## Grand Trunk Bill Passes The Dominion Parliament

Senate gives it a final reading last night and when signed by Governor General will be law; G.T.P. part of deal

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, November 8.—The Grand Trunk Bill will be the law of the land just as soon as it has been signed by the Governor General. It was passed by the Senate last night, after a somewhat strenuous time during which a number of the Government supporters bolted.

Under the provisions of the bill the Government acquires the second and third preference stock and the common stock of the whole system, including the Grand Trunk Pacific, the face value being close to two hundred million dollars. New non-preference stock will be issued to bear four per cent interest and redeemable at par after thirty years.

The only money immediately payable by the Government is in the form of something like two and a half million dollars a year on four per cent guaranteed stock. A court of arbitration will finally determine the amount to be paid, the bill setting only the maximum.

**NATIONAL RAID ON ANARCHISTS**  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—A nation-wide raid against anarchists commenced at New York last night when special officers of the Federal Government arrested more than 200 radicals.

### WAS INJURED AT SOMERVILLE CANNERY

Chief Justice Hunter recently heard an application in respect of the Workmen's Compensation Act. W. F. Gibson, of Alberni, was seriously injured in September, 1918, in the fall of a scaffold at the Somerville Cannery Company near Prince Rupert. He applied for compensation and the board, after examination, allotted him about \$170 in several payments, but refused to make any further payments. Mr. Gibson alleges that he had been wholly disabled since the accident and unable to work and claims that the board refuses to give him an independent examination, to which he is willing to submit.

He brought action against the board and Dr. G. A. B. Hall, chief medical officer, and the application was for an order of the court or mandamus compelling the board to give such examination and pay proper compensation.

S. S. Taylor, K.C., of Vancouver, appeared before the board and contended that no workman had any right of action for mandamus against the board. The chief justice directed that Dr. Hall be examined in the meantime as to the matter of the injuries.

Besides blowing several of the city light wires down and short-circuiting the city 220-volt power lines, the gale of last evening blew down all the sidings that have been put up in the last two days on the new house that is being built by Allan Davis on Sixth Avenue East. Till 10 o'clock all the power circuits in the city were out of commission pending repairs to the distributing transformer down town which had been blown out.

The Tilamook is in port unloading Alaska salmon. She will leave for Ketchikan about the middle of next week on her last trip of the season when the salmon pack will be cleaned up. She has been kept very busy the last few months bringing the fish from Alaska to this port for shipment over the G. T. P. It is expected that she will undergo repairs when she gets done with this business.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade last night an invitation to attend a conference of Boards of Trade of the province at Vancouver on February 4, 5, 6 and 7 was accepted and arrangements will be made for delegates to attend. The wives of delegates are also asked to visit Vancouver with their husbands.

In reply to a letter sent by the Board of Trade to T. D. Pattullo regarding the building of a spur line of railway into the Groundhog coal areas, the Minister of Lands wrote that he was intending to take the matter up with the Minister of Railways in person. The letter was read at the meeting of the Board last night.

A letter in regard to an application of the telegraph companies for an increase in their tolls was read at the meeting of the Board of Trade last night. The matter was referred to the Trade and Commerce Committee.

## HOUSE ADOPTS SOLDIER REPORT

Bill Carrying Out Provisions Recommended by Committee Ready for Senate.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, Nov. 8.—The report of the special committee on soldiers' re-establishment was adopted by the House of Commons last night and the bill thereon put through all its stages and made ready for the Senate.

An amendment by W. L. Mackenzie King to refer the report back to the committee was defeated by 100 to 35.

### RUPERT ARRIVED AHEAD OF SCHEDULE

Despite last night's severe snow storm, Capt. McKenzie brought the Prince Rupert in this morning fifteen minutes ahead of time. As all the wires were down between here and the wireless station the early blast of the siren surprised many and the usual number were not down to see the steamer come in. She had a fair passenger list most of whom remained in the city. Fine weather was experienced both southbound and northbound except in Queen Charlotte Sound yesterday afternoon when there was quite a gale off the Pacific. Being in sheltered waters last night the gale felt here was not particularly noticed on the ship.

### AGENT GENERAL IS QUITE EXONERATED

At the meeting of the Board of Trade last night several letters were read bearing on a criticism of the Agent General made by the local Board in which it was charged that northern and central B. C. had been overlooked in an article dealing with the resources of the province. Mr. Wade exonerated himself and the Board of Trade passed a resolution setting him right locally and ordering a letter to be written him to that effect.

### PROHIBITION IN STATE OF OHIO

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, Nov. 8.—Nothing but the official count, which probably will not be completed for a week or ten days will determine whether the Ohio voters have approved or disapproved the action of the General Assembly in ratifying the Federal prohibition amendment.

Unofficial returns give the wets a majority of 19 votes.

### GYROSCOPE COMPASS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—The use of the gyroscope compass is expected to reduce the Trans-Atlantic passage by about four hours. The record between Jacksonville and New York has already been lowered two hours by the use of the instrument.

O. M. Watson, of Alice Arm, is leaving for Vancouver by the Princess Beatrice tonight where he will spend the winter. He says he will be returning to the north early in the spring to get in on the big times that are coming when the winter is over and development and shipping is started again.

Mrs. Hoops and her sister, Miss Marjorie Campbell, of Telkwa, returned to their home this morning on the eastbound train. They have been in town since Thursday night and bid good-bye to their uncle, J. T. C. Williams, fishery inspector, who has gone to California.

## Roads are Discussed By Board of Trade

Mayor McClymont outlines steps already taken to secure improvement; financial difficulties

There was a somewhat lengthy discussion on the question of better roads at the meeting of the Board of Trade last night and at the close it was decided to urge the necessity of improving the roads.

In the absence of the expected mover of the resolution, Fred Stork spoke first. He said that the city had now justified its existence. At first the place had lived largely on borrowed money, but now it was depending on its own resources and was in better condition than ever before and its future was assured. In view of this we should no longer act like a village. He was in favor of permanent roads for even though they cost more they would be cheaper in the end. He thought the meeting should ask the Council to submit a bylaw asking for say \$150,000 to be voted as a starter. The time had arrived to grapple with this question.

W. E. Williams spoke of the necessity of first putting the sewer system in condition. He moved the resolution regarding the matter which was finally adopted.

S. E. Parker in seconding the resolution said that the streets were in a deplorable condition. The cost of improving them would be large but he thought they should get out of the small town rut. However, it was necessary to attend to the sewers first.

Mayor McClymont, who was asked to address the Board, outlined the work that had already been done and the difficulties which had to be overcome. He said that they had intended to do some roadwork with the proceeds of the sale of city lots, but the lots did not sell. The financial situation was a difficult one. The Provincial Government owed the city \$56,000 arrears of taxes. The local improvement plan had also proved a failure.

The Mayor then spoke of the new plan of making the whole city into a local improvement area. That was the only way they could borrow money. A number of the small bylaws were practically paid up and by equalizing the assessment it would not cost anyone more than it was costing today, whereas the present system continued would mean an increase.

**Cities Insolvent.**  
The mayor told of the number of cities that were insolvent, some in the hands of receivers. Prince Rupert on the other hand was one of the few places that had not touched her sinking fund. There were but six municipalities in the province that had their sinking fund intact and Prince Rupert was one of them.

The mayor then told of the difficulties attending any direct tax proposal because the railway lands and the provincial lands were all free of taxation. The Provincial Government was the largest speculator in the city because it was waiting for values to increase before selling. A few people were paying, but the big owners were getting away. Under the new proposal all would pay their share.

**Survey Made.**  
A survey had been made and an approximate cost of grading the whole city had been made. It was suggested that a million and a half dollars should be authorized first and the money borrowed as it was needed. This sum would build two trunk roads and a few side streets. Steps were already being taken to secure a granite quarry either on Smith Island or up the Skeena River and a sample of the rock had been sent to Ottawa for expert opinion as to its usefulness for road building. It was intended to crown the centre of the road with tar macadam, an expert in this work being procured from Victoria or Vancouver. They had already spent a good deal of money on the streets, more this year than in any year since the beginning of the war. The Mayor was thanked for his

### COMMITTEE TO DEAL WITH AERIAL LEAGUE

Resolution That They Initiate a Service with Vancouver Will Be Considered.

Last night's regular meeting of the Board of Trade a committee consisting of J. W. Nicholl, G. G. Hull, and D. G. Stewart was appointed to confer with the Aerial League of Canada with a view to establishing an air service between this city and Vancouver.

It was the opinion of several members of the Board that, as a committee had recently reported adversely in regard to this matter, it was useless to go any further, but the Board decided otherwise and the committee was appointed. G. Maguire strongly urged that no such opportunity be missed.

### WANTED TO LEAVE RUSSIA TO HERSELF

LONDON, Nov. 7.—The "Fight Famine" council of the British-German and Austrian representatives point to the danger in central Europe and urges the League of Nations to cease intervention in Russia so that the resources of that country be available for the world.

### WANTED TO SUBJUGATE THE ALPUCEMAS

### BEATRICE HERE INITIAL TRIP

Arrived This Morning Shortly Before Noon—Interesting Career of Boat.

This morning at 11:30 the C. P. R. Princess Beatrice arrived on her first trip of the new winter schedule of that company, which provides a weekly steamer. The Beatrice left Vancouver last Wednesday night at 11 o'clock and called at many points on the way north, including the three big mill ports, Powell River, Ocean Falls and Swanson Bay. At the last mentioned point she took on 100 tons of freight for Vancouver. This accounted for her delay of four hours. She sails this evening at 9 on her return trip south. She is running on an easy schedule to enable her to make calls at the numerous way points between here and the southern city.

The Princess Beatrice is a well known boat and along with the Princess May was considered one of the finest operating in the northern trade before 1910. In 1909 she brought Sir Charles Hays and Sir Charles Rivers Wilson and their special party to the city on one of their first visits of inspection. Sir Charles Hays was then president of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and Sir Charles Rivers Wilson was president of the Grand Trunk. The Beatrice was built 18 years ago at the Esquimalt yards and her first skipper was Captain E. McCoskrie, now port captain at Prince Rupert. She was built especially for the northern service in which she has always run, of late years maintaining the Rivers Inlet and Bella Coola run.

#### Officers.

There were many old time officers on her this morning and there were quite a number down to welcome them. Captain Rippon is still in charge of her, with Chief Engineer Ben Osborne below. Also Purser E. Cornelius, Freight Clerk T. Bridge and W. Horner, chief steward, are well known to pioneer travellers on the coast. Next week the Beatrice will be replaced by the Princess Royal for one trip. During that week the Beatrice will go on the ways and will come back on the run the week following to maintain the service through the winter. It is generally understood that the C. P. R. will extend its northern service when the season opens next spring and a larger boat will probably be placed on this run.

**Government Running Close to the Wind.**

The Government of Canada had a close call yesterday. One of its important measures passed with a majority of only four in the Senate and there is a possibility at any time that it may be forced to resign. The opposition to the Grand Trunk deal and to the soldier re-establishment proposals are at the bottom of the trouble. There are also a few who oppose the prohibition measure.

In the absence of a leader the wonder is that the Unionists have carried on so long. They have been beset with difficulties. The only objection to giving them their final quietus is that the evils of which we do not know at a time like this may be greater than those we see.

**Labor Member Tells of Russia.**

John Ward, labor member of the British Parliament, told the House of Commons of the terrible things he had seen in Russia as a result of the rebellion. He also said that such things were inevitable in any rebellion. There was bound to be bloodshed and atrocities. The horrors were not confined to one side only.

This is something we may all remember. There is in this country a constitutional method of attaining our ends. We have the opportunity to show through the ballot box whether the people are with us or not and if they are with us there are few unattainable things. Anyone who is dissatisfied with conditions can obtain relief by persuading their fellows to support them in electing members to Parliament. Once we begin to use force to attain our ends there is no telling when it will end. In Mexico, where there was a rebellion, there has been nothing but bloodshed, rapine and murder for many years and even yet the country has not settled down.

Colonel John Ward may or may not be right in regard to intervention in Russia. We are of opinion that he probably is wrong. In regard to the evils of rebellion, however, there is no doubt. Violence breeds violence and in any country that is constitutionally governed there is no need of a violent upheaval.

**PACKING SCHOOLS FOR FRUIT DISTRICT**

KOOTENAY, Nov. 7.—Packing schools are to be conducted at various points in Kootenay district during the winter months and the Provincial Horticultural department will make every endeavor to encourage the betterment of the fruit packing of the province.

**Major Gibson Figures Largely in Recent Issue of "Resources."**

Among the interesting articles in "Resources" this month is one under the title "Major Gibson at the Front." It is accompanied by a full illustration of the major and other local men taken just after Festubert. The major had fought for the United States in the Philippines and when war broke out with Germany he was one of the first to leave here. This is how Resources tells of his reason for going:

"When Prince Rupert was in the stump stage of evolution the major landed here, and was soon known and liked by everyone as he is now. When war broke out in Europe he felt that he must go to fight for his country. But, a matter of a decade before he had been fighting for another country! To some people that may seem a little curious, so an old friend questioned him on the point since his return. He blushed prettily and hesitatingly said:

"Oh, I believe I just felt the same urge as the other Britishers, the rank and file of them I mean. It wasn't a matter of Belgium so much. It was just a deep down feeling that they wouldn't be made slaves of by the Huns without putting up a fight. That's all there was to it."

**Sport Briefs**

Manager Kid Gleason of the Chicago White Sox is not wasting any time in signing up his players for next year. He has already made a contract with Dickie Kerr to remain on the Chicago team but Dickie wasn't so easy to get this year and Gleason had to show him a good piece of money before signing. A hero in the World's Series has to be paid for.

Two of the big league stars became managers during the last season and it did not affect their efficiency as players either. Tris Speaker, king pin batter, became manager of the Cleveland Indians in the middle of the season and ended up with an average of over .300. Gavy Cravath became manager of the Philadelphia Nationals in mid-season and ended up with a .340 average.

In the National Rifle Association's recent shoots in England the Canadian marksmen took six prizes out of a total of 223. The hope was expressed by all the officials of the competition that next year Canada would revive that larger teams would be sent. The prizes were won as follows: Great Britain, 45; Australia, 49; New Zealand, 9; South Africa, 10; and Canada 6.

Lloyd Cook, whom Edmonton claims as her star, has been appointed manager of the Vancouver Millionaires. Frank Patriek, who has been manager of the Vancouver team since its organization finds that he is getting rushed, so he has decided to take over the business end of the team while Cook will supervise the players. Cook has had a long experience in the puck-chasing game and played in Edmonton in 1915 when the Patricks brought him to the coast where he became a star. He went to Spokane for a season and then went back to the Terminals as captain. The selection will be popular with the Vancouver players as well as with all the other teams in the P.C.H.A.

On the evening of November 20th in the Empire Theatre at Edmonton, Eddie Fingard and Frank Barrieau, claimants for the Canadian Lightweight Championship will meet in the first of a series of elimination fights for the Dominion title. Both Fingard and Barrieau are now in Edmonton completing training.

Captain and Mrs. Mastin arrived in Prince Rupert on Thursday night and are taking charge of the Salvation Army work here. Their welcome service will be held in the Army citadel on Sunday evening at 7:30, the subject being "Standing on the Rock." Doubtless there will be a large attendance on that occasion as everyone is invited.

Corporal Tommy Ross, who the D.C.M. at Mons in 1915, has just received his decoration. He served overseas four years and is now back home firing on the G.T.P. Railway.
