GOSSE STATEMENT ON COAST FISH

Salmon Conservation Should Link Up With Economic Production

Unless Gear Is Limited, Fishermen Will Be Faced With Shrinkage of Earnings, It Is Declared

VICTORIA, Feb. 28.—That conservation of salmon on the British Columbia coast should go hand in hand with economic production and that it was the government's duty to see that this is done was declared by R. J. Gosse, general manager of the B. C. Packers and chairman of the canned salmon section of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association before the fisheries committee of the legislature yesterday. Unless a policy was adopted which would tend to keep the amount of gear within the Dominion government's maximum, fishermen were faced with the certain prospect of continued shrinkage in their earning power, Mr. Gosse stated in approving the proposed Howe regulations.

Mr. Gosse spoke as follows: "At my first appearance before this committee, I was asked to define the jurisdiction of the province and the Dominion. At that time I stated the province only had the right to license manufacturing establishments and could not say how much gear could be fished or where gear could be used. This opinion has since been confirmed by our counsel. Therefore, the only part of Mr. Howe's policy that this government can adopt is the limitation of manufacturing plants.

"Before proceeding I should like to run over one or two points that I covered before. There has been some question whether or not there is any evidence of depletion. The Fraser River big run was destroyed by the Hell's Gate slide in 1913, though it can not be questioned that over-fishing here caused shrinkage in pack and I grant you that a goodly portion was caused by American traps.

"Pinks and chums have only been exploited in the past few years so in dealing with the past it is right to only consider sockeye. The two

SILVER CUP OPENS SOON

Satisfactory Progress Being Made With Re-Financing and Re-Organization of New Hazelton Mine

Word has been received here that most satisfactory progress is being made with the re-financing and re-organization of the Silver Cup Mining Co., and that there is every reason to believe that in a very short time the mine will be re-opened and that a crew of fifteen or twenty men will be put to work in No. 3 and No. 4 tunnels to drive them ahead for another five hundred feet or more, and to develop a big tonnage of ore so that when the metal prices get back to normal again the mill can be started up and kept running at full capacity, says the Omineca Herald. What has been accomplished in the past with the mill is a matter of record and it is known just what the treatment for the ore of the Silver Cup requires.

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—Major General W. E. Hodgins, one of Canada's oldest and most eminent military men, died last night. He was 80 years of age.

main sources of sockeye fishing outside of the Fraser are the Skeena River and Rivers Inlet. Here there has been, according to Mr. Sloan, over a ten year period a shrinkage of twenty five per cent, illustrated by the chart. Speaking of pinks and chums, is there anyone so foolish as to deny that the South Queen Charlottes are near the fished-out stage? Then in the Nass area number three, the condition was so serious last year that the Dominion government closed the area completely for seining for the whole month of August. In the Lowe Inlet district, number five, only four days fishing per week was permitted for ten weeks or in other words for practically the whole fishing season in that area. In area number eight, the Kimsquit and Bella Coola district, partial closure was imposed for five weeks. In Seymour Inlet area, number eleven, the Dominion threatened to close it completely last year but it did not do so. However, this year, according to announcement made yesterday, by the chief supervisor, Seymour Inlet will be completely closed till 1934.

Conditions Bad
 "It is common knowledge that conditions are bad on the East Coast of Vancouver Island and on the opposite mainland shore beside a considerable shrinkage of fishing areas through the moving of boundaries. Ninety five fishing days were lost to the industry during 1929 or over fifteen per cent of the actual fishing days of short seasonal industry. The loss occasioned by the moving of boundaries would probably equal the loss of fishing days making a thirty per cent loss.

"The Dominion is making an effort to save the fish but at the expense of the industry and the onus is falling chiefly on the fishermen. As I have just illustrated there can be no criticism of a reasonable policy of conservation but conservation should go hand in hand with economic production and it is this government's duty to see that that is done. Consequently, unless a policy is adopted which will tend to keep the amount of gear within the Dominion government's maximum, fishermen are faced with the certain prospect of a continued shrinkage in their earning power.

"I have here a chart showing the shrinkage of fishermen's earnings also what the canner has made. There is one also showing our tremendous volume of export and that we have to compete with Japan and their cheap labor and cheap fish and with a dumping surplus of American product which has the cheapest fish.

"The salmon canners in the canners' agreement which has three years to run can have no complaints. They still represent ninety per cent

SHARKEY IS WINNER

Scored Technical Knock-Out Over Phil Scott in Third Round at Miami Last Night

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 28.—Jack Sharkey won by a technical knock-out in the third round over Phil Scott of England in their scheduled 10-round bout here last night. Scott never had a look-in and, from the stroke of the first gong, it was evident that he was beaten. Sharkey will next meet Max Schmeling, the German, in the elimination contest to decide the world's heavyweight boxing championship in succession to Gene Tunney.

There was wild confusion as Sharkey was declared the winner by Referee Lou Magnolia after two minutes and thirty-four seconds of the third round. Scott first claimed a foul and resumed the fight after a minute's rest but was unable to continue after a smashing left to the body.

In the semi-final, Risko and Campolo fought 10 rounds to a draw. Maloney of Boston defeated Mise Bouquillon of France, and Tommy Loughran got the call over Pierre Charles of Belgium.

The show probably lost \$50,000 financially.

TO MERGE DISTRICTS

Government Plans to Add Northwest Territories to Yukon Constituency

MANSON NOT SATISFIED

Criticizes New Highway Legislation As Source of Campaign Funds

TWO OFFICES BROKEN INTO

There was nothing in the dock office to attract the interest of a burglar but, in the garage office at the intersection of First, Second and Third Avenues, a cash drawer was pried open, the knife which was used in doing so being left behind. However, all the money on the premises was locked up in the safe so none was taken. City police officers this morning were investigating the entries.

VICTORIA, Feb. 28.—Establishment of a public utilities commission is under consideration by the government, Premier Tolmie told the legislature yesterday.

1930 Main Estimates Are Slightly Lower Than Those Of 1929

Total \$399,358,101 as Against \$404,245,140—Cost of Many Services Is Higher

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—Hon. C. A. Dunning, minister of finance, tabled the main estimates for the year in the House of Commons yesterday. They provide for an expenditure of \$399,358,101 as compared with \$404,245,140 last year. The principal increases are on account of aviation, public works, income, pensions, national health, post-office, public works capital and marine department capital. The services showing an increase are interest on public debt, immigration and colonization, soldiers' and general land settlement, ocean and river service, railways and canals, capital and adjustment of war claims.

LIBERALS OPPOSE LIQUOR CLEARANCES

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—A Liberal caucus yesterday, it is understood, favored a proposal for refusal of clearances to vessels carrying liquor to the United States. There was no official announcement, however.

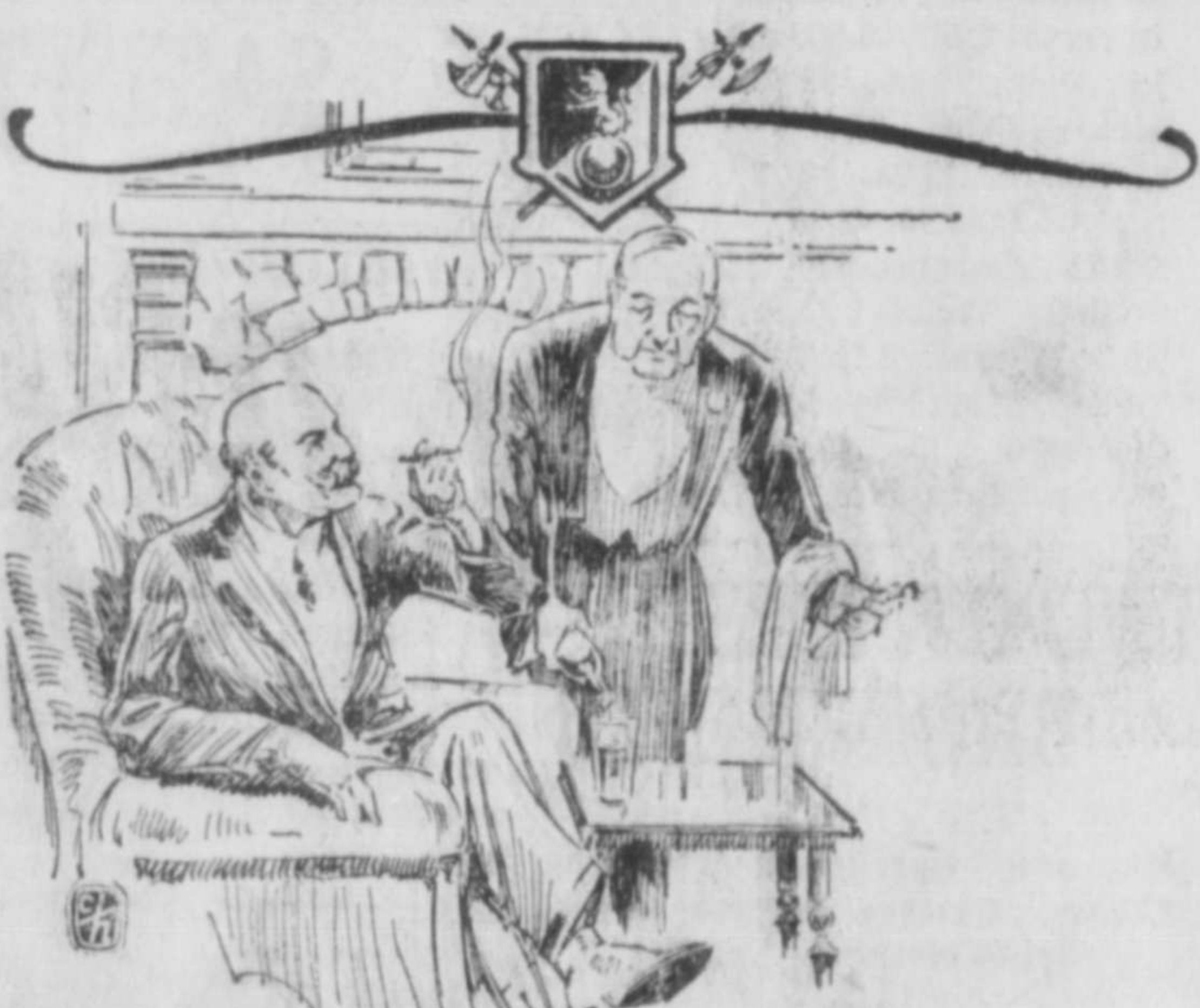

PROBLEM OF INDIA

Canadians who get part of their news of the world through the United States, must learn to take with a grain of salt the tales that come through in regard to the condition of India. While the majority, consisting of Hindus, are said to be in favor of either complete independence of dominion status, the native state, with seventy millions, are opposed to anything but British control and so are the Mohammedans which number approximately another seventy millions and the outcasts, "untouchables" or depressed classes. Of these there are over forty millions. The Sikhs, who have so often fought under the British flag are also opposed to the proposed Gandhist change.
Religion is the great controlling factor in India. There have been in the past many conflicts of race and religion and it is only the British force backed by the knowledge that under British rule they will get justice, that the various factions are held back.

DOMINION STATUS

The facile phrase, "Dominion Status," never ought to have been used in connection with India. From any standpoint which regards the magnitude of the problem and the "clenched antagonisms" it contains, that phrase is unworthy of India, and infinitely misleading in its effect upon superficial opinion in Britain. There is no analogy whatever with the Dominions. There problems are of an elementary simplicity by comparison. India is no nation. It is a miscellaneous Empire held together by the British Raj, and by nothing else. Our presence there is the keystone of the existing arch which without us would collapse on the heads of those who pulled it out. India is a continent like Europe. It contains more nations, sects, and tongues, more numerous differences of race, religion, language. United Europe is yet a distant dream, despite all civilized affinities and economic inducements. Without the British Raj United India would be a hopeless dream. Chaos would be the reality for years, until many rival efforts of conquest came to an adjustment of boundaries. Then there would be no All-India, just as there is no All-Europe.

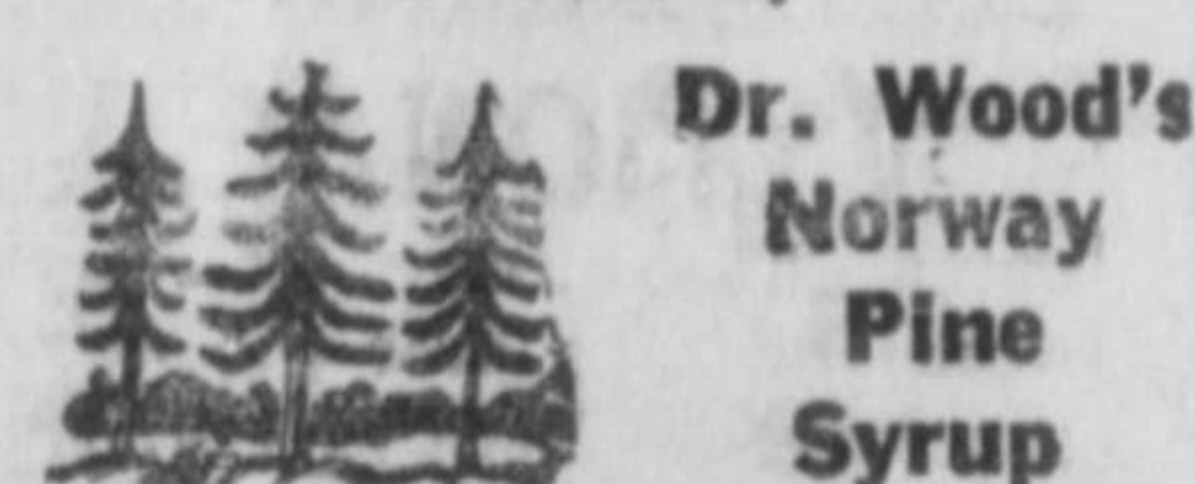

SALMON CONSERVATION SHOULD LINK UP WITH ECONOMIC PRODUCTION

of the canneries in effect. The present proposed policy merely ratifies a voluntary agreement to which ninety per cent of the industry is party. Mr. Todd did express some criticism but can his motives be explained when he was one of a delegation in December, 1928 that waited on this government and asked for limitation of canneries or again explain his action on December 7, 1929 when he was one of a delegation that appeared before the cabinet endorsing the canners' agreement and specifically asking for limitation of canneries, a group that have objected are those who hold land leases but have no plants.

"In December, 1928 the provincial government stated that in their opinion there were too many cannery licenses and asked the Dominion government to refrain from issuing any new ones until the privy council decision was rendered in February, 1929. The Dominion government acquiesced to this request and the information was broadcast over Canada through the press. Some were anxious to get in under the wire and took out land leases and these leases were endorsed on the margin that a plant must be built in twelve months, otherwise the lease would become null and void. There was no covenant on the part of the government to grant a cannery license. However, the lands department have during the last two years made a genuine effort to discourage the taking up of land leases and holding them unimproved.

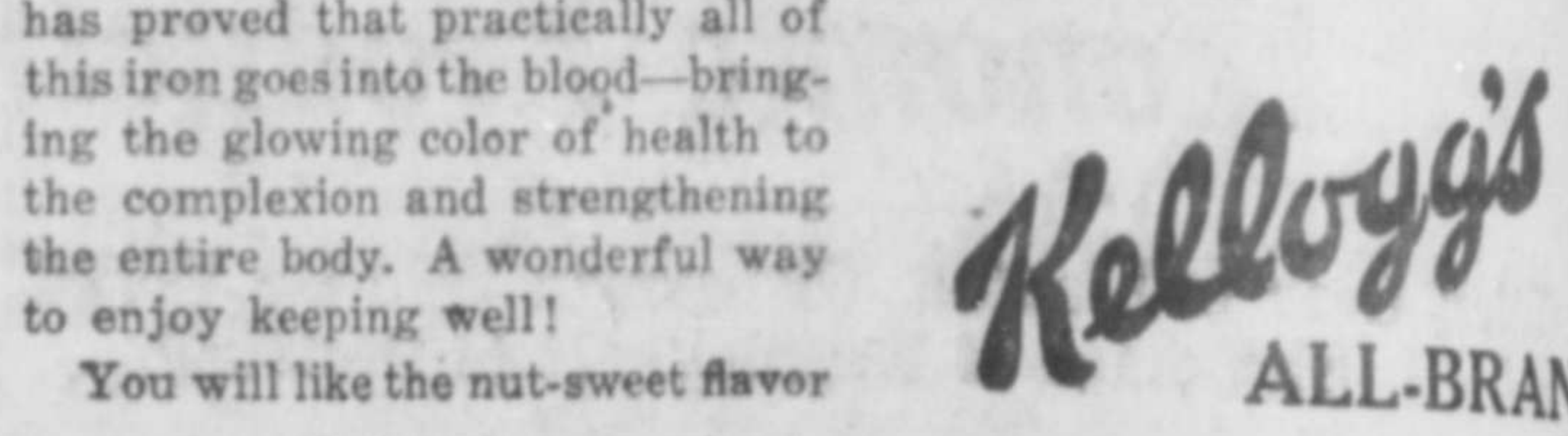

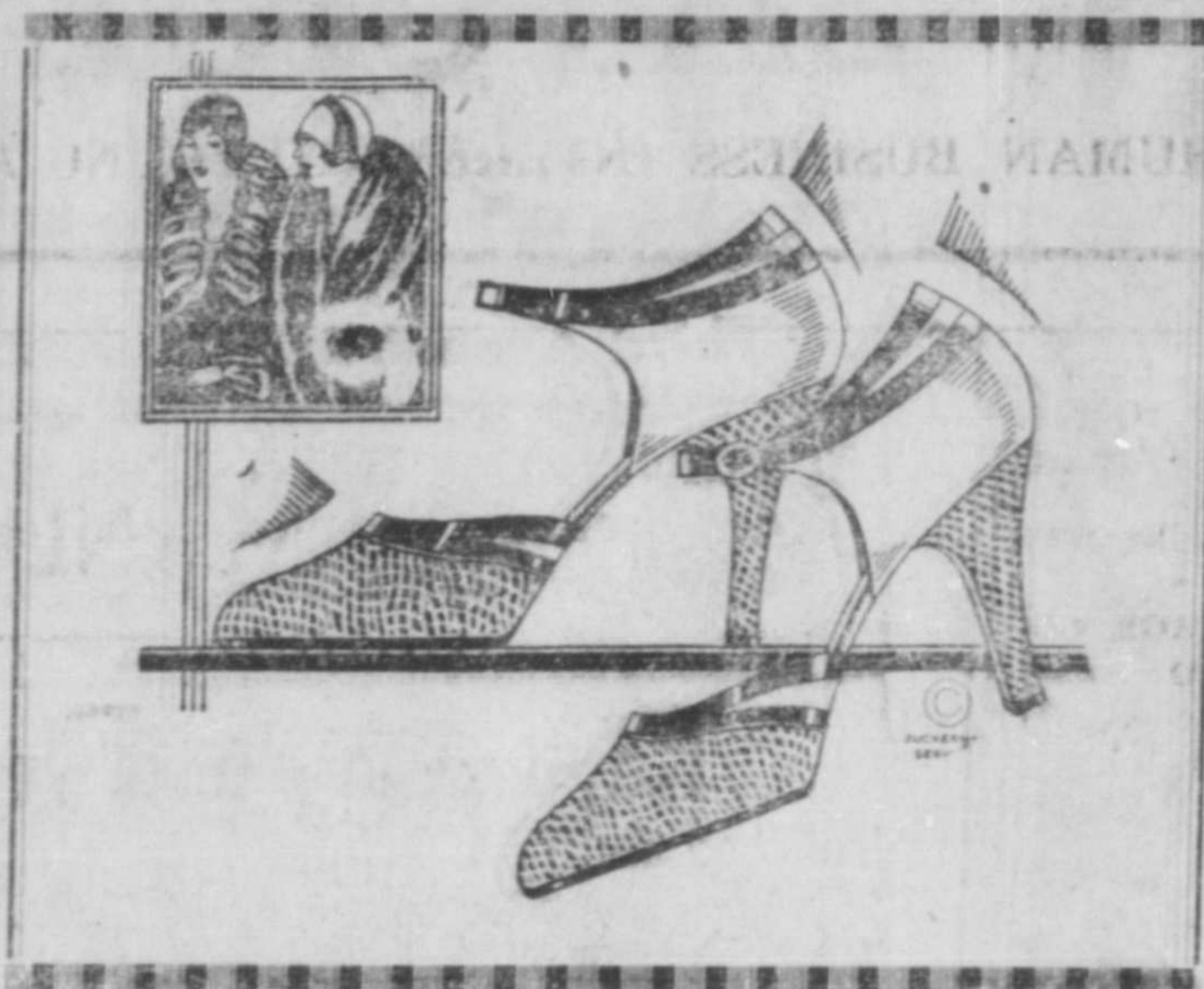
