LOCAL PAPER MILL IS INCORPORATED

CONFERENCE WILL BE BASIS OF ELECTION, SAYS BALDWIN

Prince Rupert Lumber and Paper Company Makes Large Plans For Developments In Rupert District

Taking Over Kleanza Plant at Usk at Once and Will Later Embark on Large Undertaking In Prince Rupert

VICTORIA, Oct. 10.—The establishment of a new pulp, paper and lumber enterprise at Prince Rupert, with capitalization of \$2,000,000, was incorporated here this week as the Prince Rupert Lumber, Pulp & Paper Mill Ltd. The company is formed by Minnesota and Dakota men to acquire the interests of Carl O. Swanson of Aberdeen, South Dakota. The new company will take over the Kleanza mill at Usk immediately and later plan on establishing a pulp mill at Prince Rupert.

INCIDENT IS DENIED

Both British and Canadian Circles Repudiate Report of Scene Between Premiers

LONDON, Oct. 10.—Heads of delegations to the Imperial Conference yesterday opened consideration of Premier Bennett's offer.

The official communique did not disclose what was said but Rt. Hon. Philip Snowden, British chancellor of the exchequer, was present and it is understood he expressed his views and his views on the subject of protection are well enough known.

In both British and Canadian circles denial was made of the report that yesterday's debate was followed by an incident between Premier Bennett and Premier MacDonald. While there are differences of opinion between the two premiers, their personal relations could not possibly be more cordial than they are, it is stated.

Millions of Bushels Cut From Prairie Grain Yield This Year As Rain Halts Threshing Work

WINNIPEG, Oct. 10.—Serious decreases in the wheat yield of Western Canada are foreseen as a possible result of continued wet weather which has halted threshing in some sections. Intermittent rains in Northern Saskatchewan and Alberta, where crops were heavy, halted operations and wheat sprouting has prevented threshing in many cases. It is undoubtedly true that millions of bushels will be cut from the estimated prairie yields by the wet spell.

SKEENA IS LAUNCHED

New Canadian Destroyer Takes to Water at Southampton With Miss Bennett Officiating

SOUTHAMPTON, Eng., Oct. 10.—The second of Canada's two new destroyers, the Skeena, was launched today. Miss Mildred Bennett, sister of the Prime Minister of Canada, performed the christening ceremony before a distinguished gathering.

COMPANY IS INSOLVENT

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—The well known Wall Street brokerage firm of Prince and Whitely, a member of the New York Stock Exchange for half a century, was suspended from the exchange yesterday for insolvency.

SPEAKING FOR PARTY AND NOT FOR PEOPLE IS SAID OF BENNETT

OTTAWA, Oct. 10.—"It should be clearly understood that, in making proposals for increasing the tariff, Premier R. B. Bennett is speaking for the Conservative party only and not for the people of Canada as a whole," Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Liberal leader, when informed of the substance of the Premier's speech at the Imperial Conference on Wednesday. Mr. King said that he did not wish to embarrass the Prime Minister during the progress of the conference. He thought, however, that he should state that Mr. Bennett's proposal for a ten per cent tariff increase against the world had not been presented to the Canadian people at the last general election. Neither had it been laid before Parliament for ratification at the recent session, said Mr. King.

TO REMIT INDEMNITY

Great Britain Decides to Give \$25,000,000 Back to China

LONDON, Oct. 10.—The foreign office announces that Great Britain will remit all payments of Britain's share in the Chinese indemnity of 1901 amounting to about \$25,000,000 to the Chinese government which will apply it to create educational endowments.

London Honors Dead of R-101 Disaster; Burial Will Take Place at Cardington Station

LONDON, Oct. 10.—Endless columns of mourning Britons today passed slowly through Westminster Hall between long rows of coffins containing the bodies of 48 victims of the R-101 disaster last Sunday morning in France.

The King and Queen sent a wreath of laurel leaves entwined with white heather and white roses. This rested near wreaths sent by the Prince of Wales and the Duke of York.

The bodies will remain in the hall until they are carried tomorrow to Cardington for burial.

At noon the chaplain of the Royal Air Force proclaimed to five thousand persons gathered under the great dome of St. Paul's Cathedral for the memorial service and stretching to the Cathedral's furthest corners the greatest apocalyptic message: "These are they which come out of great tribulation and have washed their robes."

British Conservative Chieftain Approves of Proposals of Bennett

Next Old Country Polling Battle Will Be Fought Out On Tariff, It Is Predicted—Canadian Premier's Offer Creates Impression

LONDON, Oct. 10.—Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Conservative leader, last night made public a statement that the next British general election would be "guided by the views expressed on Wednesday by the Imperial Conference." In all probability, it will be fought out largely on the tariff issue. The Conservative party, Mr. Baldwin's statement said, will form its own proposals for the carrying of the principle of Imperial preference into effect and will submit them to the people at the next election.

"The Canadian premier's offer of a ten per cent increase in preferential tariffs cannot fail to create a profound impression throughout this country and Empire," Mr. Baldwin asserted. "On behalf of the Conservative party I say, without hesitation, that the great principle of Imperial preference embodied in that offer is one to which we must and do subscribe."

DUNNING IN INSURANCE

Former Minister of Finance Joins Ontario Equitable; No Bearing on Future

WATERLOO, Ont., Oct. 10.—Announcement was made here yesterday from the head office of the Ontario Equitable Life and Accident Insurance Co. that Hon. Charles Dunning, former minister of finance, has been elected a director and vice-president of the company and will be actively associated in its work.

OTTAWA, Oct. 10.—The entrance of Hon. Charles Dunning into the life insurance business has no bearing on whether or not he may decide to return to the House of Commons. The former minister of finance made it clear yesterday that he had not as yet reached a decision as to re-entering the House. He lost his seat in Regina in the recent general election.

NO ARREST YET MADE

Great Deal of Talk Around Town About Scott-Olsen Razor Affray

Up to early this afternoon, Charles Olsen, alleged assailant of Warren Scott in a razor affair on Wednesday night, had not yet been taken into custody although the police investigation was still continuing.

Considerable interest has been taken in the affair around the town and a great many reports as to the principals in the affray are heard.

TEA WAS SUCCESS

The tea and sale of home cooking held by the Ladies' Aid of First Baptist Church at the home of Mrs. Frank Morris was a very successful affair, a substantial sum being realized from the event.

LONDON IS MORE KIND

Metropolitan Papers Not So Harsh In Treatment of Premier Bennett—Times Is Favorable

LONDON, Oct. 10.—The London metropolitan papers are not quite so distrustful of Premier Bennett's proposals at the Imperial Conference as are some of the Liberal and Labor publications. Considerable importance is attached in the city to suggestion of Mr. Bennett that entities within the Empire increase their tariffs on goods imported from non-British nations. London papers lean more or less towards such a preferential system and, as a consequence, few were very critical in their editorial treatment.

The Times described the plenary session at which Premier Bennett advanced his proposals as "an outstanding political event and, probably, the turning point in Imperial development," adding that "the country will insist that the proposals be examined thoroughly."

GLASS DUTY IS REDUCED

Government Repeals Increase Decided Upon at Recent Session of Parliament

OTTAWA, Oct. 10.—The government has decreased the duties on common and colorless window glass which were greatly increased at the emergency session of Parliament to the rates which prevailed prior to that session, Sir George Perley, acting premier, announces.

The decision was made to reduce the tariff, Sir George explained, after the government, on enquiry, had found that no active steps have, so far, been taken to produce glass in Canada by those having factories here.

ATLANTIC FLIGHT PROVES SUCCESS

LONDON, Oct. 10.—Reports were received here tonight that the monoplane Columbia with Errol Boy and Harry Connor on board, had landed at Tresco, Cornwall.

The report that the Columbia had landed at Tresco was later confirmed by the Air Ministry. Tresco is on the Scilly Islands off the coast of Cornwall. No word was received but apparently Captain Boyd and Lieut. Connor are safe.

BENNETT IN BRITAIN

Undoubtedly Premier Bennett of Canada created a stir when he suggested as the head of the Canadian Government that Britain should impose a protective tariff against the world in order to properly qualify as a member of the British Empire. It was a daring thing to do. It was perhaps the first time that any dominion had attempted to force the hand of the home government in the matter of general fiscal policy.

Yesterday the despatches brought a protest from the free trade element in Great Britain against such a policy but today the other side is heard from and it seems as if they are inclined to be with Bennett. British Conservatives who have in the past declared openly for free trade seem to be shifting their ground and lining up with the protectionists as they find public sentiment in that country veering that way.

HAS BENNETT A MANDATE?

Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King says Mr. Bennett has no mandate to go to London with such a proposal, but we cannot agree with that. If the last election was not a mandate for protection it is difficult to understand what sort of mandate would be expected. Being a protectionist himself, Mr. Bennett tries to get the rest of the Empire of the same mind so that there may be a protective union within the Empire. It seems quite logical.

Naturally, Mr. Bennett is speaking for his party, but his party seems to have very much the upper hand today. He is speaking for the country much the same as was Mackenzie King speaking for the country when he made proposals previously. The mind of the country seems to have changed.

If a ten per cent Empire tariff against the rest of the world is not in line with other protectionist views of the Conservative party, it is a logical extension which is fully justified under the circumstances.

C.N.R. TO DO WORK

Head Office Announces Emergent Unemployment Program For Which Government Pays Interest

MONTREAL, Oct. 10.—A new freight shed at Fort William to replace the structure destroyed by fire a few weeks ago, track laying of 140 miles of new branch lines on the prairie provinces and relaying of more than 100 miles of the company's main line trackage in Western Canada, is provided for in the emergency construction projects of the Canadian National system announced at Montreal.

These are the works specially undertaken after conferences between the government and the railways for the purpose of stimulating employment and business activities in the Dominion.

The Canadian National already has extensive works under way in Western Canada which will be proceeded with. These include such projects as the construction of the hotels at Saskatoon and at Vancouver and the construction of the new steamship docks at Vancouver to replace those recently destroyed by fire.

The special program, on the cost of which the Dominion government is assuming interest charges for a limited period, is in addition to the program which the company had already arranged to commence this fall and winter, which program has not yet been announced but which will, with the special program now brought forward, provide for construction and improvement activities in every section of the Dominion.

Planning Trip Around World

R. G. Cunningham to Visit Ireland, England and Scotland and Return By Way of Suez

R. G. Cunningham of Port Essington leaves tonight on a long tour around the world and expects to return home some time next year. He is going first to Ireland to pay a long visit with friends and then plans to visit England, Scotland and the Channel Islands.

Returning from London, he expects to take a liner by way of the Mediterranean and Suez Canal, calling at many ports in a leisurely way through the Indian Ocean, Chinese and Japanese waters and home by the Pacific.

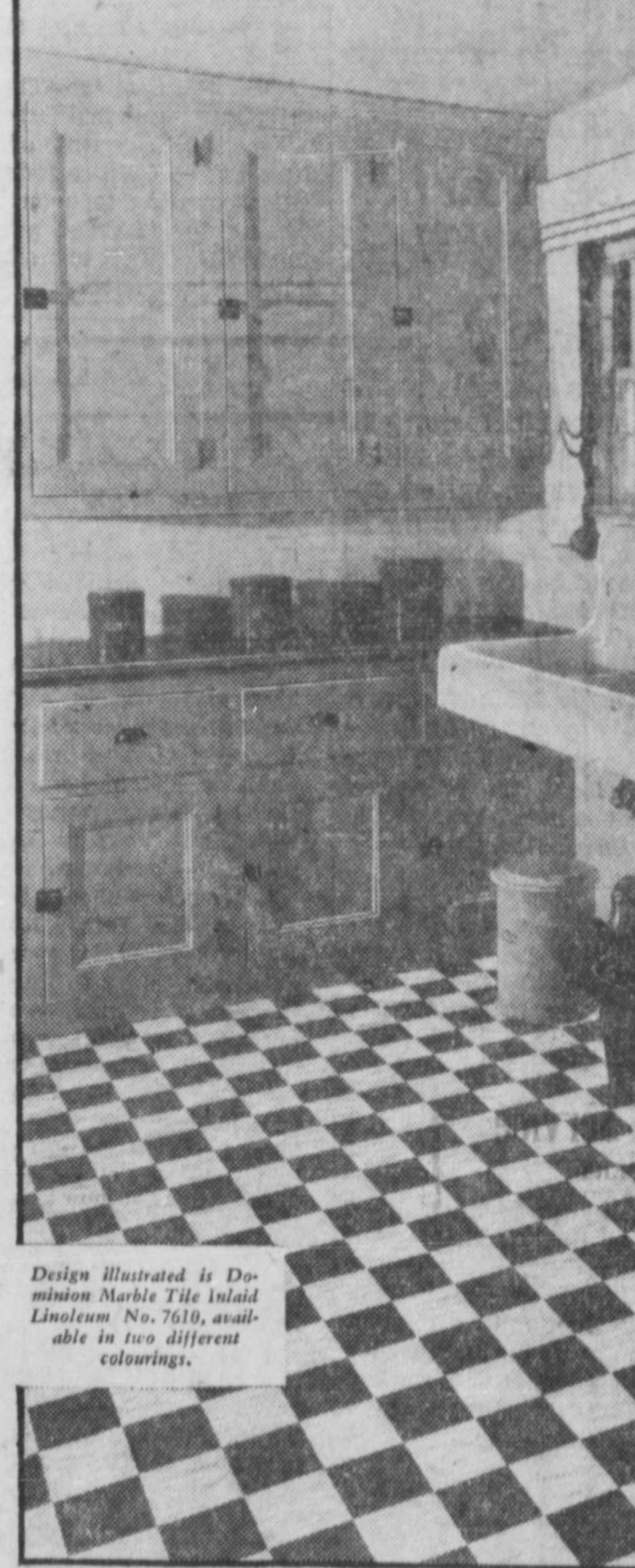

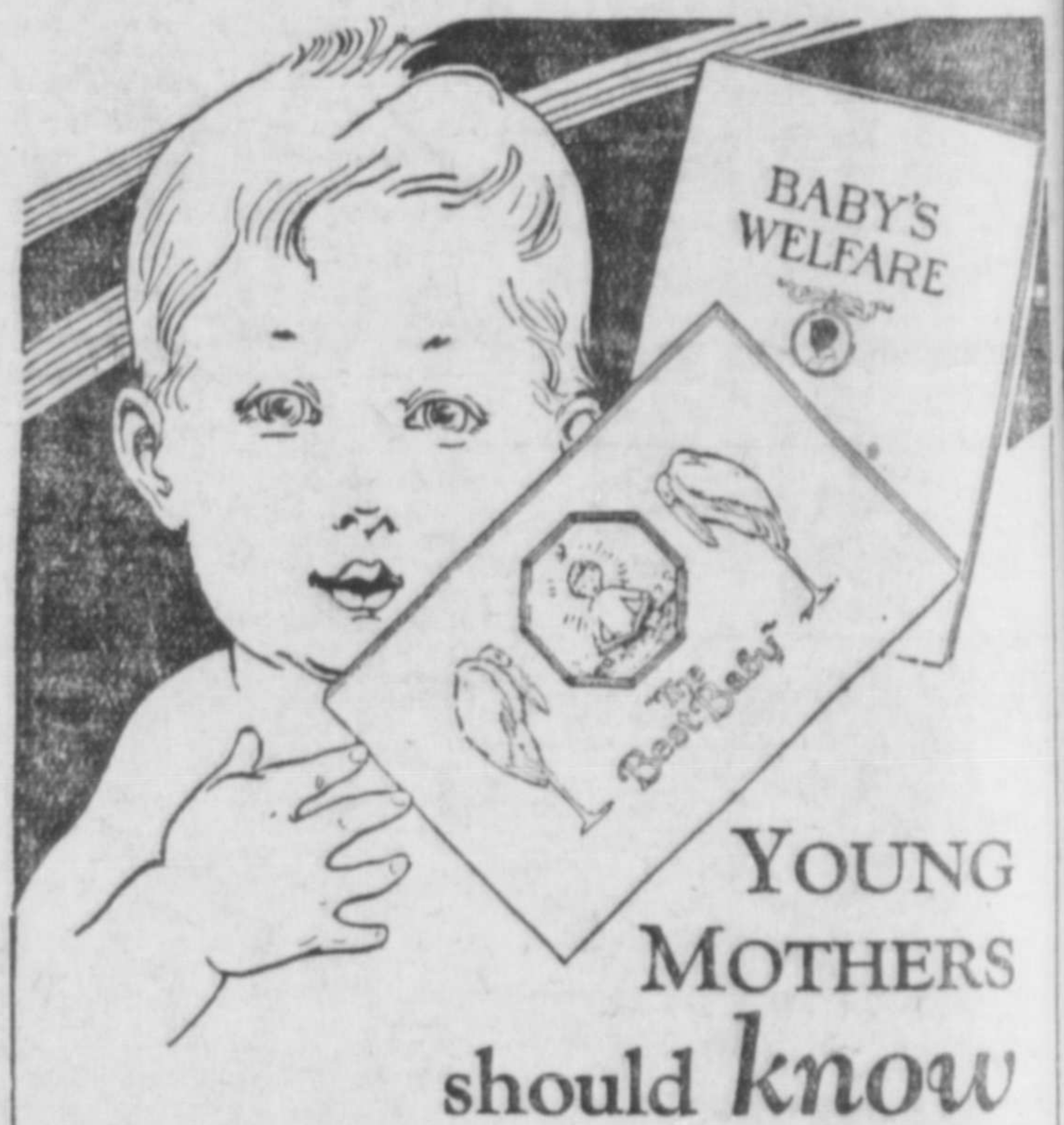
