Nationalists Stage Day of Mourning In Protest-Nineteen Injured In One of Engagements

CALCUTTA, April 15:-Disorder reigned in Calcutta and Bombay today as Nationalists observed the "hartal" or day of mourning in protest against the imprisonment of Pundit Jawaharlal and Mayor J. M. Sen Gupta of Calcutta. Nineteen were injured in heavy fighting between Nationalists and police in the Sikh quarter of Calcutta. Tram cars were burned in both Calcutta and Bombay and armored cars patrolled the streets of the latter city.

Daily Train Service Coming Into Effect This Year, May 19

No. 5 Will Arrive From East at 12:30 Noon and No. 6 Will Leave at 1 p.m. Six Days a Week

Embodying changes in time of arrival and departure which have been previously suggested, the daily train service on this line of the Canadian National Railways will become effective on May 19, it is officially announced. On and after that date, train No. 5 from the east will arrive here at 12:30 noon daily except Tuesday and train No. 6 will leave for the east at 1 p.m. daily except Sunday. The earlier arrival of trains from the east and the later departure of trains for the east will give tourist passengers connecting with company vessels longer stopovers at Prince Rupert, something which has been sought for a long time by local interests.

THE ECSTALL COPPER

Renewed interest is being taken in what was once known as the Dunsmuir mine up the Ecstall River which was examined this week by two engineers. This property was staked many years ago and held by the Dunsmuir Estate. Twice the Granby Company had it under bond and each time released it. Now it is reported that the same company has it under bond again and that the Consolidated has a large group of claims surrounding the original property.

The property was thoroughly examined years ago by government engineers and the ore was found to carry something like three per cent of copper with a very high percentage of sulphur and iron. The reason it was not worked was because of the difficulty at that time of utilizing the sulphur and iron, the demand being only for cop-

At Anyox in the old Hidden Creek mine they worked profitably copper ore carrying only one half to three quarters of one per cent copper. But that was easy to separate. According to former Anyox superintendents it would take a very costly plant to handle the Ecstall ore. There is plenty of it and it is readily accessible. The only difficulty is the complexity of the ore.
