WILL NOT AID PREMIER MACDONALD

Baldwin Declines Bid of Labor Government To Employment Parley

Conservatives of Great Britain Feel That Administration Is Incapable of Meeting Present Critical Situation

LONDON, June 19:—Premier Ramsay MacDonald yesterday invited Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin and Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George to join in a non-partizan conference on measures for unemployment relief. Last night Mr. Baldwin, the Conservative leader, was reported to have declined the invitation after a consultation with leading Conservatives. These advisors, it is stated, took the view that Conservative abstention from the conference would not prevent the government from introducing into the House of Commons any measures they might evolve to meet the critical situation. They feel that the government is incapable of dealing with unemployment and resent Premier MacDonald's refusal to allow the Opposition access to official data on conditions of trade, industry and unemployment.

PREMIER IS HENRY ON NOMINATED WAY NORTH

King Receives Unanimous Choice at Prince Albert; Speaks in Quebec

OTTAWA, June 19:—Resting here after the first stage of his election campaign speaking tour, Premier King last night received word of his unanimous nomination at a Liberal convention in Prince Albert, Sask. The telegram he received from the convention stated that 292 delegates had attended the meeting, representing 145 out of 146 polls. The Premier and members of his party left this morning on the second stage of the Prime Minister's tour. Tonight he will speak at Quebec before leaving for the Maritime Provinces where he will open his campaign at Moncton tomorrow.

Judgment Given In Stewart Case

Damage Claim Dismissed and Counter Claim Is Allowed

Dismissing the claim of the plaintiff for some \$900 and awarding defendant \$182 on a counter-claim, Judge F. McB. Young has handed down his decision in the long standing and hard fought County Court case of Harry Comes vs. Crawford Transfer Co. The action resulted from an automobile collision several months ago at Stewart. Plaintiff's claim was for damages as was also defendant's counter-claim.

L. W. Patmore acted as counsel for the plaintiff while Milton Gonzales acted for the defendant.

NOMINATIONS IN PROVINCE

Plunkett Named in Victoria and Esling For West Kootenay

VANCOUVER, June 19:—Federal election nominations in British Columbia last night included the choice of D'Arcy B. Plunkett, member of the late Parliament, as Conservative candidate for Victoria and W. K. Esling, late M.P., as Conservative candidate for West Kootenay. Mr. Esling's nomination was made at a convention in Nelson.

Palatial New C.N.R. Steamer Due In Vancouver Saturday

VANCOUVER, June 19:—Word was received in Vancouver late yesterday from B. C. Keeley, Pacific coast manager, Canadian National Steamships, who is now in San Pedro, California, that ss. Prince Henry left for Vancouver at ten o'clock Tuesday evening. According to her schedule, the new steamship will arrive at William Head on Saturday.

S.S. Prince Henry is the first of three new steamships constructed at Birkenhead, England, for the Pacific coastal service of the Canadian National Steamships. This boat will make its official debut in Pacific coast shipping circles on evening of July 3, when she will go into the Alaskan service.

After a short stay at William Head the Henry will sail direct to Vancouver where her outfitting will be completed. In addition to Mr. Keeley, ss. Prince Henry was met at San Pedro yesterday by commander S. N. Nicholls, marine supt. and Capt. D. Donald, who will have charge of the palatial new steamer from the time it leaves San Pedro.

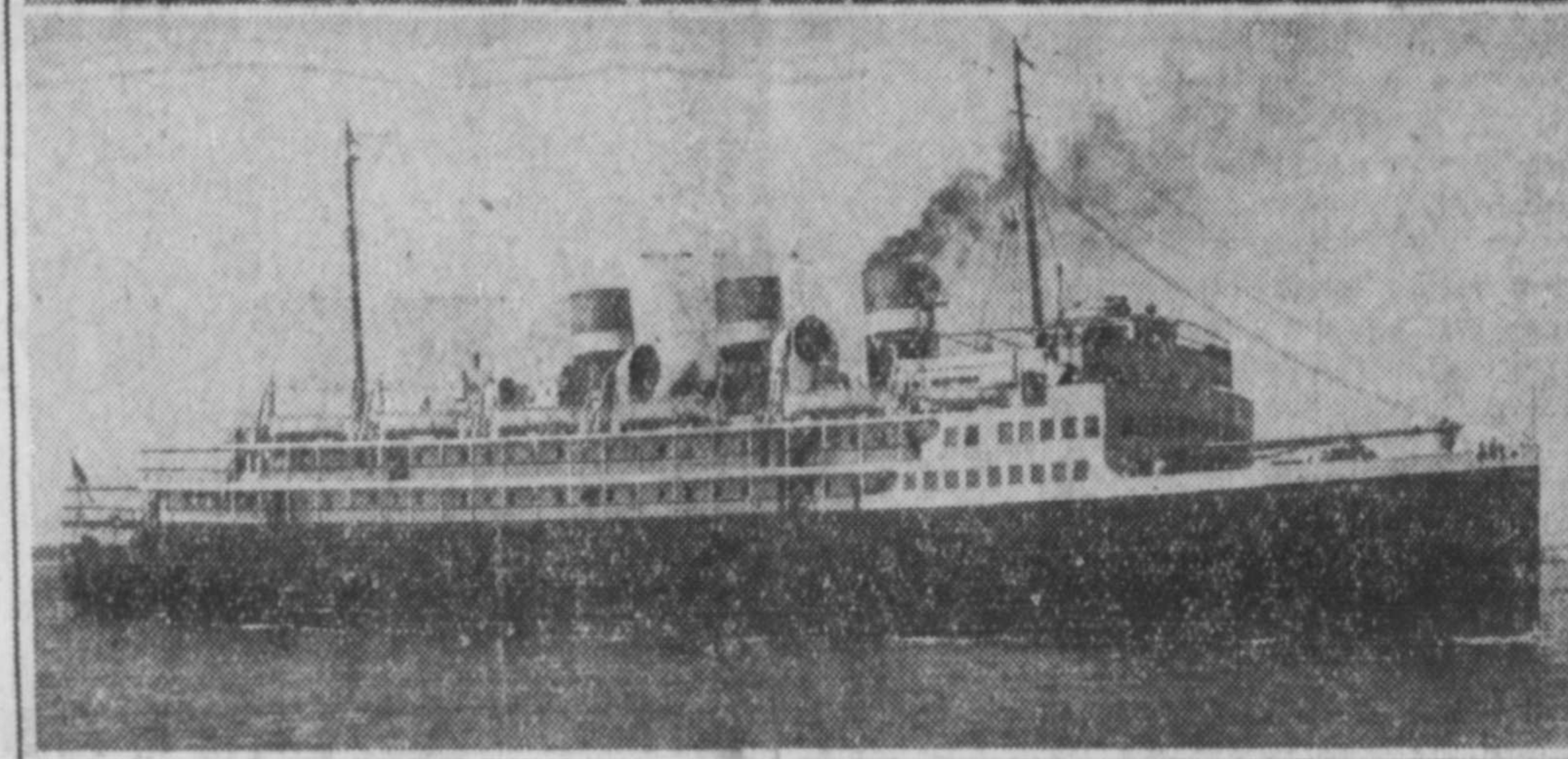

FATHER CHARGED WITH SON'S MURDER

New Canadian National Coast Steamship



This is a picture of the Canadian National Steamship "Prince Henry" which was constructed in England and has arrived on the Pacific Coast to enter the Alaskan service of the company. This steamship was constructed at the ship building yards of Cammel, Laird & Company and is a palatial tribute to shipbuilding art. Three American Trolling Boats Seized By Fishery Patrol For Anchoring In Canadian Waters

With three American trolling boats, which she had seized in the lee of Rose Spit where they lay anchored, in tow, the fisheries patrol cruiser Rividis, Capt. Sheppard, arrived in port yesterday afternoon. The three boats are the Tillie M., Sunrise and Queen City, each of which will be charged with being unlawfully anchored in Canadian waters. The seizures were made at 2 o'clock Wednesday morning. Each boat has a crew of two men. They are Seattle boats fishing out of Ketchikan.

On both the Tillie M. and Sunrise, it is stated, there was found some 700 pounds of fresh spring salmon. O. C. Jensen was skipper of the Tillie M.; L. Sandberg of the Sunrise and John Thorgerson on the Queen City. The boats were moored overnight at the fishery floats and today were taken to Digby Island where the May, which was seized some two or three weeks ago, is also being held. Proceedings, it is expected, will be launched against all four boats.

TWO GRITS IN FIELD

Dr. Thompson of Dawson and J. Skinner of Whitehorse In Contest

DAWSON, June 19:—Two Liberals—Dr. W. E. Thompson of Dawson and J. D. Skinner, publisher of the Whitehorse Star, are candidates for Yukon seat in the forthcoming federal election.

Dr. Thompson was named by a Liberal convention while Mr. Skinner was chosen at an open convention. It is expected that either one or the other will withdraw from the field.

Capt. George Black, member of the late Parliament, is expected to again be the Conservative candidate.

IRELAND ARRESTED

Former City Relief Officer In Custody on Six Charges

VANCOUVER, June 19:—George D. Ireland, dismissed city relief officer, was placed under arrest last night on six charges of theft by conversion while relief officer. The warrant on which he was arrested charged the theft of \$350 but the city prosecutor, W. M. MacKay, estimated that the total of alleged thefts was just under \$3,000.

Ireland has been released on bail of \$6,000.

Ireland appeared in city police court this morning and was remanded until June 26.

Capt. Guthrie of Comox Is Formally Arraigned In Court at Courtenay

Thought His Boy Had Been Cheeky and Threw Stick at Him in Moment of Anger—Pioneer Family on Vancouver Island

COURTENAY, June 19:—A series of small irritations within an ordinarily happy family has resulted in the death of Patrick Guthrie, aged 16, and the arrest of his father, Capt. Patrick Hugh Guthrie, on a murder charge. The father thought the boy had been "cheeky" and, in a moment of anger, threw a stick at him. The missile, it afterwards developed, pierced the lad's skull and caused a hemorrhage which resulted in his death on Sunday last. The coroner's jury found that death resulted from "misadventure" as a result of being struck on the head by a stick thrown by his father. The father was then charged with murder in provincial police court and the preliminary hearing, after being called, was adjourned for eight days.

Mrs. Guthrie left last month for a trip to Scotland and arrived at her destination on the day of her son's death.

Capt. Guthrie is an ex-Imperial army officer and a veteran of the Boer War. He is a huge man, aged about sixty, and is described as having a kindly nature although brusque in manner. The family has been respected in the Comox Valley where they have ranched for the past 25 years. The elder Guthrie has been known for the affection he held for his family.

MERGER IS POSSIBLE

British Interests May Mill Own Ore In Portland Canal

Insufficiency of the world's stocks of gold, and its converse, the weakness of commodity markets, was recently given by Sir Josiah Stamp, economist and man of affairs, as reason for the worldwide industrial depression, says the Vancouver Province.

Economists the world over give slightly varying explanations of the prevailing depression, according to particular local or national conditions, but as to the shortage of gold stocks they are in general agreement.

All the leading nations are struggling to retain their existing gold holdings and the market is eager for all new production.

It is for that reason that gold-producing companies are in the favorable position today of finding an eagerly absorptive market for their output at a time when there is a glut and a falling off in price in practically all other metals.

This situation is of interest to British Columbia, where in the Portland Canal area there is located some of the largest gold deposits in the Dominion. Made famous by the spectacular operations of the Premier Gold Mining Company, large properties in this region are still under development with plans maturing for heavy production as soon as practicable.

While it is recognized by the Premier Company that the life of their parent mine is measurably within sight, it does not follow that the end may come within a period of several years yet. In the cleaning up of a mine it frequently happens that new rich veins and pockets are located which provide additional ore for added years of milling. That seems to be the situation with the Premier, where recently some new ore bodies have been discovered.

Premier Seeks E. C. Silver
At the same time the Premier is endeavoring to get control of adjoining properties.

In its annual reports for the past few years there has been recurring reference to the negotiations that have been under way to acquire control of the B. C. Silver.

In the Premier's last annual report issued only a few weeks ago perhaps the most interesting of the comments made by General Mana-

ger Guess are those relating to the B. C. Silver Company. The B. C. holdings are not being worked, and an effort, says Mr. Guess, on the part of Premier to work out an operating basis which would be satisfactory to both parties has not yet been successful but is being continued. The adjoining ground could be worked to advantage, he believes. The plant and staff of Premier could be utilized economically and the company, he says, would secure many years of added life.

Obstacles to the deal have so far proved too great to be overcome.

It is reported that differences are due largely to the divergent valuation placed by the two companies on the B. C. Silver ore, the Premier's figure being \$1,500,000, while B. C. Silver Company places it at \$7,000,000.

B. C. Silver is handicapped from the fact that while its mineralization prospects are encouraging, its authorized capital has been fully paid up and Premier, which already holds 38% of the stock, has sufficient voting power to prevent recapitalization and the raising of further funds as was recently proposed by the Selukwe interests.

B. C. Silver is financed and controlled by the British Canadian Silver Corporation Ltd., a subsidiary of the Selukwe Gold Mining and Finance Corporation Co., London.

National Interests

The rivalry in national interests is also a factor in the difficulty of successful negotiations for acquisition of control by the Premier, which is an American company.

British interests are frankly averse to losing control of what is believed to be a valuable gold property and are endeavoring to retain it under British direction.

In view of the world's demand for gold the London interests have recently initiated a new movement which has as its objective B. C. Silver and Sebakwe consolidation, which might also include Premier Border.

The interesting position of Premier Border in such a unification follows from the fact that its property would be the logical site for a mill and the proper tunnel levels for the economic extraction of the B. C. Silver-Sebakwe ores. From its physical position all ore could be extracted by the gravity method.

In addition Premier Border has already developed a promising porphyry zone in its main tunnel level which may be the continuation of the Sebakwe zone of geologically related to the main Premier porphyry zone.

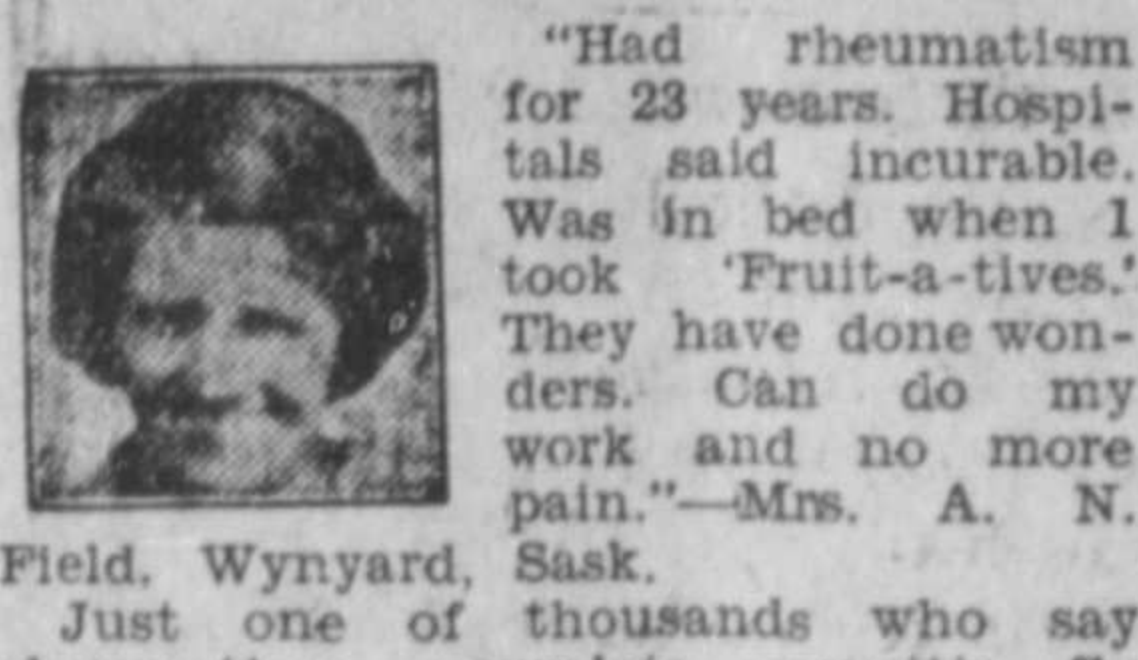

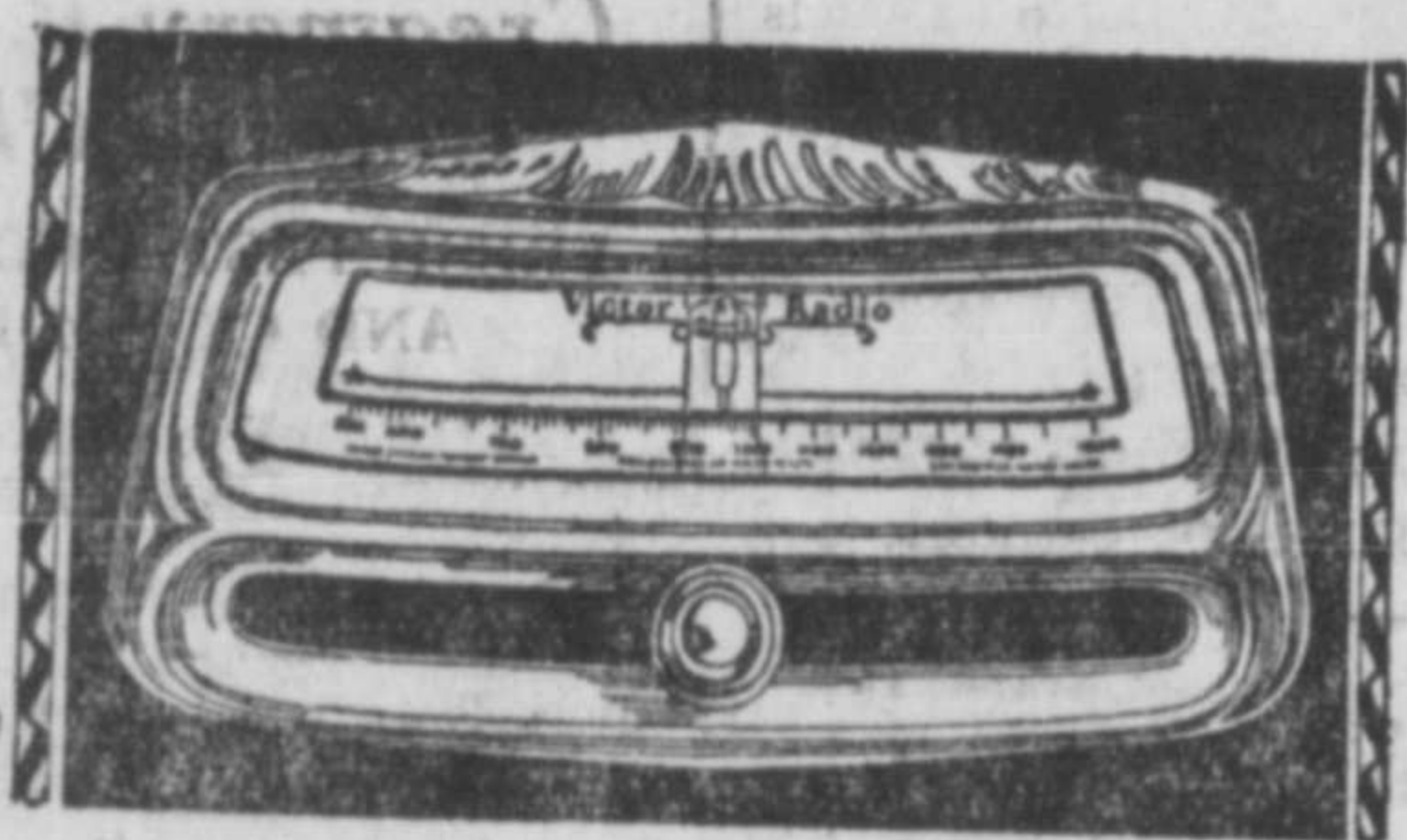
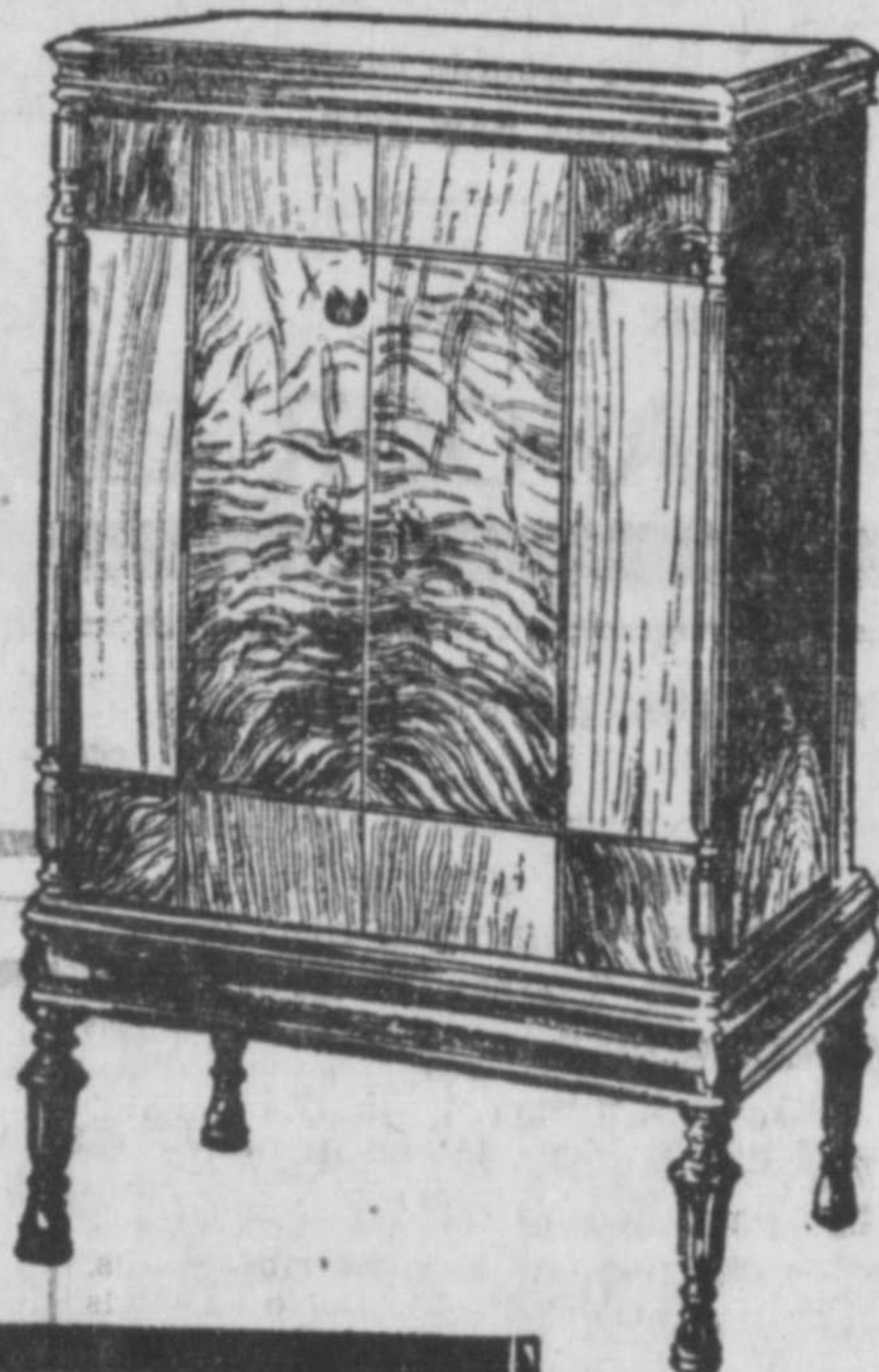

CHECK FOR HOSPITAL

Has Received \$2,660 From Government as Share of Liquor Profits

It was reported at last night's meeting of the hospital board that a check for \$2,660, as share of liquor profits, had just been received from the provincial government. This was the largest liquor profits check the hospital has ever received, it was pointed out.

The finance committee report, presented by G. P. Tinker, chairman of the committee, showed a deficit on hospital operation in May of \$371.50, collections having amounted to \$5,058.21 while disbursements totalled \$5,429.71. There were 1879 hospital days at a cost per hospital day of \$2.89.

W. C. B. CASES DISCUSSED

Hospital Board Will Try to Secure Better Adjustment of Account

Workmen's Compensation Board remittances came in for discussion again at last night's hospital board meeting with the reading of a letter from the board enclosing the sum of \$22.50 to cover treatment of Thomas Finnegan who had actually incurred a bill of \$65. It was pointed out by H. W. Birch, managing secretary, that Finnegan had stayed in the hospital after his doctor had discharged him. Then he should be personally responsible for the balance of the account, G. V. Wilkinson thought.

Ald. Macdonald suggested that further negotiations be entered into with compensation board with a view to obtaining a more satisfactory adjustment of the account. He believed that Finnegan was entitled to more than the amount in question paid by the compensation board. Of course, if the board refused to pay more then Finnegan would be responsible himself. Ald. Macdonald stated that, in cases of this kind, he had always found the board to be very fair to the workman.

Frank Dibb said that his experience had been that the compensation board was always trying to evade payments.

After further discussion, it was decided, on motion of G. P. Tinker and R. E. Benson, to take the matter up further with the Compensation Board.
