

# McGrath Mountain

ALICE ARM, Jan. 16.-Work on the big development tunnel being driven on the Sunrise property on McGrath Mountain, near Alice Arm, by Kitsault-Eagle Silver Mines Ltd. had been temporarily suspended. The cause of the cessation was the difficulty experienced in getting supplies up the mountain during the heavy snows. Work will be resumed in the spring.

The tunnel has been driven a distance of 1150 feet and two crosscuts have also been driven. When work ceased the tunnel was in a good mineralized formation, and it is considered that no great distance will now have to be driven before the big ore body showing on the surface is cut through.

The Kitsault-Eagle Co. are to be congratulated upon the tenacity they have displayed in driving the tunnel, and credit is due to G. W. McMorris, president of the company, for the able manner he has handled operations.

## Is Hopeful For Woodbine Mine

Hugh McGuire, Who Is in Charge Empire. He says that Juneau is of Operations, Passed Through City Yesterday

Results obtained in some 400 feet of diamond drilling at the Woodbine mine in the Portland Canal area justify further exploration work in lion dollars in gold last year. From search of a large low grade ore body in the opinion of Hugh McGuire, who is in charge of operations at the mine, and who passed through the city yesterday aboard the Prince Rupert, returning to Stewart after

a brief business trip to Vancouver. Mr. McGuire is arranging for an additional 2000 feet of drilling to be carried out. If tests prove successful and indicate the presence of an appreciable quantity of ore, a new tunnel will be driven in from Cascade Creek, about 175 feet below the present high level tunnel.

No strike of very rich ore is anticipated, according to Mr. McGuire, but he hopes to block out sufficient ore of low grade nature to justify operation of the mine.


