BLENHEIM ISWINNER

Iliad Second and Diolite Third In Great Derby Race Today

EPSOM DOWNS, June 4:-Blenheim won the historic Derby today before a huge multitude of racing fans not only from Great Britain but from all parts of the world. Iliad was second and Diolite, who was the favorite, third.

Blenheim won by a length with two lengths separating the second and third horses. The winner's time was two minutes and 38.1-5 seconds.

Seventeen horses ran.

After considerable delay caused by Solver Flare lashing out repeatedly, the horses got away and, at the first half mile, Ruston Pasha was leading with Diolite and Trews close up. At Tattenham Corner, Ruston Pasha and Diolite were still leading. Thereafter, Blenheim came through and, though challenged by Iliad, finished ahead.

Half a million people watched the race, including the King, the Queen, and other members of the Royal Family.

Blenheim is owned by the Aga Khan and was an 18 to 1 shot. Iliad is owned by Somerville Tattersal and Diolite by Sir Hugo Hirst.






