PREMIER TOLMIE ATTACKED BY DICK

Conservative Member For Vancouver Flays Tory Administration

"Taxes Now Mere Flea Bite to What They Must Be Soon;" Issues Warning Against Machine Developing

VANCOUVER, May 10:—Addressing the Constitutional Club here last night, William Dick, one of the Conservative members of the legislature for Vancouver, made an attack upon the Tolmie government "not for the purpose of condemning it," he said, "but to straighten it out. I predict, when an election comes, this province will owe thirty-one million dollars more than when the present government came into power. Taxes now are a mere flea bite to what they will have to come to within the next two years. I wonder if we had Mr. Bowser back in power would this have taken place?"

YUKONER IS DEAD

John McMeekin Was Member of Mounted Police, Prospector and Miner

John McMeekin, aged 67, an ex-member of Royal Canadian Mounted Police, prospector and miner of the Yukon, died last Sunday in the Vancouver General Hospital after an illness of five months.

A native of Whiteabby, County Antrim, Ireland, the deceased came to Canada in 1882 and settled at Silver Islet, near Port Arthur, later moving to San Francisco. In 1899 he went to the Klondike.

In 1912 he went to Vancouver. He subsequently became interested in oil development at Peace River Crossing.

He is survived by four sisters and one brother. One sister, Mrs. James Cathcart, resides at Chemainus, V.I.

The funeral was held Wednesday from Center & Hanna's chapel, with Rev. Thomas Wilson officiating. Interment was in Ocean View Burial Park.

BOTH OF HIS LEGS BROKEN

Further Details of Death This Week at Kamloops of Bert Hanson

Further particulars have been received here of the fatality which resulted in the death at Kamloops this week of Bert Hanson, brother of Olof Hanson of this city.

Mr. Hanson, who was a timber contractor and forty-two years of age, died in the Kamloops hospital following an accident at Lemiere when he had both legs broken while engaged in a pole job.

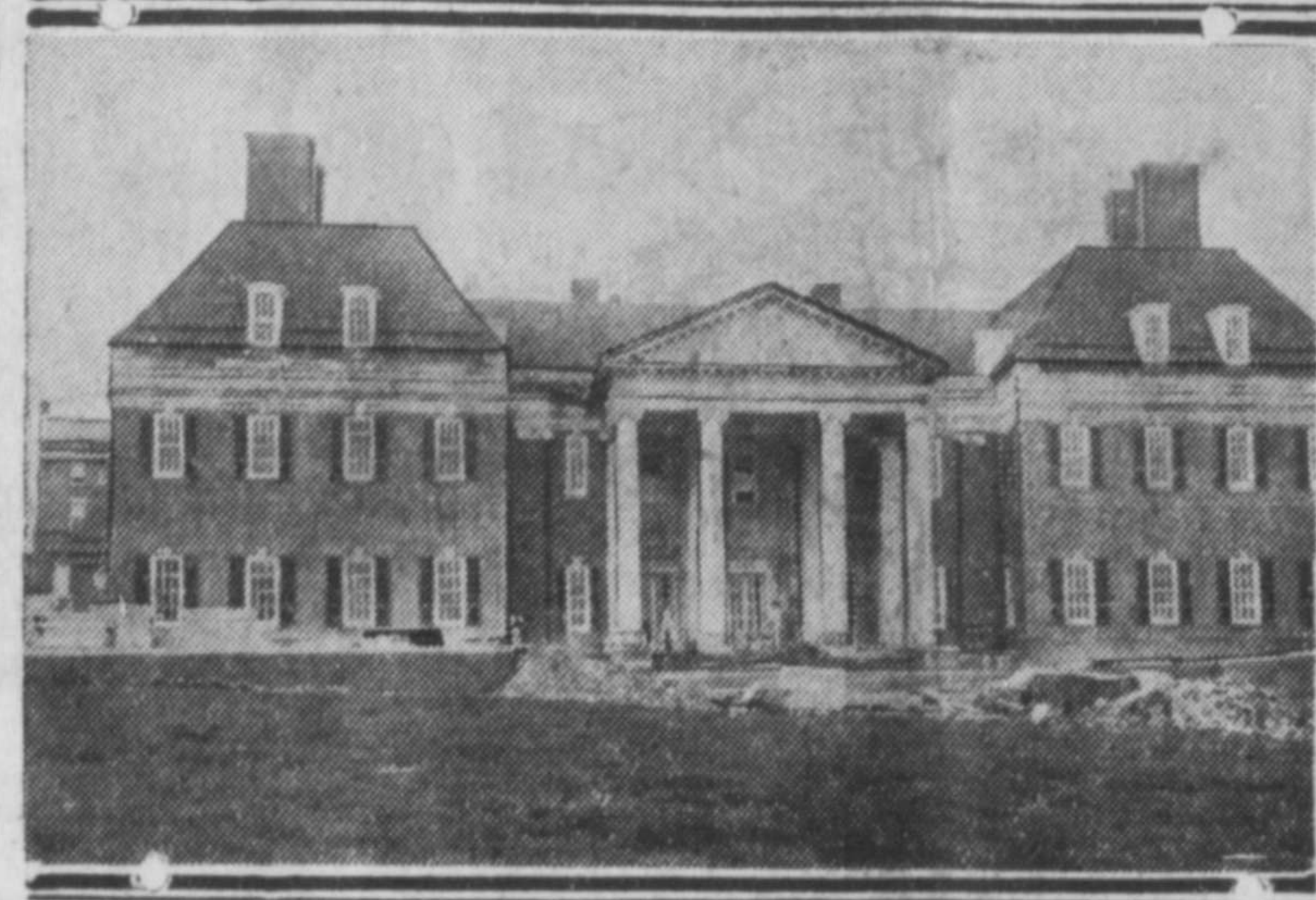

FIVE COURTS TO BE HELD

Great Rush of Applications For Presentation This Year

LONDON, May 10:—Five courts are to be held this year by the King and Queen because of the great rush of applications for presentations. Women are more anxious than ever to be included this year in the Lord Chamberlain's lists, as the King will be present in person. Last year he was not sufficiently recovered to act at the courts, and his place was taken by the Prince of Wales.

Debutantes from America and the Dominions figure largely in the lists. The reappearance of the King at the Royal Courts will make this year's season one of the most memorable since the war. Already fashionable dressmakers have received orders for Court dresses, and "curtsey classes" for debutantes are starting.

This year a new departure has been made in the dates of the courts. Four are to be in May and one at the beginning of July, none in June. Only once in recent years has there been a court in July, and that was in 1926.

TEN HOBOS ARRESTED

Taken Yesterday From Freight Train at Kaien Station

Ten hobos, all foreigners and not known in the city, were taken off an incoming freight train at Kaien station yesterday afternoon by C. N. R. Constable David Geddes and Provincial Constable A. Grant and appeared this morning in provincial police court before Stipendiary Magistrate H. F. McLeod on charges under the Railway Act of trespassing on a train with intent to ride without paying fare. Suspended sentences of two months were imposed in each case.

AMENDMENT ON ELECTION

Two Enumerators Instead of One to Be Appointed in Each Polling Division

OTTAWA, May 10:—An amendment to the Dominion Elections Act has been approved by the elections committee of the House of Commons.

The law, as it stands, provides that returning officers shall appoint enumerators from each polling sub-division. The amendment provides for two enumerators in place of one in each sub-division. The idea is that each of the major political parties will be represented by an enumerator, the two to work together and check one another. In the event of any dispute, the returning officer will be the referee.

VILLAGE IS STARVING

Two Hundred and Fifty Indians North of The Pas Are in Bad Way

THE PAS, Man., May 10:—According to word brought here today, a settlement of about 250 Indians is on the verge of starvation in the York Factory area of Northern Manitoba.

House of Commons Put Business Through On Friday Very Quickly

Resolution to Increase Biological Board Approved Smartly—Post Office Estimates Discussed

OTTAWA, May 10:—With the end of the session dependent upon the facility with which the business is put through, the House of Commons yesterday coasted along the order paper. If the progress the House made yesterday may be taken as any criterion of the future, the end should not be many weeks away. A Department of Marine and Fisheries resolution to increase the biological board was out through all stages and the third reading with scarcely any hesitation. Several other bills were advanced and post office estimates were discussed.

REJECTION OF GOULD PLAN

Boston Transcript Pleased at Defeat of Amendment Which Would Have Placed Canada on a Quota Basis

BOSTON, May 10:—The Boston Evening Transcript rejoices editorially in the rejection by the United States of the Gould Amendment to the Harris Immigration Bill placing Canada on a quota basis.

"Senator Gould's peculiar flourish toward a restriction of immigration from Canada, which he could not seem to explain himself did not amount to much, but it put the Senate on record as unwilling to do any more toward exciting the enmity of a friendly neighbor. The Maine statesman offered an amendment to the Harris Immigration to place Canada on a quota basis, and then he arose and explained that it did not mean anything, as the annual immigration from the Dominion is 19,000, whereas under his amendment 67,000 persons might be admitted. The Senate by a vote of 29 to 37, could see nothing in the Gould amendment, and the incident was closed. Whatever of inarticulate emotion may have inspired Senator Gould to submit his amendment, the Senate accurately reflected public opinion in voting that free trade in citizens between Canada and the United States is a condition which the people of this country desire to continue. The Canadian Club of Boston and other organizations which have protested against the folly of throwing more causes of friction into the American-Canadian hopper are to be congratulated upon having achieved their end."

SYSTEM LACKING

Things Not As They Should Be in Vancouver Relief Department, Mayor Malkin Says

VANCOUVER, May 10:—While he could not say that there had been actual dishonesty, terrible slackness, amounting almost to an entire lack of system, has been disclosed in the city relief department, Mayor W. H. Malkin stated yesterday following a secret meeting of the council committee which is now investigating the situation.

The committee decided on an independent audit and will proceed with the investigation next Monday.

McQuarrie Is Renominated

Is Again Conservative Choice For New Westminster in Federal Field

NEW WESTMINSTER, May 10:—W. G. McQuarrie M.P. will again contest the riding of New Westminster at the forthcoming federal general election. He was unanimously chosen at a nominating convention here last night.

Steamer Has Been Floated

Matsqui Released From Island in Strait of Juan de Fuca Following Stranding

VANCOUVER, May 10:—The steamer Matsqui, ashore since Wednesday morning on Spieden Island in the Straits of Juan de Fuca, has been refloated and brought here.

National Park Bill Is Passed

House of Commons Accepts Amendment Sponsored By H. H. Stephens of Vancouver

OTTAWA, May 10:—A bill consolidating previous acts dealing with national parks was given its third reading in the House of Commons last night. It carried an amendment sponsored by H. H. Stephens, M.P. for Vancouver Centre, providing that 30 days' notice must be given before the regulations enacted become effective by publication in the Canada Gazette.

AMY JOHNSON STILL GOING

Broke Strut Bolt at Bandar Abbas Last Night But Necessary Repairs Made

BANDAR ABBAS, May 10:—Amy Johnson took off from here today for Karachi, India, on her solo flight from England to Australia. Landing here last night from Bagdad, she broke a strut bolt. Necessary repairs were made overnight.

A DARING GIRL

Miss Amy Johnson, niece of the manager of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company in this city, seems to be illustrating two truths. One is that the British people are losing none of their virility and the other is that the new woman has great possibilities ahead of her when she can accomplish such things as those we read about in connection with Miss Johnson's flight. Prince Rupert people will take a special interest in Miss Johnson and her spectacular effort.

PROSPECTING FOR HERRING

When the fisheries commission met here a number of years ago it was stated that there were plenty of summer herring in these waters and that the fish were of excellent quality, well suited for curing as well as for use as halibut bait. No thorough test has ever been made as to the quantity of fish available.

The decision of the Dominion Government to undertake this prospecting on behalf of the local fishermen will be received with satisfaction. Prince Rupert should not be wholly dependent on halibut and salmon but should secure a share of the benefits from the other fish.

CONDITION OF CHINA

There are conflicting reports as to the present condition of China. While some claim that the reports received on the outside are very much exaggerated, there are others who say that the half of the horrors of civil strife and banditry is never told and that the country is in much worse condition than we think.

It seems a pity that one of the parties cannot get sufficient strength to finally subdue the other and thus end the civil war. With that ended there would be hope of ending the condition of banditry that undoubtedly exists.

SUMMER ELECTION

It seems likely that the election will be one that will suit the farmers. It comes between haying and harvest when no one is particularly busy and yet when weather conditions are such that all can travel to the polls.

Now that the Mackenzie King Government has to some extent stolen the policy of its opponents it does away with the clear cut issue that might otherwise have been raised. Now it becomes largely one of efficiency and of British Preference. Conservatives have not been keen on the British Preference because it tended to lower the amount of protection given Canadian manufacturers.

The farmers have secured protection for their butter and already Prince Rupert is feeling the effect by having to pay higher prices. One slight advance has already taken place and it is expected others will follow.

The difficulty with all these changes is that what benefits one usually hurts another. Prince Rupert people do not want the cost of living to be high yet they like to get a high price for halibut and salmon.

At any rate the fat is in the fire now. The Mackenzie King Government is standing for higher tariffs against United States and lower tariffs against Great Britain and other parts of the Empire. Doubtless there will be other issues but this seems to be the chief. It will be for the people of Canada to decide whether they approve this action or not.

Planting Garden and Painting of Picture Are Akin

MONTREAL, May 10—"Painting a picture and planting a garden are somewhat the same," said Dr. F. C. Harrison, professor of bacteriology at McGill, in a lecture on garden planning given at the Mechanics' Institute. He compared the two, saying that the soil is as the canvas, and the flowers, plants, shrubs and trees as the many colored paints applied by the artist to his canvas.

Young Jack Thompson, Negro Of Oakland, Captures Welter Championship From Jack Fields

DETROIT, May 10:—The new welterweight champion of the world is a dark-skinned negro lad of Oakland, Cal., named Young Jack Thompson. In one of the most startling pugilistic upsets of years, Thompson, with the heart of a lion and the boxing skill of a Joe Gans, decisively defeated Jackie Fields, the titleholder, in a blistering 15-round battle here last night. After the last punch went flying through the air, Referee McClelland raised Thompson's hand in victory and a crowd of 15,000 fans roared its approval.

Fields, the champion of less than a year, buried his head in his hands as he sat in his corner, crushed in defeat, and cried like a baby. It was the first time he had defended his title since he won it on July 25 last when he defeated the tottering Joe Dundee on a foul in two rounds.

Early this morning Thompson went to a hospital because of profuse bleeding of the eyes and nose which started after the fight.

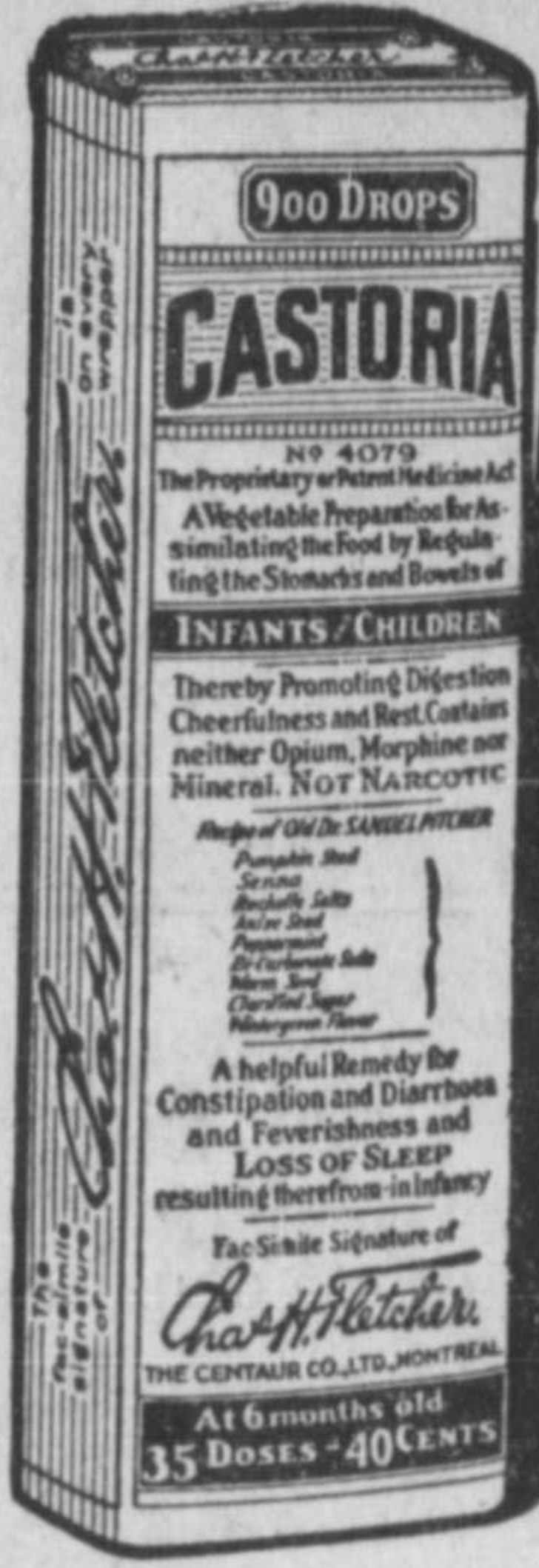

WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Fish Packer Alfred D. Sinks—Fish Auctions Here to Start Earlier in Day—Springs Running at Seven Mile Point

The fish packer Alfred D., belonging to the B. C. Packers, was burned to the waterline at Oceanic Cannery on the Skeena River early this week. An explosion in the engine room was the cause of the conflagration which destroyed the vessel. The Alfred D. was a well known boat in north coast waters of British Columbia and was a frequent visitor to Prince Rupert. She was built about ten years ago, was 35 feet long and equipped with a 15 h.p. Rallaco engine. The fire occurred as the vessel was being tuned up for the coming season's packing operations.

The brand new trolling boat Felix of New Westminster, owned and skippered by Capt. Hanson, while fishing off Butterworth Rocks near Prince Rupert this week, shipped a heavy sea through an open hatch and was swamped. Only prompt action on the part of boats nearby saved the boat from going down with the possible drowning of her owner. After the swamping, the Felix was towed into Prince Rupert and is now undergoing necessary repairs on the ways of the Ward Electric & Marine Supply Co.

Fish Sales Earlier

After the inauguration of the daily train service on May 19 and the change of departure time from 11:30 a.m. until 1 p.m., fish buyers at Prince Rupert will start their day's work earlier in order to get the fresh fish off to the eastern markets the same day in express refrigerator cars. The daily auction will start at 8 o'clock in the mornings instead of 10 or 11 o'clock or later as had been the case up to now. The earlier sale will be appreciated by the operators of the fishing vessels since it will result in getting their boats emptied that much earlier so they may commence outfitting for the next trip. In some cases, it may save at least a day of the boat's time.

D. B. Finn, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, left on Thursday night for Montreal to attend the annual meeting of the Biological Board of Canada, as well as meetings of the research and oceanographic committees of the board. While in the east, Mr. Finn will also attend the annual meeting of the Royal Society, Canada's leading scientific organization. He expects to return to Prince Rupert early in June.

Spring Salmon Running

A good run of spring salmon started at Seven Mile Point near Tow Hill, Graham Island, early this week and, upon the report of same being received, many of the Prince Rupert trolling fleet left for the scene. There is also an improvement in the spring run around the Dundas Islands while Warke Canal,

which has been having an exceptionally fine run this spring, continues to be good. The month of May will see practically the last of Prince Rupert's trolling fleet at work.

Dr. R. G. Large of Port Simpson arrived in town on Wednesday on board his power cruiser Sunbeam III, returning the next day to Port Simpson. The doctor will be here again tomorrow and will sail in the evening aboard the steamer Prince Rupert for a two weeks' trip to Vancouver.

Around Ketchikan, too, the trollers are now doing much better. On one day there over 35,000 pounds of salmon sold in the local market at prices ranging from 22 to 23 cents for large reds; 16 to 17 cents for small reds and 7 to 8 1/4 cents for white.

Nine of the "big smokers," diesel propelled boats from Hecate Strait, Goose Island district, were in from the south with the following loads: Helon, 1600 pounds sold at 23, 16 and 8 1/4 cents to New England; Arctic, 1400 pounds sold to New England at 23, 16 and 8 1/4 cents; Argo, 1600 pounds sold to New England at 23, 16 and 8 1/4 cents; Christie, 1400 pounds sold to Atlantic & Pacific at 23, 16 and 8 cents; Blanco, 1500 pounds sold to Atlantic & Pacific at 23, 16 and 8 cents; Falcon, 1200 pounds sold to Atlantic & Pacific at 23, 16 and 8 cents; Sharron, 1400 pounds sold to Atlantic & Pacific at 23, 16 and 8 cents; Pacific, 1400 pounds sold to Marilyn at 23, 16 and 8 1/4 cents; Ethel S., 1400 pounds sold to Marilyn at 23, 16 and 8 1/4 cents. Over 20 fares were brought in by the local trollers. The Phoenix, a packer of king salmon, arrived with 2500 pounds for Sebastian & Stuart.

Heading a veritable caravan, Pacific Salvage Co.'s power tug Salvage Princess, Capt. Frank Tyler, left at 12:30 midnight Wednesday with the season's first freight from here to the Taku River mining field following the break-up of the ice on that stream. The Princess had in tow several smaller boats which are to be put in service on the Taku as well as a scowload of lumber and, on deck, she carried a large parcel of freight. About the middle of next week, the Princess is expected back in port.

Cement to Falls River

Before leaving for the north, the Salvage Princess on Wednesday took a scowload of 265 tons of cement to Falls River for the Power Corporation of Canada. The large quantities of cement which are being delivered to Falls River just now are for use in the construction of the big dam in connection with the new hydro-electric power development.

Packer From Vancouver

The fish packer Olympic III, Capt. Miller, has arrived here from Vancouver and will be engaged this summer in packing salmon from the Queen Charlotte Islands to this port.

Halibut Landings

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the week of Saturday to Friday inclusive were light totalling only 575,100 pounds of which 200,100 pounds was from Canadian bottoms and 375,000 from American. This brings the total for the season to date up to 304,500 pounds Canadian and 4,308,400 pounds, American.

While landings during the week were light, prices showed little if any improvement over the week previous. The top bid for Canadian halibut was 11.8c and 5c which the H. and R. and Agnes B. were paid for catches of 5,000 and 3,000 pounds respectively and the low 10c and 5c which the Alice May and Morris H. received for fares of 2,000 and 10,000 pounds respectively. For American fish the top price was 12.7c and 6c which the Glacier received for 6,500 pounds and the low 10.2c and 5c which the Arctic was given for 22,000 pounds.

T. Kergin were hosts to some 36 young people aboard their yacht Full Moon. A cruise up Tucks Inlet was enjoyed and then the party disembarked near McNicholl Creek where a beach party was held. It was a very delightful evening for all.

Royal William First Steamer to Cross Ocean

HALIFAX, N.S., May 10—Although some records state the first steamship crossing of the Atlantic was made in 1819, it is believed that a Canadian built ship, sailing from a Canadian port, first made the entire voyage under steam some years later.

Though nominally steamers such ships in the time of 1819 relied entirely on sails when crossing the ocean, the engine, at a low rate of speed, being used only when head winds prevailed. This manner of navigating the long distance was a practice for a number of years.

In 1833, the Royal William, of 180 horse-power and 1,000 burden, was built at Three Rivers, on the lower St. Lawrence, for the purpose of plying between Nova Scotia and Cowes, Isle of Wight. She is believed to be the first ship to make the entire voyage across the Atlantic by steam. The occasion marked a new era in trans-oceanic communication, introducing a more powerful and faster class of boat relying on the use of steam for motive power.

TEMPLE FOR EDMONTON

Masons to Build \$200,000 Structure in Alberta Capital

EDMONTON, May 10—Construction of a new \$200,000 temple building on 100 Ave., near 100 St., will be undertaken by the Masonic order in Edmonton immediately.

Edmonton Masons have long planned erection of a modern temple building to offer better accommodation for the order's headquarters than is now available.

For many months past the building fund has been growing steadily and is now almost fully subscribed. Plans for the structure are being prepared by a prominent architect and construction work will be commenced as soon as the specifications have been completed.

The site, which was purchased some time ago, is held to be most desirable as the location for Masonic headquarters.
