LONDON, Feb. 25:- "I hold Empire free trade as an ideal for which every Conservative should work but, as a practical policy today, it is impossible," Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Conservative leader, said in a statement yesterday in expressing officially the attitude of his party toward the new United Empire party of Lord Beaverbrook. "No responsible statesman," he said, "could go to the country and tell the electorate it would be introduced if he were returned to power. It cannot be done. The Dominions will not have it," Mr. Baldwin declared.

The deliberate destruction of cattle and, to a lesser extent, of horses by the peasants had assumed nation-wide proportion, and does not seem to have been altogether stopped by the recent rigorous punitive legislation which threatens the kulak with two years' imprisonment and confiscation of all his property for wilful killing of cattle, and establishes the milder punishment of expulsion from or non-admission to the collective farm for other peasants who are guilty of this of-

The wholesale slaughtering of cattle, which threatens both the working effciency of the collective farms and the already straitened supply of the country with meat and dairy products is partly a desperate form of passive resistance, practiced by the richer peasants who are faced with ruin in any event and partly a last flicker of the instinct for private ownership on the part of the peasants who are entering the collective farms and feel that the personal ownership of the animals will be lost there.



Due to conditions which no one can control, the export of raw material, mainly grain and grain products, shows a decrease of \$70,700,000.

But, on the other hand, exports of goods, manufactured or partly manufactured, show an increase of \$46,500,000, which is at the rate of 9.4%.

The trend of the year's activity in export trade is clearly in the direction of increased exports of manufactured or partly manufactured goods, while the export of raw materials has declined considerably.
