When the fisheries commission met here a number of years ago it was stated that there were plenty of summer swain. herring in these waters and that the fish were of excellent quality, well suited for curing as well as for use as halibut bait. No thorough test has ever been made as to the quantity of fish available.

The decision of the Dominion Government to undertake this prospecting on behalf of the local fishermen will be received with satisfaction. Prince Rupert should not be wholly dependent on halibut and salmon but should secure a share of the benefits from the other fish.






