GAME WARDEN IN KOOTENAY IS SHOT

Former Engineer Under Arrest For Murder as Outcome of Shooting

Dennis Greenwood Dead and William Floyd In Custody as Result of Affray at Canal Flats Near Invermere

INVERMERE, July 7:—Dennis Greenwood, provincial game warden at Canal Flats, 34 miles from here, is dead and William Floyd, late stationary engineer south of that point, is under arrest charged with murder as a result of a shooting in front of a store at Canal Flats Saturday afternoon.

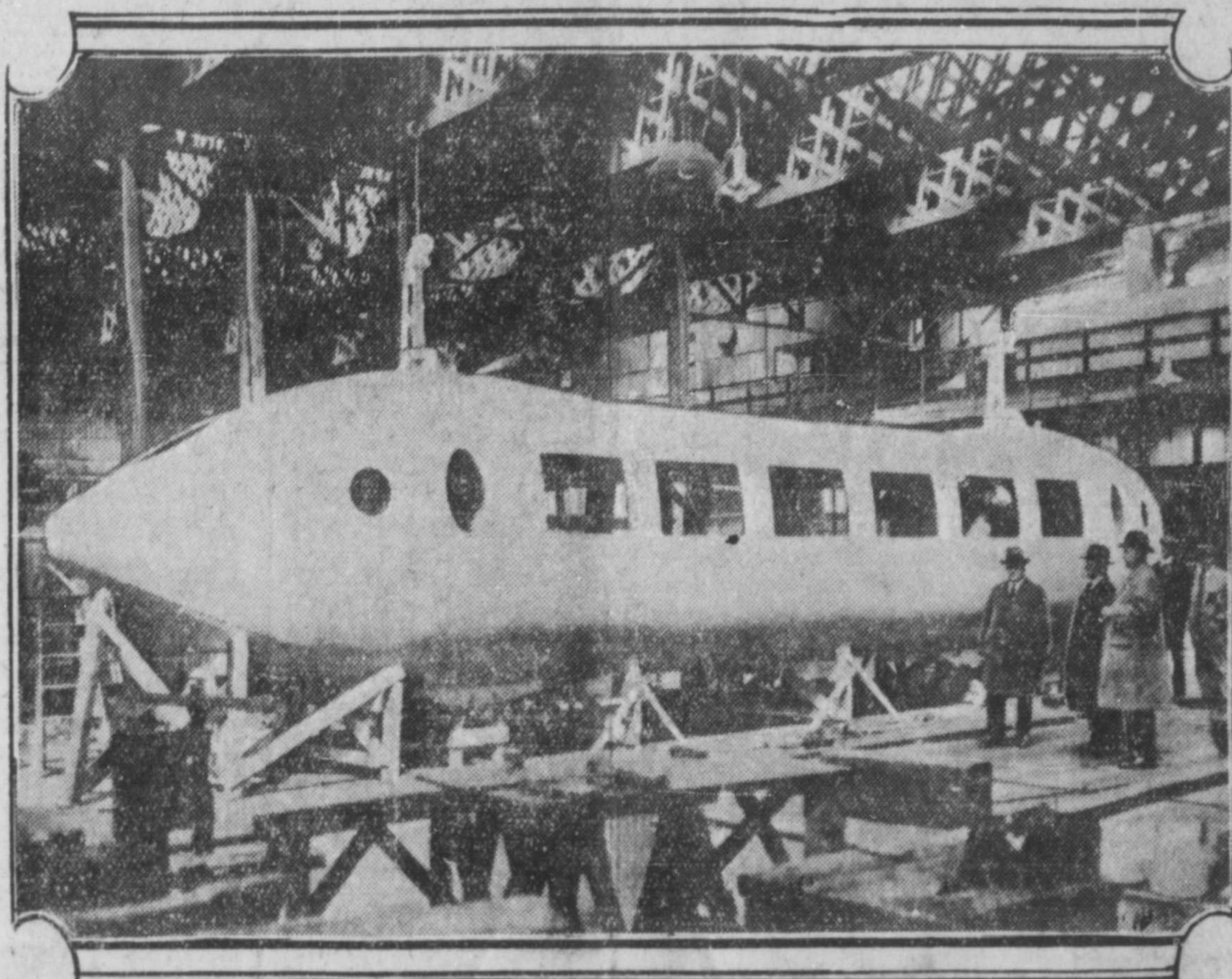

Hon. H. H. Stevens States Publicly That Peace River Outlet Must Go to Vancouver By Way of P. G. E.

In an address at North Vancouver Friday night the Vancouver Province reports Hon. H. H. Stevens as follows:

"Without further delay the Peace River country must have connection with the Pacific Coast, and this connection must be with Vancouver."

Amplifying this statement, he said: "The taxpayers of this province have some \$63,000,000 in the P.G.E., which Liberal policy has left with its northern end in the air. I contend that line must be extended to the Peace River country and that the Federal Government must co-operate in securing that purpose."

LONDON, July 7:—Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, aged 71, creator of "Sherlock Holmes" and widely known spiritualist and author, died at his home here today from heart disease. He had been ill for two months.

STEAMSHIP PRINCE HENRY

The new steamship Prince Henry which was here last week and which returns southbound tomorrow is probably the finest and most up-to-date steamer in the world. Her fittings and appurtenances are of the most modern type, nothing being omitted which can in a small space cater to the comfort and pleasure of the travelling public. While she is not an ocean liner she has many of the features of the vessels that ply between the American continent and the countries on the other side of either the Atlantic or Pacific. She is, however, designed for the Alaskan business and as such has no present competitor in the field. With such a steamship in operation and with a good hotel at Prince Rupert the Canadian National Steamships will be in a position to cater to the tourist business as never before. Next season should see a great change in this re-

spect with Prince Rupert as the hub in a rapidly expanding industry, that of entertaining the holiday crowds who come north.

MUST DO OUR PART

In view of the changing situation it is necessary that Prince Rupert should do her part in keeping up appearances and making this a city worth seeing. Many citizens are doing something along this line. In the residential district the gardens are being improved, fences made sightly, houses painted. There has been a gradual development for many years and now the results are just being seen. We are rapidly changing from a pioneer city to a city of homes. With the city developing in the residential districts we find some difficulty in keeping pace in the business section. There sidewalks are needed and needed badly yet owners of property, already heavily taxed, oppose the building of new ones. While a great deal of sympathy is felt for the people who have had to pay heavy taxes on non-production property, it must be remembered that if the city goes down at heel the property loses its value. It is only by keeping up with the times that we can expect to make progress. Sidewalks must be built or the business will gravitate to those parts of the city where they have walks.

Already some of the sidewalks in Section One have been condemned and more will have to follow. The old wooden walks are out of date and must be closed soon. There is no way of building these except under the local improvement plan under which the cost is assessed against the owners. If they refuse to pay, then the walks cannot be built.

MAJORITY WAS SMALL

J. C. Brady Had Only 321 More Votes Than Fred Stork in Last Federal Election

Such things being easily forgettable, a number of inquiries have been made as to just exactly what the majority of J. C. Brady was over Fred Stork in the last federal election. Mr. Brady's majority was 321 in a total vote of 4,170 to 3,849. Federal elections in Skeena rid-

ing have in the past been usually close. In 1925, Fred Stork beat G. G. Bushby 3,633 to 2,940 and in 1921 Mr. Stork had a margin of only 38 votes over Lieut. Col. C. W. Peck, V. C. Judging from street talk, there is reason to believe that the forthcoming contest in this riding will also be close.

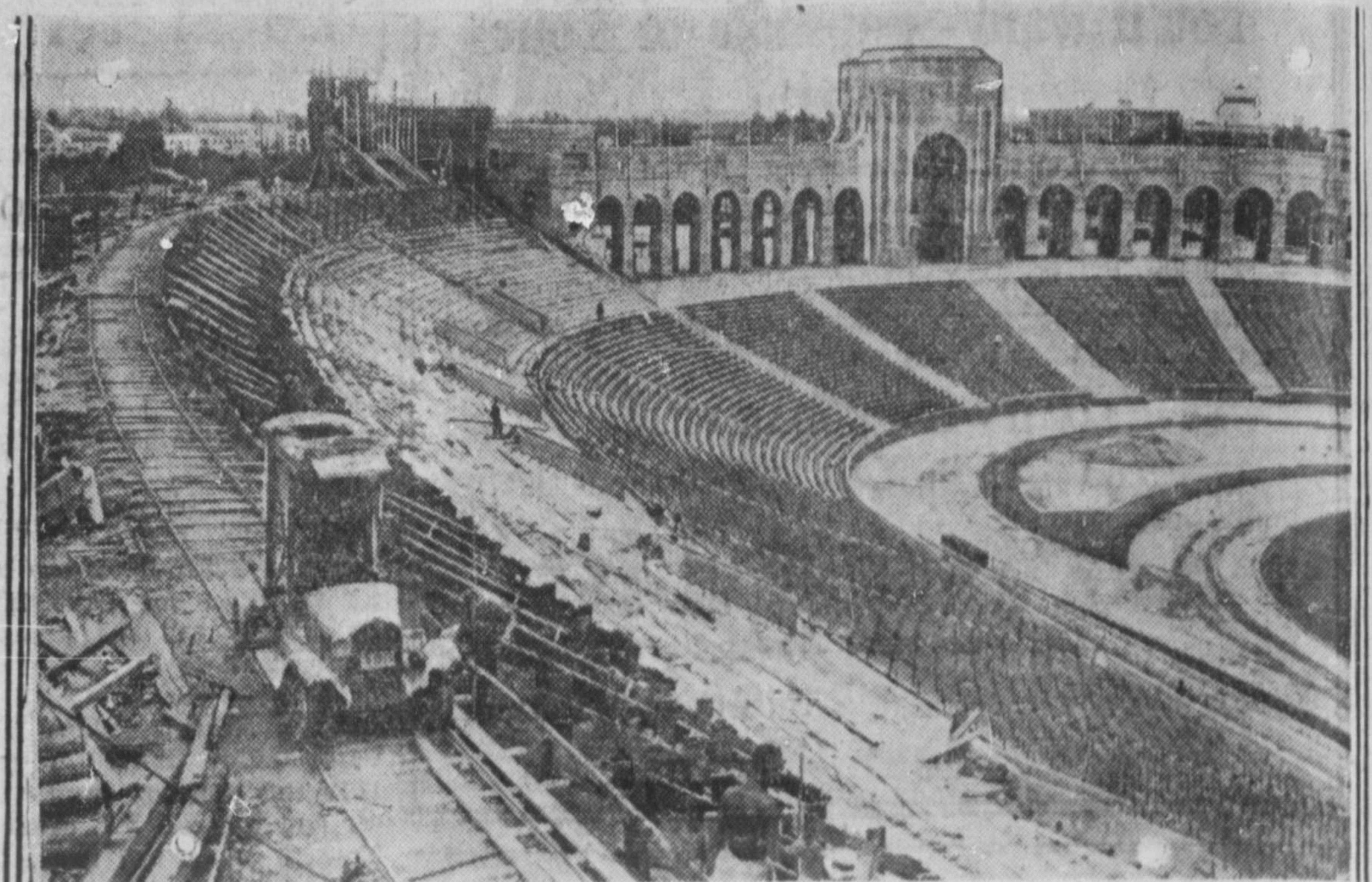

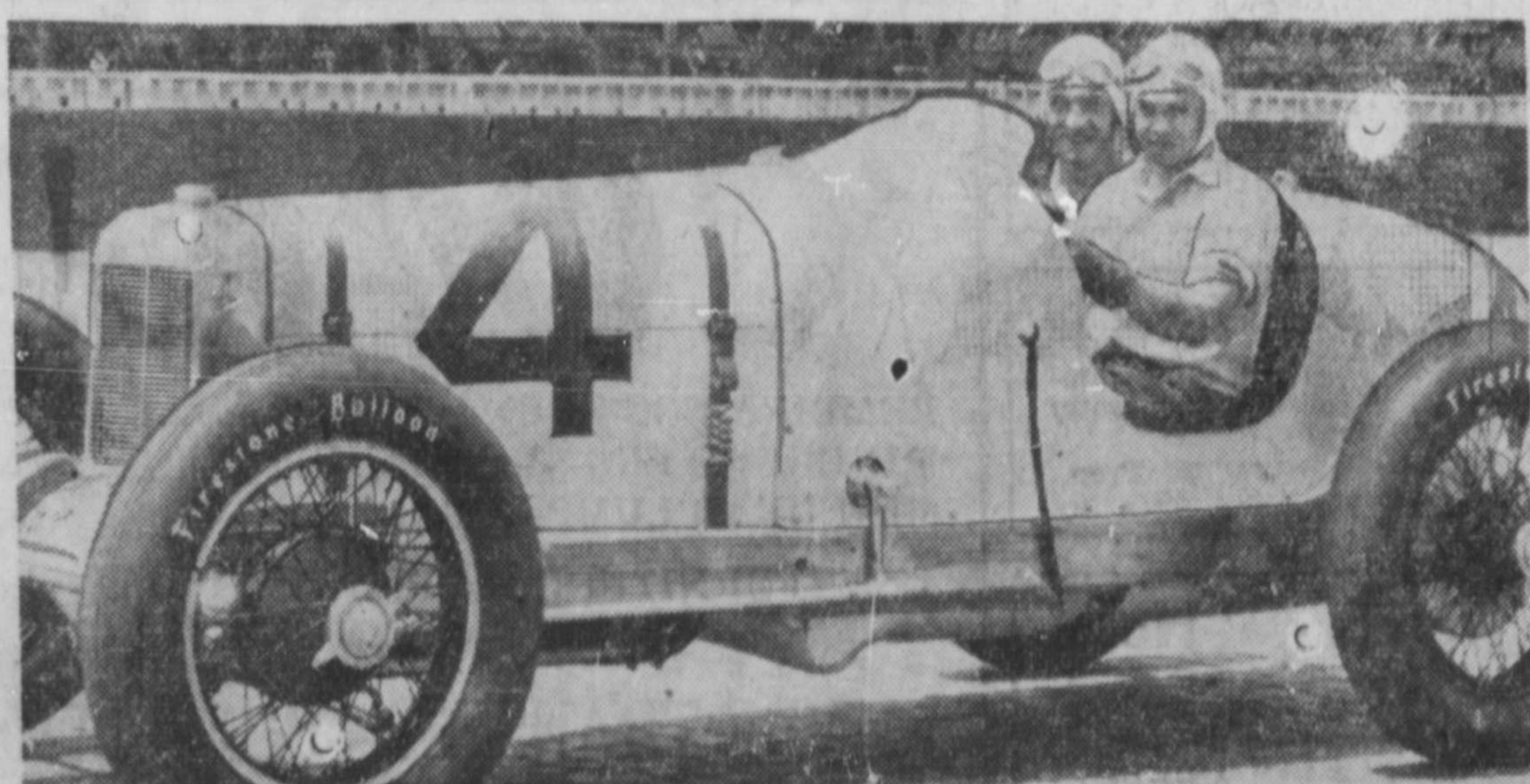

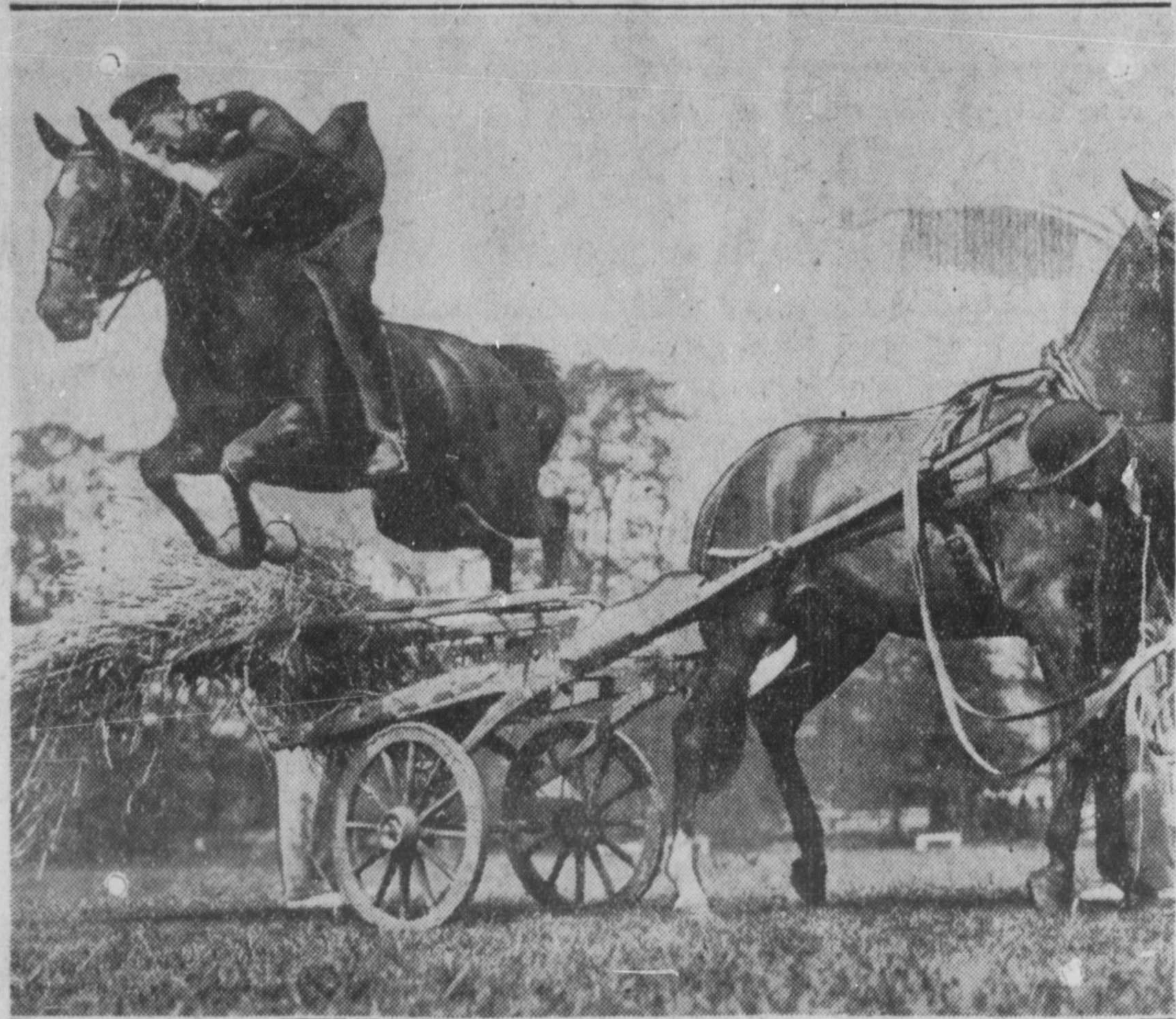

TAGGING SALMON

Camp Is Established in Massett Inlet By Official of Biological Board
