Brilliant Address To People of Canada Given by General Smuts at Ottawa Last Evening

OTTAWA, Jan. 3.—To the people of Canada, Gen. Jan Smuts, former premier of South Africa, speaking here last night, brought a message of unity, liberty and nationhood which had been achieved by the Dominion of the British Empire. There was another task, however, which remained to be undertaken, he declared. That task was to give form and substance to the unity in that great group which was known as the British commonwealth of nations.





Feminism Is New Problem In Old Quebec



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


