## BRITISH MINERS VOTE DOWN STRIKE

## FOUND APPEALS FOR SUPPORT OF NEW HALIBUT TREATY

### Deputy Minister Of Fisheries Is Speaker At Trade Gathering

Gives Description of Treaty and Work of International Commission—Other Speakers Heard at Dinner

A strong plea for support of the new halibut treaty, the work of the International Fisheries Commission, was made last night by W. A. Found, deputy minister of fisheries, at a dinner given in his honor by the Prince Rupert branch of the Canadian Fisheries Association, John Dybavn presiding. Among local speakers giving various views on fishery questions were Mayor Orme, T. H. Johnson, Geo. Bushby, Lieut. Col. Nicholls, Acting Director H. N. Brocklesby of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, G. P. Tucker, president of the Chamber of Commerce, George W. Nickerson, and J. Morrison, secretary of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union.

### LAUNCHING SATURDAY

New C. N. R. Car Barge Will Take to Water From Local Dry Dock at Week-End

Launching of the large car barge which has been built for the Canadian National Railways for service between Port Mann and Vancouver Island will take place on the high water about 1:20 Saturday afternoon, it was announced today by G. A. McMillan, superintendent of the dry dock. There will be no ceremonies in connection with the launching.

The barge is to be ready for delivery about the middle of the month.

### Lost Fingers In Mill Saw

Gordon Williscroft Victim of Painful Accident at Big Bay Lumber Co.'s Plant Yesterday

Gordon Williscroft, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Williscroft, lost the halves of two fingers of his right hand and sustained painful cuts elsewhere on the hand as a result of an accident yesterday morning in the Big Bay Lumber Co.'s sawmill where he was employed. The accident occurred at one of the mill saws.

The young man is a patient in the Prince Rupert General Hospital where friends will be glad to learn that he is resting as comfortably as can be expected.

### WILL ARREST MILLS AGAIN

Vice-President of Defunct Stock Brokerage Concern to Face Charges in Ontario

TORONTO, Dec. 4.—Bearing a warrant issued by the attorney general of Ontario charging Harvey Mills of the defunct brokerage firm of Solloway, Mills & Co. with conspiracy to defraud, Inspector William Stringer of the provincial police left last night for the west to arrest the broker on completion of his term of imprisonment in Lethbridge, Alta.

### POLL OF WORKERS

Men Accept Counsel of Labor Cabinet and Decide Not to Lay Down Tools

LONDON, Dec. 4.—Delegates to the coal miners' conference today voted 230,000 to 209,000 to reject a proposal for a general strike in protest at the application of the spread over hours arrangement to the British mine shafts.

The vote represented a triumph for Premier J. Ramsay MacDonald and members of his cabinet who had set with delegates to the conference four hours.

### Deputy Minister Interviewed By Vessel Owners

A committee consisting of G. W. Nickerson, Capt. J. D. Thurber and Capt. David Ritchie, representing the Canadian Halibut Vessel Owners' Association, had a conference this morning at the Dominion Fisheries office with W. A. Found, deputy minister of fisheries. It was stated after the conference that a number of matters of interest to the halibut fisheries had been discussed in an informal way and that there was nothing to announce.

### PORTFOLIO OF FINANCE

MONTREAL, Dec. 4.—The Montreal Gazette today publishes the following Ottawa dispatch: "It is believed that the disposition of the federal portfolio of finance has narrowed down to two alternatives—either that the Prime Minister will retain it himself for at least another session of Parliament and until further revision of the tariff is completed or that Hon. H. H. Stevens, minister of trade and commerce, will be appointed to the post. It is even rumored that Mr. Stevens had assurance of the portfolio prior to leaving London where he was an Imperial Conference delegate."

"No ground whatever exists for such a report," declared Hon. H. H. Stevens today in connection with a report that he would be made minister of finance.

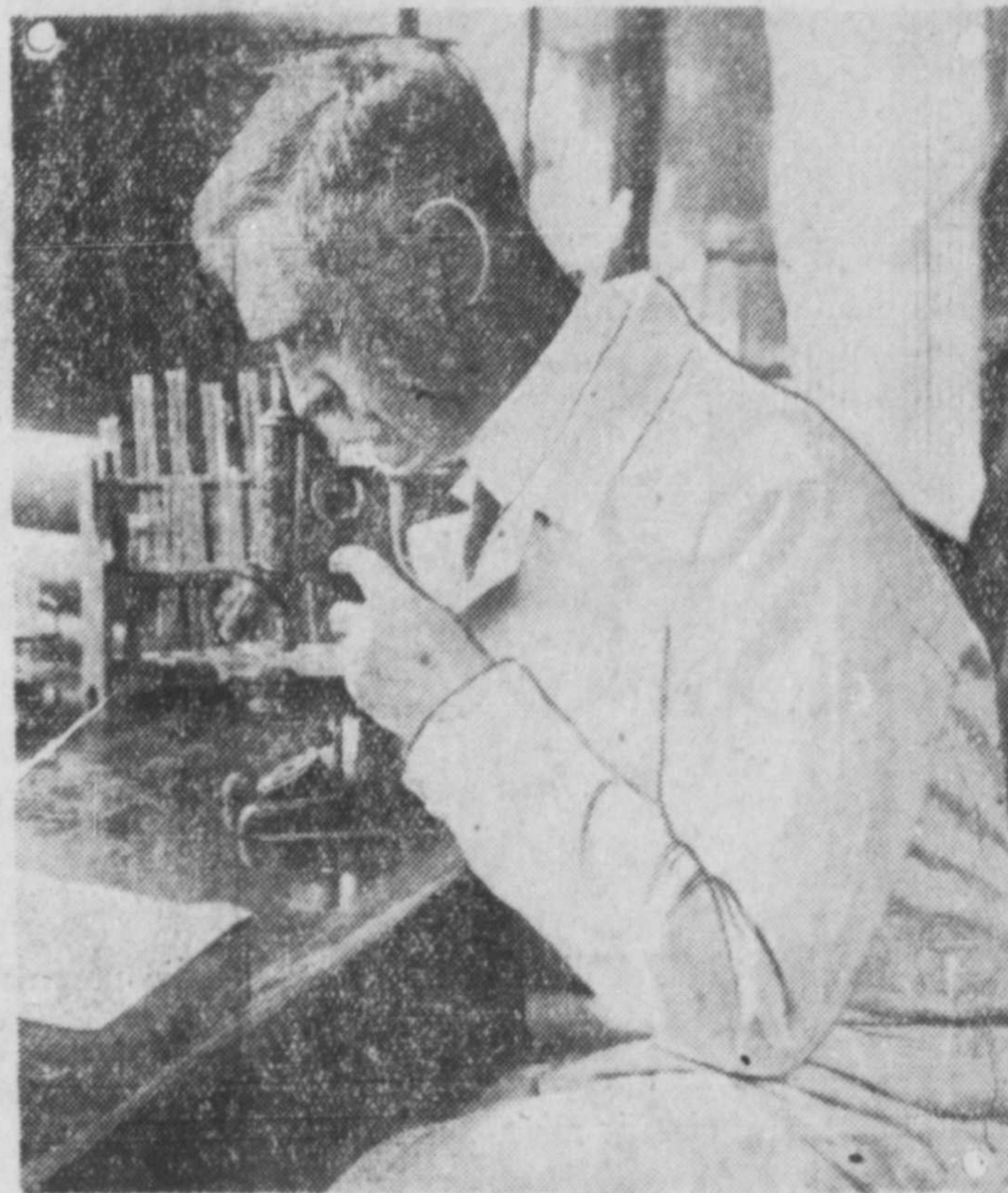
### Charged With Theft of Box of Yeast Cakes

### Premier Bennett Leaves London For Canada and Is Farewelled Cordially By Hon. J. H. Thomas

LONDON, Dec. 4.—Premier R. B. Bennett of Canada and Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas, British Secretary for the Dominions, today bade each other a cordial farewell at Euston Station in London where a large crowd was gathered to give a parting greeting to Mr. Bennett, his sister, Miss Mildred Bennett, and Hon. and Mrs. Maurice Dupre. They took a train for Liverpool and later sailed for Canada on the steamer Duchess of Atholl. They will disembark at St. John, N.B., and proceed to Ottawa.

To interviewers Mr. Bennett said that his motto now was "On to Ottawa." At the Ottawa conference next year, it would be his earnest desire and fixed intention to proceed along lines of mutual interest and co-operation, he said.

"Premier Bennett came here as a close friend of mine and he leaves still a close friend of mine," said Mr. Thomas afterwards.

This afternoon's train, due from the east at 3.30, was reported this morning to be on time.

### TRELLE IS GRATIFIED

Derives As Much Satisfaction Out of Third Place Award as Out of World's Title

CHICAGO, Dec. 4.—Herman Trelle, though jubilant over taking the wheat title of the world, is still more satisfied with third place which he won in hard winter wheat inasmuch as he feels that he has moved the winter wheat line seven hundred miles further north.

### If King Had Been Premier, Canadian Wheat Would Now Be Selling in Great Britain

WINNIPEG, Dec. 4.—If Canada had been represented at the Imperial Conference by Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King as Premier, the Dominion would have been granted by Great Britain a fixed quota on wheat for the next ten or twelve years, according to the belief of Hon. Charles Stewart, former minister of the interior, as stated before the annual meeting of the Manitoba Liberal Association here. Mr. Stewart claimed that Premier Bennett was throttling trade that meant much to Canada.

Appealing for a united stand against all Conservatism, Hon. T. A. Crerar, former minister of railways and canals, stated that never had it been more necessary to bring all forces together against what he considered the most reactionary government Canada had ever had.

### Salmon Fishermen Again Voice Opposition Against Traps and Give Views on Other Proposals

Strong opposition against any move to permit operation of salmon traps in British Columbia waters was voiced by the Northern British Columbia Salmon Fishermen's Association, representing the salmon fishermen of Northern British Columbia, at a conference in Prince Rupert yesterday afternoon with W. A. Found, deputy minister of fisheries. Opposition was also expressed against the proposal to limit the number of fishing licences granted. It was felt by the fishermen that transfer of fish from one area to another should be permitted. The proposal to suspend further systematic annual reduction of 10% in Japanese fishing licence was supported. A standard form of fishing licence plates, similar to those used for automobiles, was urged.

New proposals made at the Prince Rupert conference were that the Dominion government should employ hunters to destroy the seal, this to be supplemental to the existing bounty system, that protection be taken off seagulls in the interests of fishery conservation, that obstructions be placed above fishing boundaries, in creeks so as to prevent illegal fishing above those boundaries, and that drag seines be entirely abolished.

Mr. Found asked the fishermen not to discuss in his presence a resolution on which they went on record as being absolutely opposed to any further transfer of administrative powers over the fisheries from the federal to the provincial government. This resolution will be presented to the department in writing.

Only fishermen took part in the conference with Mr. Found although representatives of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. and Canadian Fishing Co. were also in attendance.

The conference lasted for about two hours and a half and was held in the Moose Hall. Gustavs Norman, president; Charles Lord, secretary, and Mike Anderson, one of the members of the executive, were spokesmen for the Northern British Columbia Salmon Fishermen's Association. Associated with Mr. Found in taking the views of the fishermen were James Boyd, supervisor of fisheries for District No. 2, and Frank Warne of the Dominion Fisheries office.

In opening the proceedings, Mr. Found explained that the purpose of his annual visit to this coast was to consult with those engaged in the various branches of the industry with regard to changes in regulations which it might be felt desirable to bring about. He hoped that, in addition to having such public meetings, it might be possible in the near future to have a conference at some central point with representatives of every branch of the industry in attendance. It was difficult otherwise to hear all sides and come to mutual agreement. There was a community of interest throughout the industry and it was impossible for one branch to profit long if another failed to profit. The department was endeavoring at all times to discharge its responsibilities to the best interests of all concerned. Mistakes might be made but Mr. Found hoped that none would think such mistakes wilful.

Speaking of the condition of the salmon industry, Mr. Found remarked that the increased runs of recent years indicated that, after all, the department had met with some success in the matter of conservation. There were always troubles, however, and now efforts had to be focussed on matters of marketing.

HALIBUT TREATY

The halibut treaty which is now before the United States Senate after having passed the Canadian Parliament is the result of a number of years of investigation and is the second definite effort toward conserving the halibut fisheries. Efforts are being made to defeat it by those who care only for the present but have no regard whatever for the future of the industry.

While recognizing the difficulty of the situation, it looks as if the only thing to do now is to take such steps as will tend to make the halibut fishing a remunerative industry, even if it should be slightly less remunerative just at present.

TAKING KEEN INTEREST

The report of the meeting of the fishermen with the deputy minister of fisheries indicates that the fishermen are taking a keen interest in their own calling and through their organization are able to make their influence felt at Ottawa. It is to be hoped that this interest will continue. It is only by being continually alert and by keeping in close touch with the authorities that they can expect to properly protect their own interests. The canners will always look after themselves.

The suggestion of alertness does not necessarily mean opposition. As the years advance there will develop a spirit of co-operation between canners and fishermen, such as is not seen today. There will be a spirit of give and take on both sides. It will be recognized that without successful canneries the fishermen will be unable to market their fish and the industry will also recognize that without good fishermen they cannot carry on. Each should make money and benefit from the activities of the other.

ishness of placing all the eggs in one basket. At the present time, the only marketable fish was halibut and salmon and the halibut was being slowly depleted. Conservation was being asked. He suggested that greater attention should be given other kinds of fish. He spoke of a campaign put on in England to interest the public in fish which was very effective. If a market was developed fishermen might take other kinds of fish not marketable now and sell them here. He hoped Mr. Found on his return to Ottawa would recommend the publicity campaign which had already been proposed.

George Busby spoke very briefly of the idea of making regular visits to study conditions on the ground. John Morrison told of objections to the proposed treaty. If areas were set aside and opened for brief periods only, American boats would go in there in large numbers and clean up the fish in a short time and Canadian boats would then find the supply cut off as they would have to go long distances

for their fish if Hecate Straits were closed to fishing. Many of the Canadian boats were too small to visit the western banks.

Mr. Morrison suggested that the sale of small halibut should be prohibited. Some boats made a practice of fishing for small fish and the way to stop it was to refuse them a market. He believed the present close season should be continued but would make it effective commencing November 1.

Col. Nicholls congratulated Mr. Found on being now the deputy head of a department with a responsible minister and a department all their own. He took it that the chief duty of the department was conservation. This called for a great deal of tact and tolerance.

**Makes Proposal**  
Col. Nicholls then made a proposal to the department. He mentioned the work being done at the experimental station for the purpose of enabling people to use fish

in their painting, and to feed their babies on fish oil to give them the necessary vitamins. For more immediate results he suggested that, as there was something like three million pounds of fish being culled each year, and that some boats seldom had any culls while others had a large number, there must be some condition other than those already suggested to account for the large wastage. Many boats would be out 14 days and bring in no culls. He

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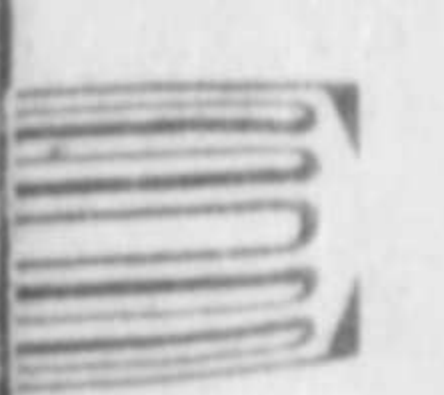

thought lack of knowledge responsible for present conditions. He knew of one man who had a bad reputation for the condition of his fish, who saw what others were doing and changed his ways so that he had changed his reputation. He urged that a man be appointed to educate the fishermen. This would mean dollars to fishermen and dealers.

Mr. Brocklesby told of the difficulties in their department. Their work was necessarily slow as they had foundation work to do before they could proceed. They had done a good deal of work on the discoloration of fish and tenders had now been asked for a vessel suited for the purpose with which they could continue their investigation.

Other branches of the fishing industry were asking aid besides the halibut industry and they were working on pilchard oils. That industry was languishing through the drop in prices. Formerly they were obtaining 45c. a gallon for their oil but today it was selling at 8 cents and it cost from 19 to 20 cents to produce. All the operators were taking tremendous losses and if the condition continued they would have to go out of business.

G. P. Tinker welcomed Mr. Found on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce. G. W. Nickerson championed the Nova Scotia fisheries about which some remarks had been made. He supported the position taken by Mr. Morrison in regard to restricting the quantity of fish to be taken from any one area. This year the halibut sold at an average of 9 cents a pound. He had a boat in the early years of the industry when the highest price paid was four cents and they made money. He suggested the department might busy itself in securing a reduction in the cost of operating.

Mr. Found then spoke apologizing for the absence of the minister of fisheries but stating that he would be in Prince Rupert next summer and would spend some time in the city. H. E. Pawson, assistant Commercial manager of the Power Corporation of Canada, who has been here this week in connection with the opening of the new hydro-electric plant here, will sail on the Prince George tonight for Vancouver enroute back to his headquarters in Montreal.

### CONTROL FLIGHTS

Flyers Should Be Prevented By Law From Making Hazardous Trips, Paper Contents

For more than a month aviators of this district have been flying into the north country and have been swallowed up in the fastnesses of that unexplored area, says the Vancouver Sun editorially. Today eight fliers are missing.

It is a pitiful thing that the wives and families of these fine young men should be subjected to the fear and worry that inevitably accompany the non-appearance of loved relatives.

But it is even more pitiful that a splendid growing industry should suffer a measure of disrepute in the public eye because flying feats have been attempted in an uncharted country when they should not have been tried at all.

The Government of Canada has made a belated attempt to assist the fortunes of these missing men by sending three search planes into the area where they are supposed to be lost.

But the effort of the government to obviate such a situation should have begun long before conditions called for a search. In brief, Ottawa should have had machinery for preventing these disastrous flights in the first place.

**Not Helpful**  
Ottawa is not helpful to commercial flyers. According to law, no rescue expedition may be undertaken by government machines until commercial companies have indicated their unwillingness to take on the job.

This in itself is foolish. The government has both the equipment and the money to search for missing aviators more thoroughly and

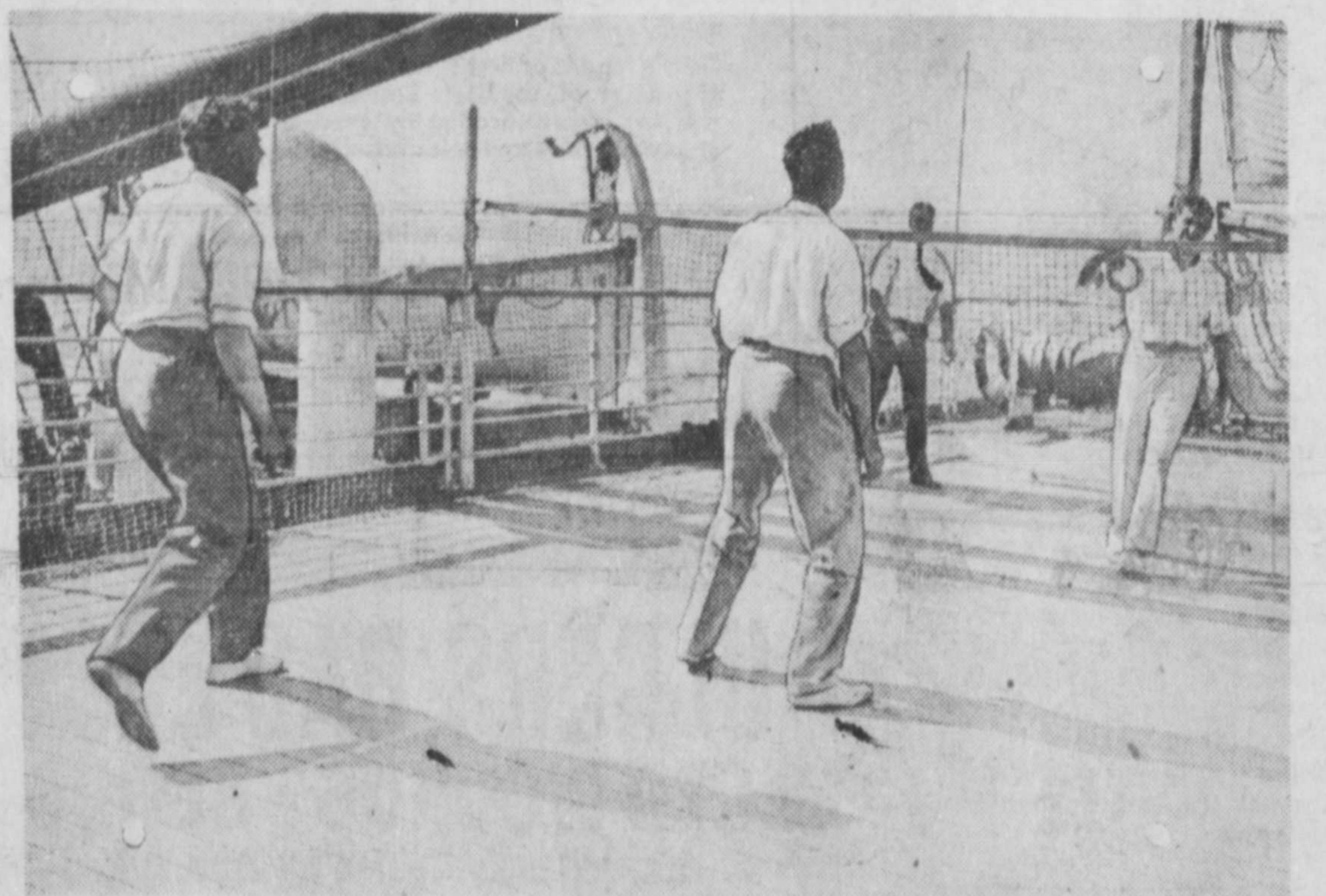

exhaustively than any commercial company. But the iniquity in this situation goes even further back. There should be some regulation capable of enforcement by the district branches of the air force to prohibit and prevent commercial flights, inspired by the unusual courage of flying men, which are bound to end in misfortune or disaster.

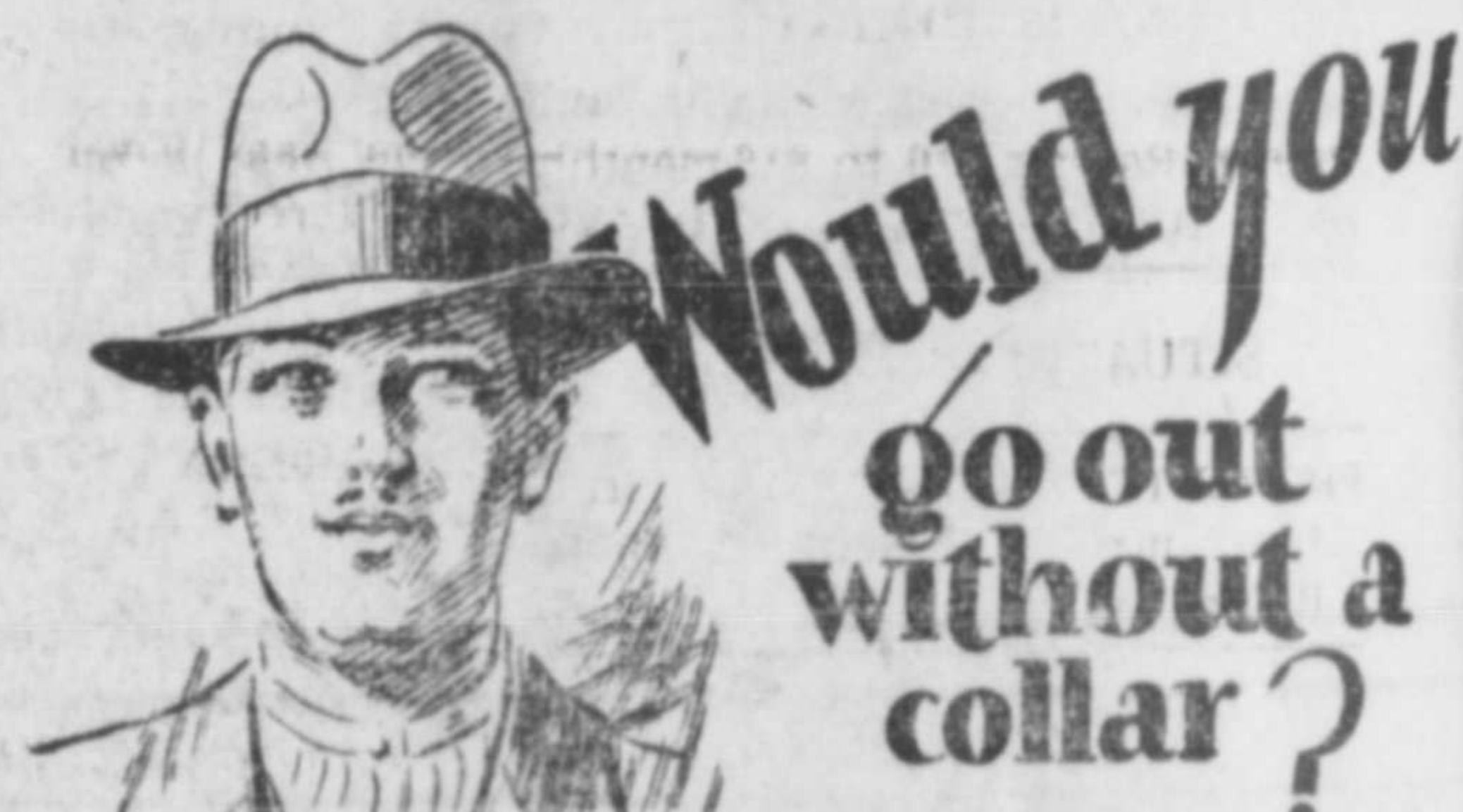
In all candor, had Ottawa exercised proper supervision and control of flying exploits in this area, these eight men would not be missing at all.

It is a little late to deprecate the absence of such supervision. But surely the anguish of those involved should indicate a new phase of flying conditions in Canada that will protect Canadian flying men from the consequences of their own high courage and attempt to perform the impossible.

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## Salmon Fishermen Again Voice Opposition Against Traps and Give Views on Other Proposals

gulations which would be submitted, Mr. Found wished to make it clear that these were not proposals of the department. They were merely a list of proposals from various sources which had been gathered together and were being placed before the gathering to hear its views.

**Proposals Dealt With**

A proposal that the chief administrative officer in British Columbia be permitted to prohibit certain sizes or dimensions of nets for the purpose of protection of certain species of fish if needed was the first to be taken up. Mr. Found was informed that the Salmon Fishermen's Association intended to take a referendum on this proposal and that the result of the vote would be transmitted to him immediately.

The meeting, while holding no strong views on the matter, expressed itself as being opposed to a proposal that the closed season for blueback fishing be extended to June 1 and that, after that date, there be no size limit enforced.

In connection with a proposal that the number of lines in salmon trolling be limited and that the use of the "pig" be prohibited, the meeting went on record as being opposed to any change or restrictions in the trolling regulations.

The meeting was not in favor of a proposal to alter the time of the weekly closed season from 6 p.m. Friday to 2 p.m. Sunday, to 2 p.m. Friday to 2 p.m. Sunday.

The meeting thought that it was but common sense to have a regulation whereby all fish caught in herring gillnet operations be permitted to be sold in the ordinary way since it is killed in any event.

No objection was expressed against that Ogden Channel be reopened to salmon purse seining. A. Snellman, speaking on behalf of Skeena River gill netters, voiced no objection.

Not much importance was attached to a proposal that no salmon purse seines be allowed to operate in the gill net areas of Fisher Channel and Fitzhugh Sound during the sockeye season.

The meeting approved a proposed regulation that gill nets of not less than 6½-inch mesh be used for fishing cohoes as the mesh of sockeye nets is too small and most of

the larger fish fall out when the weather is rough, resulting in much wastage.

Opposition was voiced against a proposal that no one be permitted to operate under a gill net licence and trolling licence at the same time. Gustave Norman said he had never heard of a person using both gears at the same time.

A proposal that when certain areas are closed for conservation purposes to seining, gill netters in those areas should also be stopped from operating was opposed.

#### Local Resolutions

A proposal emanating locally that it be made illegal to buy, sell or import spring salmon weighing less than six pounds was approved. Mr. Found mentioned that it was beyond the power of federal control to regulate the sale of fish after it was caught.

Opposition was voiced against a proposal that a limit of five pounds be set for codfish to be taken. A proposal that bait for codfishing be confined to herring only was also opposed.

Strong favor was expressed for a proposal that the present system of attaching licences issued to other than resident white British subjects and Canadian Indians to canneries be discontinued providing that there be no increase in the number of fishermen in this category.

Charles Lord described as "vicious" the present system of farming these licences out to the canneries and then to Oriental contractors. It meant that these fishermen were under the thumb of this cannery or contractor.

A proposal that 250-fathom pilchard nets be permitted on the West Coast of Vancouver Island was approved. Abolition of the weekly close season for pilchard fishing was also approved.

The proposal that there be no further reduction of 10% in licences issued to other than resident white British subjects and Canadian Indians was approved with little discussion. The view was expressed that Japanese licences were now in fair proportion to those issued British subjects and Indians.

At the same time, it was made clear that no increase in Japanese licences would be countenanced. Mr. Found gave assurance that no increase was under consideration.

#### Salmon Traps

The proposal that "salmon traps be permitted along the Alaskan boundary in Pearce Canal area" brought up the most heated discussion of the conference.

The fishermen had fought a battle against salmon traps in 1929 and thought they had been successful, said Mr. Lord. Now, however, the dry bones could be heard rattling again. The fishermen were alarmed to note the number of trap sites that had been taken up in the area referred to. If traps were permitted, it would mark the gradual finish of the individual fisherman, Mr. Lord predicted. Operation of traps would throw fishermen out of work and still further aggravate the problem of unemployment.

If trap licences were granted to one or two companies, they would have to be given to all other companies so they could meet the competition, Gustave Norman pointed out.

Mike Anderson spoke at length. He expressed the view that the pur-

pose of salmon traps was to obtain fish cheaper and do away with the fishermen. He thought that it was the duty of the department, from the conservation standpoint if from no other, to see that no trap licences were granted. Not only the fishermen but the whole public of the north was opposed to fish traps.

Since it was the canneries that wanted traps, Charles Lord thought that the onus of justifying traps should be on the cannery companies.

There was some talk of cannery companies having private conferences with the minister of fisheries and it was felt that the canneries should come out in the open as did the fishermen.

Mr. Found replied that it was the duty of the minister or any other official to meet any branch of the industry in conference. He could no more refuse the canners such a conference than he could the fishermen and conferences with the fishermen were welcomed just as much as were conferences with the canners.

Opposition was emphatically voiced against a proposal to limit the number of fishing licences issued. The fishermen felt that there should be an open door policy in all branches of the industry.

Considerable discussion developed over the proposal that "the transfer of salmon from one area to another be prohibited," which proposal was heartily condemned. Charles Lord went so far as to say that the fishermen would do away with areas altogether and would allow the transportation of fish from any part of the coast to any other part. The view was expressed that, if canners and cold storage plants were allowed to take fish from one area to another, the fishermen should have the same right.

It was also urged that the systems of reporting transfer of seining licences from one area to another be simplified in order that valuable time could be saved the seineboats. Peter Leighton suggested that every fishery officer might be given authority to issue transfers.

In the matter of limitation of salmon purse seines, favor was expressed for the three and a half inch mesh.

The meeting opposed the proposal to close seining areas 1, 2 and 3 for the season 1931 for the purpose of restoring salmon runs. Departmental officials had the power to close these areas if it was considered necessary, it was pointed out.

#### Local Proposals

Charles Lord inquired what had happened to the proposal that there be a standard, weatherproof fishing licence plate. It was urged that such plates be issued with no expense to the fishermen and that they be manufactured by union labor. The department had this matter in mind, Mr. Found stated. He thought that the fishermen might pay the cost of the plate with their licence fee. Already the department was spending \$700,000 annually on this coast while its revenue was only \$20,000.

The new local resolutions were then presented by Mr. Lord. There was considerable discussion over the proposal that a hunter be employed to destroy seals. J. M. Morrison of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union thought that something should be done about sea lions which did great depredations among the halibut. The proposals would have consideration, Mr. Found promised.

In reply to the proposal to remove protection on sea gulls, Mr. Found stated that this matter had been regularly taken up with Parks Department under which the Migra-

tory Birds Treaty was administered. No result had yet been attained. Mr. Found inquired what kind of obstructions in streams above fishing boundaries were considered most effective to prevent illegal fishing there. Concensus of opinion was that concrete blocks were best. Boulders might also do. On either barnacles would soon grow and it would be hard on poaching nets.

The matter of abolition of drag seines would be taken up with the Indian Department, Mr. Found promised. The fisheries department was in sympathy with the proposal.

The question of dumping of fish offal from canneries was briefly discussed. It was stated that the Rupert Marine Products reduction plant consumed practically all of offal in this district.

Charles Lord urged that, since Prince Rupert was the centre of administration for fisheries district No. 2, such a conference as this should be a regular event. Mr. Found answered that he, at least, intended to come here annually.

Mr. Found, before the meeting ended, extended the greetings of Hon. E. N. Rhodes, minister of fisheries, to the fishermen here. The minister had regretted that it was impossible for him to visit Prince Rupert this fall but he intended to be here next summer when the fishing industry was going in full swing. Mr. Found thanked all those who had taken the trouble to come out and attend the conference.

Today Mr. Found was to have a conference with a committee consisting of G. W. Nickerson, Capt. J. D. Thurber and Capt. David Ritchie, representing the Canadian Halibut Vessel Owners' Association.


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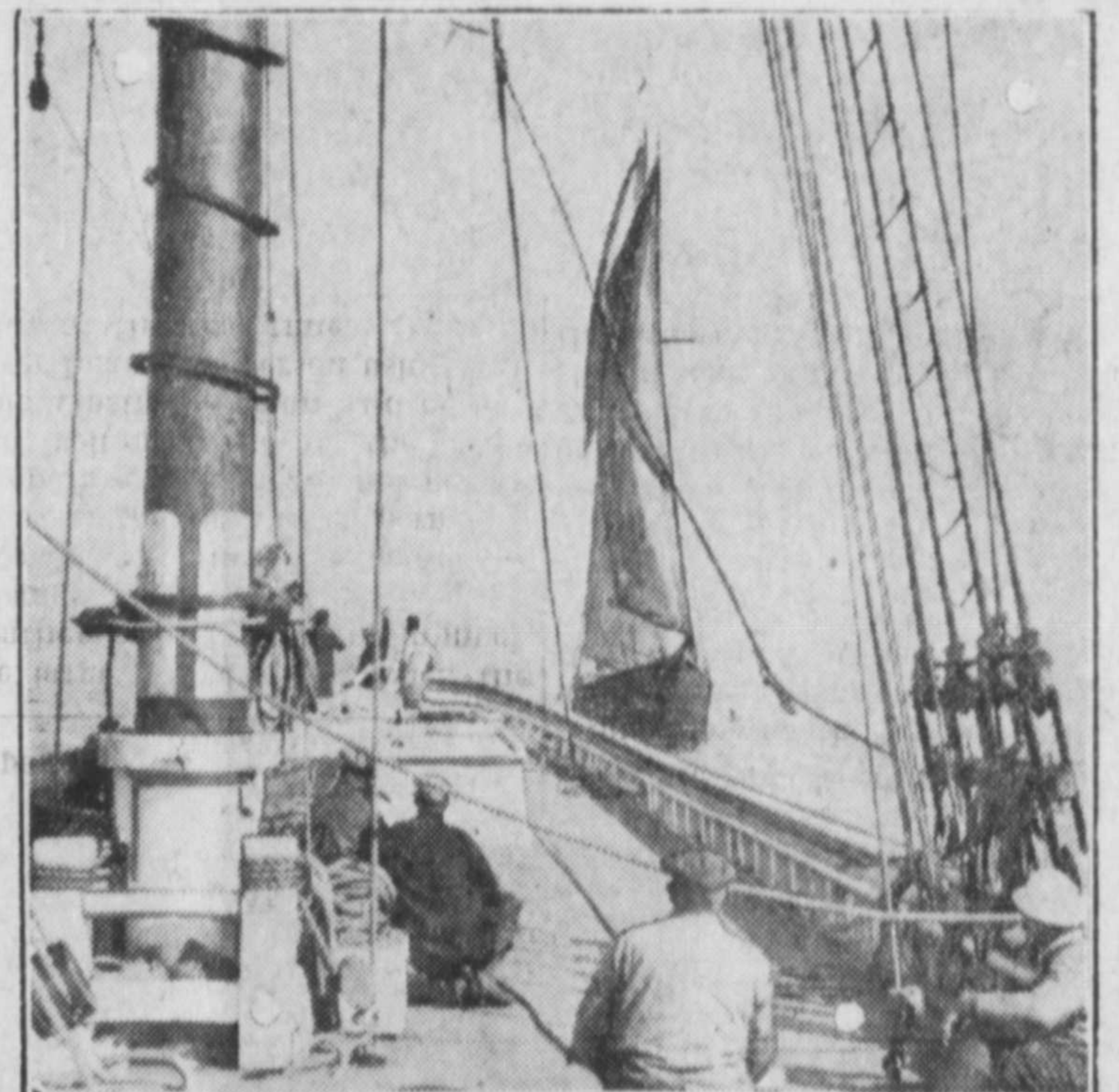
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
