## GET BEHIND THE BUTTON AND BUY VICTORY BONDS

Prince Rupert is doing well; Subscribers all Asked to wear their Emblem during Remainder of Week

Prince Rupert has already about reached the objective of \$175,000 in the Victory Loan drive. Saturday night the returns showed \$165,750. The city is doing well, and there is already a good deal of canvassing to be done and it is expected that the quarter of a million dollars will be reached before the end of the final week.

L. K. Makovski who was here at the week end from the Vancouver office made a special request that every purchaser of the special Victory Loan button. This button is given to the bond buyer and for this week only it should be displayed.

Mr. Makovski in an interview Saturday said that it was absolutely necessary to complete the financing of the war by re-employing the soldiers and spending money in various ways until conditions became normal. This was initially a war loan and would be the last. He looked for over a quarter of a million from Prince Rupert.

This week sees the windup of the drive. The local canvassers are out in good time today and are meeting with a good deal of success. In most cases it has been unnecessary to even ask for money. People had already bought it out and decided how many bonds they could take. It is simply a matter of filling in the application and writing a check.

## CARS MUST NOT KEEP CAR

Automobiles and Motor Cycles Prohibited Except by Special Permission.

DUBLIN, Nov. 9.—A proclamation has been issued by the Commander in Chief of the forces in Ireland, forbidding the owning or using of an automobile or motor cycle in Ireland, except by special permission. The order will be effective November 15.

Automobiles and motor cycles have been used a good deal of late in connection with illegal acts of Sinn Feiners and the order is issued for the purpose of curbing these activities.

## STEAMER POLAR SUNK AT SEA

United States Shipping Board Vessel was 250 Miles From Halifax.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—The United States Shipping Board's steamer Polar has been sunk at sea, according to a wireless message received at Boston. The estimated position of the steamer is about 250 miles off Halifax.

## JELICOE GIVEN BIG RECEPTION

Arrives on New Zealand and Will Be Guest at Ball Tonight.

VICTORIA, Nov. 10.—Admiral Jellicoe was given a great reception on his arrival here on board the battle cruiser New Zealand. Tonight he and Lady Jellicoe are to be entertained at a grand Navy League ball.

## ARE OPPOSING TREATY WITH THIS COUNTRY

Alaskan and Seattle Interests Fear Competition of This Port.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Because Prince Rupert may benefit therefrom, Alaska and Seattle fishing interests are opposing the reciprocal treaty with Canada which is now awaiting final ratification.

The treaty grants Canadian fishing vessels the same rights in American ports that are granted to American vessels and equal rights to American vessels in Canadian ports, in a measure removing some of the objections which American interests have made to present conditions.

Also the treaty provides for the abrogation by Canada of the present Canadian tariff of one cent a pound on halibut, the United States having no such tariff.

Stringent regulation for preservation of halibut in the North Pacific, by establishing closed seasons and other measures are features of the treaty. These regulations are reported to be those recommended and discussed before the joint international conference which considered the subject on the Pacific Coast.

The text of the treaty having been approved by the Canadian and American commissioners, it now only awaits formal signature before being sent to the Senate for ratification.

Sir Douglas Hazen of Canada, one of the negotiators, has been designated to sign for the British Government. As soon as President Wilson is well enough to sign an order designating Secretary Lansing to sign for the United States a date will be set for signing and Sir Douglas will come here for the purpose.

The only objection now to the signing is the opposition of the American fishing interests which fear the competition of this port.

## RUSSIANS PREPARE TO WITHDRAW FROM OMSK HEADQUARTERS

LONDON, Nov. 9.—Representatives of foreign governments at Omsk, the headquarters of the Kolchak forces in Siberia, are preparing to withdraw from that city, the state department has been informed. This follows the defeat of the All-Russian forces by the Bolsheviks.

## COMMITTEE ON ROADS TO REPORT TO BOARD

In accordance with a resolution of the Board of Trade passed at the last meeting President McCaffery has appointed J. H. Pillsbury, Colonel McMordie and J. Roerig to be a special committee to report in regard to road improvements. They are expected to have their report ready for the next general meeting.



## CELEBRATE ARMISTICE DAY BY REACHING QUOTA FOR PROVINCE

Tomorrow is "Armistice Day" and the British Columbia committee is very anxious to have the province of British Columbia reach its quota of \$17,147,800 on that day. It would be a fitting method by which to celebrate the anniversary of the successful close of the greatest struggle in history.

District returns show that while the gross returns this year are almost as large as for last year at the same time, the number of purchases of bonds is much smaller, in fact less than half the number of last year.

The patriotic appeal is not used this year as it was last. People purchase bonds mostly because they want a good investment. But there is also a duty to the state to perform. Money is needed and only by individual lending can the affairs of the country be carried on.

## FEW FISH BOATS DURING WEEK

Drop in Quantity of Fish Marketed Followed Drop in Price.

The fish arrivals and shipments were very light last week. In fact it was the smallest week for many months. There were only three carloads of halibut shipped east as against seventeen for the previous week. It is expected that there will be more boats in this week especially as the price is going up again.

Following are the arrivals and sales at yesterday's Fish Exchange:

Agnes B., 41,000; Viola, 3,000; Nidaros, 6,000; Nornen, 2,000. These boats sold to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. at 18.5c and 13.5c.

The Senator sold 30,000 lbs. to the National Fisheries at 18.5c and 13.5c.

Margerite sold 4,000 lbs. to the Cold Storage at 18.6c and 13.5c.

## DUMP EXPLODES

Ten British Soldiers Fail to Report After Ammunition Blown Up.

## D'ANNUNZIO'S TROOPS CLASH WITH ITALIANS

ROME, Nov. 10.—There has been a clash between the forces of the Italian Government and D'Annunzio's troops in which casualties were suffered on both sides, according to statements issued by the Serbian official press bureau.

## FILIPINO KID GOES UP FOR SIX MONTHS

Had Become General Nuisance to Police, so Goes to Jail.

J. Villamore, the Filipino Kid, drew the maximum penalty in the police court this morning for vagrancy. He was given six months at Okalla Farm by Magistrate McMordie. Villamore has been a general nuisance in the city and has been ordered out of town on various occasions. He had also served various terms in jail here and had been found guilty of theft once.

He was noticed around town on Friday last and was arrested in a shack which he and two Chinamen had taken possession of. Articles that are prohibited by law were found on the premises and it was decided that the only way to get rid of the Kid was to give him a good stiff jail sentence, so he received the maximum.

## ARMISTICE DAY IS TO BE CELEBRATED

Tomorrow, Armistice Day, having been proclaimed a provincial public holiday, the banks and public buildings will be closed. Mayor McClymont said this afternoon the City hall would close for the day. The Daily News will publish as usual.

## 'KING GEORGE' SINKS NEAR JAP POINT

Captain and Crew Tramp Beach for Sixteen Miles to Metlakatla.

The big gas boat King George was wrecked off Jap Point on Saturday morning. She had been running all the night before in the heavy wind and snow storm and was returning from Alice Arm to Prince Rupert. Her crew had been working in the mines at Alice Arm and were coming south for the winter. While at that place her storage batteries had become pretty well drained and she had been experiencing difficulty going all the way south.

About 10 o'clock on Saturday morning the craft struck a snag or submerged log and began to ship water fifteen minutes later. The boat was immediately headed for shore and just before reaching the Jap Point buoy she sank in shallow water over the rocks. The crew immediately took to the row boats and got to shore, saving only their blankets.

## Attempt to Row.

Shortly after this they attempted to row the rest of the way to Metlakatla, but found that it was almost impossible to buck the heavy southeastern gale. They went ashore again and walked along the shore line, a distance of 16 miles. They reached the Indian village late in the afternoon, wet, tired and disgusted. Fortunately, Frank M. Davis was over with his gas boat the Mayflower and brought the men to town although he had not intended coming back till the next morning. They arrived in Rupert after 11 o'clock on Saturday night.

The King George was a large boat, 40 feet long. At one time she was engaged in fishing, but has been used for other purposes lately. She is now submerged in shallow water and it is believed that she can be successfully raised. Fred Miller, a well known waterfront man, was her captain.

## LETTS ENVELOP BOLSHIEVKS IN BIG OFFENSIVE

British are Bombarding Lines of Retreat Says Press Bureau.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The Lettish Press Bureau announces that on the fourth day of the Bolshevik offensive the Lettish troops are gradually enveloping the forces of Colonel Avaloff Bermond and bombarding his lines of retreat with the assistance of the Allied fleet.

### Railway Belongs To the Nation.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway now belongs to the nation. It has been acquired along with the parent line at a big price and we must make the best we can of it. Possibly it may be better for this city to have the line owned by someone that has money to spend in improving it. At any rate the railway is purchased and it is for us all to unite in making it cater to the needs of this and surrounding communities.

So far as Prince Rupert is concerned it should not make much difference who owns the railway. It is probable, however, that the railway improvements will now be made. There is the station, the coastal dock and the ocean dock, these in particular are necessary to the development of this port and it will be worth while going after them.

### Keep Clear of Political Influences.

It is hoped that now the railway is owned by the country it will be kept quite clear of all political influences. It must be run on business lines if it is to be a success. One reason why so many people dreaded Government ownership was the knowledge that in the past politics had played such an important part in the operation of big public utilities. If the commission is freed from political influence good results may be obtained, but otherwise we may expect nothing but failure.

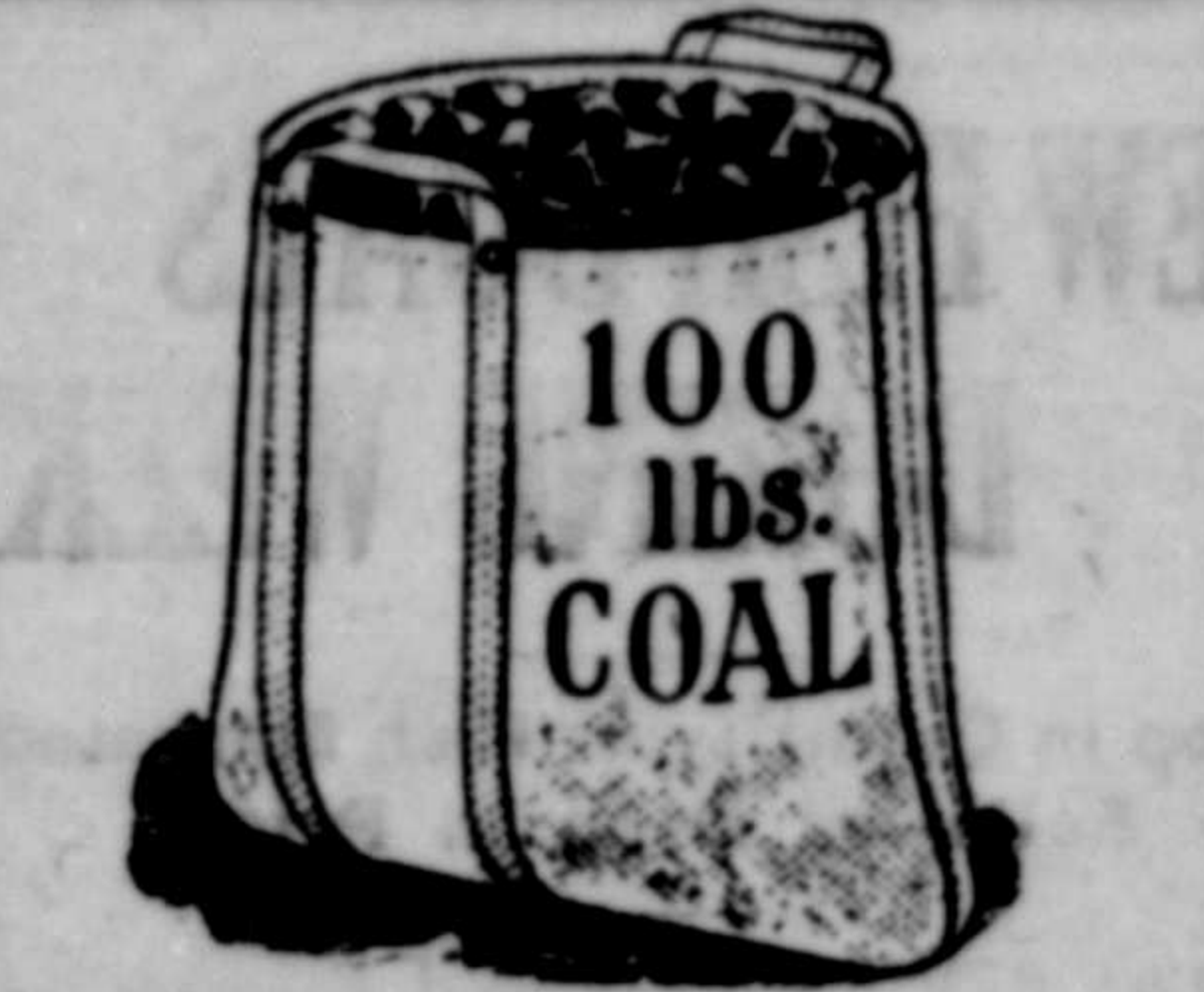

A new flux quarry is being opened at Anyox. It is located up Hidden Creek back of the smelter and the ore will be transported to the plant by means of a cable tramway. The new mine is named the Rambler Quartz.

Several Stewart mines expect to keep operating all winter. Among the properties that intend to operate right through the winter are the Big Missouri, Joker, Fortynine, New Alaska, Bush and E Pluribus Unum as well as the Premier Mine.

The people of Swanson Bay celebrated Hallowe'en fittingly. During the afternoon the festivities were given over to the children, while in the evening a big masquerade ball was held for the adults. The prize winners were: Ladies' prize, Mrs. Hall; gents' Mrs. Atleek.

In a recent mining report the Dolly Varden mine at Alice Arm is stated to be the largest silver producer in the province of British Columbia.

During his recent visit to the North on the Victory Loan campaign, G. G. McGeer, M. L. A. for Richmond, addressed meetings at Ocean Falls, Anyox, Alice Arm Swanson Bay, besides Prince Rupert. Mr. McGeer was very satisfied with the prospects for bond sale in the district. He was impressed with the mining activity that he witnessed and heard about and predicted a big mining rush in the spring.

### The Man in the Moon

## THE FINAL VICTORY LOAN

Editorial in The Globe, Toronto, Sept. 16, 1919

Preparations for the launching of the final Victory Loan have been begun. From this time forward until the end of the campaign public interest in the financial condition of the Dominion will increase steadily. There is need for a discussion not only of the fundamentals of National Finance, but for the diffusion of information all over the country as to the purposes for which this specific loan is required. The war is over. The appeal to the win-the-war spirit—so effective in the floating of former loans—cannot be made upon this occasion. Instead, there must be an appeal to the common sense of the people and to their desire to do all that is possible to bring about the restoration of normal conditions in the Dominion.

The first thing that must be impressed upon the public mind is the fact that a large part of the money called for is required to wipe out the indebtedness of the Government to Canadian banks that have advanced great sums—almost a quarter of a billion dollars—to enable the Government to grant credits for the purchase of goods for export to Allied countries that are unable to pay cash for all the Canadian provisions and other products they require. The loan is needed also to meet the heavy expenditures attending the demobilization of the Canadian overseas army. Gratuities and back pay run into enormous sums. The credits to Great Britain to enable her to continue buying Canadian products have been very large. Greece, Roumania, and Belgium have been supplied with foodstuffs, clothing, and implements through a loan of seventy-five million dollars made by the Canadian Government to the Governments of these countries. Sir Henry Drayton says that further credits will have to be made to finance the export of our natural products. The loans will be repaid in time, and such portions of them as are not promptly liquidated by the importation of British and continental European goods into Canada will remain to the credit of the Canadian people as an investment of capital on which interest will be drawn.

It is good to have considerable investments abroad instead of remaining—as Canada was before the war—almost exclusively a debtor nation. In pre-war days, for example, the British people had almost three billion dollars invested in Canada. They owned huge blocks of national, Provincial, and municipal securities. They held the bulk of the bonds and stock of our railways. They had much money in Western lands and in Eastern manufacturing enterprises. Large blocks of bank capital were British. It required the export of about a hundred and fifty million dollars' worth of Canadian products yearly to pay even the interest on this great investment. That fact indicates why Canadian exports to Great Britain were greater than Canada's imports from Great Britain. They had to be about a hundred and fifty million greater if we were not to keep going more deeply into debt year by year through the reinvestment of British money in Canada.

During the war the British people sold or put in pledge large amounts of Canadian securities—not less probably than half a billion dollars' worth—and Canadians have been buying these securities by means of a large surplus of exports. It is anticipated that after all the war accounts are balanced Canada will have reduced her debt to British capital by at least half a billion dollars, and that hereafter she will have to export twenty-five million dollars' worth less of her products than in pre-war years to pay her annual interest bill to Great Britain.

But it may be argued that the Canadian people as a whole will not benefit because some of them owe less to some of the British people than they did before the war. This is a mistaken view. It is true that there has been a vast increase of Canada's internal debt because of the war. For a period of years too long to estimate with any degree of certainty all the people of Canada as taxpayers will have to pay about \$120,000,000 a year as interest on the war debt to the much smaller number of Canadians who hold war bonds. But when we get down to concrete cases instead of dealing in the mass the debt burden of two billions does not look so hopelessly large. The interest amounts to about \$15 per year per head. Every shop girl or domestic or workman who has been able to buy three hundred dollars' worth of Victory bonds—and their numbers run up into hundreds of thousands—will get annually in interest from the Government a little more than enough to pay his or her share of the taxation due to war debt. In other words, their savings cancel their share of the debt.

Had the country tried to finance its war expenditure by foreign instead of internal loans—supposing that to have been possible—the condition of Canada would have been vastly more serious to-day. Our debt to external creditors would have been over four and a half billion dollars, and to pay the interest at the current rate would have involved the export of about two hundred and thirty million dollars' worth of Canadian products yearly without any corresponding imports. The effect upon the manufacturers and merchants of Canada of such a drain would have been almost ruinous, for the people of the Dominion would have their buying capacity very seriously reduced by the export of their products to pay interest on the external debt. It is therefore of great importance that the Canadian people as a whole should owe some of the Canadian people the bulk of the money spent in prosecuting the war. The interest is spent in the country, and benefits in the spending all classes of the community—the debtor as well as the creditor.

If the argument here presented is a sound one, then it follows that to the very limit of our capacity we should continue to buy Victory Bonds. The new issue will have to yield at least four hundred million dollars to enable the National Treasury to discharge its obligations during the current financial year. Victory Bonds are an excellent investment, but they are more than that. They are a sign that Canadians have faith in their country, in its vast resources, in the stability of its Government, in the will and the power of the people to build up and maintain a civilization which will stand the greatest stress that can be brought to bear upon the foundations whereon the Dominion has been reared.

### 1,000 DOGS KILLED IN VICTORIA LAST YEAR

Proposal to Provide Revenue by Selling Skins of Stray Canines.

VICTORIA, Nov. 10.—Ald. John Harvey, chairman of the Pound Committee of the City Council, announced last night that he will investigate the problem of disposal of stray dogs' hides. It has been suggested to him that considerable revenue might be derived for the city from the sale of the skins of dogs killed at the pound, as leather merchants are said to be in the market for such material and are prepared to pay high prices for it.

"One thousand dogs were killed last year by the poundkeeper," said Ald. Harvey. "So far as I know the carcasses were destroyed at the city incinerator. This meant, of course, a complete loss to the city. I don't see why the carcasses should not be preserved and the skins removed and sold. The poundkeeper probably would not have time to handle this work but the leather merchants might look after that. The proposition is worth investigating anyway. It has been tried out on the prairies and found successful."

Ald. Joseph Patrick is said to be also in favor of the plan and he can probably be counted upon to support Ald. Harvey in the probe. Ald. Patrick says that many of the dogs impounded have been disposed of by the poundkeeper to Gordon Head poultry farmers who are warring against a plague of weasels.

Aldermen look upon the whole

proposition in a favorable light. They see in it an opportunity for the pound department to become a revenue producer; indeed, the creator of a brand new industry for Victoria.

He joined the Cunard company in 1878 and became a master in 1903, his first ship being the Aleppo. He has been in command of many large Atlantic steamers. On the Mauretania he made the record for speed between Liverpool and New York. Two of his ships were torpedoed during the war, first the Lusitania in 1915 and the Ivernia, in the Mediterranean, in 1917.

In 1918 Captain Turner received the decoration of the fourth class of the Order of the British Empire. He is becoming an old man and the rigor and especially the excitement of the war period is said to have told on his nerves and health.

### ADDRESSES BOARD
