#### Sam Cocker Given Nomination To Contest Omineca Riding In Next Election For B. C. House

BURNS LAKE, Nov. 25.—Samuel Cocker was the successful candidate in the nomination convention held here yesterday by the Omineca Conservative Association. Arthur Shelford of Wistaria, the defeated Conservative candidate in the last provincial election, was the only other nominee. The first and only ballot gave Cocker 31 votes and Shelford 16, and Cocker was hailed as the standard bearer amid scenes of wild enthusiasm. Mr. Shelford made a motion that the nomination be made unanimous. This was seconded by W. J. Rimes of Vanderhoof and carried unanimously with loud shouts and applause.

#### VETERAN NEWSMAN

Walter F. Payne Expires at Winnipeg After Having Been 50 Years With Free Press

WINNIPEG, Nov. 25.—Walter F. Payne, veteran Winnipeg newspaperman and for nearly fifty years a member of the editorial staff of the Manitoba Free Press, died here this morning after a week's illness. He was news editor of the Free Press for many years.

Born in Chatham, Ont., on June 20, 1863, the late Mr. Payne was educated at Charing Cross. Like many of the pioneer newspapermen he entered the game by the printing end in his native town. In 1880 he joined the Grip Publishing Co. in Toronto but the next year came to Winnipeg. He had resided here ever since then.

The late Mr. Payne is survived by a widow, one son and two daughters. He took a great interest in curling and was a past president of the Manitoba Curling Association. He was a Liberal in politics and a Methodist in religious belief.

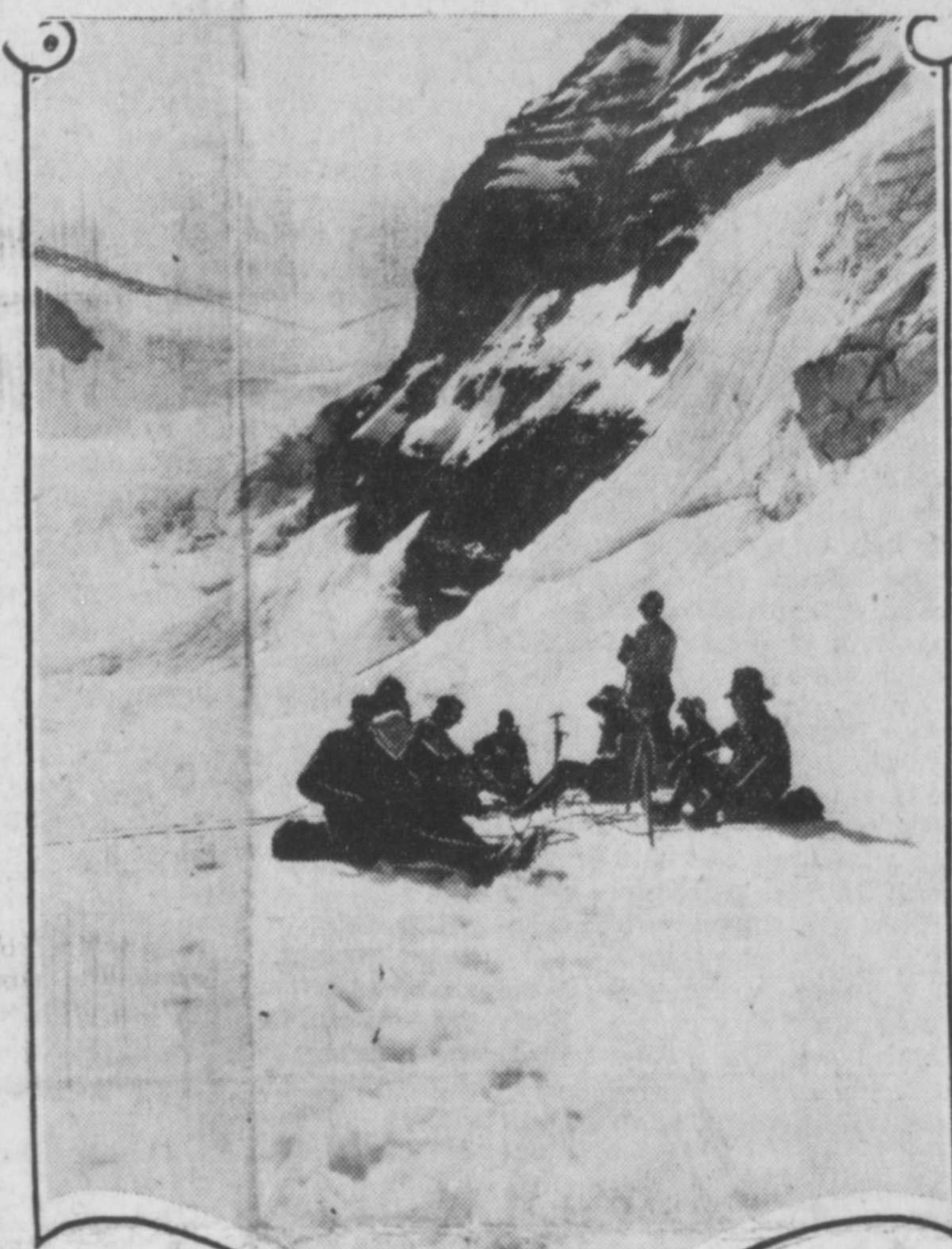

#### Duty on Manufactured Goods is Promised by Conservative Leader

Eight Hundred Delegates, Without Dissenting, Give Renewal of Their Trust to Former Premier of England

LONDON, Nov. 25.—Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin was given a unanimous vote of confidence as leader of the Conservative party by eight hundred delegates to the Central Council of the National Union of Conservative and Unionist Associations today. Mr. Baldwin, speaking in reply to the resolution, made an important announcement to the effect that the first step the Conservatives would take if they came into power would be to impose an emergency tariff on manufactured goods as quickly as possible.

#### TELEPHONE DEPARTMENT SURPLUS WAS \$1315

During the month of October, estimated revenue of the city telephone department was \$4,506 with expenses of \$3,191, leaving a surplus of \$1,315. It was reported to the city council last night by Sam Massey, superintendent of the department.

MONTREAL, Nov. 25.—Leo Plaisance, 37-year old bell boy in a local hotel, won \$50,000 for drawing Glorious Devon in the Canadian Legion sweepstakes on the Manchester Handicap Saturday.

#### Huge Prehistoric Creature Of Strange Characteristics Found In Ice Near Cordova

CORDOVA, Alaska, Nov. 25.—A giant amphibian lizard-like creature has been found encased in ice on Glacier Island, reports from Valdez, near the island, said today. The creature was forty feet long, and its fur was in perfect condition. The tail measured sixteen feet, the head six feet and the body twenty feet in length.

The body is believed to have been preserved since prehistoric times in the ice on the upper reaches of the Columbia Glacier and the ice coffin, it is assumed, gradually worked its way to the sea.

#### Council Taking Steps to Handle Unemployment Emergency Arising In City; Near 400 Are Workless

Importance of Bylaws Being Passed This Week Is Stressed—Increase Relief Amounts to Be Sought By Municipality

The unemployment situation, plans for unemployment relief and ways and means of carrying same out were important matters of discussion at last night's meeting of the city council. A report from the city engineer which was read to the council by Mayor Orme stated that a total of 383 men had been registered at the engineer's office as being in need of work. The city engineer asked for a ruling from the council as to how these men should be handled and, in return, received a suggestion that as many as possible should be taken care of in the first two weeks, always giving the preference to married men with families resident here. The council was loath to interfere with the city engineer in the matter of hiring and firing men but members of the board expressed their willingness to co-operate if it were so desired by the city engineer. Ald. Pullen, urging that ratepayers attend the public meeting tonight and hear the nature of the relief work bylaws explained, expressed the opinion that it would be "a tragedy" if these bylaws should be defeated through apathy or for any other reason. Mayor Orme and Ald. Macdonald agreed with this view.

#### MANY DEAD IN STORMS

Mortal Toll In Western Europe Tempest Estimated Between Forty and Fifty

#### Land Inundated

England and Ireland Among Countries Which Suffered From Floods

LONDON, Nov. 25.—Flood waters washed over farms and through populous cities and towns today in England, Ireland, Belgium, Holland, France and Germany. The gale, which had lashed Western Europe over the week-end, died down during the night but another blow was threatened this morning. Deaths in Western Europe are estimated at between forty and fifty. Vast areas of the western and eastern counties of England are under water, not to any great depth but sufficient to interrupt communications and isolate scattered dwellings.

#### RENAHAN HUNT ON

Aerial Search Will now Concentrate in This Sector—Visibility Good and Planes Busy Today

Flight Lieutenant Phinney and Flying Officer Dunlap, favored with greatly improved weather conditions, are in the air again today continuing the search for Pilot Robin Renahan and two companions who have now been missing exactly four weeks today while on a flight from Vancouver to Atlin and who are believed to have been forced down somewhere between here and Ketchikan.

The two Air Force machines took off shortly after 10 o'clock this morning with the intention of closely examining the areas back of Kaien Island and north of here. Signs of a crash are being sought. It is a fine, clear day and visibility is excellent for such a search. After a week of misty rains, there was a decided improvement today in meteorological conditions.


The two United States Navy planes, conducting a search out of Ketchikan, will also be actively on the job today, it is expected. With Capt. Burke, Atlin flyer, found, the whole northern search will now concentrate on the quest near here for Robin Renahan. With the necessity of having to go to Atlin removed, it is considered likely that the Air Force planes will be held here indefinitely to assist in the Renahan search.

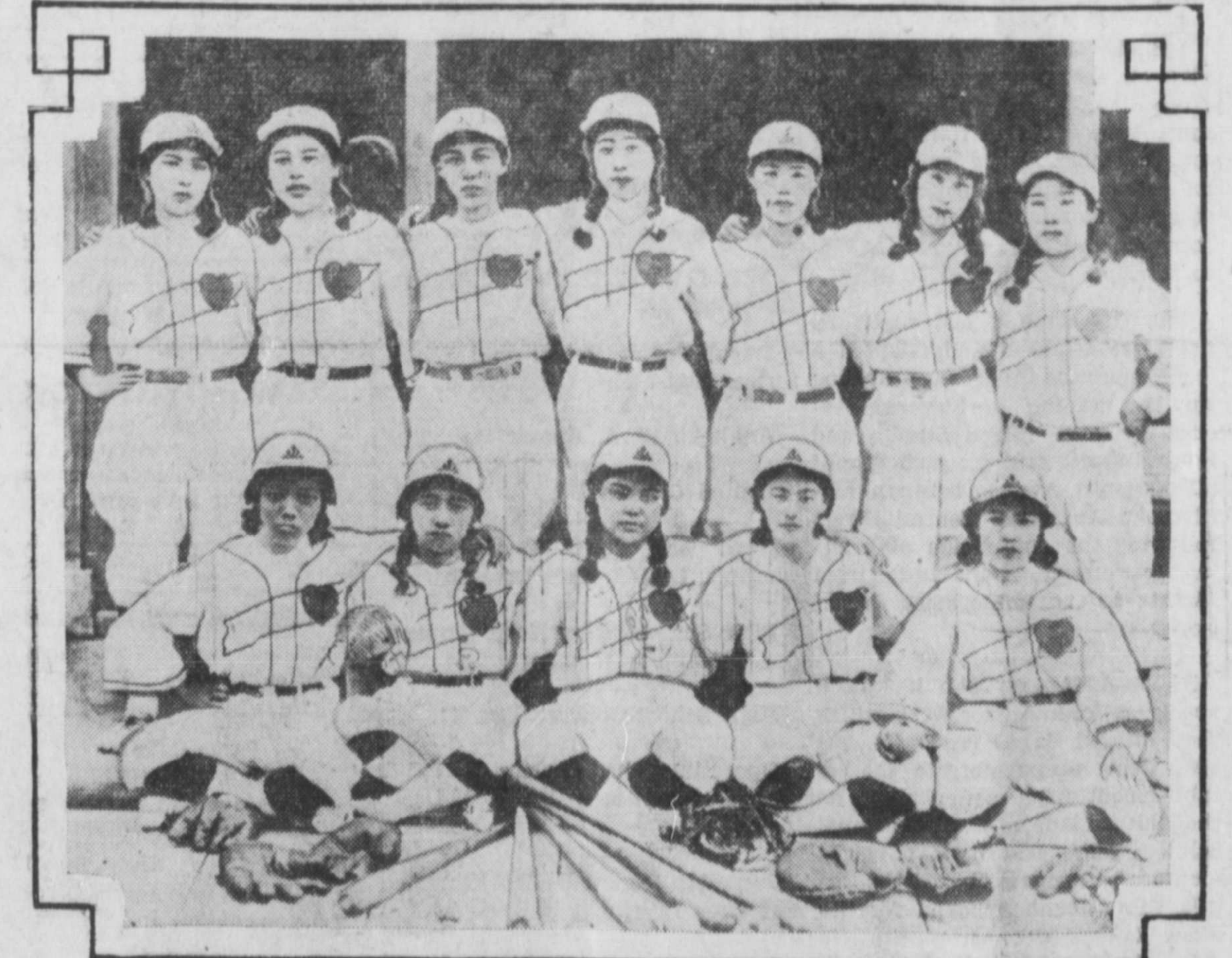
## Co-Operative Insurance On Public Bld'gs

## FACILITIES AT FLOATS

Improvements Requested of City Council by N. B. C. Salmon Fishermen's Association

A list of necessary improvements in connection with the new fishermen's floats was presented to the city council last night by the Northern British Columbia Fishermen's Association. ## Ford President Makes Longest Phone Call



**THE LONGEST TELEPHONE CALL** ever made inaugurated the new radio telephone service connecting Canada and Australia when Mr. Wallace R. Campbell, president of the Ford Motor Company of Canada, Limited, talked from his desk in the company's plant at East Windsor, Ontario, to Mr. Hubert C. French, Managing Director of the Ford Motor Company of Australia, Pty., Ltd., at his home in Geelong, Australia. The call was solely for business purposes. Beam radio signals and land wires carried the conversation over 16,820 miles, or two-thirds of the distance around the globe.

It was 9:15 a.m. in East Windsor and 12:15 a.m. in Geelong when the call was made. Mr. Campbell, the operator, had been on duty for a few minutes and 35 seconds, the two automobile executives discussed the affairs of the Australian Ford Company with as little difficulty as if they had been talking over a few hundred miles of land wires.

So efficient did this new method of rapid communication prove that Mr. Campbell is planning to use the service regularly to keep more closely in touch with the affairs of the Australian company. Hitherto, only the cables have been available. A similar service is expected to become available soon which will enable Mr. Campbell to conduct business by radio telephone with

The Ford associated companies in India, Malaya and South Africa and the agency in New Zealand. The call was routed over a beam network of land telephone lines and four beam radio systems. From East Windsor, Mr. Campbell's voice was flashed by land lines to New York City and Reddy Point, Long Island. Thence it was transmitted by short wave radio to a receiving station at Rugby, England, whence it was flashed by land lines to the British Post Office station in London. From there it was carried by beam radio to Sydney, Australia, and thence by land lines to Geelong. The return circuit, separate from the first, carried Mr. French's voice by land wires from Geelong to Sydney; thence by beam radio to London, by land wires to Cupar, Scotland, by beam radio to Bolton, Maine, and thence by land wires through New York City to East Windsor. It was the most ambitious radio telephone circuit ever set up for a purely business call.

Trained operators in New York who monitored the call reported they had heard Mr. Campbell's voice distinctly on the return circuit from Geelong, after it had travelled more than 33,000 miles. "The inauguration of this new service, an outstanding achievement in communication, will knit more closely than ever the two great dominions of the British Empire and should markedly facilitate the conduct of trade between them," said Mr. Campbell.

### Twenty Years Ago

In Prince Rupert  
November 25, 1930

The Harris Bros. have refused an offer of \$100,000 for the American Boy mine near Hazelton. The offer was made by Prince Rupert interests. The property will be bonded for a much larger sum in Vancouver, W. S. Harris states.

The work of erecting the pole line along Third Avenue in connection with the new power plant is proceeding. Two boilers in the power station at Cow Bay are now in place and the engine is on its way from Vancouver.

Mrs. Sarah Christina Mortoson, wife of Louis Mortoson, Third Avenue, died from the effects of burns sustained some time ago when she fainted while carrying a lamp. She is survived by two sons and a daughter. (Mrs. F. W. Chandler, who still lives here, is the daughter.)

### CITY BORROWING \$100,000 FROM BANK

After information had been received from F. E. Robertson, local manager, to the effect that head office of the Royal Bank of Canada had approved the advancing of another \$50,000 to the city, the council last night put through a bylaw providing for the temporary borrowing from the bank of \$100,000 including \$50,000 for the new loan and \$50,000 for the renewal of a note now coming due. Maturity date will be in March.

## NEWS OF THE MINES

AROUND PRINCE RUPERT

Annual Meeting of Dalhousie Co. — Interior Coal Proving Popular — McGill Reviews Activities In Omineca Mining Division

At the annual meeting of the Dalhousie Mining Co. Ltd., which was held recently in Victoria, the president, in his address, stated that it was hoped by next spring to have actually blocked out sufficient ore to keep the proposed mill at the Molybdenum property near Alice Arm running for two years or more. In view of the length of ore bodies exposed on the surface and allowing for them to extend downward for a reasonable depth, there was probably, as a matter of fact, sufficient ore for the property to keep a mill of reasonable size going for an indefinite period. Efforts to finance the work have met with excellent success and, within a short time, it is expected that all financing will be completed to equip the property with a good mill of fifty tons per day initial capacity and to develop sufficient ore to keep it working for a long period. The mill should be completed and the property in profitable production within approximately a year. Directors were re-elected and officers for the ensuing year are: president, Andrew Wright; treasurer, E. Butterworth; secretary, D. S. Tait; directors, W. D. Brown, Henry Mitchell, George Cameron and William A. Pratt.

There has been a great run on the output of the coal mine which is being operated near Telkwa by Frank Dockrill ever since the cooler weather has set in. Up to the present, it has been out of the question to get any coal ahead for shipment as people with trucks have been at the mine bunkers to cart the coal away as soon as miners bring it out. The Telkwa coal is proving very popular with the people of the Bulkley Valley.

The end of the season of activity and settling down for the winter finds Omineca mining division not together without some hopeful signs writes L. S. McGill, well known lawyer and mining man of Smithers. The activities of W. R. Wilson & Sons on the Ingenika River have accomplished a great deal and some of the Finlay River prospects taken up last year are said to be showing up very well. Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. carried out an active season of work on the Emerald property in the Sibola region, southwest of Houston, but it is reported that some of the work that was done did not meet with quite as much success as might have been anticipated. Another field where consolidation was also working during the season in the vicinity of Takla Lake and Driftwood River where promising copper and gold showings are said to have been discovered. In the Omineca River and Manson Creek sections placer operations were carried on by a number of operators, including Consolidated. Distance from transportation has been always a serious handicap for this section but the construction of a new government road into the area from Fort St. James appears to help out in this respect while the Peace River rail outlet through Peace River Pass will be sure to put the district on its feet. In the Babine Range, some work has been carried out on the Iron mine and it is concurrently reported in Smithers that the Crofton interests will carry on a development program on the property commencing in the very near future. Such work as has been done in the past two years has opened up much new ore and is very encouraging but finances have been lacking for extensive work. The Lorraine and Silver King properties have had active development work which has met with success. The most recent work in the main tunnel of the Silver King has advanced a tunnel as a drift on ore for fifty feet and some remarkable showings of native silver have been brought in from the new development. F. W. Galloway, Spokane mining engineer made an examination of the property in the latter part of October and is understood to have been favorably impressed with what he saw. Glacier Gulch group on Hudson Bay Mountain is still under negotiation for a deal but so far none has been closed. J. B. Woodworth,

Vancouver mining engineer, made a brief examination of this property in October and is said to have been favorably impressed with gold-bearing showings which have attracted so much attention this year. In May, 1928, Mr. Woodworth made an examination of the silver-lead-zinc showings on the same property and had an interim option which he relinquished in order to centre his efforts on the Porche, Island gold property near Prince Rupert. There has been some change in the coal mining situation in the district this fall. Telkwa Collieries, five miles from Telkwa, have operated for several years past but, owing to the death of Frank Taggart, who was promoting a large project to develop with English capital a plant to utilize the by-products from the coal of this and other coal properties in the district, the mine is now closed. To supply the needs of the district in coal, Frank M. Dockrill has opened for operation another coal mine just one mile from the Telkwa Collieries and is now ready to start shipping. Road, camp and bunkers have been constructed and a good quality of coal taken out from what
