LONDON, Jan. 22 .- Wth quiet talks in the seclusion of their own headquarters, delegates to the five-power naval disarmament conference are endeavoring today to remove preliminary difficulties and reach a basis of common understanding. The conference will get down to actual work tomorrow in private. In these preliminary conversations LEGISLATION delegates from France and Italy hold the stage. France would like for the Mediterranean Sea some pact similar to that concluded for the Pacific in Washington in 1922. What is desired is something to check naval rivalries in the Mediterranean.
