WILL SURVEY FISHERIES OF CANADA

RENAHAN SEARCH CONTINUES BUT WITHOUT SUCCESS

Dominion Minister Resolved To Induce Canadians To Eat More Fish Than At Present

Has Engaged Large Montreal Company to Go Into Matter—Thinks Per Capita Consumption Should Be Ten Pounds More

OTTAWA, Nov. 8.—Canadians can be induced to eat more fish and Hon. E. N. Rhodes, minister of fisheries, proposes to find out how it can be done.

POOL HAS DEBT PLAN

Approves Suggestion That It Make Annual Payments to Meet 1929 Crop Indebtedness

WINNIPEG, Nov. 8.—The Manitoba Wheat Pool, admittedly the loser on 1929 crop transactions, has evolved a way of paying its indebtedness to lending banks.

WILL BUILD SNAG BOAT

Prince Rupert Dry Dock Receives Contract for Construction of Government Vessel

Announcement was officially made today that the Prince Rupert dry dock has been awarded the contract to build a new stern-wheeler river boat to replace the Bobolink which has been condemned.

The new boat will be of wooden construction. Work will commence on it at once and the job will take about four months to complete.

STATEMENT IS DENIED

Premier Bennett Explains That He Did Not Charge Lancashire Mills As Sweatshops

LONDON, Nov. 8.—Returning to London yesterday from Sheffield where the freedom of the city was conferred upon him, Premier Bennett of Canada denied having charged Lancashire with sweated labor.

What he had done, Mr. Bennett explained, was to compare the costs of production of cotton in Canada with production costs in England. He had made no accusation of sweated conditions, he said.

Mr. Rhodes said that, according to the best statistics available, per capita consumption of fish in Canada was 22 pounds per year. An increase of 10 pounds per year per head would make Canadian consumption even then only three-quarters of that in Britain.

According to the proposal, \$890,000 will be paid next August 1 and \$905,000 each August 1 thereafter until the indebtedness is repaid.

FEARS FOR THE HOTEL

The president of the Chamber of Commerce at the monthly meeting of the organization expressed the opinion that it looked as if the hotel were being shelved. This followed the reading of a non-committal letter from Sir Henry Thornton in regard to it in which he said that the work could not be done as an unemployment relief measure.

Olof Hanson M.P., said they had been directly promised that the hotel would be built this year and this had been confirmed by Mayor Orme and J. C. Brady.

Alderman Collart said he had a wire from Mr. Warren during the time he was acting mayor recently, in which the general manager said it was only a question of site. He thought a strong protest should be sent to Sir Henry against the delay.

H. F. Pullen said there were two possible reasons for the present changed attitude. One was that in view of the recent election, Sir Henry Thornton thought it the right thing to first consult parliament in regard to the work here and the other was that the new government was influencing the stopping of the work because the people of the district had elected the wrong member.

It was decided to again write to Sir Henry and to send a copy of the letter to Colonel Ham, asking that the work proceed.

CANADIAN PLANES ORDERED TO HUNT FOR PAT RENAHAN

OTTAWA, Nov. 8.—Two government seaplanes from Jericho Beach, now doing photographic work on Vancouver Island, were ordered today by the Department of National Defence to assist in the quest for Pilot Renahan of the Alaska-Washington Airways and companions who are lost between Butedale and Prince Rupert. The planes will proceed to Prince Rupert at the earliest possible moment, today, if weather permits.

PREFERENCE FOR SALMON

Premier Tolmie Urges That B.C. Product Be Included Under Proposed Quota

VICTORIA, Nov. 8.—Action to secure for the British Columbia fisheries consideration in the Empire purchase quota plan before Imperial Conference at London concludes was taken by Premier Tolmie last night in a cable to Hon. H. H. Stevens, minister of trade and commerce, who is in London. The cable in part said: "Press reports indicate the exclusion of canned salmon from the proposed quota scheme on ground of impracticability due to scattered sources of supply. This, as you know, is incorrect as canned salmon produced within the Empire is only in this province. Personally, I see no reason whatever, if the quota scheme is to be adopted, why it should not apply to our salmon."

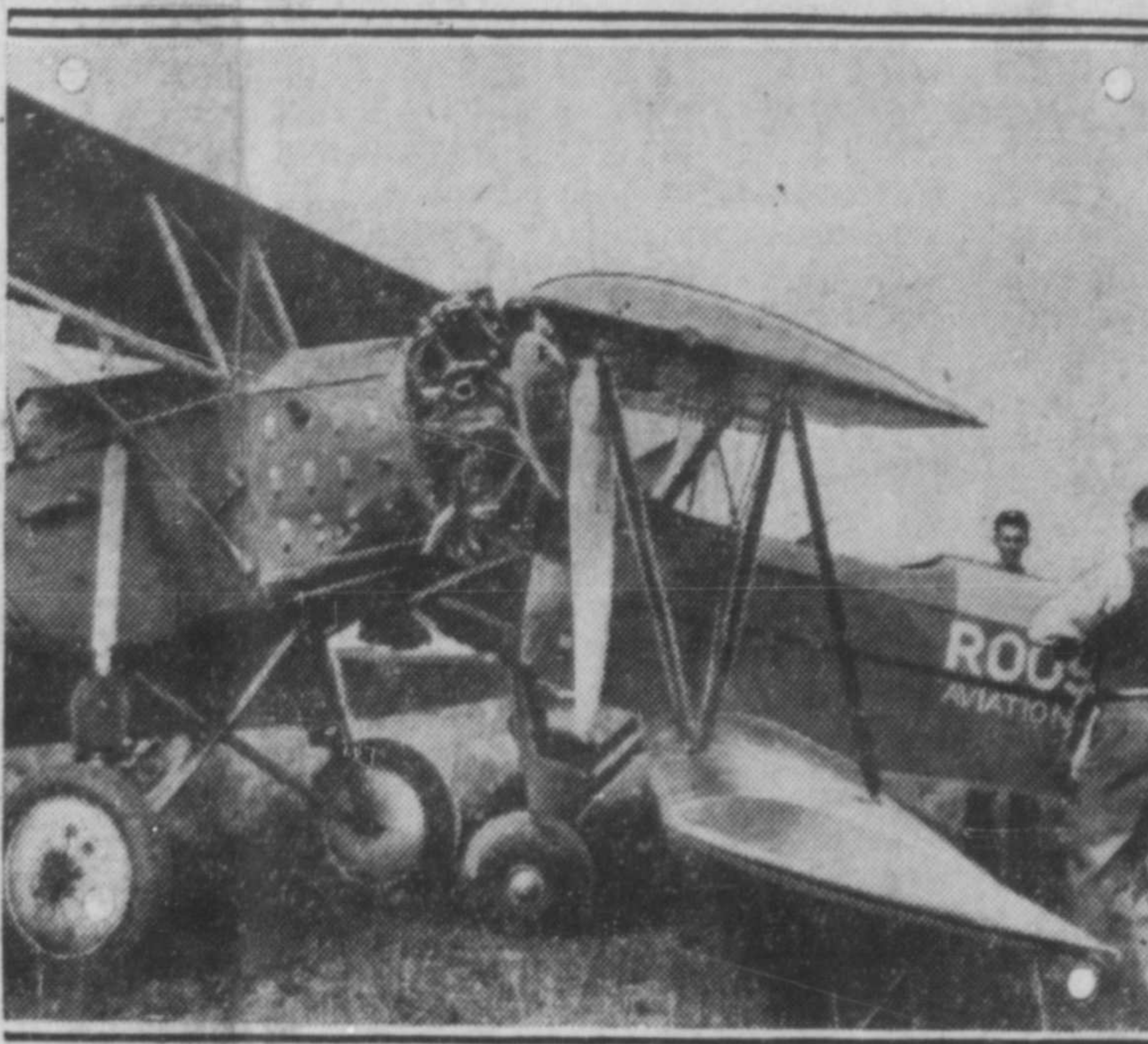
Louis Wesley Sentenced to Two Months For Theft; John Morrison Is Acquitted

Chamber of Commerce to Follow Up Effort to Secure Shipments of Grain Through Local Elevator

The possibility of grain being shipped through Prince Rupert this season was discussed last night at the Chamber of Commerce meeting following the reading of a letter from R. D. Purdy, Alberta Wheat Pool manager. Various suggestions were made, one being that the government should be asked to cancel the Pool's lease at the end of their term and another that the lease be put up to tender. Still another was that a clause should be inserted providing that the elevator should be used for shipments rather than for storage. Finally, it was left to the grain committee to take the matter up again with the Wheat Pool and the same committee is asked to bring in a recommendation as to future action.

WORKLESS IN RIOTS

Disorders Experienced Yesterday in Montreal and Hamilton

MONTREAL, Nov. 8.—Several hundred unemployed were routed yesterday by the police swinging batons on Champ de Mers near the Montreal City Hall. The demonstrators paraded to the square but were met by a strong force of police and were speedily dispersed.

RELIEF WORK IS DISCUSSED

Committee of Chamber of Commerce to Investigate With View Helping Scheme

At the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce last night, George Casey urged the chamber to support the relief work as proposed on Eleventh Avenue. The sum of \$16,000 to be supplied by the government would be wholly in adequate. He thought the original scheme for Eleventh Avenue a capital one and the chamber should back up the city council in carrying it out. It was referred to the civic committee for immediate report.

Bellingham Party Goes On Search Along Coast for Long Missing Pilot

Hunting Expedition Is Converted Into Rescue Trip—Embarked From South Today and Will Spend Two Weeks Scouring Coast

BELLINGHAM, Nov. 8.—Five Bellingham men will turn a deer hunting trip into an impromptu search party along the Northern British Columbia coast for Robin (Pat) Renahan, former Bellingham flyer, who has been missing for eleven days near Prince Rupert. The party embarked today on the cruiser Nohusist for a two weeks' trip in Canadian waters. The party is composed of Art Hook, J. M. Rayner, Dr. C. S. Hood, Roy Lehmen, Ed. Matson and J. E. Owens.

SALVAGE FINISHED

Northwestern Taken to Safety at Dundas Bay By Four Fishing Boats

SEATTLE, Nov. 8.—The crippled Alaska Steamship Co.'s liner Northwestern, which broke down with rudder trouble off Cape Spencer, is now safe at Dundas Bay, Alaska, after being towed by four fishing boats.

The Northwestern awaits the arrival next Wednesday of the steamer Alameda, which leaves Seattle today, and will turn over to that vessel her 21 passengers, the crew of 60 men and freight.

The tugs Douglas and Oriole will be sent from Seattle to Dundas Bay to tow the Northwestern here.

CONVENTION CONCLUDES

Northern Fishermen Oppose Salmon Traps, High Saltery Licence Fee and Change of Control

OFFICERS ELECTED

The Northern British Columbia Salmon Fishermen's Association, continuing its annual convention yesterday afternoon, went on record as maintaining its former attitude regarding salmon traps, namely, direct opposition to the installation of same.

A resolution was also passed expressing opposition to the exorbitant licence fee of \$1500 imposed by the provincial government on salmon salteries. Such a fee would kill a once flourishing industry, it was felt, incidentally lessening competition in that particular species of salmon.

The convention went on record as being directly opposed to any further transfer of fisheries administration powers from the federal to the provincial government.

The association elected the following executive for the coming year: Gustave-Norman, chairman, Mike Anderson, J. Roberts, Vic Markland, A. Snellman, Charles Lord and J. Deane.

Charles Lord was re-elected general secretary.

The convention was marked with complete unanimity of opinion on the major questions confronting the gathering and intense interest was manifested by members generally in the business and proceedings.

MAY HAVE GONE DOWN

At a conference here this morning between Pilot Eckmann of the searching seaplane Wrangell, Capt. S. Halverson of the coastguard cutter Cygan and T. K. Smith, a newspaperman from the Ketchikan Alaska Chronicle, all of whom have been engaged for several days in searching for the lost plane, it was decided that Renahan probably tried to land in the dark somewhere near Lewis Island and that plane and everything sank. He was last seen near Lewis Island, about twenty miles south of Prince Rupert.

The Cygan has been searching all local waters, calling at the light-houses and at other places and has found no trace of the missing men. She will be returning today to Ketchikan.

A story to the effect that the plane struck on Stephens Island and caught fire is not credited as the light seen there was on the Saturday before Renahan left Seattle.

Pilot Eckmann took off at 1 p.m. today in the drizzle to again fly over Kennedy, Smith and Stephens Islands.

Owing to low visibility, Pilot Eckmann was unable to go out this morning to search.



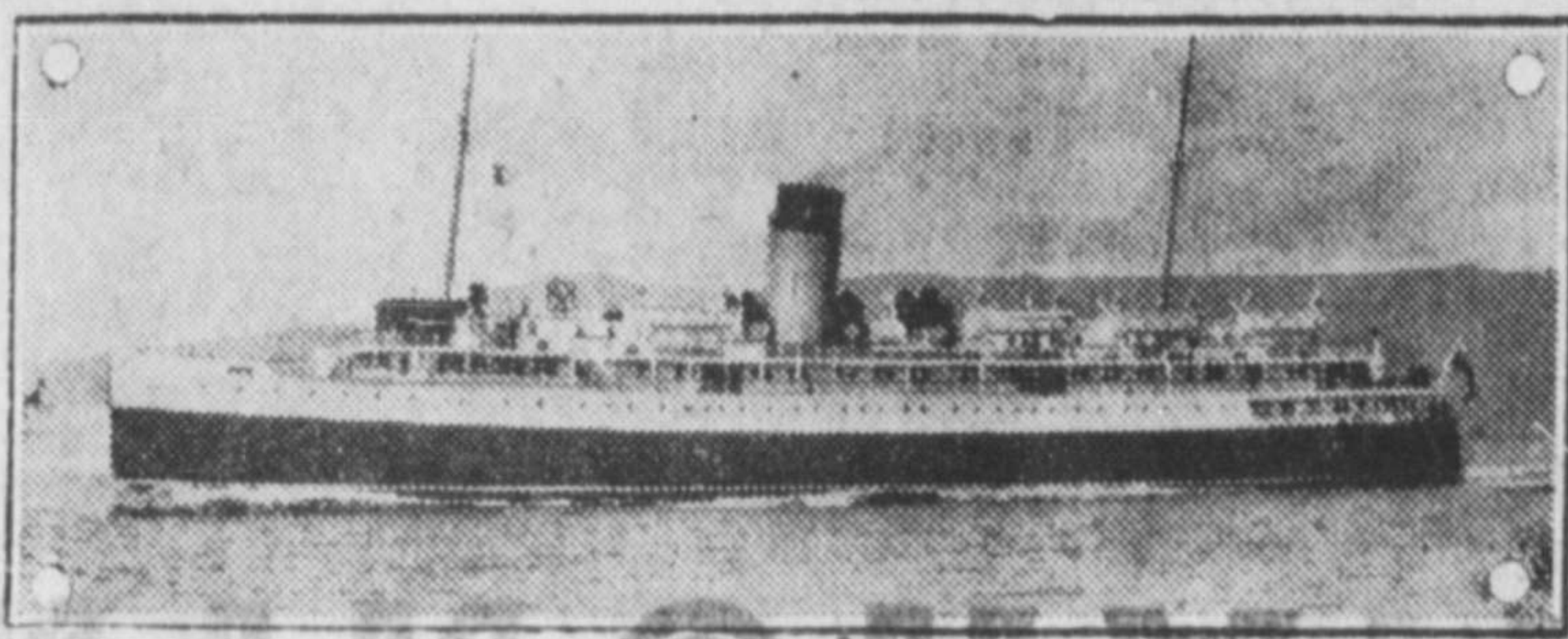

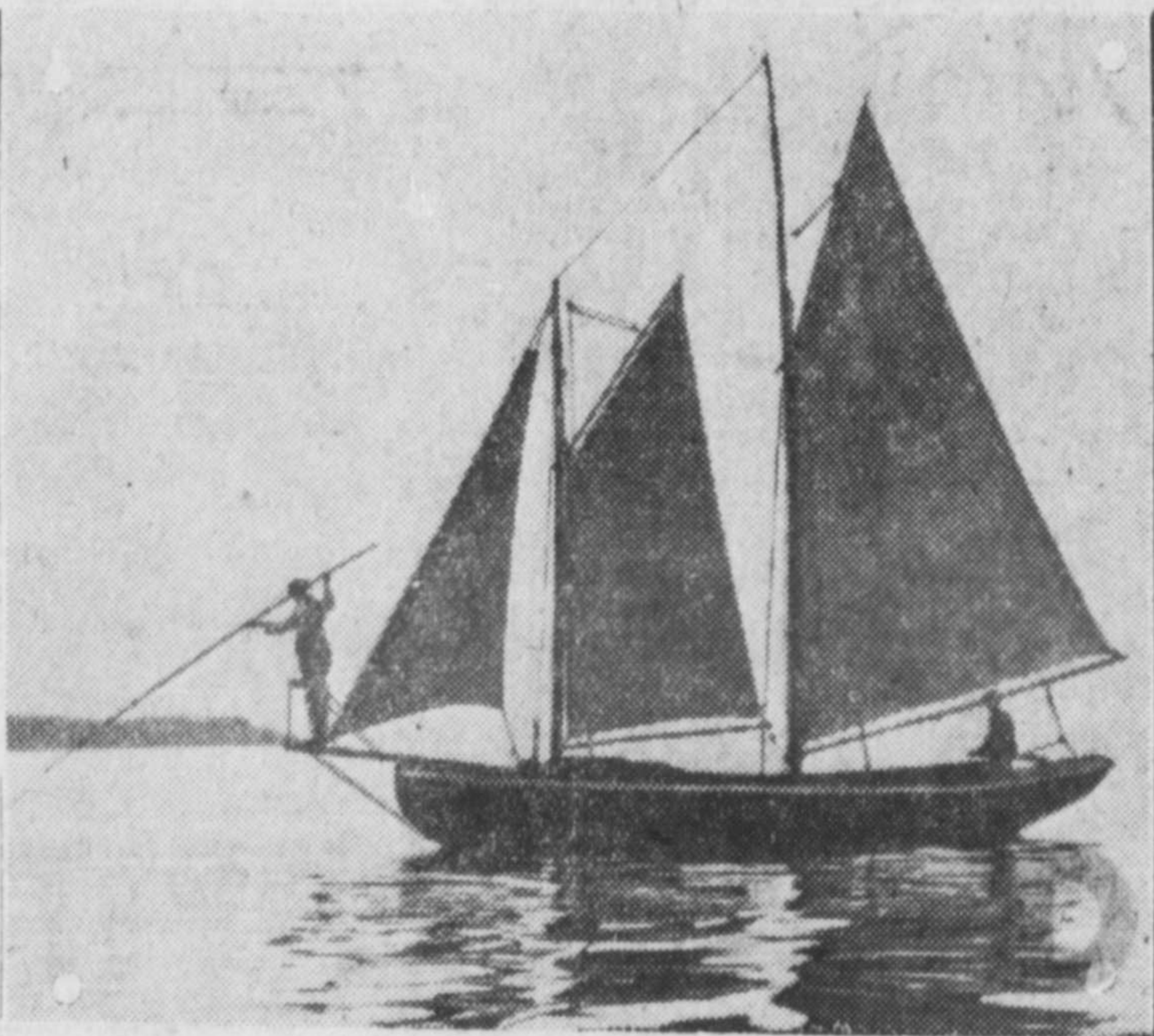

WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Ending of Halibut Season Near — Boats Return From Packing Charters — Dolf Prince Pays Visit to Port

With the close of the halibut fishing season just an even week off, most of the vessels of the fleet are now on their final dash of the year to the banks. It was estimated at the middle of this week that about twenty of the local boats had by then tied up, leaving the most of the fleet still at work. The next two weeks will see them all home for the winter. The last boats should be all accounted for by November 22 or within a week following the closing of the season. As usual, the most of the Seattle boats are expected to proceed straight home to sell their final catches. The majority of the vessels with home ports in Alaska will come on here to dispose of their last fares, taking advantage of the fresh fish market and better prices that may be obtained than if they sold for cold storage in Alaska.

Pacific Salvage Co.'s power tug Pachena, Capt. Charlie Larkin, made a trip this week to Georgia River near Stewart to pick up some machinery. The vessel left here Tuesday night and returned yesterday. Capt. Paul Armour, J. H. Pillsbury and Verge Moore went along to make the trip.

The P. M. L. 2, skippered by Capt. Bill Willis, is being kept busy in doing odd jobs in the service of the Pacific Salvage Co. The vessel made a trip on Thursday to Cloyah Bay with lumber to be used in the construction of a lineman's cabin for the Power Corporation of Canada. The vessel went out again to Cloyah yesterday to pick up a scow.

After spending several weeks in port while his boat Lila was undergoing a rather extensive overhaul and renovation job, Harry Scott got away on Tuesday morning of this week for his hand logging operations in the vicinity of Lowe Inlet. Harry expects to keep pretty steadily at the grind for the winter.

Sunday night's mysterious explosion disturbed the waterfront as well as the rest of town. Indeed the disturbance sounded very suspiciously as though emanating from that quarter, although everybody professes to know nothing whatever about the strange blast. In any case, slumbers were disturbed and if Cap Kohrt dashed to the deck with the fire extinguisher and exclaimed, "What the Hell," while a neighbor agreed that they were just his sentiments, we were not altogether shocked this once. Be it meteor, bomb or firecracker, it was a rude way of disturbing an honest somnolent's slumbers. If there was any way of definitely accounting for it, it would not have been so bad but to perpetrate a mystery so suddenly upon the citizens was a mean thing which just might have been expected from a person so low down as to celebrate Halloween two nights after the legal date when everybody might expect the pranks to be all over.

Getting New Engine

The Indian Department's cruiser Naskeena moved up from the floats of the Pacific Salvage Co. this week to the dry dock where the installation of a new engine will be made. A new 45 h.p. Eastern-Standard full diesel is to be put in to replace an older motor of similar make and power. The job will probably occupy the best part of the next two weeks.

John Davey, popular fish buyer for the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., celebrated his birthday on Thursday of this week and received the hearty congratulations of many friends without taking a sip either. John we understand, is now 21 years old more or less but looks years younger. In fact, if we did not know how old he is, we wouldn't believe it for, like Doc Clapperton, he seems to grow younger with the passing years. Perhaps it's the music as does it for these two youths who do love to warble just as we all delight to hear them. That John will long continue to preside over the destinies of the Prince Rupert Fish Exchange and that his voice will never grow fainter is our hearty wish—and that stands no matter how old he may turn out to be.

The Ketchikan motorship Norco was in port Thursday morning from Ketchikan. After unloading 10 carloads of frozen fish for transshipment east over the railway, the vessel proceeded to Seattle.

Cap. Tom Smith, with the impending close of the halibut fishing season has gone trapping down the

coast from Prince Rupert with his boat Ringleader. He is to be away for about six weeks on his first trip and will spend the most of the winter engaged in this line of work.

The early part of this week, Capt. Dolf Prince, former well known Prince Rupert halibut boat owner, revisited port, coming north from Victoria to pick up furniture and take it to the British Columbia Capital, where he is taking up residence. He made the trip north on his new boat Violet P., a 64-foot craft with 72 h.p. Gardner semi-diesel engine, which was built at Vancouver during the past year. He was accompanied by his wife and three children on the trip. Capt. Prince is taking up residence in Victoria as he intends in future to charter his boat out a good deal for fish packing purposes rather than engage in halibutting although he would return to the halibut game if the charter market failed. During the past summer he had the Violet P. chartered to the Cee Pee Packing Co. on the West Coast of Vancouver Island for pilchard packing.

The well known Prince Rupert halibut boat Sea Maid, Capt. Henry Dorreen, returned to the home port on Monday after a 100-day pilchard packing charter to the Island Packing Co. on the West Coast of Vancouver Island. In spite of her late return north, the Sea Maid has gone to make one trip to the halibut grounds before the season closes.

After having been chartered during the summer for pilchard packing on the West Coast of Vancouver Island, the Pacific Salvage Co.'s power tug Salvage Princess of the Prince Rupert fleet of the company, has taken up duty with the company's Vancouver fleet for the winter. It is expected she will return to Prince Rupert next spring.

The Massett fish packers Waterfall and Dora, skippered by Henry White and Jeffrey White, called at Prince Rupert this week on their way back to the Islands after having spent the summer packing dog salmon at Nootka on the West Coast of Vancouver Island. They arrived on Wednesday and left yesterday.

Mariners using Venn Passage, Prince Rupert Harbor, are advised that Robertson Point beacon has been replaced temporarily by a black spar buoy. A four-pile dolphin will be established on the south side of the channel west of DuVernet Point to mark this turn in the channel and spar buoy removed.

Canadian halibut landings here during the past week were very light, totalling only 53,900 pounds. American landings were, however, well up to average, amounting to 554,500 pounds and making the total for the week 611,400 pounds. For the season up to yesterday the grand total of landings was 23,602,500 pounds made up of 6,283,900 pounds Canadian and 17,318,600 pounds American fish.

During the week prices remained at a rather low level. The top bid for Canadian fish was 12c and 8c which the Relief was paid for 10,000 pounds and the low 10c and 5c which the Mayflower, Embra and Cape Swain received for catches of 1,200, 8,000 and 6,000 pounds respectively. For American fish the high bid was 14.5c and 6c which the Arctic and Daily were paid for catches of 28,000 and 24,000 pounds respectively. The low price for American halibut was 8.3c and 4c which the Pioneer was paid for 36,000 pounds.

When the skipper of the Seattle schooner Daily on Wednesday delivered a final ultimatum to two of his crew who were enjoying the white lights of Prince Rupert that he was going to pull out for Seattle if they didn't come pronto, he evidently meant business for he was away within half an hour. Meantime, the two members of the crew have spent a substantial portion of their wad and will have to pay their
