The British Columbia Library Commission is to ask the provincial government for approval to operate a library service along the line of the Canadian National Railways out of Prince George. Arrangements are being made to use a Canadian National car for this travelling library service through the central interior.

Whalen Receiver Wins Judgment

Awarded \$1745 Against J. H. Palmer of Swanson Bay Who Is Given Counter-Claim of \$394

Concluding trial in Supreme Court in Vancouver, Mr. Justice Murphy awarded E. M. Mills, suing as receiver and manager of Whalen Pulp & Paper Mills Ltd., judgment for \$1745 against J. H. Palmer, Swanson Bay. The award was money which had been paid by the plaintiff five years ago to workmen employed by Palmer in stevedoring at Swanson Bay. The defendant succeeded in establishing a counter-claim for \$394 in respect of his services.

Angus Macdonald, Barrister Of Halifax, Chosen Leader Of Liberals In Nova Scotia

Gathering Last Night Marked New Departure In Maritime Politics, Being First Time Chief Was Ever Elected By Open Grit Convention

HALIFAX, Oct. 2.—Angus L. Macdonald, Halifax barrister, was chosen leader of the Nova Scotia Liberal party in open convention here last night. He succeeds Hon. William Chisholm, who asked, on account of ill health, to be relieved of the leadership. It was the first time in the history of Nova Scotia that the Liberal party met in convention to choose a leader.

VICTORIA, Oct. 2.—Ten thousand dollars damage was done yesterday by fire which gutted the jam factory of the Holsum Packing Co. Ltd. at Lake Hill near here.

Council Takes Middle Course On Tax Penalty

Mayor Instructed to Support Reduction of Fifteen Per Cent But Not Low As Five

The city council, at a special session last night, reconsidered its action in regard to the fifteen per cent penalty for non-payment of taxes and, while also rejecting the extreme resolution sent to it from Nanaimo, instructed Mayor Orme to stand for a middle course at the Penitentiary convention of the Union of Municipalities.

City Treasurer Matheson explained to the council some of the hardships that had recently come about through the high cost of redeeming property after tax sale, showing that, in some cases, the cost was so high that it prevented the owners paying up and getting their property back.

There was a general discussion lasting for about an hour during which the matter was pretty well threshed out, all the aldermen taking part, at the conclusion of which it was mutually agreed to stand for a middle course and also to ask for the elimination of the five dollar registration fee as another step toward inducing people to hold on to their property.

Mayor Orme presided and there were present Aldermen Brown, Pillsbury, Ruederham, Black, Pullen, Macdonald and Linzey.

"As a partner in the Confederation of Canada, British Columbia emphatically protests against any action by the Imperial Conference affecting Canadian constitutional matters until the provinces have had the opportunity of meeting and discussing the whole question."

Philadelphia Athletics Pound Six to One Decision Out of St. Louis Cards to Win Second Game

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 2.—The world champion Philadelphia Athletics steam rolled the St. Louis Cardinals today with a heavy hitting attack and finished up with a score of six to one and two games to the good in the series. Each team scored one home run. George Earnshaw, the big right-hander, held the Cards to six hits and fanned eight batters before another capacity crowd of 32,295 fans

FIRE LOSS WAS HEAVY

Sawmill Fire Tuesday Brought Destruction For September Up to High Mark

During the month of September, the local fire department responded to eight alarms. Damage was rather higher than usual owing to the sawmill fire Tuesday morning. The total damage for the month is estimated at \$20,000. The fires in which damage was done were as follows: Sunrise Grocery, \$400 (estimated); Thomas Ballinger's woodshed, \$100 (estimated); Home Oil office, \$100 (estimated); Big Bay Lumber Co.'s sawmill, \$20,000.

In the same month last year there were four alarms and damage amounted to \$133.

The Masonic Hall fire in January when \$10,300 damage was done and the Big Bay Lumber blaze last month when the loss was valued at \$20,000 has brought the fire loss in Prince Rupert for the present year to date up to a figure far in excess of any recent year.

So far the fire loss in Prince Rupert this year is estimated at \$31,187 as compared with but \$1,793 in the same period of 1929. So far this year there have been 62 alarms turned in as against 39 in the same period last year.

Minister's Statement Regarding Secession Meets With Protest

"Britain Is No Longer Alone Mistress of Our Destiny," Says Wartime Premier—Right Is Unsound Says Former Finance Minister

SYDNEY, Australia, Oct. 2.—"The suggestion that Britain by herself can dissolve the Empire without consulting us is monstrous," declared Rt. Hon. W. M. Hughes, wartime Premier of Australia, in addressing university students here. He was referring apparently to a statement said to have been made by Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas, Lord Privy Seal, to newspapermen

that "nobody questions the right of a Dominion to secede." Mr. Hughes protested against Britain "attempting to grant the right to secede or anybody proclaiming the right to secede from the Empire without consulting Canada, Australia, and other parts of the Empire."

"It is time Britain realizes that she is no longer alone the mistress of our destiny," said Mr. Hughes, "and if General Hertzog, the South African Prime Minister, thinks he can be within the British Empire and simultaneously outside of it, it is time some one told him the facts."

TORONTO, Oct. 2.—Hon. Sir Thomas White, former Canadian minister of finance, in a letter appearing in the Toronto Mail and Empire, expresses the opinion that the statement attributed to Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas that "nobody questions in the least the right to secede" is quite unsound. Mr. White argues that the expression "right to secede" must mean a constitutional right. The written law of Canadian constitution and the fundamental law of Canada, he said, contains no suggestion, much less an enactment of right to secede.

ELEVEN MORE WOMEN TODAY

Systematic Raid on Comox Avenue Is Being Continued By City Police

Eleven more women appeared before Magistrate McClymont in city police court this morning and were fined in connection with the operation of disorderly houses on Comox Avenue.

For being keepers, Emily Lawrence, Muriel Lee, Myrtle Gilroy, Jeanette Dubray, Betty Shannon, Clara Perrin, Melvin Polk and Agnes Catlett were each fined \$50, with 30 days' option.

For being inmates, Bertha Jousseau, Jean Anderson and Joyce McDonald were each fined \$25, with option of 15 days.

The fines in each case were paid.

HAMILTON IS WINNER

Eastern Tigers Took Calgary Name-sakes Into Camp Yesterday Thirty-Seven to Eight

CALGARY, Oct. 2.—Continuing their victorious tour of Canada, the Hamilton Tigers yesterday defeated the Calgary Tigers 37 to 8 at rugby.

Miss Beryl Agnes Hillis, eldest sister of Mrs. J. T. Steele of Giscome, died last week in Tranquille Sanitarium at the age of 30 years.

NORTHCOTT IS HANGED

Collapsed as He Entered the Death Room and Had to Be Blindfolded Before Mounting Gallows

SAN QUENTIN, Calif., Oct. 2.—Gordon Stewart Northcott, aged 23, convicted of murdering three boys on a chicken ranch near Wineville, Calif., was hanged at the state prison here today.

As Northcott was led into the deathroom he collapsed and had to be supported by guards and was then blindfolded. It being the first time that this had to be done to a prisoner in the history of the prison. He kept up a continual mumble as he mounted the steps to the gallows where the noose was placed around his neck and the trap released which shot him into eternity.

GOOD FAITH IS QUESTION

Watt Inquiry Further Adjourned Until October 16 to Let Manson Get to Victoria

VICTORIA, Oct. 2.—The real point in the inquiry into the dismissal of Norman A. Watt as government agent at Prince Rupert was whether he acted in good faith in retaining coroner's fees rather than what the practice of others in similar positions, Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald intimated this morning when the inquiry adjourned from Prince Rupert reopened at the Court House here.

C. H. Locke K.C., crown counsel, sought to bring further evidence on the matter of the coroner's fees before the inquiry and asked for adjournment until October 16 in order that A. M. Manson K.C., counsel for Watt, might be able to reach here from Prince Rupert.

The adjournment was granted but the commissioner stated he would make no ruling as to whether the proposed new evidence should be received or considered.

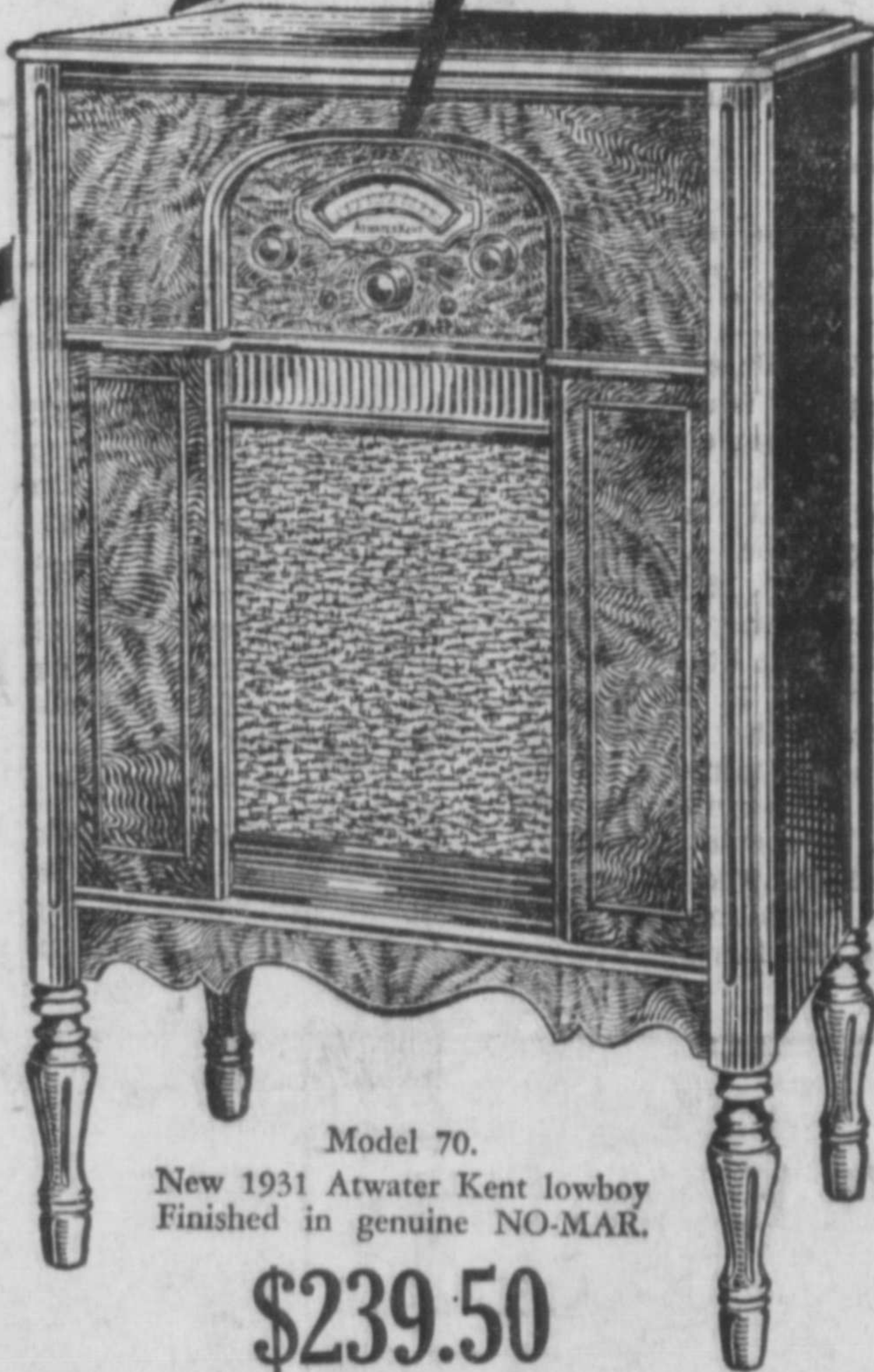

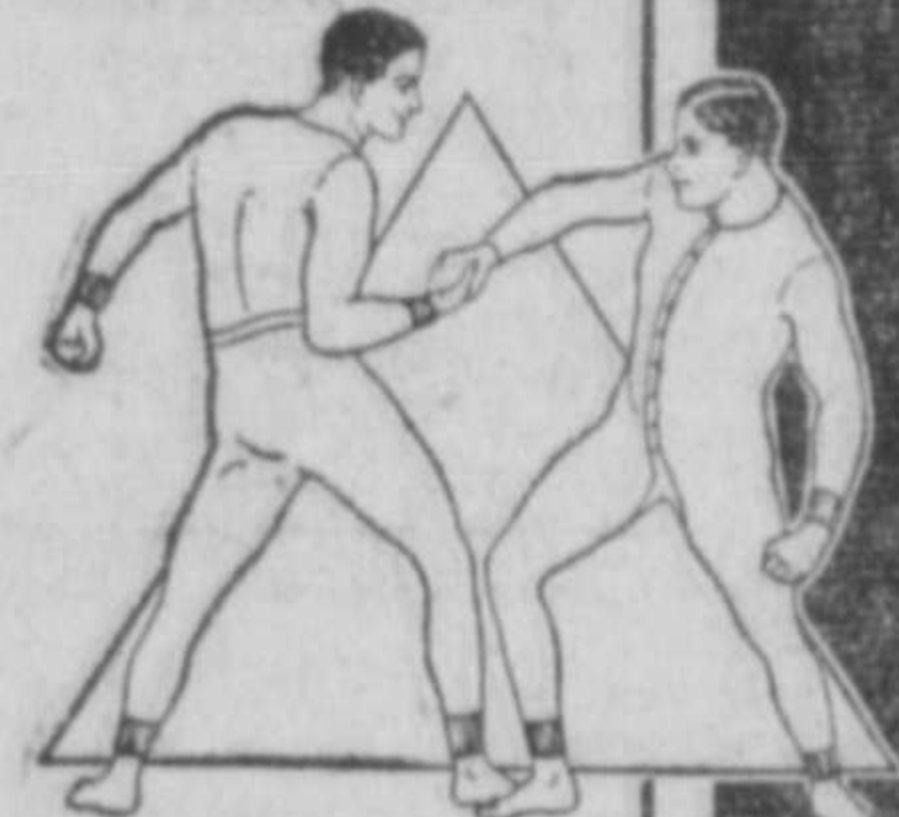
