulders and a chunk of wood had been taken out. There was no account of how they would get in the sewer. Ald. Perry asked if the sewers were ever flushed and the mayor replied that this was not now necessary, the rainfall being considered sufficient flush. Ald. Perry asked that some disinfectant be put around the Hays Block as his offices were there and he knew the situation. He had even considered moving his own offices from there.

New System.

The mayor stated that the only cure for a lot of the present sewer troubles in the city would be the installation of a new and heavier trunk system. It would cost money, but it was necessary and had to be done some time. It was not an expenditure that could be avoided. Ald. Casey felt that it would be a wise thing to have the city engineer make a report on plans for a new sewer system so the matter could be considered and steps be taken in some such direction.

PRINCE GEORGE

The Fraser River is beginning to freeze over and last Saturday the steamer B. C. Express made her last trip of the season. She took 90 tons of freight for Quesnel. After she has made this trip an effort will be made to pull the "B. X." off the bar which she struck some weeks ago. If the operations for pulling her off are successful the damage will be repaired this winter so that she will be ready for operation next spring when the river opens again.

The two main recommendations of the Grand Jury at the recent Assizes held at Prince George were better jail accommodation and suppression of the gambling evil.

Mr. Justice Clement in a hearing in chambers at the recent Assizes held that the recent tax sale, over which there had been some dissatisfaction was conducted legally and properly.

The water tower which forms the source of water supply for South Fort George was completely destroyed by fire last Friday. It is planned to replace the old tower with a steel and concrete reservoir.

The weather has been exceptionally cold here the last week. A fall of some inches of snow has made good sleigh riding. Owing to trouble with the heating systems in the schools the children have had a holiday all week. It is predicted that this winter will be one of the most severe in the history of Prince George.

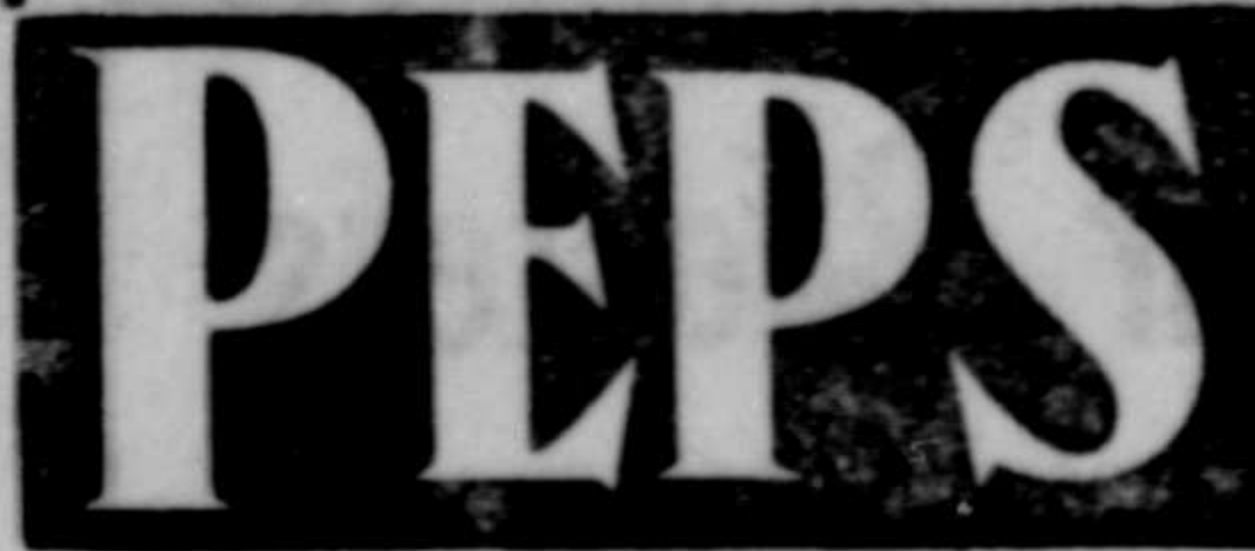

FISH WHARVES ON SECTION TWO

Minister of Lands Reports Application Having Been Made for Foreshore Rights.

At last night's council meeting a letter was read from T. D. Pattullo, Provincial Minister of Lands, in which it was stated that an application had been made to that department by some party or parties for a waterfront site for fishing purposes. As the department had understood that it was the intention to centralize, as far as possible, the fishing waterfront about Seal Cove, the Department had decided to seek the advice of the city in the matter.

The mayor did not favor Section 2 as a place for fish wharves, etc. In the first place it was originally intended for ocean docks and was suitable for such and it was too open for fish wharves, in his opinion. Ald. McRae was of the opinion that the fishing industry should be centralized and not scattered all over the waterfront. Ald. Rochester pointed out that from a standpoint of the fish wharves being an annoyance to the residential section, they could be no more annoyance than the garbage scow is, which is at present located there.

Ald. Casey moved and Ald. McRae seconded that the letter be referred to the Fisheries Committee, of which Ald. McMeekin is the chairman. This resolution was carried.

In the Letter Box

NATIONAL CAMPAIGN

To the Editor:—
Canada entered the war to help defend Christian principles. Canada had a pronounced distaste for the theory that might is right. Canada despised cruelty and the disturbed savagery of armed men. Five years of conflict proved that sacrifice brought comfort, that duty done brought happiness. "The happy warrior," was the man who had served his comrades gallantly and well. It has been the world too long to realize the solid truth of the saying that he who loses his life shall find it, that the man who helps others best helps himself.

"Life" of New York is a gay and spirited periodical, not specially "religious," not usually given support of "uplifters," but always virile and honest, and generally reflecting the view of the sophisticated man of the world. Recently it said, "Happiness is a state of mind, and though high wages and dividends, and food and raiment, and shelter, and hot and cold water, and electric light, and satisfactory transportation contribute to produce it, they by no means do the whole job. After we have arranged to be fed, clothed, and all that, we still have to be good, and more than that, to be good to other people, or we won't enjoy even this life."

Is not that exactly the principle taught by the Christian Church? For nearly two thousand years, the eminent folk in the world's history have believed and lived out the Gospel of Jesus. They learned the rudiments of living in the four Gospels. But the crowd generally "looked out for number one." The memory of selfishness has perished from the earth. Their lives were miserable. They refused to learn that a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things he possesseth.

Even today, despite the proofs of the philosophy, which are innumerable, despite the proved emptiness and futility of self-indulgence, and the life of mere pleasure, men hesitate to take the only road to happiness. Surely we shall not forget one of the great lessons of the war.

The leaders in the churches are determined to press home to every Canadian mind the Gospel of the Nazarene, as a means of

personal happiness, as the only method of securing national progress and prosperity. Five denominations, Anglican, Baptist, Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian, are co-operating in a united national campaign. They ask members of the several communions to awaken to their responsibilities as professedly Christian people. They challenge every non-member to a consideration of the gospel they present, and to a decision that it is fundamental to all patriotism and all national prosperity. Who will deny it?
